Yonkers Swimmer, Maichina Gennerelli Qualifies for State Championships

On Saturday, October 23rd, Yonkers High School Sophomore, Maichina Gennerelli, made history for Yonkers Swimming at the Conference III Swimming Championships held at The Mark Twain Pool. Gennerelli is the first female athlete from Yonkers ever to qualify for the New York State Swimming and Diving Championships, which will be held at Ithaca College on November $19-20,\,2021.$

At Conference Championships, Maichina won the 500-yard freestyle event with a time of 5:14.05, which met the state qualifying time standard of 5:14.60. Gennerelli qualified last year as well, but the State Championships were cancelled due to Covid.

"I'm actually in disbelief that I made history for Yonkers," Gennerelli said. "I want to thank my teammates for helping me make the cut. While I was swimming, I could see them cheering for me, which was great motivation. I felt like the happiest person in the world after my race!"

With the recent retirements of the Yonkers Building Commissioner and Deputy Building Commissioner, Mayor Mike Spano has brought in Sam Borrelli, to serve as acting Building Commissioner, in an effort to improve the services to the people of Yonkers.

Borrelli, who has worked as the Deputy Commissioner of the Yonkers DPW until his transfer to the Building Department, is an engineer, but not a licensed, profressional engineer, which is a requirement for the positon based on the City Charter.

City Council Majority Leader Mike Breen has drafted legislation to amend the Charter to permit Borrelli to become the permanent Building Commissioner

"The mayor wanted to expand the pool of qualified candidates to find someone who can effectively run the Building Department. You don't have to be a licensed engineer to run the Building Department, you need a professional manager and Sam Borrelli is a practical engineer who was gettings things done at DPW, and also brings the management experience that we were looking for. That is why I have drafted and sponsored this legislation," said Councilmember Breen.

The Local Law would amend the City Charter to remove the words "professional engineer." Breen said he has heard from numerous residents in Yonkers about some of the problems they have experienced from the Building Department.

"We want to alleviate these problems and get a building department that is

Yonkers Police Arrest, Charge 15-year-old Gang Member with Attempted Murder

Previously Arrested for Multiple Shooting at Age 13



On Saturday, November 6th, 2021, at approximately 11:10 PM, members of the Yonkers Police Department responded to Saint Joseph's Hospital at 127 South Broadway on a report of a male gunshot victim having collapsed in the parking lot. Upon arrival officers met the victim who had been moved inside to the Emergency Department; he was in critical condition with several gunshot wounds to his torso and upon being stabilized was transferred to a local area trauma center. The victim's personal vehicle was located in the hospital parking lot with ballistic evidence present. A criminal investigation was initiated.

Detectives from the Major Case Squad and Crime Scene Unit responded to the scene and interviewed subjects and witnesses, recovered surveillance video, and processed forensic and ballistic evidence. Within hours investigators were able to trace the victim's movements back to where the shooting incident occurred, in the parking lot of the White Castle restaurant at 257 South Broadway. Investigation yielded that the victim, a 20-year-old resident of Yonkers, had driven to White Castle to meet several individuals in a marijuana transaction. One of the individuals, now suspect, allegedly displayed a 9mm handgun and attempted to rob the victim of all his property, including his money, drugs, cell phone, and car; the suspect then fired at least two gunshots at the victim, striking him in the torso. The suspect then fled on foot and the victim was able to drive himself to the hospital. No other parties reported being injured, and no proceeds were actually taken from the victim.

Over the next several days detectives continued to follow-up leads, review surveillance video, and interview the victim and witnesses. Investigators were able to identify the gunman as a 15-year-old male member of the local Mak Balla Blood street gang; he was located by Major Case Unit and Gang Unit detectives on November 9th and placed into custody without incident. The juvenile suspect is known to investigators as he was previously arrested, charged, and convicted of multiple shooting incidents when he was only 13 years old.

The juvenile suspect was processed at the Community Affairs Division and charged with Attempted Murder 2, a Class A-I Violent Felony in the New York State Penal Law; and Assault 1, a Class B Violent Felony in the New York State Penal Law. He was remanded to a juvenile detention facility pending his next court appearance. Due to his age, he is classified as a juvenile offender and his identity is being withheld from public disclosure. The case is being prosecuted by the Westchester County District Attorney's Office. Additional information may be released as it becomes available.

Latimer Rules Out A Run for Governor...But Never Say Never

Westchester County Executive George Latimer, fresh of a 20 point re-election win on Nov. 2, ruled out a run for Governor of the Empire State next year...almost. Adding a caveat of "you never say never," Latimer told WAMC radio that the current Governor, Kathy Hochul and NY Attorney General Letitia James, are "the major candidacies," for NY Democrats.

"I think it's pretty unlikely at this stage of the game," said Latimer when asked directly if he was going to run for Governor. "From where i'm sitting now, it looks like a two candidate race. And I think, you know, it's fair to say that women who have never had a governor before today, feel a certain sense of pride. They would like to see a woman governor after 56 male governors. They're happy to see a female governor, whether it will continue to be Governor Hochul or Attorney General James."

"You never say never, but I think it's pretty unlikely that I'm going to be in the gubernatorial sweepstakes. I'm very happy to be county executive, I got a great county to run and I'm anxious to do a good job here.

When asked if he will endorse a candidate for Governor, Latimer said yes, but that he will wait for others, including State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, who Latimer called the most prominent democrat in the county, and others, Westchester County Chair Suzanne Berger, and Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano, before making an endorsement. "I don't expect it's going to happen in the short term," said Latimer, who remined all of us that the convention in Westchester and in NY State will be held in February beause of the June primaries now in New York State

But Latimer added that because of redistricting of all political boundaries in New York State, and the delays in accomplishing that requirement, the primary for state offices might have to be pushed back to September.

85 Units of Mixed Income Apartments Opens at Former Cottage Garbens Housing Complex



City, County and State officials joined with the Municipal Housing Authority for the City of Yonkers (MHACY) and The Community Builders (TCB) on October 29 to celebrate the completion of 172 Warburton at The Ridgeway, a new \$53.5 million transformative mixed-income residential community in Southwest Yonkers.

172 Warburton at The Ridgeway continues the strong partnership between MHACY and TCB to transform Southwest Yonkers by replacing three outdated Cottage Place Gardens public housing buildings and a vacant, dilapidated three-story residence with a new, energy efficient eight-story elevator residential building containing 85 housing units, a 181-unit parking garage for residents of this project phase as well as the broader Ridgeway development.

An exciting and innovative feature of the project is a new universal pre-kindergarten center located at the street level of 172 Warburton and is operated by WestCOP to serve both lower-income families at The Ridgeway communities and the broader neighborhood. The pre-K center includes eight classrooms, a multipurpose room, a commercial kitchen, staff offices, and an outdoor play area.

"Southwest Yonkers has a vibrant history, and this new public housing complex will provide residents with modern, high-quality affordable homes while also strengthening the entire community," said Governor Kathy Hochul. "This neighborhood is vibrant and inclusive, and with our ongoing investment to provide New Yorkers with new housing opportunities, this city will continue to grow and thrive."

"The redevelopment of Cottage Gardens into The Ridgeway is yet another example of how Yonkers is revitalizing our neighborhoods and improving the lives of all our residents. As we see luxury housing rising along the riverfront, it is also important that we provide quality affordable housing so all boats rise with the tide. We thank New York State for making this possible and commend the leadership of MHACY and The Community Builders on this very significant development," said Mayor Mike Spano.

"Not since the Yonkers downtown daylighting have so many layers of government come together to serve the needs of our tenants," said MHACY President and CEO Wilson Kimball. "172 Warburton is the type of Public Private Partnership that shows these partnerships produce terrific results, we are very grateful to NYS, Westchester County, the City of Yonkers and our partners at The Community Builders for making this level of quality affordable housing available to our tenants."

"172-Warburton-The Ridgeway is an example of what can be done when multiple levels of government and the private sector work together. I am pleased to lead a Senate that is focused on funding affordable housing and education, high priorities for me. This development combines both: modern, affordable apartments and a Pre-K school on site. The unit mix of the 104,773-square-foot building includes 39 one-bedrooms, 31 two-bedrooms, and 15 three-bedrooms with a range of affordability. The project has been designed to achieve Enterprise Green Communities (EGC) certification. Green elements of the project include Energy Star appliances and a solar PV array to provide energy for a portion of the building's common electricity needs. Ten percent of the project's units are accessible for people with disabilities, and four percent of the project's units are adapted for the needs of the hearing and visually impaired.

172 Warburton at the Ridgeway is the fourth phase of a six-phase master plan to redevelop the Cottage Place Gardens public housing complex into The Ridgeway, a mixed-income community of choice in Southwest Yonkers. Constructed in the 1940s, the 256-unit Cottage Place Gardens long outlived its useful life.

Transgender Awareness Week 2021: Meet Ms. Cienna Rosalina

"I never felt like a boy," said Cienna Rosalina. "I guess God wanted me to be a trans woman." Born on July 16th, 2000, Cienna Rosalina, 21, is a trans advocate who has dedicated her life to advancing trans conversations and improving the lives of others. "I'm a kind spirit who finds comfort in helping other people," she said. It's because of this that she agreed to do this interview. "I'm speaking for a community of people who society wants to be quiet."

For Transgender Awareness Week 2021, (Nov. 13-19) Yonkers Rising and Yonkers Times. Com celebrate Cienna Rosalina. Transgender Awareness Week is from Saturday, November 13th to Friday, November 19th. The week is a celebration that leads to the Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDoR). TDoR is a day that memorializes victims of transphobic brutality.

To be trans means "you were born in the wrong body," said Rosalina. It's when you want to "make your outer appearance match what you feel." Young Black and Latinx trans girls and trans women are all over New York City. Cienna is from Yonkers, though. This interview is a necessity. A former Yonkers Lincoln High School student, Cienna's unapologetically living her truth.

"Although society is becoming aware, trans deaths are at the highest they've been recorded this year," Rosalina told me. Dozens of trans girls and trans women were murdered across the country last year, and they are continuing to be. One homicide should cause an outrage. Ten, twenty-five, or forty murders should call for reform. "Men can't take their desire" to want to be with a trans woman. With that, they choose to kill them.

Cienna taught me the word demasculinized. The definition of the word is to remove the masculine qualities of something. Men think that if they fall in love with a woman who was ascribed male at birth, a trans woman, they're less than a man. Not only that, but they feel that other men and women will look at them differently. Many men want relationships with trans women. "They want it, but they don't want people to know that they want it," said Rosalina.

This is one of the reasons that trans women protect themselves at all costs. According to the Human Rights Campaign, over 50% of trans adults experienced sexual assault. With that, there are a lot of families who have turned a blind eye to their trans relatives. "Some trans youth don't get the love" they require, Rosalina said. Statistics back up her statement 100%. The HRC also states that 48% of Latinx and 39% of Black trans adults live in poverty.

Many families feel like they lose a child when their loved one shares their trans identity with the world. "You don't lose a child. You gain an authentic child," said Rosalina. One of the bravest things someone can do is let you know that they are trans. Don't throw your child away. "If you love somebody, you should want to understand them."

Ciswomen are women whose gender identity is the same as the gender identity assigned at birth. Many ciswomen, especially Black ciswomen, feel like trans women are trying to be them. They feel like trans women are nothing more than people trying to attain something they can never. To that, Cienna Rosalina says, "there is no type of woman. Mind your business. You have bigger fish to fry. If it doesn't concern you, don't let it concern you."

Cienna Rosalina is living happily as an activist. A young trans woman in a relationship, Cienna wants girls to know that "there is somebody out here for everyone. Don't let your trans identity let you feel like you're less than," she said. As she uses her social media platform to wave the banner for trans rights, her TikTok account, @ItsCeeRose, now boasts over 71,000 followers.

"You are only as small as people make you feel," she said. "Don't let them make you feel small." Her last words to me were that she's going to be famous. Or as she puts it, "I'm going to be "famous as f***."

kers resident told him that when she was going to sell her house, she found an open permit from 1947, that had to be cleared up.

"With all of the new development coming into Yonkers, its important

that we have a working, effective building department. I thank the Mayor for addressing this issue, which is the #1 problem that I hear about in Yonkers," said Breen.

"Mayor Spans has been able to make improvements to our vector gue.

"Mayor Spano has been able to make improvements to our water system and cut back in overtimes costs, and I support his efforts and changed in the Building Department.

Breen added that there is no state mandate requiring the Building Department Commissioner to be a licensed engineer. "You don't have to be a doctor to run a hospital. One good manager is worth a hundred licensed engineer. With the departures from the commissioner and deputy commissioner, the time is now to make this change, because its worse now than its ever been.

On This Day in Yonkers History ...

Monday, November 22nd:

November 22, 1939: Yonkers Welfare Commissioner Nicholas Ebbitt announced he asked Milo Perkins, head of the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation, to inaugurate the food stamp program right here in Yonkers. Commissioner Ebbitt had approached officials in all Yonkers banks to support the plan.

November 22, 1942: After soloist Florence Perlman sang at the "Women at War Week" rally held in the auditorium of Most Holy Trinity Church, the master of ceremonies was so moved, he gave her a big, hearty smooch! Rather than being shocked, the audience loved it; the gentleman who kissed her was husband Alexander Perlman!

Tuesday, November 23rd:

November 23, 1918: Mayor William Wallin announced a patriotic community Thanksgiving Sing Service would be held in the armory on North Broadway, joining the national celebration of both the holiday and the end of the war.

November 23, 1955: Yonkers asked federal help to repair damage caused by the Saw Mill River flooding, requesting \$87,000 for the work. The Administration asked the allocation come through the Federal Civil Defense Administration, hoping the work would be directed by the Army Corps of Engineers. Yonkers Democratic Supervisor Thomas McSpedon stated most of the Yonkers damage happened in the Saw Mill River Valley, saying it was "hard to tell people with eight to ten feet of water in their homes nothing could be done about the flooding."

Wednesday, November 24th:

November 24, 1942: The Yonkers Lions Club, meeting at the Abbey Inn, dedicated a service plaque in honor of members in the armed forces to the "cause of freedom." More than twenty per cent of active Yonkers Lions membership had volunteered in the three branches of the US armed forces! Club President Bert Caulfield reminded attendees Thanksgiving was not just a time of feasting, and suggested all give "thanks to Almighty God" at their places of worship.

November 24, 1950: The largest group of women to be accepted in the Women Marines in the metropolitan area enlisted at the Yonkers Marine Corps Recruiting Station in the Main Post Office Building, foot of Main Street. After getting last minute instructions from St. Sgt. James Harrington USMC, the Women Marines left for Parris Island for six weeks' boot training.

Thursday, November 25th:

November 25, 1942: Gorton and Yonkers High Schools' students went on a rampage the night before the traditional Thanksgiving football game between the two schools. Students smashed windows at Yonkers High, more were broken at Gorton, and they smashed twenty-one trolley car windows. Police had to break up several raucous street corner rallies.

November 25, 1944: Park Hill Avenue resident Irving Haim, President of International Distributors, sponsored a national contest for the best essays promoting better understanding on-- matchbook covers! Six different messages were on the covers, including, "When you find anyone, yourself included, thinking, speaking or acting with racial or religious prejudice—Stop It! Smith, Kelly, Cohen or Svoboda are good enough to die for us, they are good enough to live here with us as an equal." Twenty-five million messages of tolerance circulated around the US on his matchbooks.

Friday, November 26th:

November 26, 1926: Because of the economy measures by Mayor William Walsh, prisoners in the City Jail did not have turkey for their Thanksgiving dinner; they had to be contented with roast chicken.

November 26, 1942: Margaret George, publicity director for the War Industries Training Program, announced Eastern Aircraft in Tarrytown called Yonkers School of Aeronautical Manufacturing the "West Point of the Air." Hundreds of the school's certified students, from all strata of society and a variety of ethnic and religious backgrounds, worked together in the plant with one goal in mind, to end the war.

Saturday, November 27th:

November 27, 1946: Former Mayor John Fogarty blasted the closing of the Yonkers Health Center Laboratory. Pointing out for many years, during the tenure of the late Health Commissioner Dr. Buckmaster, Yonkers had "an enviable health record under his long and intelligent administration, it being usually among the first ten healthiest cities in the country." The Health Center and its "splendid equipment" originally were created to care for underprivileged children, using the guidance from local Academy of Medicine members. The lab had been taken over by Westchester County.

November 27, 1955: Former Ninth Ward Democratic Alderman William Slater appealed to Governor Averill Harriman to come to Yonkers' aid and help stop after-election-surprise pay raises for the Mayor and twelve Councilmembers! Slater was leader of a citywide movement to stop sitting Councilmembers from raising their pay 69 percent.

Remembering Judge Arthur "Mike" Doran



Arthur J. Doran, Jr., the longtime former Chief Judge of the Yonkers City Court and friend to everyone, passed away peacefully on the evening of November 12, 2021. The Judge was born in Yonkers on May 23, 1941 to Arthur J. Doran, Sr. and Katherine Doran and grew up on Palisade Avenue with his two brothers and 5 sisters. He attended St. Mary's grade school, Manhattan Prep and Manhattan College. Mike met the love of his life, Carol Watson at the age of 14.

They were married in 1961 and began raising their family in Yonkers, spent a few years living in Ossining before moving back to their beloved Yonkers. The Judge attended Law School at night and earned his Law Degree at New York Law School. He began working for the City of Yonkers as an investigator in the Yonkers Corporation Counsel's Office, later worked as an attorney in that office and ultimately became the Corporation Counsel for the City of Yonkers.

He was appointed to the position of Yonkers City Manager in 1986 but found his true calling when he ran for judge in 1987, was successfully elected to that office and would forever be known as "The Judge". He enjoyed a long tenure as the Chief Judge before he retired from the bench in 2007.

Among his proudest achievements is the founding of the Yonkers Drug Court. He was an active member of many organizations and was proud to have served on many, many Boards. He is the only person in history to hold the title of Grand Marshall at both of the Yonkers St. Patrick's Day Parades, one on South Broadway and the other on McLean Avenue. He is most remembered for his wisdom, patience, kindness and generous spirit.

He had the gift of becoming an instant friend to everyone he met and was truly a friend to all. The Judge is survived by his wife Carol, his 5 children, Arthur (Karen), Kathleen Tokarz (Larry), Amy Dall (Kerry), Peter (Ailish) and Elizabeth Keromytis (Angelos). He is also survived by the next generation of Dorans, his beloved grandchildren Ashley (Kyle), Christopher, Holly, Megan, PJ, Molly, Brendan, Tara, Maggie, Penelope and Julia. He is also survived by his sister Mary Richards, and is predeceased by his siblings, Kayette, Ann, Sally, Jimmy, Danny and Marcy.

The unit mix of the 104,773-square-foot building includes 39 one-bedrooms, 31 two-bedrooms, and 15 three-bedrooms with a range of affordability.

The project has been designed to achieve Enterprise Green Communities (EGC) certification. Green elements of the project include Energy Star appliances and a solar PV array to provide energy for a portion of the building's common electricity needs. Ten percent of the project's units are accessible for people with disabilities, and four percent of the project's units are adapted for the needs of the hearing and visually impaired.

172 Warburton at the Ridgeway is the fourth phase of a six-phase master plan to redevelop the Cottage Place Gardens public housing complex into The Ridgeway, a mixed-income community of choice in Southwest Yonkers, NY. Constructed in the 1940s, the 256-unit Cottage Place Gardens long outlived its useful life. 172 Warburton aligns with the City's long-term vision for revitalization of this community identified in the Yonkers Choice Neighborhoods Transformation Plan and Warburton-Ravine URA plan.

Sunday, November 28th

November 28, 1939: Yonkers resident Earl Browder, leader of the American Communist Party, spoke at Yale's Strathcona Hall. The boisterous audience mixed cheers with boos, but basically was "good natured," shouting "Viva Browder" and "Down With Everything" while he was speaking. Three hundred Yale men outside the hall were a different story; they crowded around as he was leaving and tried to overturn his car. Persistent rocking the car did not do the trick, so they threw vegetables at his car. Yale President Charles Seymour had resisted pressure from New Haven Mayor John Murphy and the Connecticut American Legion to cancel Browder's appearance.

November 28, 1946: After Daily News columnist Danton Walker wrote a column on Yonkers' three hundredth birthday, mentioning William C. Handy, composer of the St. Louis Blues and resident of Colonial Heights, as one of Yonkers "prominent citizens;" Handy reproduced the column, circled his own name, and sent it as a thank you to the columnist. W. C. Handy wrote on the card, "Thanks, Mr. Walker, and thanks to Yonkers which reminds me of a phrase... 'More cities are claiming Handy living than claim Homer dead!"

The Charles E. Gorton High School Alumni Association embarked on a project to honor all Gorton High School men and women who served in the military. Simultaneously, the Alumni Association committed to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier with its Never Forget Garden program https://tombguard.org/centennial/projects#never-forget-garden. Gorton is the only school in the United States to do so.

This garden is a living tribute to the past and the present and honors Gorton High School students serving in World War 2, Korea, Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan. A stone marker honoring the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier will be permanently displayed in the garden, which was donated by the Azzaro family of Yonkers, whose son Richard served as a Tomb Guard during the 1960's.

The Never Forget Garden will be managed and cared for by Gorton High School's freshman class and the school's Center for Learning students.


