Can Police Use Drones to Better Protect & Serve?



The Yonkers Police Department recently announced the launch of the City of Yonkers' Drone as a First Responder (DFR) pilot program, in partnership with Motorola Solutions Inc., Flying Lion Inc., Westchester Drone Ops, and St. Joseph's Medical Center.

Drone as a First Responder (DFR) is an innovative and transformative use of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (aka Drones) used by public safety professionals to assist in everyday operations. This technology has not been implemented in the Westchester area as a DFR program until now. The Yonkers Police Department has committed to a 60-day pilot program to assess the use of this technology as an enhancement to our public safety operations.

For this pilot program, the Yonkers Police Department will utilize one drone- a DJI M300 series – equipped with high-definition cameras and thermal imaging. This drone will be responding to calls for service alongside, and overhead, Of

In February of 2021, Richard Leaf, a respected member of the Westchester community, was arrested by the FBI and charged with receiving and possessing videos and images containing child pornography. Leaf, 72, from Somers, was sentenced on July 2 by Federal Judge Philip Halpern to a 10-year prison term. "He knew ex-

actly what he was doing," said Judge Halpern, who could have sentenced Leaf to 17 years, or 5 years, which is what Leaf's attorneys had recommended.



The funding will help finish the mansion entryway, build additional ADA compliant restrooms, expand the innovative sustainable geothermal heat and cooling pump systems, and install other amenities to accommodate the increasing audience.

Do New Yorkers Know We Have Public Financing of State Campaigns?

This reporter was unaware that the State of New York has created a public financing program for candidates running for Assembly and State Senate this year and for Governor, Attorney General and Comptroller in 2025.

The Public Campaign Finance Board (PCFB) was established by Part ZZZ of Chapter 58 of the Laws of 2020 (enacting Title 2 of Article 14 of the Election Law). The New York State Public Campaign Financing Program launches after the 2022 general election (the first day of the program is November 9, 2022).

As part of the New York State Board of Elections (NYSBOE), PCFB is charged with the responsibility of administering the Public Campaign Financing Program for candidates running in Statewide and State legislative elections. The Program provides a multiple match on small contributions from New York State residents to candidates who opt in, allowing candidates the opportunity to raise competitive amounts based on eligible contributions from constituents. For all races, only in-district contributions of \$250 or less will be matched.

The Public Campaign Finance Board (PCFB) was created as a bipartisan unit within the State Board of Elections to implement and oversee the New York State Public Campaign Finance Program. The program is designed to foster participation in the democratic process by matching small dollar contributions with public funds.

The PCFB is responsible for developing a program for informing candidates and the public as to the purpose and effect of the Program, including the preparation and dissemination of educational materials, providing compliance counseling and guidance to candidates seeking to participate in Program. The PCFB will publish detailed information about the money raised and spent in Statewide and State legislative elections providing transparency to the use of public funds. The PCFB will also provide oversight and enforcement of program provisions to ensure public funds are utilized responsibly and pursuant to program parameters.

Eligible offices include Governor, Lt. Gov. Comptroller, Attorney General, State Senate and Assembly.

The New York State Public Campaign Finance Board authorized its first round of public matching funds payments to participating committees in May. Thirty-seven committees will receive payment electronically through the New York Statewide Financial System (SFS) for the first scheduled payment issuance date for the 2024 election cycle on May 13, 2024 before the June 25 primary.

The NYS PCFB has been funded with \$100 Million in taxpayer dollars for candidates that meet the requirements.

Contributions up to \$50 are matched 12 to 1. Contributions between \$50-\$100 are matched 9-1. Any contribution between \$100-\$250 is matched 8 to 1.

Derickson Lawrence Fires Counsel, Will File Motion for New Trial

We received the following statement from Derickson Lawrence: On Friday, June 21, 2024, Derickson Lawrence, 67, FinTech CEO from the City of Mt. Vernon, New York, severed his relationship from his Counsel of Record. Lawrence was recently convicted on an 11-count indictment of fraud by a jury in Norfolk, Virginia, on March 22, 2024, and was awaiting sentencing on July 19, 2024.

The Honorable John A. Gibney, Jr., presiding United States District Judge and E.D. of Virginia over the case United States of America vs. Derickson Lawrence, granted Lawrence's motion to change course in representation, and more importantly, granted Lawrence Pro Se status.

Lawrence immediately moved to continue his sentence hearing and then moved for authorization to file a motion for a new trial. Both requests were granted by Judge Gibney. The new sentencing date has been set for September 27, 2024.

The defendant and the process remain at the mercy of the district court. The next steps by Lawrence in his role as Pro Se, will determine the procedural outcome and the ultimate results of his motions in the United States of America vs. Derickson Lawrence.

Lawrence is a former congressional candidate for the NY 16 Congressional District, former Chair of Westchester County Crimestoppers, and former Chair of City of Mt. Vernon Charter Revision Commission, end of statement.

Lawrence was found guilty this year of defrauding a pandemic program. He faces up to 30 years in prison. Sentencing was set for July 19 but was adjourned to September 27.

Congressman Lawler Announces \$5 Million in Funding for Westchester Localities



On July 12, Congressman Mike Lawler joined leaders from Ossining, Somers, Cortlandt, and Mount Pleasant to announce \$5 million in community project funding for Westchester County towns that was included in the federal funding bills for Fiscal Year 2024.

"When I was elected to represent this district, I promised that I would work with my partners at every level of government and in both parties to prioritize the needs of our residents – and that's exactly what we've done in working with each of the officials here with me today to ensure funding for this and other important projects across our district," said Congressman Lawler. "Projects like these are great examples of what we can accomplish when we put aside politics and focus on meeting the needs of our communities and constituents. That's been my focus as Congressman, and that remains my focus with the most recent round of community project funding, which we submitted just a few weeks ago and will be unveiling more about later this year."

"It's often we hear from politicians telling us what they're going to do to help the communities, but Mike has always come through," said Mount Pleasant Town Supervisor Carl Fulgenzi. "We appreciate you not only talking about the needs of the local government, but following through and making sure we come through."

"This community funding project is very important to our community," said Ossining Town Supervisor Liz Feldman. "This water main is very old and has broken fifteen times in the last six years, most recently in front of the nursing home, where we had to bring in truck water to support the residents until we could get it fixed. It's long overdue and we would not be able to accomplish this in a timely fashion without this funding.

"On behalf of Town of Somers Supervisor Rob Scorrano, I want to thank Congressman Lawler for this \$2 million that his office secured," said Mike Coughlin, representing Somers Town Supervisor Rob Scorrano. "This money will help us with our water projects, bringing fresh water to our business historic district that has been a problem for us for many years. The money will solve a PFAS problem that we've had and we are grateful for this generous grant."

"We would like to thank Congressman Lawler for the \$1 million for the Annsville Sewer and Water Infrastructure Project," said Cortlandt Town Planner Chris Kehoe, representing Cortlandt Town Supervisor Rich Becker. "Annsville's a gateway to the town of Cortlandt and Westchester County. We're looking to both improve the economic development of the area and improve the environmental health of the area and this money is critical for that effort."

Four separate requests were made for community project funding on behalf of the portion of Westchester County in New York's 17th District. The funding includes:

\$1 million to Ossining to upgrade the community's water distribution system, which includes the complete replacement of the Town's old cast iron mains in the project area, improving water quality and reducing the need for costly repairs.

\$2 million to Somers to improve public health and drinking water quality by addressing PFAS issues in the downtown Business-Historic Preservation District


\$1 million to Cortlandt for constructing a central sewer that would provide sewer and water service to the Annsville Creek section of the Town of Cortlandt, helping the town responsibly develop the area for commercial and residential

DiNapoli: Tax Cap Remains at 2% for 2025



Property tax levy growth will be capped at 2% for 2025 for local governments that operate on a calendar-based fiscal year, according to data released today by State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli. This figure affects tax cap calculations for all counties, towns, and fire districts, as well as 44 cities and 13 villages.

"Allowable tax levy growth will be limited to 2% for a fourth consecutive year," DiNapoli said. "The rate of inflation has decreased since the highs of 2022, but local governments are still facing higher prices for goods and services, moderating sales tax revenue collections, and an end to federal pandemic aid. Local officials should consider these issues as they budget for the coming year."

In accordance with state law, DiNapoli's office calculated the 2025 inflation factor at 3.30% for those local governments with a calendar fiscal year, above the 2% allowable levy increase, and indicative of the higher costs facing these localities.

The tax cap, which first applied to local governments (excluding New York City) and school districts in 2012, limits annual tax levy increases to the lesser of the rate of inflation or 2% with certain exceptions. The law also includes a provision that allows municipalities to override the cap.

NY Court of Appeals Rules Proposition One, Equal Rights Amendment, Will be on the Ballot

New York State Court of Appeals has permitted Proposition One, also known as the Equal Rights Amendment, to appear on the ballot on Nov. 5. The Court of Appeals dismissed the appeal of a ruling by the NYS Appellate Division which allowed the ERA to be on the ballot.

Proposal 1, the NY Equal Rights Amendment, reads:

No person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws of this state or any subdivision thereof. No person shall, because of race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, disability creed, or religion, or sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, pregnancy outcomes, and reproductive healthcare and autonomy, be subjected to any discrimination in their civil rights by any other person or by any firm, corporation, or institution, or by the state or any agency or subdivision of the state pursuant to law.

Nothing in this section shall invalidate or prevent the adoption of any law, regulation, program, or practice that is designed to prevent or dismantle discrimination on the basis of a characteristic listed in this section, nor shall any characteristic listed in this section be interpreted to interfere with, limit, or deny the civil rights of any person based upon any other characteristic identified in this section.

The Proposal has supports and detractors organizing to support its passage and rejection.

Sasha Ahuja, Campaign Director for New Yorkers for Equal Rights, said, "In a victory for all New Yorkers, today's decision from the State's highest court confirms Prop 1 will be on the ballot in November. On Election Day, all New Yorkers can and should vote to protect our rights and reproductive freedoms, including abortion — permanently."

"The anti-abortion minority's cynical attempt to block this popular amendment from appearing on our ballots has once again been rejected, as expected. However, these anti-abortion operatives will not be deterred from seeking other methods to undermine our rights. From the overturning of Roe v. Wade, to abortion bans passing state houses across the country, anti-abortion extremists are restricting our rights and reproductive freedoms.

"Now more than ever, we need to make sure our fundamental rights and reproductive freedoms — including abortion — are protected from changing political tides. Our campaign will be meeting voters where they are across the state and making sure they vote YES on Prop 1 this November."

The nonpartisan Coalition to Protect Kids, said, "We are disappointed, but not surprised, that the controversial 'Equal Rights Amendment' initiative will, indeed, appear on the November ballot as Prop One.

"Proposition One is a dangerously worded proposal that could establish the permanent right of biological males to compete on girls and womens sports teams, threatening athletic scholarships for young women and taking away precious playing time. Sixty-six percent (66%) of New Yorkers recently surveyed by the Siena College Research Institute said they oppose biological males competing on girls and womens sports teams in New York State.

"Prop One could also prevent parents from knowing, or having a say, if a child is transitioning genders in school, at a time when European nations and many U.S. States are banning underage transgender surgeries because of the harm they have caused young people. The carelessly worded ballot issue that would amend New York's Constitution also includes language surrounding age that could threaten sensible age restrictions for young people — laws on smoking for example — and senior housing facilities that require residents to be 55 or older.

"Our strictly nonpartisan coalition is fully supportive of the LGBTQ+ community. That includes protecting young people from making permanent, and potentially tragic, life decisions without the input of their guardians." – Ayesha Kreutz, spokeswoman, Coalition to Protect Kids-NY

Democrats are hoping that Prop 1 will increase democratic turnout in the fall elections, advocating that will protect abortion rights in NY State.



New Rochelle Woman Charged in Torture Murder of Her Intimate Partner

Torture murder charge a first for the Westchester DA's Office; defendant also charged with threatening two individuals, physical and sexual assault of two other victims

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah announced on July 8 that a New Rochelle woman was indicted for murder and for inflicting torture upon 27-year-old Concetta Morton, an intimate partner, prior to her death.

DA Rocah said: "In a first for this Office, we are charging the defendant for not only murder, but also for allegedly acting in an especially cruel manner and inflicting torture upon Ms. Morton before her death. We commend the New Rochelle police for their role in this exhaustive investigation. My Office will seek justice for all of the victims."

The defendant, Kenya Tilford, 41, was arraigned July 2 before New York State Supreme Court Justice Anne Minihan in Westchester County Court following an 18-count indictment by a Westchester County Grand Jury on the following charges: Murder in the First Degree, Murder in the Second Degree, Strangulation in the First Degree, Concealment of a Human Corpse, Tampering with Physical Evidence, two counts of Intimidating a Victim or a Witness in the Third Degree, Assault in the Second Degree, Unlawful Imprisonment in the First Degree, three counts of Aggravated Sexual Abuse in the Third Degree, Kidnapping in the First Degree, Attempted Assault in the Second Degree, Strangulation in the Second Degree, and Coercion in the First Degree, all felonies; and Assault in the Third Degree and Menacing in the Second Degree, both misdemeanors.

The defendant remains remanded to Westchester County Jail and is scheduled to appear in court July 16.

It is alleged that the defendant tortured the victim for three months and, ultimately caused her death by asphyxiation before concealing the victim's body inside a storage bin at her Franklin Avenue apartment. During this period, the defendant was captured on surveillance video purchasing a hooded coverall, bleach, tarps, paper towels, rubber gloves, a chainsaw and the storage bin in which the victim's body was found.

The defendant is also charged with intimidating one individual, threatening another individual with a knife, physically and sexually assaulting one intimate partner, and sexually assaulting and attempting to physically assault another intimate partner who she also allegedly intimidated.

It's Time to Put Yonkers IDA on Hiatus

It's time to put the Yonkers IDA on hiatus! IDA was created by NYS law in 1969 to promote economic welfare, create long term jobs, and a 2015 reform law added another requirement: A company must attest that it could not develop the project for which it's seeking a tax break without the discount. Three very simple rules.

In theory, IDAs should create permanent jobs in a community and boost the local economy, not only through these jobs but also via increased tax revenue from pilot payments. But experts argue that subsidies, including those from IDAs, don't actually provide an economic boost as intended. In 2013, economic development researchers were asked to prepare a report on subsidies for the New York State Tax Reform and Fairness Commission. The study found a major flaw in the structure of New York's subsidies: Tax breaks may go to a business that would construct a project even without the subsidy package. The study found no conclusive evidence that "state and local taxes, in general, have an impact on business location and expansion decisions."

In addition, IDAs generally aren't meeting their job creation numbers. The Authorities Budget Office analyzed data from projects approved in 2018 and found that five years later, in 2023, the projects had generated almost 60 percent fewer jobs than promised when the projects were approved.

Another common critique of IDAs is that the tax breaks they give out negatively impact schools. Most public school funding in New York comes out of residents' property tax payments. But IDAs have the power to lower the property tax burden for businesses and developers — and as a result, schools miss out on that money. IDAs often use the "but for" requirement to argue that their tax breaks aren't actually drawing away from local tax revenue at all: In the absence of a pilot, they claim, there would be no project and therefore no taxes to collect to begin with. But school districts lost \$1.8 billion to IDA tax breaks in 2021, according to a study by the subsidy watchdog group Good Jobs First.

Under NYS Law it is not permissible for IDAs to subsidize housing. How many projects in the last five years have been for new housing? Additionally, applicants are asked if they can undertake the project if not for the tax breaks. The application is submitted under penalty of perjury. Not saying they perjured themselves, but how many big established and well known housing developers have received IDA pilots?

The Yonkers IDA has approved millions of dollars in tax breaks, all at the expense of the taxpayer. How many projects have not been completed or gone belly-up? Every application approved, since most are for housing, puts the taxpayer on the hook. In addition, if you have made your payments on time and have \$10,000 remaining, ask for a grant – you'll get it. Ten thousand dollars, more free money. And how do we know if workers are paying Yonkers "luxury" tax for non-residents, not many of the applicants have Yonkers billing addresses. It's time to put the Yonkers IDA on hiatus.



Officials from the City of Yonkers, New York State, Westchester County, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the NYS Homes and Community Renewal joined with the Mulford Corporation today to celebrate the grand opening of La Mora Senior Housing, one of the few affordable housing projects in the nation that uses energy saving Passive House design in a modular construction format.

Located at 23 Mulberry Street in the Hollow neighborhood of South Yonkers, the \$48 million, four-story building has 60 energy efficient, affordable apartments for seniors. La Mora Senior Housing was built by the non-profit Mulford Corporation.

Passive House design is a voluntary standard for energy efficiency which results in ultra-low energy buildings that require little energy for space heating or cooling. It is estimated to achieve 40-60 percent energy savings over a conventional building design.

"The grand opening of this beautiful new senior housing development is yet another example of how the City of Yonkers and the Mulford Corporation are working together to revitalize our neighborhoods with affordable, quality-built housing. We applied the Passive House sustainable design incorporated into the construction, which is in line with the City's climate action plan for sustainable growth," said Mayor Mike Spano.

"The Mulford Corporation is incredibly grateful for the financial support La Mora has received at every level of government from the City, county, state and federal government. Allowing Yonkers seniors to age in place in the most resilient housing possible was clearly a collective vision," said Wilson Kimball, President of Mulford Corporation.

Homes and Community Renewal Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas said, "It is so gratifying to see this \$48 million development up and ready, just two years after the groundbreaking. This project brings 60 affordable, energy-efficient homes to Yonkers and is a testament to how we value and respect our seniors. Our thanks to Governor Hochul, the City of Yonkers, Mulford Corporation and our many partners and trades who worked with HCR to make this real and are helping us provide the types of housing opportunities that allow more New Yorkers to remain in the communities and neighborhoods they love."

"La Mora Senior Apartments will ensure that more low-income seniors in Yonkers have safe, sustainable, and affordable housing options along with essential services. This development not only addresses the housing needs of our aging population but also sets a benchmark for energy efficiency and environmental responsibility. By integrating advanced design and construction standards, we are ensuring that our seniors can enjoy comfortable, secure, and modern homes while contributing to a greener future. I am proud to lead a State Senate dedicated to creating more affordable housing, from approving over \$26 million in state funding for this project, to the historic housing plan passed in the 2025 State Budget," said NYS Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart Cousins.

"HUD's primary mission is to improve people's lives and strengthen communities. La Mora Senior Apartments accomplishes both goals. It will provide seniors with safe, comfortable, and sustainable housing, while at the same time, revitalize the surrounding Yonkers Hollow neighborhood. I am delighted and proud of HUD's contribution in the financing of this project and congratulate our partners for helping to make this needed and important housing come to fruition," said HUD Regional Administrator Alicka Ampry-Samuel.


"We are proud to support Mulford Corporation in bringing 60 new affordable housing units to senior residents in Yonkers. This project will transform the lives of tenants who now have access to sustainable housing, along with the essential amenities and resources needed to prosper and thrive," said Sharmi Sobhan, Managing Director, Chase Community Development Banking.

Financing for La Mora Senior Housing includes \$17 million in permanent tax-exempt bonds, Federal Low-Income Housing Tax Credits that will generate \$17.7 million in equity, and \$9.1 million in subsidy from New York State Homes and Community Renewal. NYSERDA provided \$240,000, Westchester County provided \$3.4 million from the Housing Implementation Fund and the City of Yonkers provided \$1,615,000 in HOME funds. Mulford Corporation provided \$2.6 million loan.

Designed by the architectural firm of Perkins Eastman, the apartments include low-flow plumbing fixtures, Energy Star appliances, individual high-efficiency electric heat and cooling, and LED lighting. The building has a high-efficiency envelope, dual-pane insulated windows, and a central hot water heating and distribution system. An emergency generator will ensure that the building systems remain operable in the event of a blackout.

In addition to the energy saving features, other amenities include a community room with kitchen, two business rooms, fitness center, central laundry, building-wide WIFI, storage units, landscaped courtyard and roof top deck.

La Mora Senior Housing was featured in a national panel discussion in Washington D.C. on June 7 to raise awareness of innovative and affordable housing designs and technologies. More than 4,000 people, including policymakers, housing industry representatives, media, and the public, attended the program.

Yonkers City Council Approves Landmarking of St. Mary's Church

At their July 16 special meeting, the Yonkers City Council unanimously adopted a resolution to Landmark St. Mary's Church. Built in 1948, St. Mary's is the oldest Roman Catholic Church in Yonkers.

St. Mary's is in jeopardy of closing its doors, after the Archdiocese of New York recently called for the church to merge operations with nearby St. Denis and only offer one mass per week.

The Landmarking of St. Mary's includes the exterior façade, interior, rectory and parish hall. The Landmarks Preservation Board voted to landmark the church, and the City Council voted to adopt the recommendation of the Landmarks Board, making the status official.

Hundreds of Yonkers residents and former parishioners of St. Mary's have come forward to call on the hallowed church to remain open.

Many Hispanic residents of Yonkers who now attend St. Mary's have been rallying in support of what is called "The Cathedral of the Hudson River Valley."

City Council Majority Leader John Rubbo said, "St. Mary's is a very important building in Yonkers. The Landmarks Board and Planning Board thought long and hard about it. I have received letters and emails from parishioners and former parishioners across the country to save this institution."

Councilwoman Tasha Diaz said, "I was delighted to see this legislation on our agenda. I attended St. Mary's school for six years and they had a good impact on my life."

Council President Lakisha Collins-Bellamy, who was one of the first elected officials to call on the church to be preserved, said, "As a community, Yonkers has spoken. They have told us to landmark this church, so we voted today to take it out of committee."

Many Yonkers residents have been pushing for the council to grant landmark status to St. Mary's, for fear that the church would be demolished.

The Archdiocese of NY has told parishioners at meetings held earlier this year that the church is in need of \$10 Million in repairs. Some parishioners who are in the construction -engineering industry claim that the number is closer to \$6 Million, and the repairs can be made in phases.

This would give supporters of St. Mary's the opportunity to raise \$2 Million for the first phase. A nonprofit, St. Mary's Friends has been formed to do just that. "The non-profit organization St. Mary's Friends is working to ensure the preservation of St. Mary's (Church of the Immaculate Conception) Yonkers, New York. The mission of the organization is to save the church, so parishioners can continue to express their faith. We have been instrumental in filing an canonical appeal to stop the archdiocese from merging St. Mary's Parish with St. Peter's/St. Denis. We are working to gain landmark status from the city of Yonkers for both the external as well as internal physical structures. We are also working to submit an application for the National Historic Registry.

"We are also working to raise the funds necessary for building preservation and maintenance, including, but not limited to, the pursuit of grant opportunities and the launch of a capital campaign, to ensure the integrity of the buildings for future generations. We will work to preserve the church buildings, not only as a place for mass, but as a chapel or a shrine, where people can pray. It is our aim to protect the legacy of St. Mary's Church as an enduring beacon and Sacred Space of the Roman Catholic faith in the city of Yonkers," from St. Mary's Friends.

The two key factors in granting Landmark status were the history and the architecture of the church.

St. Mary's sits on .52 acres and is a valuable piece of real estate. The church recently celebrated its 175th anniversary.

In other business, the City Council approved a temporary moratorium on any development of battery energy storage systems, and an 8 month moratorium on any new self storage facilities.

A Family Affair Take Shape at Open Door Family Medical Center

Like mother, like daughter.

Maryam Motabar worked as a dentist in Tehran, Iran, in a community health center and then in a private practice, before emigrating to the United States in 2000. She left her home, she said, to give her children a chance for a better life.

Hired as a dental assistant at the Ossining Open Door Family Medical Center after arriving in the U.S., Maryam quickly moved up the ranks. Within several years, she was the director at Open Door's sites in Ossining and Sleepy Hollow, and in charge of its call center.

The opportunity to return to dentistry came about when the NYU College of Dentistry accepted her into a two-year program that would have allowed her to practice as a dentist in the United States. She admittedly wrestled with her decision. "I loved dentistry, and I did think about it for a few weeks," she said. "But it's hard to say no to Lindsay (Farrell, Open Door's President/CEO). She can be very persuasive."

The decision worked out well for Maryam. Today, she is Vice President, Practice Administration, overseeing the federally qualified health center's medical and dental services, facilities, and call center.

Meanwhile, her daughter Sheida Takmil came to this country at the age of four and literally grew up at Open Door. She spent time there with her mother and used its primary care services as a patient herself. She saw up close the difference Open Door made in the lives of its patients, many of whom were new to the country and struggled to find quality healthcare.

During her teen years, Sheida read to children in the waiting room as part of Open Door's Reach Out & Read program, volunteered at the Ossining village fair, and put together educational materials for the Baby Bundle packages. After graduating from Ossining High School, Sheida went to the University of Pennsylvania. She graduated from UPenn in 2017, and the NYU College of Dentistry four years later. She did her dental residency at NYP Weill Cornell and recently completed a post-graduate program for implant dentistry. She recently earned fellowship status in the International Congress of Oral Implantologists (ICOI).

Two years ago, Sheida returned to Open Door – this time as staff dentist Dr. Takmil in the Ossining and Port Chester offices. She's one of several groups of family members – siblings, parents, and children – to work at Open Door in different capacities.

"The thought of working one day at Open Door, where my mother has worked for so many years, was always in the back of my mind," said Sheida, who is now 28. "I was open-minded about where I wanted to work, but my heart has always been at Open Door, and that was hard to ignore. It's very rewarding to be part of something so great. Why did NBC make this decision? Because the vast majority of Americans, regardless of party affiliation, did not want to hear the divisiveness and attacks on Trump, even for a few days. To continue the same talking points against Trump, who was the victim of an assasins bullets, one of which killed an innocent man and first responder, is being tone deaf, and out of touch with most Americans, in my view.

How long should that time of decency continue? A few days? A week? I'm not sure, but 48 hours was too soon. Congresswoman Alexandra Ocasio-Cortez, (AOC) warned democrats not to "resign themselves to fascism," and accept that Trump will win election in November, 48 hours after the shooting.

And former Congressman Mondaire Jones is being criticized for his comments against Trump at a rally in in Peekskill on July 16. Jones said, "Donald Trump says he wants to terminate the constitution. When he could have tried to be more reasonable, he took the MAGA person to be his vice-president...And we are supposed to stop calling these people threats to democracy? Hell No." (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=N-_jwnAEYNo).

Jones, who is running for Congress agaainst Congressman Mike Lawler, was condemned by Lawler and by State Senate candidate Gina Arena. "This has nothing to do with political parties and everything to do with common sense and common decency," Ms. Arena said. "A U.S. Presidential candidate was shot three days ago, and a former congressman is already inciting additional hatred into the mix. It almost defies belief," said Arena, who is challening State Senator Pete Harckham in November.

"For Mondaire Jones to double down on divisive and inflammatory rhetoric painting political opponents as enemies barely 48 hours after former President Trump was nearly assassinated shows how unfit for office Mondaire Jones really is," said Lawler for Congress spokesman Chris Russell. "Despite widespread calls for a return to civility and a toning down of the rhetoric, including by President Biden and former President Barack Obama, Mondaire Jones has continued to show his true radical nature, yet he can't seem to help himself. He should immediately apologize."

Westchester democrats in attendance, including State Senator Harckham, Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg and Deputy County Executive Ken Jenkins, are being called on to disavow Jones' comments on timing. "Mr. Harckham clearly should have said something at the event, but he just stood there smiling and applauding instead. That's totally unacceptable. I call on Mr. Harckham to publicly reject Mr. Jones's remarks from this afternoon," said Arena.

"While Mondaire Jones attempts to incite violence against his political opponents, Congressman Lawler is actually working in a bipartisan way with Congressman Ritchie Torres to protect President Biden, former President Trump, and RFK Jr. on the campaign trail. And news broke that there is an existing Iranian plot to assassinate former President Trump. Shame on Mondaire Jones for his extreme rhetoric," said Russell.

Jones also called Trump "an enemy to democracy itself," when he criticized Lawler for supporting Trump at the RNC convention.

The political question is will Jones' comments impact his race for Congress against Lawler? Did Jones just lose the small sliver of undecided voters in the 17th Congressional district of NY? Or are political campaigns today more focused on firing up their political base then reaching out to the few undecided voters.

Lawler won election to Congress in 2022 by 1,820 votes. This congressional race is one that could help decide which party controls the House of Representatives in 2025.

Arena lost to Harckham in 2022 by a 53%-47% margin.

The details surrounding Leaf's arrest are disturbing, as is Leaf's continued behavior after his initial arrest.

Last year, Leaf admitted to posing as a teenager named "Alex Bronson" to communicate on Skype with a minor who Leaf believed was a 15 years old boy. During the course of these communications, the minor sent Leaf a video of himself masturbating in the shower and a fully nude photo of himself in a bedroom. In addition, law enforcement officers uncovered almost a dozen images and videos containing child pornography on Leaf's home computer.

The Complaint further alleges that Leaf created a dozen fictitious accounts on Chat Avenue, an online chatroom website, and Skype to communicate with minors. The usernames of some of LEAF's fictitious accounts include: alex Bronson, sportsboi.15, alex15, 15brandon, zach.914, runnerboi.14, austinf19, sportsgirl.914, brandon.williams.23, dan.dan77771, beachsand.7, Austin A.

U.S. Attorney Audrey Strauss urged parents and young adults who may have interacted with any of these usernames to call 1-800-CALL-FBI to help provide additional information that would help the investigation and help put this dangerous predator away for the rest of his life.

U.S. Attorney Audrey Strauss said: "Richard Leaf is alleged to have engaged in deeply disturbing sexual communications with minors, and in being in possession of child pornography. Child pornography inflicts immeasurable damage upon innocent victims, and this Office and our FBI partners will continue to exhaustively detect, identify, and charge any individuals engaged in this sinister conduct."

The charge of receiving child pornography carries a mandatory minimum sentence of 5 years in prison; and possessing child pornography carries a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison.

Leaf, a former member of the Westchester County Sports Hall of Fame, was the longtime announcer for Iona College basketball, and a retired Harrison middle school social studies teacher.

But after Leaf gave the FBI permission to search his computer, they found 10 files on his computer involving child pornography. After his arrest in 2021, Leaf told LoHud.com that the videos and photos found on his computer were not his and came from someone "hacking my computer."

After released on \$100,000 bail, Leaf was caught again engaging in illegal pornographic activity online. After that Leaf was back in jail. Assistant U.S. Attorney Jennifer Ong had asked for a 14-year term, calling Leaf's actions "predatory"

During his 34-year career as a Middle School teacher in Harrison, Leaf engaged in perverse conduct with students, including having sleepovers with students that involved in appropriate touching and masterbation.

One of Leaf's victims filed a lawsuit against the Harrison school district under the Child Victims Act. And part of the reason for Judge Halperin stiff sentence was after hearing about Leaf's other, more serious activities decades before.

Summer-Bummer: Westchester Lakes Close

Due to Algae

Several Westchester area beaches have been forced to close temporarily due to Harmful Algae Blooms, HAB. Croton Point Beach on the Hudson, was closed earlier this month after testing found a enterococcus bacteria, which had been churned up in the water due to rain and wind. This County operated beach is now open.

Two other beaches in Northern Westchester, the Mohegan Colony Association and Mohegan Beach Park District, both on Mohegan Lake, were closed but are now open. The closures were due to harmful algae bloom found in water testing.

Lake Welch Beach in Rockland County, which can accommodate up to 9,000 visitors, was also closed due to HAB, but has now reopened.

Assemblyman Matt Slater and Putnam County Executive Kevin Byrne advised residents of Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) and called for the state to increase investments in new technology and needed infrastructure while offering an omnibus legislative package to tackle the ongoing HABs issue.

HAB's have continued to be a huge problem in the Hudson Valley region as five beaches in Putnam County, two beaches in Yorktown and others in Rockland have already been shut down due to ongoing algae blooms.

"Every year, our communities are combating harmful algal blooms, and the problem is now reaching every corner of the state," said Slater. "This is a complex issue that requires greater investment and a more comprehensive approach from New York state. Residents and visitors are being denied the ability to enjoy some of our great natural assets this summer because of these beach closures and the state cannot keep burying its head in the sand."

This proposal (A.6266)(S.7727) would add harmful algal blooms (HABs) within the definition of water contaminant and require the implementation of measures aimed at efficiently managing and mitigating the adverse effects of harmful algal blooms in marine and freshwater environments. Moreover, it requires the development of emergency protocols to swiftly address instances of HABs and establishes a commission to develop regional monitoring and response plans. The proposal would also direct Cornell University to complete a study of HABs and provide the findings to the governor, Legislature, state agencies and the HABs Commission. The state's Environmental Facilities Corporation would also be authorized to provide funding for emergency drinking water supplies when contamination has resulted in HABs or hypoxia.

Putnam County Executive Kevin Byrne said, "Public health and safety should be a priority for every level of government. Harmful algal blooms are a public health issue. They are affecting communities across the state and Putnam County is not immune. Our Department of Health team does a remarkable job managing the impacts of HABs, but county and local governments need more support if there is ever going to be meaningful change to limit HABs in the future."

Westchester County Health Commissioner Dr. Sherlita Amler said: "The decision to close these beaches is a precautionary measure to ensure the safety and health of the public. Harmful Algae Blooms are more prevalent during hot days when water temperatures rise, leading to increased bacteriological growth rates."

Residents and visitors are encouraged to visit the Westchester County website, Westchestergov.com, for the latest updates on beach closures and reopening schedules. The County remains committed to maintaining high standards of environmental health and safety across its recreational facilities.

After the murder, it is believed that Dixon boarded a train and went to Stamford, Connecticut. He then may have boarded a bus to Atlanta, Georgia, and then traveled on to Charlotte, North Carolina. Dixon has known ties to Charlotte, North Carolina; Atlanta, Georgia; Stamford, Connecticut; and New Rochelle, New York.

"On November 14, 2022, Dixon was charged with murder in the New Rochelle City Court, New York, and a state warrant was issued for his arrest. The FBI is offering a reward of up to \$10,000 for information leading to the location and arrest of Mtayari Dixon," end of FBI statement.

One year after the shooting, on October 26, 2023, the New Rochelle Police Department announced that they had "obtained a Warrant of Arrest regarding a Homicide that occurred on October 26th, 2022 on Horton Avenue and Colonel Lee Archer Boulevard. The NRPD is looking to arrest Mtayari Z. Dixon, 29, formerly of New Rochelle but currently known to reside in Stamford, Connecticut.

"The Warrant calls for full extradition from any U.S. State. Anyone with current information of his whereabouts are encouraged to call New Rochelle Police Detectives at 914-654-2300.

"James Caldwell Jr, 29 years of age, of New Rochelle, died one year ago today. On October 26, 2022, at about 5:54pm, New Rochelle Police received multiple calls of shots fired, and that a person was shot near the intersection of Horton Avenue and Colonel Lee Archer Boulevard. Upon arrival, New Rochelle Police located a person on the ground with multiple gunshot wounds.

"New Rochelle Police, Fire and Ambulance personnel administered first aid and the victim was transported to a local hospital. Caldwell, ultimately succumbed to his injuries.

"Although New Rochelle Detectives have identified the person believed to be responsible for the murder, the suspect, Mtayari Dixon, is believed to be in hiding somewhere in the southern United States. New Rochelle Detectives have been working with other Law Enforcement agencies, including the FBI Safe Streets Task Force, to bring Mtayari Dixon to justice. We urge anyone with information on Dixon's whereabouts to contact the New Rochelle Police Department at 914-654-2300," end of NRPD statement from Oct. 2023.

Crimestoppers had offered a \$2,500 reward dating back to 2022.

ficers on the street. When a priority call for service is received, the drone will launch from the roof of St. Joseph's Medical Center and be jointly operated by a pilot on the roof with the drone, as well as a pilot controlling it remotely from our AWARE Crime Control Center. From this launch location, this drone has a response area that reaches approximately 60% of all Police calls for service.

The real-time video feed will be streamed to Officers and Supervisors in the field via a smartphone and laptop application, so responders can see the emergency scene before arriving. The ability to evaluate the resources needed, prepare the proper operational response, and increase the safety of the first responders and the public is the intent of the project and the mission of this program.

Public transparency is a fundamental value of the Yonkers Police Department. To maintain the highest level of trust and transparency with the community, drone flight logs will be published on the Yonkers Police Department website to show the community how the drone is being used. This public-facing platform will be updated daily, and the public will be able to see the date and time of flights, flight paths, and duration, as well as the reason for the flight and the call type it responded to.

Mayor Mike Spano said, "I'm so proud the City of Yonkers is the first and only municipality in Westchester County utilizing this program. By keeping up with evolving technology, we have another tool that allows us to serve our community in a way we never have been able to before. This will allow for more informed decisions, a bird's eye view, and an unmatched advantage in critical situations. Thank you to Motorola Solutions, Flying Lion, and Westchester Drone Ops for the assistance in providing us with this resource."

"Policing is a difficult profession," said Police Commissioner Christopher Sapienza. "Despite the challenges, our Officers here in Yonkers consistently prove they are the best at what they do. Today, we are giving them yet another tool to help them serve the people of this City with the addition of our drone as a first responder. This new technology transforms traditional police response by allowing our Officers to view a scene while responding, giving them vital information that can be used to make more informed decisions upon arriving. I want to thank Mayor Spano and his administration, as well as the city council, for continuing to be so incredibly supportive of our Police Department and constantly providing us with cutting-edge technology to ensure that our officers are the best-trained and best-equipped."

"Saint Joseph's Medical Center is honored to serve as the launching pad for the drone as a first responder program and partner with the Yonkers Police Department and the City of Yonkers on this important initiative to combat crime and keep our community safe," said Michael J. Spicer, President and CEO of Saint Joseph's Medical Center.

The pilot program will operate five days per week, eight hours per day, through August 31, 2024. After program completion, an assessment of the operation will be conducted to ascertain the effectiveness of this technology in Yonkers, as well as an overall program assessment and plan to move toward a full-time operation.

Playland to Celebrate the Legendary Dragon Coaster's 95th Birthday

It's the Year of the Dragon and Playland is hosting a 'beast of a bash' this month as one of the nation's most historic amusement parks and waterfront destinations prepares for two weekends of fun to commemorate the iconic Dragon Coaster's 95th birthday on Saturday, July 20 and Sunday, July 21.
