ATV Driver Who Almost Killed a Yorktown Man Gets 6 Months Shock Incarceration

21-year-old Kyle Frankild, who drove an ATV into 64-year-old Ed Moffet at Hunterbrook field in Yorktown last year, pled guilty on July 17 to second degree assault and was sentenced to six months shock incarceration and probation by State Supreme Court Judge Larry Schwartz.

Emergency personnel who arrived on the scene said that Moffit was 10 minutes away from dying, and suffered serious injuries, including a broken leg, broken ribs and head & brain injuries that he is still recuperating from today.

Frankild was facing 5 years in prison and was charged with 1st Degree Felony Assault, 3rd Degree Criminal Mischief, Leaving the scene of a serious injury accident and 4th degree possession of stolen property. The ATV that Frankild was driving was stolen.

It has been one year since 10,000 Yorktown homeowners had to go through a summer of garbage hell after the Town Board awarded a garbage contract to a company that couldn't handle the job.

Since fixing their error, over the past 9 months, CRP Sanitation has been collecting residents garbage and has done a good job. One resident on Yorktown Garbage Talk on Facebook "last year at this time we were struggling with garbage and recycling not getting picked up. We now have consistent pickups, I appreciate CRP."

CRP was appointed by the Town to an emergency contact, at a cost of \$4.4 Million, that ends at the end of August. Over this summer, the Town went out to bid on a new Garbage contract, for five years.

CRP came in at \$3.95 Million. Mahopac scrap came in at \$3.75 Million, and AAA Carting came in with the low bid of \$3.45 Million. Instead of saving the taxpayers \$500,000 per year, for a five year contract, the Town decided to go out to bid a second time. Two of the same bids came in; CRP and AAA at the same costs.

So the Town Board has any easy decision to make, right? According to NYS law, they are required to award the bid to AAA, who is the "lowest, responsible bidder." But for some reason, it appears that the Town Board is dragging their feet to do so.

Mosquitoes with West Nile Virus Found in Rye Croton, Mount Vernon, White Plains & Yonkers



County Health Department Reminds Residents to Remove Standing Water and Use Repellents

The Westchester County Health Department announced that this season's first batches of mosquitoes carrying West Nile Virus in Westchester were found in Croton, Mount Vernon, Rye, White Plains and Yonkers. The Health Department will inspect areas surrounding the positive mosquito batches and if needed, treat any nearby catch basins that hold standing water to protect against further mosquito breeding nearby.

These are the first positives out of 45 batches of mosquitos collected by the County Health Department from eight locations throughout Westchester that were tested for West Nile Virus by the New York State Department of Health

Commissioner of Health Sherlita Amler, MD said: "As you spend more time outdoors, protect yourself and your family by using repellents, especially from dawn to dusk, when many mosquitoes are active. Apply sunscreen first, and repellent second."

The Health Department reminds residents about mosquito safety through news releases, social media and our website, where a report on mosquito control and surveillance can be found on the West Nile Virus page.

Throughout the season, the Department also traps and tests mosquitoes to track the presence of mosquito-borne viruses.

Symptoms of West Nile include fever, headache, body aches and joint pain, but can be more serious for people 60 and older, and those with underlying medical conditions.

Tips to Avoid West Nile:

Avoid the outdoors in the late afternoon and early evening when mosquitoes are active and feeding. When outdoors use insect repellents and follow the label instructions.

Adults can use insect repellents with up to 30 percent DEET on infants over two months of age by applying the product to their own hands and then rubbing it onto their children, avoiding their children's hands, eyes and mouth.

Wear long pants, long-sleeved shirts and socks when outdoors, especially in areas where mosquitoes are active and feeding.

• Check around your property for anything that can hold water, and pour it out or put it away. Mosquitos don't travel far from a water source.

• Check and remove standing water from children's toys and play houses left outside.

· Remove discarded tires.

• Drill holes in the bottoms of all recycling containers that are left outdoors.

• Turn over plastic wading pools, buckets and wheelbarrows when not in use.

• Change the water in birdbaths at least twice weekly.

• Keep storm drains and gutters clear of leaves and debris.

Continue to chlorinate swimming pools, outdoor spas and hot tubs until properly winterized or drained for the season. Also, if not chlorinated, drain any water that collects on their covers. Westchester County to Give Free Back to School Vaccines in Yonkers and White Plains



The Westchester County Department of Health will book appointments now for its free back-to-school vaccine clinics to assure children have the vaccines they need to attend school this fall.

New this year, the County Health Department will bring vaccines to two Yonkers schools – the Yonkers Montessori Academy and the Enrico Fermi School – where any Yonkers student who is eligible for the state's Vaccines for Children (VFC) program can receive free immunizations. Appointments are required; for scheduling, call 914-995-5800.

The County Health Department's nurses will visit the Montessori Academy on Thursday, August 8, where they will provide Tdap, Meningitis and Hepatitis B vaccines. On Friday, September 13, County Health Department nurses will give vaccines at the Enrico Fermi School.

The County Health Department is also expanding its vaccine appointments for all VFC eligible Westchester County students from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. as follows:

- Mondays in the White Plains clinic;
- · Fridays in the Yonkers clinic; and
- Thursdays, starting August 29, in the Yonkers clinic.

Health Commissioner Sherlita Amler, MD, said: "Yonkers schools have done a lot to encourage families to vaccinate their children, so we are pleased to support Yonkers parents by bringing free, convenient vaccines to their schools. Now is the right time for all parents to schedule vaccine visits for their children. If your child is eligible for Child Health Plus, Medicaid or has no insurance, we can help. You can also call your child's healthcare provider."

Children attending day care and Pre-K through 12th grade in New York State must receive all required doses of vaccines on the recommended schedule to attend or remain in school. Visit School Immunization Requirements to learn what vaccines your child needs.

The Westchester County Health Department Health Navigators can help families and individuals sign up for the health insurance they need. Those without a regular doctor can learn where to go for ongoing primary care. For more information, call (914) 995-6350.

NYC DEP Breaks Ground on \$1.9 Billion Water Tunnel in Westchester County

New tunnel will run approximately 500 feet below ground and improve flexibility between vital water-supply facilities that serve more than 9 million people in New York City and Westchester County;

Project is among more than \$3 billion in DEP capital commitments throughout Westchester County alone that will improve nation's largest municipal water supply system

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) today broke ground on the \$1.9 billion Kensico to Eastview tunneling and facilities upgrade project in the Westchester County town of Mt. Pleasant that will improve the operational flexibility of the drinking water supply for more than 9 million people in the City and throughout southern Westchester County. The project will be New York City's largest water-supply tunneling effort in Westchester County since the 1940s, and its construction will create hundreds of jobs for local laborers.

The centerpiece of the project—known as the Kensico-Eastview Connection (KEC)—will be a 2-mile-long tunnel between Kensico Reservoir and the Catskill-Delaware Ultraviolet Light Disinfection Facility (CDUV) in Eastview. The new tunnel will provide an additional conveyance between these vital components of the water supply system, giving DEP the ability to take other facilities out of service for periodic maintenance and inspection.

"Creating additional redundancy in our vital water supply system is an essential investment for the long-term resilience of the remarkable feat of engineering that provides more than 9 million New Yorkers with a reliable supply of pristine tap water," DEP Commissioner Rohit T. Aggarwala said. "This project will help us fulfill our commitment to providing consistent and reliable delivery of the highest-quality water to New York City and the growing population centers in Westchester County."

The first phase of construction includes site preparation at the DEP campus adjacent to Kensico Reservoir, followed by the digging of two large shafts, 400-500 feet deep, the tunneling between the two shafts, and the addition of several new facilities and upgrades at the Kensico campus. All phases of the project are expected to span a ten-year period with the new tunnel coming fully online by 2035.

Kensico Reservoir is located north of White Plains and is a vital component of New York City's Catskill-Delaware Water Supply System. The reservoir stores approximately 30 billion gallons of water at full capacity. DEP draws about 1 billion gallons of drinking water from Kensico Reservoir each day to meet the demand of 8.6 million residents in the five boroughs of New York City and approximately 500,000 residents of Westchester County whose communities are connected to the City's system. As it moves towards the City, drinking water that leaves Kensico Reservoir is also treated at CDUV.

The KEC tunnel will stretch the approximately 2 miles from Kensico Reservoir to CDUV in Eastview, the largest such facility in the world. The finished tunnel will be 27 feet in diameter and run 400-500 feet below ground with a capacity to carry as much as 2.6 billion gallons of water each day. The design accounts for future growth in the City and Westchester County, the potential addition of treatment facilities, and the need to periodically take other infrastructure out of service for maintenance or inspection.

The project also includes new facilities and site work at both Kensico Reservoir and CDUV. A century-old intake chamber at Kensico Reservoir will be upgraded and enlarged to draw water into the new tunnel, the reservoir's shoreline around that intake chamber will be improved to prevent <u>s</u>ediment from escaping into the new tunnel, and the Kensico campus will receive utility, grading and drainage upgrades. In addition, a new screen chamber to remove debris from the water will be constructed just north of DEP's main campus at the reservoir, near Columbus Avenue in Valhalla, and the chemical addition systems at Kensico Reservoir will be upgraded to ensure for the continued proper treatment of drinking water.

DEP will also build a connection chamber at CDUV in Eastview to receive water from the new tunnel. Work at this site will also include several projects related to drainage, stormwater and utility improvements.

Members of WJCS group homes partake in a wide variety of social, recreational, and cultural activities, in addition to attending day programs in the Westchester community, to help them achieve their highest potential.

"We are proud to provide a supportive atmosphere through 24-hour, hands-on care at our group homes, offered by trained quality staff," said WJCS CEO Seth

Recall of Deli Meats Linked to Listeria Expanded

Boar's Head and Old Country Virginia Ham, Salami and Bologna added to Recall

The U.S Department of Agriculture has expanded its recall of deli meats linked to a multi-state Listeria outbreak. An additional 71 varieties of Virginia ham, salami and bologna that were produced in a Virginia plant and sold under the Boar's Head and Old Country brands have been added, in addition to the original Boar's Head liverwurst that tested positive for the listeriosis bacteria.

Westchester County Health Commissioner Sherlita Amler, MD said: "We want people to be aware of this recall of deli meat, and the potential risk of a Listeria infection. If you have these products in your refrigerator at home discard of them immediately, or return them to the store where the food was purchased. Check the Health Department's website for proper cleaning protocols to sanitize your refrigerator and prevent the contamination of other foods. If you have consumed these products and are exhibiting symptoms, contact your health care provider immediately."

For a full list of the contaminated products and more detailed cleaning instructions, visit the Health Department's website.

There were 33 people who were hospitalized in connection with the Listeria outbreak across 13 states. There have been two deaths; one in Illinois and one in New Jersey. Listeria infection can affect anyone who eats contaminated food, causing mild intestinal illness. It is especially harmful for those who are pregnant, age 65 or older, or who have a weakened immune system due to certain medical conditions or treatments. Listeria can cause pregnancy loss, premature birth or a life-threatening infection in a newborn and can be deadly for seniors and those with weakened immunity.

Anyone who ate food linked to this outbreak and who has a fever and other symptoms of listeriosis, such as fatigue and muscle aches, should contact a healthcare provider. Most medical experts say that anyone who may have eaten contaminated food but does not feel sick does not need tests or treatment. Talk with a healthcare provider if you have questions about what to do.

An estimated 1,600 people get Listeria food poisoning each year and about 260 die, according to the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention. Listeria infections typically cause fever, muscle aches and tiredness and may cause stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions. Symptoms can occur quickly or to up to 10 weeks after eating contaminated food.

Kensico Reservoir was built in 1915 as part of New York City's Catskill Water Supply System. Kensico was later modified in the 1940s to also receive water from the City's Delaware Water Supply System, also in the Catskills. Those two systems—collectively referred to as the Catskill-Delaware System—comprise the largest unfiltered water supply in the United States.

Also this year, DEP is expecting to break ground on more than \$1 billion in facility and infrastructure additions and improvements at Hillview Reservoir in the City of Yonkers, which is the last stop for water from the Catskill reservoirs before it enters the water tunnels that feed the five boroughs.

The KEC Project is required by, and must be constructed in accordance with, the terms of the Hillview Consent Decree and Judgment entered by the United States District Court of the Eastern District of New York on May 15, 2019, and the Final Environmental Impact Statement pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act is available online.

DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing approximately 1 billion gallons of high-quality drinking water each day to nearly 10 million residents, including 8.5 million in New York City. The water is delivered from a watershed that extends more than 125 miles from the city, comprising 19 reservoirs and three controlled lakes. Approximately 7,000 miles of water mains, tunnels and aqueducts bring water to homes and businesses throughout the five boroughs, and 7,500 miles of sewer lines and 96 pump stations take wastewater to 14 in-city treatment plants. DEP also protects the health and safety of New Yorkers by enforcing the Air and Noise Codes and asbestos rules. DEP has a robust capital program, with a planned \$29 billion in investments over the next 10 years. For more information, visit nyc.gov/dep.



LETTER TO THE EDITOR – WESTCHESTER RISING

Vice President Kamala Harris will be a formidable candidate in the November 2024 Presidential election.

July 28, 2024 To the Editor:

I read with great interest Eric Wolf Schoen's column ("So Where Do We Go From Here?") in the July 26, 2024 edition of Westchester Rising. While I agree with him that President Joe Biden is to be congratulated on his recent decision to withdraw as the presumptive Democratic Party Presidential nominee and his long record of public service to the nation, I believe he is shortchanging Vice President Kamala D. Harris' credentials to serve as the Democratic Party's Presidential nominee and potential POTUS (for the record, I actively supported Governor Nikki Haley's candidacy in this year's GOP primaries).

Ms. Harris, a graduate of Howard University and the University of California, Hastings College of Law, began her public service career in 1990 – over 30 years ago, primarily as a prosecutor ("smart on crime") in California's criminal justice system. Prior to her election as District Attorney of San Francisco. Harris ran that city's Family and Children's Services Division representing child abuse and neglect cases.

In 2010, she was elected California Attorney General where she oversaw the nation's largest state justice department. Some of her notable accomplishments included winning multi-billion dollar settlements on behalf of homeowners, students and veterans. As a U.S. Senator from 2017-21, she championed legislation to fight hunger, improve maternal health care, expand opportunities for small business capital investment, and revitalize American infrastructure.

The Vice Presidency is an awkward office with little power; most incumbent VP's have not been seen in their best light. If she has been seen by the public as invisible during her tenure (with the exception of her chairing the immigration task force), it was because she was required to spend much time breaking tie votes in the U.S. Senate when critical components of the Biden legislative agenda were being debated in that chamber.

Given President Biden's late decision to withdraw as a candidate, I do not see how the logistics of a "super primary" – which have been advocated by some -- could have been conducted on such short notice. That decision is properly to be made by the elected convention delegates.

Given recent polling since President Biden's withdrawal, I believe that we will see a very close election in both the Electoral College and the popular vote. I agree with Mr. Schoen that not all Republicans will support the Trump-Vance ticket; indeed, a number of prominent Republicans and Republican organizations such as the Lincoln Project have already endorsed Ms. Harris' candidacy, and more will do so.

If significant numbers of Republicans and independent voters view this election as a choice between democracy and autocracy -- as I do -- then Ms. Harris may very well be on her way to the White House. Time will tell.

Eric Schoen's column (July 26th) woefully misrepresented easily obtained facts and ignores truth.

First, "all of the delegates" are NOT yet "lined up", as claimed. The August convention's delegates will choose the candidate. Second, Vice-President Harris was given the task to "secure our nation's borders" but she cannot unilaterally impose an executive order, as did President Biden in early June 2024, when he suspended the entry of most migrants crossing the southern border, disqualifying those who enter the U.S. illegally from asylum. Mr. Schoen ignores or does not understand that Harris, as Vice-President, does not have that same executive power. But she said that she too will support this when elected.

President Biden did this in February, when Republicans scuttled a bipartisan border security bill with nearly every Republican voting to filibuster it as Donald Trump wields border chaos as a centerpiece of his campaign against President Joe Biden.

Republicans prefer chaos to results.

Biden restored the United States as the anchor of the free world while leading the successful effort to help Ukraine defend itself against Russian aggression, and restored NATO, defeating Trump's efforts to demolish the most successful alliance in 75 years, and prevented Putin's illegal aggression from swallowing Ukraine.

Schoen's claim that "not much" is known about Kamala Harris is due to his lack of research or willful ignorance. Harris served as California's attorney general (2011–17) before being elected to the Senate in 2017.

California is the 5th largest economy in the world for the seventh consecutive year, with a nominal GDP of nearly \$3.9 trillion in 2023 and a growth rate of 6.1%

Her responsibility included pushing for Congress to pass the John R Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, which would've extended the protections of the 1965 Voting Rights Act and required federal approval for some local election law changes.

Mr. Schoen claims that "Trump will be very hard to beat." 

Fugitive Accused of Defrauding Yonkers Immigrant Community Arrested in Washington State

Brought back to Westchester by WCPD Warrant-Fugitive Unit detectives

A man accused in 2019 of scamming members of the Hispanic community through an immigration fraud scheme was returned to Westchester from Washington State last night by detectives from the Westchester County Police Warrant-Fugitive Unit.

Juan Cedillo, 69, was arrested on July 8 by the Thurston County Sheriff's Department and the U.S. Marshals Regional Task Force in Olympia, Washington. After Cedillo waived extradition, WFU detectives flew to the west coast to take custody of him and return him to Westchester.

Cedillo was brought to the Westchester County Jail in Valhalla last night. He is scheduled to appear today in Westchester County Court in White Plains.

Cedillo was arrested following a lengthy investigation by the Yonkers Police Department in 2019 and accused of stealing tens of thousands of dollars from members of the Hispanic community. YPD detectives said Cedillo bilked his victims by claiming he could help them obtain so-called U visas and other documents that could pave the way to legal immigration status and citizenship.

In November 2019, the Westchester County District Attorney's Office announced that a grand jury had returned an 87-count indictment against Cedillo. He was arraigned and sent to the Westchester County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bail. After his release in 2020, he made several virtual court appearances from Washington state but failed to appear in person when later directed to do so by the court.

An arrest warrant for Cedillo was issued at that time. WCPD detectives lodged the arrest warrant with law enforcement in Washington state and other locations, including Kansas, where Cedillo had been known to operate his immigration assistance fraud scheme.

The Westchester County Police Warrant-Fugitive Unit is tasked with locating and apprehending persons wanted on warrants issued by West<u>chester</u> County Supreme Court, Westchester County Court and Westchester County Family Court. It also handles extraditions when a defendant is apprehended in another state and is wanted by Westchester County or any of its municipalities.

In 2023, the Unit made 236 arrests of suspects wanted on warrants, including for Murder 2nd Degree, Attempted Murder, Assault 1st Degree and various sex crimes, robbery and weapons charges. The Unit executed warrants in throughout the metropolitan area. , and detectives also traveled to multiple states across the nation to return suspects to Westchester to face justice.

I condemn the NYS Board of Regents for considering this and urge them to expeditiously reverse course anything less is a total slap in the face to tens-of-thousands of girls competing in high school sports across the state."

Congressman Mike Lawler released the following statement after news broke that the New York State Board of Regents is considering a sweeping change to allow boys to compete in girls-only sports and compete for spots on their teams. This would severely impact competition, potentially harm scholarship opportunities, and create an uneven, unfair, and potentially unsafe playing field for tens-of-thousands of female high school athletes. "Iam deeply disturbed by recent reports that indicate the New York State Board of Regents is considering a move that would effectively eliminate girls-only sports as we know it," said Congressman Lawler (NY-17). "As a girl dad, I can definitively say this is the last thing that New York State should be doing. It's absurd."

"Allowing high school boys to compete against girls in sports will destroy fair competition, take away scholarship opportunities for girls, and put girls at a higher risk for injury," concluded Congressman Lawler (NY-17). "I condemn the NYS Board of Regents for considering this and urge them to expeditiously reverse course - anything less is a total slap in the face to tensof-thousands of girls competing in high school sports across the state." Assemblyman Matt Slater (R,C-Yorktown) has expressed strong opposition to a proposed policy under consideration that would create a mechanism allowing boys to participate in girls' sports. Slater argues that this proposal threatens to undermine years of effort at the federal, state, and local levels aimed at providing equitable opportunities for female athletes.

"The proposed policy would prevent female athletes from pursuing scholastic athletics on a fair and level playing field," said Slater. "This one-sizefits-all approach by the state government represents a severe overreach and strips local school districts of their ability to manage these matters." The New York State Athletic Administrators Association and school district superintendents across the Hudson Valley have also expressed opposition to this proposal. Local districts and their administrators have been handling these situations on a case-by-case basis, ensuring that every student has a fair opportunity to compete while maintaining safety and fairness in sports. Slater emphasized the importance of local control in these matters, stating, "Our local districts have been effectively managing these issues, ensuring fairness and safety for all students. The proposed state policy would undermine these efforts and ignore the unique needs of our communinties.

Yonkers Man Charged With Distribution Of Protonitazene -Synthetic Opioid More Potent Than Fentanyl

Damian Williams, the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, and Frank A. Tarentino III, the Special Agent in Charge of the New York Division of the Drug Enforcement Administration ("DEA"), announced today the unsealing of a Complaint charging MIGUEL DE JESUS REYES MEDINA a/k/a "Azua," and ERIK ALBERTO LOPEZ VALDEZ with conspiracy to distribute fentanyl and distribution of protonitazene, a novel synthetic opioid that is up to three times more potent than fentanyl. REYES MEDINA and LOPEZ VALDEZ were arrested today. LOPEZ VALDEZ will be presented later today before U.S. Magistrate Judge Robert W. Lehrburger, and REYES MEDINA will be presented before Judge Lehrburger tomorrow, July 19, 2024.

U.S. Attorney Damian Williams said: "As alleged, Miguel de Jesus Reyes Medina and Erik Alberto Lopez Valdez engaged in a scheme to sell dangerous narcotics to New Yorkers, including a novel, and potentially lethal, synthetic opioid. As part of that scheme, the defendants sold protonitazene, which, as alleged, is as much as three times more deadly than fentanyl. This prosecution underscores my Office's unwavering commitment to protecting our communities from the deadly opioid crisis, including from emergent synthetic opioids that pose even greater threats than fentanyl. We will not allow drug dealers to hide behind novel changes to the chemical structure of drugs to avoid prosecution."

DEA Special Agent in Charge Frank A. Tarentino III said: "Today's arrests show the commitment the DEA and our law enforcement partners have in targeting those poisoning our communities. As alleged, these individuals are not only responsible for the distribution of the lethal drug fentanyl, but the distribution of protonitazene, a novel synthetic opioid that is up to three times more potent than fentanyl. It is safe to say that the removal of these individuals, and the distribution of these illicit drugs from our streets, saved another family from having to bury their loved one. The DEA and members of our NYDETF remain committed to doing everything we can to bring those responsible to justice."

As alleged in the Complaint:[1]

In or about April 2024, REYES MEDINA agreed to sell fentanyl to a confidential source (the "Source") working with law enforcement. REYES ME-DINA negotiated the price and quantity of fentanyl to be provided, requesting \$2,000 for 74 grams of fentanyl. On or about April 10, 2024, REYES MEDINA met with the Source and provided a 74-gram package of narcotics. During the meeting, REYES MEDINA emphasized that the narcotics were high quality and strong. Then, on or about April 16, 2024, REYES MEDINA arranged to have LOPEZ VALDEZ deliver a further 420-gram package of narcotics to the Source for the price of \$12,250, which LOPEZ VALDEZ did. Following the arrest of REYES MEDINA and LOPEZ VALDEZ, laboratory testing determined that the packages of narcotics provided to the Source by REYES MEDINA and LOPEZ VALDEZ consisted of nearly 500 grams of protonitazene, a synthetic opioid that is up to three times more potent than fentanyl.

REYES MEDINA, 49, of Yonkers, New York, is charged with one count of conspiracy to distribute fentanyl, which carries a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years in prison and a maximum sentence of life in prison, and two counts of distribution of protonitazene, each of which carry a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison.

LOPEZ VALDEZ, 38, of Camden, New Jersey, is charged with one count of conspiracy to distribute fentanyl, which carries a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years in prison and a maximum sentence of life in prison, and one count of distribution of protonitazene, which carries a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison.

The minimum and maximum potential sentences in this case are prescribed by Congress and are provided here for informational purposes only, as any sentencing of the defendants will be determined by a judge.

Mr. Williams praised the outstanding work of the DEA, the New York City Police Department, and the New York State Police in connection with this investigation.

Team USA's Youngest Olympian

One of the great stories of the 2024 Summer Olympics in Paris, is the youngest member of the US Olympic team, 17-year-old Claire Weinstein, who grew up in Westchester and White Plains.

Claire began swimming at the age of 3 and began swimming competitively at the age of 6. She is the daughter of Rodney and Diane Weinstein and has three younger sisters and one brother.

Her family attended Reform synagogue of Congregation Kol Ami in White Plains, and Claire went to Highlands Middle School in White Plains. For her mitzvah project, Claire volunteered as a coach at Westchester Aquatic swim club. Claire believes that everyone should learn to swim and have the opportunity to swim competitively if they want to.

A donation was made to the Christopher Dewey Memorial Swim Foundation that helps low income swimmers pay for the cost of training and travel for competitions.

Claire moved to Las Vegas as a teenager to train at the Sandpipers of Nevada swimming club. And at the age of 13, she qualified for the 2020 US Olympic trials, but did not make the team.

In 2022, Claire was a member of Team USA's 4 x 200 women's relay team that won the gold medal at the World Aquatics Championships.

So far, at the summer Olympics in Paris, Claire made the finals of the 200m freestyle and finished 8th. After we go to press, Claire will compete in the 4x200m freestyle relay with Katie Ledecky, who began swimming in the Olympics at age 15, in 2012.

In qualifying for the US team, became the youngest US swimmer to qualify for an Olympic Games since 2008.

Weinstein began her competitive swim career on the Lake Isle team in Eastchester and set several records at the Westchester Swim Conference. She also swam on the White Plains Varsity Swim team while in middle school.

"I'm always learning and figuring out ways to be better. I know every obstacle will only make me better," said Weinstein, who will be attending UC Berkley in the fall. She enjoys shopping, going to the cinema and spending time with friends...like every other American teenager.

fet had approached them at Hunterbrook Field as they were driving and tearing up the ball field and told them to stop. They surrounded him, they started doing circles around him with all the four wheelers, and then as they had him trapped, one of them came along and ran him straight over.

Moffet said that he is ok with the plea agreement.

Shock incarceration in New York State has been called a boot camp for those seeking an alternative to longer prison terms. NY Shock Incarceration allows individuals who will become eligible for release on parole or a conditional release within three years to participate in a rigorous six-month program and qualify for release at the successful completion of the program.

The program includes a military schedule, with rise and shine at 6am and activities throughout the day until 9pm. Persons in the program will participate in a rigorous set of physical activities and must respond to commands of their program leaders.

Counseling for substance abuse is also included, and education is offered to improve life and job skills.

More than 10 other ATV drivers were involved in this incident, but it is unknown whether any others were charged.

Letter to the Editor: My mother came from a place you never heard of until July 13: Butler, Pennsylvania

Unlike many Californians, whose families often moved from somewhere 'back East' like Ohio or Nebraska, most blue-collar New Yorkers in the 1960s were not the products of domestic migration: Grandparents landed at Ellis Island, found their way to Brooklyn, The Bronx, or Queens, settled, married, raised families, and died.

My mother was different. Her father followed a trail to mills, mines, and factories in small towns in Pennsylvania where you could make real money if you worked hard, even if you didn't speak English good, and weren't afraid of jobs that were always dirty, often dangerous, and occasionally deadly.

In grandpa's case, it was to a place called Butler, Pennsylvania, where mom lived the first eleven years of her life until 1932 when the steel mills and the factories closed down and her parents decided to try their luck in New York, selling their house for \$500 and moving with six children to a tenement on the Lower East Side.

Mom recounted Butler lovingly, recalling growing up in a house with flowers, vegetables, and chickens in the backyard She said the streets were steep, the houses were small, the families were large, almost everybody was of eastern European...Ukrainian, Czech, Polish, something called 'Rusyn'...descent, everybody went to a church on Sunday and even if you were poor, always dressed nicely when you did.

And there was never any crime.

When my sons were old enough to appreciate their heritage, my wife and I drove to Pittsburgh, went with them to a Pirates game or two, rode on one of the two inclines that climb Mt Washington, took the Gateway Clipper under so many bridges, offered my boys a dollar if they could spell Monongohela, then drove up 40 miles to the place where grandma was born. We were like James Earl Jones portraying Alex Haley going up the river Gambia in the second installment of 'Roots'.

The people in Butler were blonder, taller, and thinner than back in the predominantly Italian and Jewish neighborhoods where I (Astoria) and my children (Mamaroneck) grew up and my wife noticed, when we stopped in a McDonalds' for lunch that many of the older, probably retired men there were coughing loudly and often: perhaps the result of working for decades in mills and factories without environmental protections.

Seeing Butler reminded me of scenes in the movie The Deer Hunter, for which a guy whose family owned a bakery in Astoria I used to go to...Walken's...won the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor.

God, the world is small.

Butler was less than 400 miles away, in the same country, but it was another world.

Early in life I learned that when New Yorkers asked 'where your family was from', they meant what country did they immigrate from. I dutifully responded, but often added that my mom was born and raised in a place you never heard of: Butler, Pennsylvania.

And nobody ever had.

And if I had thought of it, I would have presumed I was the only guy growing up in Queens County in the 1960s who would ever have a connection to Butler, Pennsylvania.

And I was.

Until now.

Point Of View/Letter To The Editor Historic Ruling For People With Disabilities

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) made disability rights history, releasing a highly-anticipated final rule implementing Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which will prove to be a powerful tool in fighting discrimination based on disability in healthcare and human services. It is significant news, especially after more than 40 years of advocacy by the disability community to secure greater protections.

Ensuring that people with disabilities will be treated equally as members of the community, Section 504 prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in programs receiving federal financial assistance. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Civil Rights, the new rule, titled "Discrimination on the Basis of Disability in HHS Programs or Activities," advances equity and bolsters protections for people with disabilities under Section 504. The final rule covers protections for key provisions, including discrimination in medical treatment, community integration, accessibility of medical equipment, web, mobile app, and kiosk accessibility and value assessment methods. The rule strengthens anti-discrimination and civil rights protections, and ensures equal opportunity for people with disabilities. The work that Independence Care System (ICS) is doing to improve access to primary and specialty care for people with disabilities will be greatly advanced because of this new rule. This will support ICS in continuing its work with our partners at New York City Health and Hospitals (H+H), the largest community hospital system in the country, and helping to advance health equity and improve health disparities for people with disabilities.

Shock probation entails short-term incarceration at the discretion of a judge. N.Y. Penal Law § 60.01

In anycase where the court imposes a sentence of imprisonment not in excess of sixty days, for a misdemeanor or not in excess of six months for a felony or in the case of a sentence of intermittent imprisonment not in excess of four months, it may also impose a sentence of probation or conditional discharge provided that the term of probation or conditional discharge together with the term of imprisonment shall not exceed the term of probation or conditional discharge authorized by article sixty-five of this chapter. The sentence of imprisonment shall be a condition of and run concurrently with the sentence of probation or conditional discharge.

TEMPORARY TSA PRECHECK® APPLICATION "POP-UP" SET TO **RETURN TO WESTCHESTER COUNTY AIRPORT AUGUST 5 TO 9**

County Executive George Latimer announced that residents of Westchester County and surrounding areas will be able to enroll in the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) TSA PreCheck® program at Westchester County Airport from August 5 to 9, where Idemia will host a temporary "pop-up" enrollment center event.

Latimer said: "For the third time, we are excited to bring back this opportunity for local community members to enroll right here in our own centrally-located Westchester County Airport. We know this has been a widely popular pop-up opportunity in the past, and we are thankful to the TSA for their continued collaboration to offer this limited-time event once again."

TSA PreCheck is a valuable travel option that expedites a traveler's airport security checkpoint screening process. TSA PreCheck allows travelers to leave on their shoes, light outerwear and belt, keep their laptop in its case and their 3-1-1 compliant liquids/gels bag in a carry-on, in select TSA airport checkpoint screening lanes. More than 200 airports participate in TSA PreCheck nationwide and approximately 100 airlines participate in the program.

Travelers need only make an appointment online (appointments are being taken now) and complete their enrollment in-person or as a walk-in. Locate the Enrollment Center in the terminal's 3rd floor observation lounge. The center will be open from Monday, August 5 through Friday, August 9, from 9 a.m. to noon and afternoons from 1 to 5 p.m.

To participate in this enrollment opportunity, travelers should make an appointment online and pre-enroll online. It typically only takes 10 minutes to pre-enroll. After completing the pre-enrollment steps, applicants select the enrollment site for "White Plains, N.Y." and select "Pop-up: HPN." Applicants can select an appointment time using the drop down menu to choose a date and time. The drop-down menu will show the first available time available, but individuals can choose a different date and/or time using that drop-down menu.


Applicants must bring documentation proving identity and citizenship status. Visit the Universal Enroll website for a list of required documents to prove identity and citizenship.

The application fee is \$78 and is good for five years. It must be paid at the time of your appointment by credit card, money order, company check, or certified/ cashier's check. Cash and personal checks are not accepted. Fingerprints and a

After completing enrollment, successful applicants will receive a Known Traveler Number (KTN) via U.S. mail within about 10 days that is valid for five years. Many individuals are approved in just a few days after completing the in-person appointment, so applicants are encouraged to check your status online.

DiNapoli: NY Clean Energy Fund Makes Progress on Solar Capacity, But Energy Effeciency Lags

New York's Clean Energy Fund (CEF), established in 2016 to help New York reach its clean energy goals, has made good progress on reaching its goals for distributed solar capacity and leveraged funds, but is behind in meeting its energy efficiency targets for 2025, according to a report from New York State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli. Since 2016, the CEF spent \$3.4 billion through 2023 and has achieved 45% of its total efficiency goals.

"The Clean Energy Fund has made good progress on reaching its solar energy goals, but crucial energy efficiency programs have underperformed," DiNapoli said. "It is important for the state's climate goals that these funds are used effectively to achieve the best outcome for New York's energy consumers."

The CEF, authorized by the New York State Public Service Commission (PSC) to promote the use and development of clean energy resources, is administered by the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) and aims to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, create a more affordable and resilient energy system and attract private investment. The PSC provides funding for the CEF through surcharges on customers' utility bills. Ratepayers are expected to contribute nearly \$7.5 billion from 2016-2032.

CEF program areas that receive funding from ratepayers include:

Market Development which consists of initiatives focused on generating energy savings and other clean energy benefits.

NY-Sun which works to increase solar power capacity.

NY Green Bank which finances clean energy projects.

Innovation & Research which helps bring clean energy products to market. Through 2023, NYSERDA has reported that its implementation of these pro-

grams has achieved 45% of its 2025 goal for total efficiency savings, 46% of its 2025 natural gas efficiency goals and 33% of electric efficiency goals. Distributed solar has achieved 89.1% of its goals and attracted \$20 billion in private investment.

Market Development Program (MDP)

The MDP has contributed over 80% of CEF's energy efficiency savings to date but has underspent on several initiatives to decarbonize multifamily housing for low-to moderate-income New Yorkers and lower energy consumption and energy bills. It has, however, exceeded its budget for work to promote the construction of efficient and affordable new homes.

Stepping up performance of programs to achieve electric efficiency and electrification of buildings is crucial to the state's clean energy goals. To reach reductions in building emissions, the PSC has said New York would have to retrofit 200,000 buildings a year, ten times the current rate of about 20,000 per year.

NY-Sun, NY Green Bank, and Innovation and Research Programs

The NY-Sun, NY Green Bank and Innovation & Research programs have made progress toward their energy savings goals. NYSERDA reported that if committed projects are counted, the NY-Sun program reaches 150% of its 2025 distributed solar goal.

The NY Green Bank, intended to accelerate deployment of clean energy by removing barriers in financing markets by partnering with private sector entities, has committed over \$2 billion in clean energy finance, with an annual investment target of \$225 million, attracting private capital investment of \$5.5 billion in clean energy projects in New York.

Outlook

DiNapoli's report recommends NYSERDA ramp up performance of programs to achieve electric efficiency and electrification of buildings and take steps to meet its goals for natural gas and other fuel savings. It also recommends the PSC and NYSERDA review the MDP's program initiatives to focus on investment in the areas that deliver the most successful results in advancing the state's clean energy goals.

How come? "The Teamsters are doing something correct if the extremes in both parties think I shouldn't be on this stage,

"At the end of the day, the Teamsters are not interested if you have a "D," "R" or an "I" next to your name. We want to know one thing. What are you doing to help American workers?"

"The partisanship is not working. We need bipartisan support, we need bipartisan cooperation," said O'Brien, who reminded us that the Teamsters have endorsed Republican Presidents Richard Nixon and George HW Bush in the past.

O'Brien said he also wanted to speak at the democratic convention. Let's see if he gets invited.

After O'Brien's speech, Senator Josh Hawley wrote an OP-Ed, which included, "There was a time when Republicans knew that American strength depends squarely on American workers—and their way of life: family, neighborhood, church, union hall. Ronald Reagan knew it. Abraham Lincoln, a one-time rail splitter, understood it in his bones. And Theodore Roosevelt perhaps said it best when he exclaimed, 'I am for business. But I am for manhood first, and business as an adjunct to manhood.' Roosevelt's sentiment should be conservatives' mantra," said Hawley.

And if Mr. Lieberman wants to talk about Republicans being non-union, how about AOC's decision to cancel Amazon's plan to bring 25,000 jobs to NYC by building one of their largest factories. Those jobs would have been good paying jobs. That was the biggest mistake for New Yorkers and for labor in a generation.

dents, the Town Board, in awarding the contract to Competitive, did not award it to the "lowest, responsible bidder."

If the Town Board wants to blame someone for AAA Carting suing the Town, they should blame themselves for making the ill advised decision to award the contact to Competitive. Don't blame AAA for your mistake.

AAA Carting had the garbage contract with Yorktown for five years, and has dozens of other contracts in Westchester and beyond.

Plus, they came in with the lowest bid. If the Town Board wants to save taxpayers a few bucks, and follow the law, they should award the contract to AAA at their next meeting this month.

The Town Board, under then Supervisor Matt Slater, claimed the reason they gave the contact to Competitive was to save taxpayer dollars. Now they have the same choice to make with AAA.
