Harrison Settles Lawsuit for \$425,000 for Sexual Harassment in the Fire Dept.

Settlement Amount Is One of the Largest by a Municipality in an Employment Discrimination Case Brought by the US on Behalf of a Single Individual

When your local government is being sued by the US Attorney for Sexual Harassment and Employment discrimination, all is not well. And it didn't end well for the Town/Village of Harrison last week when US Attorney Damian Williams announced a \$425,000 settlement between the Town-Village and Angela Bom-

Bommarito, a former Harrison Fire Fighter, was pressured by senior firefighter Henry Mohr with "unwanted sexual advances, harassment and stalking, including by repeatedly following her and calling her on numerous occasions. Further, Mohr used sexually demeaning expletives to describe Bommarito in front of other firefighters.

Bommarito filed complaints and reports against Mohr but failed to take any action. She resigned her position under extreme duress. But even after her resignation, Mohr continued to harass and stalk Bommarito. Mohr was eventually arrested and pled guilty to harassment in the second degree. A family court judge also entered an order of protection against Mohr.

The Federal Government and the US Attorney got involved in this case under the Civil Rights Act of 1964, based on the Fire Department's discrimination against a female firefighter on the basis of her sex.

U.S. Attorney Damian Williams said: "As part of the settlement, the Town of Harrison has admitted that it never took any disciplinary action against a male firefighter who ultimately pled guilty to harassing a female firefighter. That type of response to illegal workplace harassment is abhorrent and undermines citizens' faith in their local government. Pursuant to the Consent Decree, the Town of Harrison is required to implement comprehensive policy changes. I want to commend the bravery of Angela Bommarito, who fought back against discrimination and made this Consent Decree possible. This Office will always stand with victims of

Last month, we reported on the reelection campaign of State Supreme Court Judge Charlie Wood. Judge Wood was elected in 2009 as a republican. In 2019, Wood switched parties and is now running for reelection as a democrat. https:// yonkerstimes.com/political-agendas-ethics-and-judicial-races-in-westchester/

In that story, several Westchester democrats supported Wood's reelection, and reaffirmed his pro-choice views. Since then, we have received several emails and comments from Progressive Westchester democrats who are still opposed to Wood's reelection as a democrat.

Shannon Powell, co-founder of Westchester Indivisible, said, "Wood is a Republican who changed parties in 2019 to have the best chance of being re-elected. He is not a Democratic incumbent - he is a Republican and Conservative Party incumbent who has not been previously vetted by Democrats. Wood supporters might play a game of semantics with his controversial decisions but the Democratic base in blue Westchester wants to elect judges who reflect their values. Citizens for a Democratic Majority - and many party leaders - are saying that Wood does not pass that test."

A group of Progressive Westchester Democrats, Citizens for a Democratic Judiciary, circulated a petition against Judge Wood's reelection as a democrat. The petition signed by more than 1,000 democrats, reads "We believe Judge Charles D. "Charley" Wood should not be a nominee for New York State Supreme Court on the Democratic Party ballot line. The State Supreme Court is the pipeline for higher court positions, which are filled by appointment and do not come back to the voters to decide. Therefore, it is appropriate and necessary to scrutinize Charles Wood's background and decisions as a sitting judge.

The democratic primary with the most doubt was in New Rochelle. Ramos-Herbert was running against County Legislator Damon Maher. Some believed that Maher had a chance at victory, but in the end Ramos-Herbert got 63% of the

In Mt. Vernon, Mayor Shawyn Patterson-Howard was reelected for a second term with 71% of the vote, easily defeating former Mayor and Council President Andre Wallace. And in Yonkers

Mayor Mike Spano won his democratic primary with 68% of the vote, defeating Councilwoman Corazon Pineda-Isaac, 21% and Margaret Fountain-Coleman 11%.

All three winners had the support and endorsement from their respective democratic parties in New Rochelle, Mt. Vernon and Yonkers. And in a moderately low turnout, the rank and file democrats who come out, usually vote for their party's nominee.

One other democratic primary of note was the race for County Legislator in the 16th district, Yonkers. Incumbent County Legislator Christopher Johnson lost his primary to Yonkers Councilwoman Shanae Williams, with Williams getting 61%. Williams will now join the county board next January, in this heavily democratic county board district. County Legislator Terry Clements, District 11-New Rochele won her democratic primary with 58% of the vote, defeating Ximena Francella.

Ramos-Herbert will have a republican challenger in New Rochelle in November, as will Patterson-Howard. But in both city's, democrats have held control of City Hall for decades. In Yonkers, the outcome for Mayor is undetermined because republican City Councilman Anthony Merante is challenging Spano in November. Merante will have the campaign funds that neither Pineda-Isaac or Fountain-Coleman had to challenge Spano. And, there is a referendum on the ballot in November regarding term limits in Yonkers, to move the terms of office back to three, four-year terms. This referendum might galvanize the anti-Spano vote.


Current Status of RC Recreation Development LLC vs Yorktown, NY: No Legal Basis



RC Recreation Development LLC is appealing the rulings of both the Article 78/Injunction and the Dismissal of Legally Justified Claims against Yorktown, NY. Larry Nussbaum wants to remind Yorktown and it's residents that Judge Wood did not make any reference or recognize that the Concession Agreement and First Amendment Agreement between RC and Yorktown, NY, is a Public Private Partnership. PPP contracts mean a long term contract (20 years in our initial term), for the design, building, financing, operating and maintaining the Valley Fields Golf Course and Club House. In this 3P arrangement, RC bears the risk and management throughout the life of the contract and where renumeration is solely linked to the demand risk of the Golf Course and Club House dining facilities as "user-pay" revenue.

Judge Wood has not taken into consideration that in Public Private Partnerships the termination for convenience clause cannot be based entirely on obtaining a better deal from another source, which is the fact in this termination.

Lastly, Yorktown "does not have title" to the improvements on the parkland parcel which include the renovated Valley Fields Golf Course and Valley Fields Grille and Restaurant in the new clubhouse until there is an "executed settlement" with a legal hand off, with RC's title duly signed over to Yorktown, NY.

Because RC retains legal title to all improvements, there is an independent law suit against Yorktown Group Golf, Inc for the cause of unlawful enrichment and other causes.

All of these claims and others will be litigated in the remaining 5 causes Judge Wood did not dismiss.

They are:

- **1** The Stop Work Order is Arbitrary and Capricious and Contrary to Law (enables RC to expose all the wrong doing by Yorktown, NY, and those involved individually)
- **2** Declaration of No Material Breach (enables RC to expose the false violations of Yorktown, NY, and those involved individually)



- **3** The RFP is Arbitrary and Demonstrates Slater's Real Interest in Re-Writing the Concession Agreement to Favor Yorktown (enables RC to expose Slater and members of the Town Board's bad faith as Yorktown and those involved individually)
- **4** Retaliation as against Slater, Esposito, and Landi in their official and individual capacities for RC's free speech rights protected by Article 1, Section 8 of the NYS Constitution.
- **5** Unreasonable Searches and Seizures in Violation of the NYS Constitution.(enables RC to expose all illegal activity by Yorktown and those individually involved)

Depositions and Interrogatories are currently being Scheduled.

16-Year Old Jogger Sexually Assaulted at Rye Town Park

The Rye Police Department arrested Richard A. Olmino, 21, of Port Chester, NY, in connection with an assault that occurred at approximately 12:00 am on June 23. Olmino, who at the time of his arrest was free on bail in connection with an arrest for Criminal Sexual Act first degree in Suffolk County, was arrested in Port Chester, NY, and subsequently charged with Sexual Abuse in the First Degree a class D felony. Additional charges are currently pending.

Olmino was processed at the City of Rye Police Department, arraigned, and remanded to the Westchester County Jail with no bail to return to court at a later date

The Rye Police were assisted by the Westchester County Police, the Westchester County District Attorneys Office, The Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the Putnam County Sheriffs Office.

Anyone with information regarding Olmino is urged to call the Rye Police at 914-967-1234.

At a press conference, Rye Police said that the incident occured at Rye Town Park, with a 16-year-old girl, who was jogging. After briefly speaking to the girl, Olmino is accused of grabbing her and sexually assaulting her at knifepoint. The girl screamed and security came to break up the attack, with Olmino fleeing.

Westchester County Police and the FBI were able to identify Olmino, and waited for him near his home in Port Chester, where he was arrested and charged with first degree felony sex abuse.

Published reports claim that Olmino has a history of sexual violence against women. He was arrested in Suffolk County recently for 3rd degree rape, but was released on bail, and has arrests for public lewdness.

Two other recent incidents in Rye point to a possible connection with Olmino that Rye Police are investigating. On June 3, an 18-year old woman reported being assaulted on near Rye High School. After Rye Police asked for the public's assistance, a 15-year old reported being approached near Milton Road but was able to meet up with friends before an assault took place.

Mount Kisco Man Charged with Manslaughter in Stabbing Death

Westchester County Police detectives have charged a Mount Kisco man with Manslaughter 1st Degree in connection with the stabbing death of another village resident over the weekend.

Both the victim and the deceased resided at 305 Lexington Avenue and were known to each other. The incident occurred inside that address. The suspect, Oscar Morales, 41, was arrested Sunday following an investigation by Patrol officers and detectives from the General Investigations Unit assigned to the Mount Kisco precinct. Morales was arraigned before Justice Mark Farrell of Mount Kisco Justice Court and remanded without bail to the Westchester County Jail in Valhalla.

On Saturday, June 24, at 11:12 pm, WCPD Communications received a 911 call reporting an assault with a knife that just occurred at 305 Lexington Ave. Patrol Officers arrived at the scene and found a man with who had suffered multiple stab wounds.

Officers rendered first aid until the victim was transported to Northern West-chester Hospital Center. The victim was pronounced deceased at 12:18 a.m. According to witnesses, Morales and the victim had an argument that turned into a physical altercation, and Morales allegedly used a knife to stab the victim. Morales was placed under arrest at the scene and transported to the Mount Kisco Precinct.

The name of the victim is being withheld pending confirmation of his identity.

Appeals Court Rules Yonkers Term Limits Extension Vote By City Council Legal

On June 23, a NYS Appeals Court ruled that a lawsuit filed by 12 Yonkers residents claiming that the vote by the Yonkers City Council last year was illegal was without merit. In a unanimous decision, the Appeals Cour Judges found that the Council and Mayor Spano did not violate the Yonkers Charter and did not commit an ethics offense simply by voting for a signing the term limits extension, which amended the permissible terms of office for the Mayor and City Council from three, four-year terms to four, four-year terms.

Arguments were filed with the court by attorney Michael Sussman, on behalf of 12 Yonkers residents; ANNE MARIE McARDLE, CAROLYN SOLIERI, MICHAEL REPRESA, CHRISTINE ANITA PETERS, ERIC ADRE JOHNSON, FRANKE. COLEMAN JR, GEORGE McANANAMA, JOAN GRONOWSKI, JOSEPH PINION III, KISHA SKIPPER, MARK PAROLISI and RONALD

The law firm of Harris Beach filed arguments on behalf of the City, Mayor Spano, and all of the members City Council. In Nov. 2022, the Council vote was 4-3 to extend term limits, with Council President Lakisha Collins-Bellamy, Majority Leader Tasha Diaz, Minority Leader Mike Breen and Councilman John

In April of 2023, State Supreme Court Judge George Fufidio ruled that the vote by the council was lawful, writing, "there were no ethical violations committed by the Yonkers City Council by increasing their own and the Mayor's term limits," and "this Court does not find that the increase in term limits for the City of Yonkers Mayor and the Yonkers City Councilmembers violates the Yonkers City Charter."

Judge Fufidio added in his decision, "The Court agrees with the Respondents that this case is, factually and legally, almost identical to the Molinari case (Molinari v Bloomberg) in which the Federal Eastern District and Second Circuit courts found that the increase in term limit for the New York City Mayor, City Councilmembers and other city officials was lawful. "

'Simply put, the term limit increase and the concomitant salary is not the kind of "financial benefit" contemplated by such rules. First, it is a benefit which is not guaranteed to Mayor or any of the Councilmembers. Each still needs to win their seat in a general election, which leads to the second point, that is the seat, salary and term limited office is potentially available to anyone who is eligible to run for office in the City of Yonkers.

The other argument made by Sussman and the 12 residents was that any change to the term limits law required a referendum vote. Fufidio wrote, "New York State decisional law has held that a change to the length of term limits that does not change the length of a term of office does not need to be enacted by a

The Appeals Court found that a majority on the City Council voted to amend term limits last year. And, the final determination of who will serve as the next Yonkers Mayor is still in the hands of the voters this year.

NYAG James Announces Opioid Settlement With CVS & Walgreens; \$1B for New York State

On June 9, New York Attorney General Letitia James announced the final approval of \$17.3 billion in opioid agreements with drug makers Teva Pharmaceuticals and Allergan and pharmacies CVS and Walgreens, including over \$1 billion for New York state. These agreements settle ongoing lawsuits by other states, and finalizes settlement provisions that were negotiated between Attorney General James and Teva Pharmaceuticals, CVS, and Walgreens. These respective agreements will become effective in the coming weeks. These funds are part of the over \$2.6 billion secured by Attorney General James from opioid manufacturers, distributors, and prescribers. Funds from this settlement agreement are expected to start becoming available to state and local governments by the end of this year. New York has already started receiving payments from Teva for the trial premium in recognition of New York's landmark liability verdict following a six-month trial. Attorney General James had previously settled with Allergan, and is not part of the national agreement with that company.

"No amount of money will bring back the lives lost to opioids, but these funds will help heal New York," said Attorney General James. "For years, Teva, CVS, and Walgreens peddled deadly opioids and today's historic agreements hold these companies accountable for their role in this public health crisis. These funds will help with opioid abatement, education, and treatment efforts in our communities."

The settlement agreements announced today finalize previously achieved agreements secured between Attorney General James and the companies involved. Those agreements include securing \$523 million from Teva Pharmaceuticals and over \$548 million from CVS and Walgreens. As a result of Attorney General James' efforts to hold opioid manufacturers, distributors, and prescribers accountable for their actions, New York will receive over \$2.6 billion to support abatement, treatment, and prevention efforts over the coming years.

The settlement agreements announced today will also require Teva to operate under a monitor, prevent all opioid marketing, and ensure systems are in place to prevent drug misuse. CVS and Walgreens have agreed to requirements that the pharmacies must monitor, report, and share data about suspicious activity related to opioid prescriptions. A final agreement with Walmart is not being announced today; there are different process for finalizing that settlement, which is anticipated in the coming weeks.

These settlement agreements continue to build on Attorney General James' commitment to combat the opioid crisis and keep New Yorkers safe. In March 2019, Attorney General James filed a historic lawsuit to hold various opioid manufacturers and distributors responsible for their roles in the crisis. Attorney General James has recovered more than \$2.6 billion to support New York opioid abatement, treatment, and prevention efforts from several companies, including Teva Pharmaceuticals, Mallinckrodt, Allergan, Endo, McKesson, Cardinal Health, and Amerisource Bergen. Attorney General James has also led multistate coalitions in reaching settlements for billions of dollars with CVS, Walgreens, and Walmart for their role in failing to properly regulate opioid prescriptions. Additionally, Attorney General James has also cracked down on dozens of drug trafficking rings, taken action against drug peddlers, and removed dangerous drugs out of New York communities.

violations of our nation's civil rights laws."

Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke said: "All employees deserve a workplace free from sexual harassment and must be able to report harassment without fear of retaliation by employers. The Justice Department will continue to vigorously pursue all cases to ensure that all workers are guaranteed the rights and protections promised by our Nation's laws."

As part of the Consent Decree, HARRISON and the HARRISON FIRE DE-PARTMENT made factual admissions, including the following:

In May 2015, the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT had no active female firefighters. In June 2015, Angela Bommarito joined the HARRISON FIRE DE-

PARTMENT, together with one other female volunteer firefighter. HARRISON and the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT ultimately became aware that after Bommarito ended a relationship with Henry Mohr, a senior firefighter, Mohr repeatedly called her, followed her (including while driving a Fire Department official vehicle), and repeatedly drove by her house. In addition, Bommarito complained to certain members of the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT leadership about Mohr's harassment.

In January 2016, Bommarito went to the HARRISON Police Department and filed a report against Mohr. HARRISON'S then-Police Chief met with Mohr and told him that he wanted "to make sure this whole thing dies" and get Mohr "out of this whole situation." The Police Chief said to Mohr that Bommarito's presence at the firehouse was a "temptation," which was "hard to resist sometimes."

The then-Police Chief also met with Bommarito. During their meeting, the Police Chief suggested that he could arrest Bommarito for her presentation of what the Police Chief claimed was incomplete and false information to the Police Department regarding her relationship with Mohr. The Police Chief prepared a resignation letter for Bommarito, which stated that she would resign from the Fire Department. Bommarito signed the resignation letter.

HARRISON and the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT never took any disciplinary action against Mohr. In May 2016, Mohr was arrested for his harassment of Bommarito. Later that year, Mohr pled guilty to harassment in the second degree, in violation of New York Penal Law 240.26.03.

Under the Consent Decree approved by the Court, HARRISON and the HAR-RISON FIRE DEPARTMENT must maintain an anti-discrimination policy that includes prohibitions on discrimination, sexual harassment, and retaliation, as well as provisions that require objective fact-finding investigations into complaints of policy violations. HARRISON and its FIRE DEPARTMENT must also provide training to relevant personnel on prohibited employment practices and corresponding investigation procedures. The Consent Decree further requires HARRISON and the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT to provide information to the United States regarding complaints and investigations relating to charges of discrimination while the Consent Decree remains in effect. The Consent Decree also requires that HARRISON maintain recent improvements to the HARRISON FIRE DE-PARTMENT firehouse, which have provided additional facilities and features for female firefighters. Finally, the Consent Decree requires the HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT and HARRISON Police Department to maintain policies relating to use of HARRISON FIRE DEPARTMENT vehicles and limitations on the disclosure of non-public sensitive information obtained by HARRISON Police Department employees in connection with criminal investigations.

As part of the resolution, the Defendants have also agreed to pay a total of \$425,000, which will consist of an up-front cash payment to Bommarito and a sum to fund the purchase of an annuity contract to make future periodic payments to Bommarito as well as payments to her attorney for reasonable attorneys' fees. This is one of the largest payments by a local government in an employment discrimination case brought by the United States on behalf of a single individual.



On 1-Year Anniversary of Dobbs Decision, Gov. Hochul Signs Sen. Mayer Bill Strengthening Access to Reproductive Health Care

Legislation (S.1066B/A.1709B) Ensures New York Providers Can Prescribe Medication Abortion and Deliver Reproductive Health Care Through Telehealth Services to Patients in States Where Abortion Services are Outlawed or Restricted

Governor Kathy Hochul today signed legislation (S.1066B/A.1709B) into law to strengthen access to reproductive health care and protect patients and doctors who require abortion care through telehealth services. This legislation expands the current law to ensure doctors, medical providers, and facilitators in the state are able to provide telehealth services to patients outside of New York without fear of litigation in states where abortion services are outlawed or restricted.

"We are witnessing a shameful regression of women's rights in this country as abortion access is restricted in states across the nation," Governor Hochul said. "In New York, we remain committed to ensuring abortion remains safe, accessible, and legal. This legislation will help more women access medication abortion and reproductive care by ensuring our health care providers can deliver telehealth services to out-of-state patients without fear of legal or professional repercussions. With this bill, New York is continuing to fight back against restrictive abortion laws and help more people access the care they need."

Legislation (\$\text{S}.1066B/A.1709B}) will help ensure more women can access reproductive health care and abortion services by prohibiting state law enforcement from cooperating with cases prosecuting doctors in New York who use telehealth services to prescribe medication abortion or deliver any reproductive health care to people in states with restrictive abortion laws. It also ensures that providers who comply with their practice are not subject to professional discipline from medical malpractice insurance companies for delivering these reproductive telehealth services to out-of-state-patients. This legislation expands the current law that Governor Hochul signed in June 2022 to protect New York health care providers of abortions when an out-of-state patient is physically present in New York.

In New York, we remain committed to ensuring abortion remains safe, accessible, and legal," said Gov. Hochul.

Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins said, "New York will not stand idly by while women's rights are chipped away around us. Our state is a longstanding safe harbor for those seeking refuge and the Shield Act provides necessary protection to doctors who are providing critical reproductive health care to women across our country. I'd like to thank Senator Shelley Mayer for sponsoring this legislation in our chamber, and ensuring New York is doing all it can to fight against these horrific rollbacks on abortion rights. As we reach the one year mark of Roe being overturned, I'd also like to thank Governor Hochul for taking swift action to sign this bill into law ensuring these protections."

This legislation was sponsored by Westchester State Senator Shelley Mayer. "Proud and grateful that my bill with Assemblymember Karines Reyes has been signed into law by Governor Hochul. This is another historic moment in New York State's nation-leading role protecting the right to reproductive health services, including abortion. By signing this bill today, Governor Hochul again leads the nation on this issue. This law authorizes licensed New York health care providers, in accordance with New York law, to provide telehealth services and prescribe medication abortion to women living outside New York State. I extend my gratitude to the providers, advocates, legal experts and legislative colleagues, especially my partner Assemblymember Karines Reyes, Speaker Carl Heastie and my courageous Senate Majority Leader, Andrea Stewart-Cousins, who worked to craft a national model for this effort. We are fighting back, not backing down, for the rights that were stolen from us in the overturning of Roe v. Wade. Thank you to everyone who made this historic day possible."



served as Counsel to Nicholas A. Spano, who was the third highest ranking member of the State Senate Republican Conference and past Chair of the Westchester County Republican Committee. In 2009, he was elected to his current 14-year term on the Republican, Conservative, and Independence party lines. He did not change his enrollment to Democrat until 2019—notably, after Westchester County and the 9th Judicial District had become more favorable to Democratic candidates. This April, he told a journalist that "party switches in Westchester County are kind of par for the course."

"The nominating convention for the 9th Judicial District, in which the Democratic Party's nominees will be formally designated to the ballot, is not until August. In the current field of candidates are people who have consistently espoused and upheld Democratic values. Charles Wood is not one of them. As Chair Suzanne Berger recently said about this process, ours is a political decision. And so, we call upon the Westchester County Democratic Party to evaluate all qualified candidates and come to a consensus regarding who among them have the ability not only to be good judges—but good Democratic judges.'

The Hastings-on-Hudson Democratic Committee released a statement on June 9 which read, "At our meeting on June 7, 2023, the Hastings Democratic Committee voted to oppose the candidacy of Judge Charles D. Wood in the race for N.Y. State Supreme Court, Ninth Judicial District. The current field includes ten candidates recommended by the Judicial Screening Committee of the Westchester County Democratic Committee (WCDC). "We encourage our fellow Democrats to support two other candidates from among that list for the open seats on the bench. We are especially disturbed by Wood's actions against two individuals during this year's campaign. In the first matter, Wood filed an apparently meritless ethics complaint against another judicial candidate, Judge Veronica Hummel, seeking that she be "removed from office." Although such a filing is confidential, news of it somehow reached the WCDC Judicial Screening Committee members by the time they met a few days later. Judge Hummel was denied their recommendation, though she had received it the year before, and she subsequently withdrew from the race.

"In the second matter, Wood threatened legal action against Catherine Lederer-Plaskett, of WCLA - PAC, for disseminating factual errors about his employment history. It turned out that the errors he cited were due to omissions made for "brevity" by Wood himself in his campaign résumé. In both cases, Wood's use of his position to bully his opponents is incompatible with the conduct this Committee expects of our judicial candidates and judges.

"Further, the Hastings Democratic Committee finds Wood's history as a lawyer serving the interests of the Republican party to be highly disconcerting. Prior to becoming a judge, Wood was employed for six years as Counsel to senior Republican State Senator and former Westchester County GOP Chair Nick Spano.

"Wood also handled election lawsuits for Republican candidates. His participation in two well-publicized cases stands out: the losses by Andrea Stewart-Cousins to Nick Spano for State Senate in 2004, and by Erin Malloy to Dennis Flood for Irvington Mayor in 2005. "We are dismayed that the attorney who argued against these local Democrats—and against the counting of voters' ballots-is now seeking our support for State Supreme Court, where election disputes are commonly decided.

"Wood last won election to his current 14-year term on the Republican, Conservative, and Independence ballot lines, and changed his party affiliation to Democrat in 2019. He is not a Democratic incumbent, and our concerns about his sincerity as a Democrat were heightened by statements such as this one, made recently to the press: "Party switches are kind of par for the course" (Judge Who Censored The New York Times on Behalf of Project Veritas Seeks New Term as a Democrat, New York Focus, 4/5/23).

"For these reasons, we ask that the delegates of the Ninth Judicial District designate two qualified candidates who are better suited for the office and better aligned with the Democratic values we've all worked so diligently to uphold."

Other Westchester democrats we spoke to have questioned Wood's attack on Hummel, who serves as an acting Justice in the Bronx. "The email from Hummel was sent privately, and in the email, which is now public, she did not criticize Wood, and only referenced a NY Focus Article and WCLA-PAC e-blasts. Other lawyers, and the NYSAG's office have reviewed the matter and found no violations of judicial ethics," said one Yorktown Democrat. More details on the Wood-Hummel dispute can be found by reading our prior article.

What further clouds the matter of Judge Wood and his reelection campaign is that there will be no vote by Westchester Democrats before November. A Judicial convention will be held by the democratic parties in Westchester, Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess and Orange Counties, and that convention will select the democratic party's nominee for November. There are at least 8 other Westchester democrats seeking to replace Wood as the democratic nominee. This makes the effort of convincing leaders in the Westchester Democratic Party to endorse someone other than Wood more difficult.

But as one Sound Shore Democrat told us, "Our politics and our Judiciary has changed so much since 2009 when Judge Wood was elected as a Republican. Today, I don't think the Westchester Democratic Party should endorse him."


