

Yorktown Rallies for Sheridan Gorman

About one thousand Yorktown residents, and friends of Sheridan Gorman, came out to Devito Field on March 28 for a memorial to remember the 18 year old YHS grad who was in the middle of her freshman year at Loyola University in Chicago when she was murdered on March 19.

A handout from the organizers told everyone in attendance about Sheridan. Titled Our Darling, Daling Diva, it reads.

Sheridan Grace Gorman, 18, of Yorktown Heights, New York, did not simply walk into a room—she arrived. With a laugh that could fill it, a presence you couldn't ignore, and a heart that made everyone feel like they mattered.

Beth Davidson Up 6 in Latest Poll to Take on Lawler in NY-17

A recent poll conducted by Impact Research gives Rockland County Legislator Beth Davidson a six point lead in an upcoming democratic primary in June to see who will face off against republican congressman Mike Lawler in November.

The poll has Davidson at 23%, with Cait Conley second with 17%, Peter Chatzky at 8%, Effie Phillips-Staley at 5%, Mike Sachs at 1%, and 45% undecided.

“Recent polling conducted among Democratic primary voters in NY-17 shows that Beth Davidson is the best-known and best-liked candidate in the primary field, leads in the vote, and starts with a base of support that other candidates lack. Additionally, Davidson’s profile and message is the most broadly appealing to primary voters and moves more voters toward her, while Cait Conley has serious vulnerabilities. Below are key findings from this research,” writes the memo from Impact Research which originally appeared in Politico.

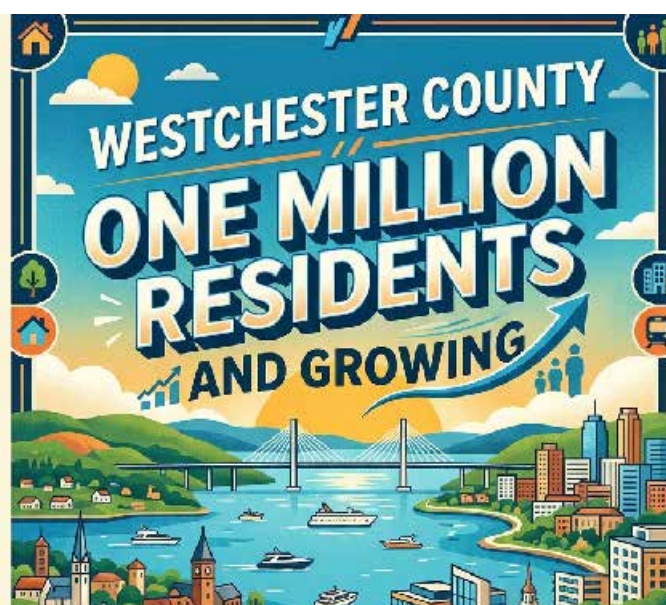

KEY FINDINGS

Beth Davidson, the only elected official with a history of winning competitive races in the field, is the best known and most well-liked candidate in the Democratic primary. While there are still primary voters to introduce her to, over four-in-10 primary voters already know Davidson (41% name ID), and she has a favorability advantage over the Democratic field (33% are favorable toward Davidson, compared to 28% for Cait Conley, 25% for Peter Chatzky, and 13% for Effie Phillips-Staley). This name ID advantage is significant in the expensive New York City media market, and comes after Davidson received recent media attention for her leadership standing up to protect Rockland County from Trump's illegal ICE raids – a top issue priority for primary voters. Her name ID advantage is also notable given that candidate Peter Chatzky has already started spending on paid communications to primary voters.

Davidson currently holds a 6-point lead in the vote with nearly a quarter of the electorate supporting her. Davidson currently leads the field with 23% of the vote, while all the other candidates are under 20% (23% Davidson / 17% Conley / 8% Chatzky / 5% Phillips-Staley / 1% Sacks / 1% Cappello / 45% undecided). Importantly, Davidson is the only candidate in the race with a notable base of support at this point, driven by a lead in Rockland, part of which she serves in the county legislature, though she wins votes across the entire district.

Davidson has the most broadly appealing profile to primary voters. Davidson's biography and record of leadership in Rockland are very appealing to primary voters, with 84% saying that they would be likely to vote for her after hearing a brief description – the highest of any of the candidates' bios, including Cait Conley. Primary voters found Davidson's record of standing up to Trump and defending the Hudson Valley from ICE raids especially compelling.

Additionally, Cait Conley has serious vulnerabilities with Democratic primary voters. Her ongoing work on the payroll of AI companies that helped develop technology used by the Trump Administration, her attacks on progressive groups and unions, her never having lived in the district, and her lack of a track record supporting Democratic values and causes all test with very strong intensity (up to 53% very serious concerns) and move voters against her.

Bios:

Beth Davidson is a Rockland County legislator, former school board member, cancer survivor, and mom of two. As a public servant, she's been focused on standing up to Trump and getting results for Hudson Valley families. She fully funded our public schools, passed a law to protect our kids from gun violence, and now she's leading the fight to protect her constituents from Trump's brutal and illegal ICE raids. And

when Trump cruelly cut food assistance benefits, Beth fought back, getting the county to help cover the cost so kids, seniors, and veterans didn't go hungry. Over one hundred and fifty Democratic leaders including the Rock-

land County Democratic Committee endorse Beth because they trust her to defeat Mike Lawler, stand up to Trump and ICE, and deliver on our Democratic priorities in Congress.

Cait Conley lives in Ossining and is a decorated combat veteran and national security expert who has answered the call to serve time and again for our country. She was awarded three Bronze stars for her service, went on to serve as President Biden's top counterterrorism adviser on the National Security Council, and was banned from Russia for her work protecting American democracy from Vladimir Putin.

She never imagined that the biggest threat to our democracy would come from within our own borders, but with Trump raiding our streets and taking away our rights and freedoms, she's stepping up again to run for Congress and defend our democracy from Trump's attacks. She is endorsed by Congressman Pat Ryan, who says she's the strongest candidate to win against Mike Lawler.

Peter Chatzky is a businessman and the former Mayor of the Village of Briarcliff Manor. Peter has enacted over seventy laws – from tax relief for veterans to incentives for clean energy – and helped get new housing built in Westchester. When Trump tried to build the Trump National golf course in Briarcliff Manor, Peter organized his neighbors to stop it. Peter believes the system is broken, we're up against a corrupted government, a politicized court, and a Republican party trying to erase what makes America strong. A true bold progressive, Peter will take on Trump and fight to fix the system by abolishing ICE and passing Medicare for All.

Effie Phillips-Staley is a Tarrytown Trustee and nonprofit executive who has been endorsed by former Congressman Jamaal Bowman. In Congress, Effie will put people first by fighting for Medicare for All, universal childcare, anti-war legislation, and abolishing ICE.

Mike Sacks is a lawyer-turned-television reporter who has covered political and legal affairs in the federal government. He is running to stop Donald Trump and Mike Lawler from destroying our democracy.

The poll was taken before the New York Times ran a story on Peter Chatsky and his troubling social media posts that several women's groups have called sexist and offensive, and which resulted in Philips-Staley calling on Chatzky to get out of the race.

Westchester County to Host 3 Free Compost Giveaways in Celebration of Earth Month

Westchester County is celebrating Earth Month by offering free compost to residents and launching its spring 2026 Community Compost Bin and Rain Barrel Sale to help reduce waste and promote sustainable practices at home.

The compost is produced at the County's CompostED site, a small-scale compost education and demonstration facility that processes up to two tons of food scraps each week. The giveaway events provide residents with free compost while encouraging food scrap recycling and highlighting the environmental benefits of composting.

To build on these efforts, the County is also offering compost bins, rain barrels and accessories at reduced prices through a bulk purchasing program. Backyard composting helps reduce the amount of trash while creating nutrient-rich material for gardens. Rain barrels help lower water costs, minimize flooding, and provide a natural water source for plants and landscaping.

Each registered resident will receive two 1-cubic-foot bags of compost. DEF staff will be on-site to verify registration and load pre-bagged compost into vehicles.

County Legislator Holstein Asks Gov. to Pass 25-foot buffer zones around Religious Institutions



Westchester County Legislator Judah Holstein wrote the following letter to Governor Kathy Hochul, requesting that she support legislation to create a 25-foot buffer zone around religious institutions.

“Today I sent this letter to Kathy Hochul following recent incidents in NYC and here in Westchester. The negative response in NYC to similar proposed protections has been shocking. In my district, two synagogues have had protests outside their entrances. We must ensure that people of all faiths can access their houses of worship safely.

“Dear Governor Hochul,

I am writing to urge you to pass legislation establishing 25-foot buffer zones around religious institutions across New York State.

This is not hypothetical for my district. In recent months, two synagogues in District 10 have had protests outside their entrances. People attending services and community events have had to walk through crowds, noise, and confrontation just to get inside. That’s not what religious freedom should look like in practice. Safe and secure access to houses of worship must be guaranteed.

We’ve addressed this issue in other contexts. Westchester enacted protections around reproductive health care facilities to ensure safe access, with support from the NYCLU as a constitutional balance between access and free speech. The same principle applies here.

This bill does not prohibit protest. It sets a reasonable, narrowly tailored boundary so that exercising one right does not interfere with

another. Even strong free speech advocates, including FIRE, recognize that content-neutral time, place, and manner restrictions can be appropriate.

If we don’t act, we are permitting intimidation at the entrance to houses of worship. That is not consistent with the First Amendment, which protects both free expression and the free exercise of religion.

This is a straightforward step with immediate and long-term impact. It ensures safe access now and helps prevent these tactics from spreading to other religious institutions, including churches and mosques. People of all faiths should be able to enter their houses of worship without fear or obstruction.

I urge you to take this up and move it forward immediately,” writes Holstein.

WESTCHESTER COUNTY BOARD INTRODUCES NEW APPRENTICESHIP BILL

increase of 6,578 people in just one year – the highest population ever recorded for the County, and the largest gain of any county in New York State.

A proud Yorktown Husker, Sheridan threw herself into life the way she did everything—full force and full heart. She played field hockey, lacrosse, and bowled for Yorktown High School and spent 8 years cheerleading then 3 years coaching with our beloved Yorktown Athletic Club giving back to the community she loved so much. Yorktown was her home, her people, her heart—and she carried that same energy and love with her to Loyola University Chicago.

Sheridan had big dreams—and, of course, she was going to make them happen. She was studying business with a focus on entrepreneurship and already talking about starting her own business in the beauty industry. Not just because she loved hair and makeup, but because she wanted people to look as beautiful on the outside as they were on the inside.

And then there was driving... “Riding with Sheridan” was not for the faint of heart. Let’s just say inanimate objects were not always safe. But if you were lucky enough to be in that car, you were also lucky enough to be part of something special—because it usually involved singing at the top of your lungs. And what a playlist it was... One minute it was 90’s rap, the next it was Praise and Worship. No transition. No warning. Just pure Sheridan. Hands up! We Gormans break for Nelly and Jesus!

Sheridan’s laugh—her laugh—was something you never forgot. It was loud, real, and completely infectious. And we miss it already more than words can say.

She gave us 18 years of pure joy, chaos, laughter, love, and unforgettable memories. She was our light. Our laughter. Our heart.

But more than anything, Sheridan was a cheerleader for life and for people. She believed in others before they believed in themselves. She showed up. She loved fiercely. She made people feel important. And we will carry her with us—always.

The ceremony included several friends and family members of Sheridan, who gave fond memories and stories.

There were Irish poems and songs, as the family thanked the Yorktown community for lighting up their homes in Green in memory of Sheridan.

The ceremony did not include any political speeches, which was welcome to most in the crowd who did not want to hear that on this day. Yorktown Supervisor Ed Lachterman made brief comments in welcoming all to the event. “Today while we mourn, we also remember, and we carry her light forward. Because Sheridan’s story does not end here.”

A representative from Loyola University’s campus ministry spoke about Sheridan, who was a member of the Crew and Bible study at the college. “Her hopes were to find her people and explore her faith. I ask you and invite you to reflect on how Sheridan lived. She sought to know Jesus more fully. Sheridan you are deeply loved at Loyola and you are deeply missed. And you will live on in the lives you touched.”

Sheridan was deeply involved in Yorktown athletics, both during her years at Yorktown High School, where she played on the Field Hockey, Lacrosse and Bowling teams, and before that with the Yorktown Athletic Club, where she also coached.

Sheridan’s father Tom Gorman, explained how he also graduated from YHS and came back after college to raise Sheridan and her sister Maddie, with his wife Jessica. “Sheridan was our joy, and now that joy is gone. But seeing all of you tonight, we are heartbroken but not alone.”

Sheridan’s death has drawn national attention. The entire ceremony was broadcast on Fox News digital. For those who want to get a true feeling of what Sheridan meant to so many, please watch it, link-

Congressman Mike Lawler remembered Sheridan on the floor of Congress, saying “I rise today with a heavy heart to honor the life of Sheridan Gorman, of Yorktown Heights NY, who was tragically murdered at just 18 years old.

Sheridan was a proud member of the Yorktown community, and a Freshman at Loyola University Chicago studying business. Her life was stolen in a senseless act of violence at the hands of an illegal immigrant, leaving her family, friends and the entire Yorktown community at a complete loss.

A 2025 Graduate of Yorktown High School, she was an athlete and a mentor known for her warm kindness and limitless compassion. Sheridan inspired those around her, competing in Field Hockey, Lacrosse and Bowling, and giving back by coaching young athletes through the Yorktown Athletic Club.

Sheridan was a lot like the Northern Lights she went out to find with her friends on the early morning on March 19. The kind of light that shows up quietly, bringing color to what was otherwise darkness. You are lucky to witness it while it is visible in the night sky.

Doina and I offer our deepest condolences to her parents Jessica and Thomas, her sister Madeline, the entire Gorman family and those who loved her. May her memory be a blessing and may she rest in eternal peace,” said Lawler.

President Donald Trump called the Gorman family to offer his condolences.

It was good to see both Democrats and Republicans coming out to remember Sheridan.

Senator Pete Harckham said, “This evening, I joined the Gorman family and the Yorktown community in honoring the life and memory of Sheridan Gorman. It was a beautiful tribute to someone who brought so much kindness and joy into the world. My thoughts remain with the family, and I will continue to keep them in my prayers during this difficult time.”

Yorktown Councilmember Lanny Gilbert said, “As a member of the Yorktown Town Council, I want to express, on behalf of our entire community, our deepest sorrow, love and support to the family and loved ones of Sheridan Gorman. Sheridan was a beautiful young woman, a bright soul, and a proud graduate of Yorktown High School whose life was taken far too soon.

The pain of losing a child is unimaginable. Having lost a child of the same age, I can only begin to understand the depth of the heartbreak and grief you are enduring. Though we as people of Faith, may never understand why tragedies like this happen, why terrible things happen to good people, we can find strength in how we care for one another.”

The Gorman family has been outspoken in their call for justice for Sheridan. "I want to say this gently, but honestly, as a mom. I'm angry," Jessica Gorman said. "I'm like completely heartbroken, and we are going to fight for justice for our sweet Sheridan, and we're going to fight for change. Not everyone will believe in what we do—that's ok-but we all want the same for our children, to be safe and to come home.”

And that call for Justice comes in the form of changes to the criminal justice system in some communities where local and state law enforcement does not share information on illegal immigrants with ICE.

Assemblyman Matt Slater and Putnam County Executive Kevin Byrne, with Congressman Lawler, are three local republicans that have been outspoken in calling for change.

As a fellow graduate of Yorktown HS, I applaud the Gorman’s for coming out and sharing their grief with the community. I found a post from a former Yorktown resident on Social Media, who like me, did not know Sheridan, but felt moved by her life.

Late Saturday night, I was in our house in Georgia when I came across a link a friend had posted on Facebook for the memorial for Sheridan Gorman at Jack DeVito Field in Yorktown.

“I did not know her. Many people I know did. The vigil was held on the field where we spent years building community—celebrating, remembering, and fighting back against cancer.

Saturday, the community turned out for the Sheridan family. That is Yorktown strong.

Listening to her parents and her sister—such strength. They shared great, heartwarming stories that painted a picture of Sheridan, full of joy and love.

Her friends, her coach, her family friends, local leaders, and clergy all shared her bright and caring personality with the world.

She was 18. She should still be here. What Saturday brought to the forefront is this:

Sheridan’s spirit, kindness, leadership, and joy were fully packed into her short life—and she left a legacy. The Gorman family has a long road ahead. One thing that came from this was a call for people in the community to light their homes in green...

We’ve been in Georgia for 6 months, but after 26 years of Yorktown being imprinted on our hearts, we lit our sky in Wildwood to honor a bright light who continues to inspire.

Let’s be kind. Let’s pause more. Let’s find joy and seize the moments. In honor of Sheridan.

May the road rise to meet you,” said Jane Buckley McCarthy.

Jose Medina-Medina, 25, an illegal immigrant from Venezuela, has been arrested and charged with murder.

Most of us believe that Sheridan’s passing was the perfect opportunity for our elected officials and others to try to cross over the political divide and talk about how her death should lead us to try to remove the criminals who are not legal residents.

Assemblymember Dana Levenberg was one who said, I join the Yorktown community in mourning the senseless killing of Sheridan Gorman, a student at Loyola University Chicago. May she rest in peace. I will continue to follow the details of this case as it unfolds.

“Following the identification of a suspect who is from Venezuela, some have begun politicizing this incident, blaming Chicago's policies for our community's tragic loss. However, ICE and CBP agents themselves have complained that the current quota-driven approach to immigration enforcement has led them to take their focus off of criminals, and direct it instead toward anyone they can get their hands on. This approach is evident in Chicago, where 'Operation Midway Blitz' has succeeded in traumatizing hundreds of residents, including U.S. citizens, while failing to prevent this young woman's death.

“If public safety is our goal, we are better served by policies that enable law enforcement to pursue specific problematic individuals instead of the tactics we are currently seeing from ICE and CBP. As we discuss these issues in Albany, I will continue to advocate for legislation that promotes public safety without abridging our constitutional rights. I hope that our leaders in Washington can engage this issue in good faith and partner with us as we pursue true community safety,” said Levenberg.

Two Yorktown High School graduates had this opportunity but did not take it. I searched for comments from Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and Dave Matthews, YHS’s two most famous graduates, but could not find any.

Leading up to the panel, students met once a week after school for four weeks to participate in etiquette classes, where they learned how to properly sit while dining, what types of conversation are appropriate or inappropriate at the dinner table and what attire is proper to wear.

The panelists provided insightful feedback and shared personal experiences of how they overcame challenges and adversity. The event concluded with lite bites and refreshments as students continued to mingle with each other and guests.

“My favorite part was either them asking the questions because I wanted to hear what they have to say, or us eating,” said eighth-grader Mikayla Young. “What stood out to me is when she (Ms. White) said that she likes it when her students come back to her after a lot of years.”
