Last month we wrote about our opposition to efforts to rename the Mario Cuomo Bridge (formerly the Tappan Zee Bridge). Our view was that is was a waste of time and money, and that our state has much more pressing issues that our elected officials should be focused on.

We take a similar view with the legislation introduced in Albany to rename Donld J. Trump State Park. The park is hidden in a remote area of Yorktown and Putnam Valley, on the Northern Westchester border with Putnam County. It is more of a large, 436-acre preserved greenspace, with only walking trails available to visitors.

Westchester Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg, and Manhattan State Senator Brady Hoylman have introduced a bill to rename Trump park. Their claim is that the Trump name is hurting the parks popularity, and is contributing to its neglect and sparse visitation.

A release from Hoylman and Levenberg states, "In the bill's memo, the legislators argue that "New York State has always been known for welcoming and embracing people of all cultures and backgrounds, and even our park system reflects these values....The names of these parks and green spaces should do the same." During his presidential campaigns and his time in office, Trump disparaged many different groups of people. He also actively sought to undermine the results of the 2020 election, going so far as to instigate a violent riot on January 6, 2021 that left five dead and many others injured, including 138 police officers."

We took note of this part of the release. "Given his divisive and un-democratic actions, some liken the renaming of the park to the removal of Confederate monuments."

Congressman Jamaal Bowman: Keep Tik Tok

Westchester Congressman Jamaal Bowman became one of the first members of congress to support Tik Tok, as Congress debates whether to ban the popular mobile App. The Chinese-owed platform has come under scrutiny and criticism for its widespread use by millions of young americans, some to their detriment. Others in Congress claim that Tik Tok is being used by the Chinese Communist Party, (CCP), as an information collection and data mining tool.

"Tik Tok has become a community for free speech for 150 Americans. That includes many of the content creators that I just met with. They talk to me about a sense of family. They talk to me about a sense of community. They talk to me about a place that is helpful to their mental health, and to their sense of belonging. They talk to me about finding a place where they can communicate with others

"Tik Tok is used as an educational tool where you have professors and teachers providing content for students to engage with and learn from. That is what Tik Tok is for so many Americans," said Rep. Bowman, who pushed back on claims that Tik Tok is hurting Americans, or that it is involved in spying for the CCP.

"Why do we need to ban a platform that 150 million Americans now use?" There are many apps on our phones right now that are Chinese apps. And so the idea that, 'Oh, TikTok is the boogeyman' — it's just part of a political fearmongering that's happening,"

Bowman added that the accusations made against Tik Tok are more of the same "fearmongering" coming from the Republican Party, who he says is "xenophobia around China."

"I haven't seen any hard evidence that TikTok is committing some form of espionage," he said. "What I've heard is speculation. And what I've heard is innuendo."

Rep. Bowman, who frequently posts on Tik Tok and has a large number of followers, said that Facebook is more of a security risk than Tik Tok. "When we look at American companies like Facebook looking the other way in 2016 when Russia colluded to impact our election — Facebook is a national security risk. We're not talking about a ban on Facebook."

Westchester Residents Asked to Sign Up For GridRewards; Get Paid & Save the Planet



Mayors from Hastings to Sleepy Hollow are engaging in a friendly competition; encouraging residents to sign up for GridRewards to illustrate the importance of synchronicity when it comes to energy reduction. The challenge takes place now through April 28, 2023.

GridRewards, owned by Logical Buildings, AI tech leader in sustainability, is an app designed to get large numbers of people to lower their energy consumption at the same time by getting paid to do so. Niki Armacost from Hastings is leading the charge for her Village. "We're very excited to participate in another Mayor's Challenge this year using GridRewards!

There are many actions people can take to reduce their carbon footprint, but GridRewards is one of the very simplest we've seen. And if we all work together – which is of course the real trick and the brilliance of the app, it is not only Rivertowns residents who win, but every person living within a few miles of a horrible

When so many users reduce their energy consumption at the same time, or in a synchronized manner, it effectively creates a distributed virtual power plant (VPP) and reduces the need for expensive, polluting, fossil-fuel-powered Peaker Plants — for those hot summer days or when the grid is overworked.

According to the Peak Coaliton, (peakcoalition.org), on days with extreme weather, like heat waves or sub-zero temperatures, redents consume more energy to stay cool and warm, which puts excessive demand on the grid. In response to this increased demand in electricity, highly polluting power plants known as "peakers" fire up in the South Bronx, Sunset Park, and other communities of color throughout New York City. These inefficient peakers spew harmful emissions into neighborhoods already overburdened by pollution, exacerbating widespread health problems.

Peaker plants are a prime example of how low-income communities and communities of color bear the brunt of a host of energy and industrial infrastructure that poses significant public health and environmental hazards. Most of these fossil fuel peaker plants are very old, some dating back to the 1950s, and many have been

NYAG James Secures Indictment of Westchester Caseworker for Stealing \$300K+ from 95-Yr Old

Westchester County Caseworker Chantel Chenault Fraudulently Withdrew Funds Belonging to a 95-Year-Old Suffering from Dementia Under Her Care

On March 24, New York Attorney General Letitia James announced the indictment of Chantel Chenault, 46, of Danbury, CT, on charges of grand larceny and identity theft for stealing more than \$300,000 from a 95-year-old woman with dementia while she was under Chenault's care. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) alleges that from March 2017 through April 2022, while employed as a caseworker with Westchester County Adult Protective Services (APS), Chenault transferred over \$500,000 from the elderly woman's retirement accounts to the woman's checking account and would bring the woman to the bank to make withdrawals multiple times per month. Chenault also regularly used the woman's ATM card at casinos without permission. Chenault was arraigned today in Westchester County Court before Judge Maurice Williams. Her next appearance in court is scheduled for June 15, 2023.

"Chantel Chenault used her position as a caregiver to steal from someone who trusted her and who couldn't protect herself. This betrayal harmed the victim and harmed the reputation of the Westchester County Adult Protective Services," said Attorney General James. "All New Yorkers deserve safe and secure services to support autonomy later in life. My office will always defend our seniors against those who attempt to exploit their vulnerability and will ensure bad actors are held

"There is nothing more insidious than exploiting the most vulnerable among us, especially when families put their trust in a caseworker they believe will treat their loved one with the respect and dignity they deserve," said Suzanne Miles-Gustave, Esq., Acting Commissoner, New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) "OCFS has zero tolerance for this type of abuse and referred this case directly to Attorney General James' office for investigation. I commend the subsequent caseworker who reported the alleged criminal activity to the appropriate

New Alzheimers Association Report Finds Half-Million Caregivers in NY



The Alzheimer's Association 2023 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures report, (https://www.alz.org/alzheimers-dementia/facts-figures) finds the burden on New York Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers is growing. The new report released on March 15 shows there were an estimated 546,000 dementia family caregivers across the state in 2022, providing 884 million hours of unpaid care valued at \$19.09 billion.

The new report also reveals that New York caregivers and those across the country face significant emotional, physical and health-related challenges as a result of caregiving as well, including:

Dementia caregivers report higher rates of chronic conditions, including stroke, heart disease, diabetes, and cancer compared to caregivers of people without dementia or non-caregivers. In New York state, 59 percent of caregivers reported at least one chronic condition.

The prevalence of depression is higher among dementia caregivers when compared to caregivers for other conditions. In New York, nearly one-quarter of caregivers reported depression.

Seventy-four percent of dementia caregivers report they are "somewhat concerned" to "very concerned" about maintaining their own health since becoming a caregiver. In New York, 12percent report frequent poor physical health.

Across the country, 59 percent of dementia caregivers report high to very high emotional stress due to caregiving and 38 percent report high to very high physical stress due to caregiving.

"This year's Facts and Figures report underscores the considerable physical and emotional toll New York caregivers experience when caring for someone living with Alzheimer's," said David Sobel, executive director of the Alzheimer's Association Hudson Valley Chapter. "It clearly underlines the need for caregiver support in New York and across the region. The Alzheimer's Association offers free local support throughout our state including support groups and education, as well as the Association's 24/7 Helpline. This support can be a lifeline to caregivers."

The annual Facts and Figures report provides an in-depth look at the latest national and state-by-state statistics on Alzheimer's disease prevalence, mortality, caregiving, dementia care workforce and costs of care. According to the report, there are 6.7 million people 65 and older living with Alzheimer's dementia in the United States, including roughly 410,000 in New York state.

Let's Not Weaponize Gas Stoves and the Grid **Against Climate Action**

What's the rapidly growing trend that Germany, Washington State, New York City, Ithaca, Montreal, and now the City of Beacon have joined?

In all these places, new homes and small buildings will stop installing most appliances fueled by polluting methane gas by year-end, extending the practice to larger buildings within three years or less.

Energy, climate, and building experts from municipalities to states to nations are all reaching the same conclusion that the most cost-effective and energy-efficient way to tame the health- and climate-destroying pollution from burning fuels in buildings and vehicles is to power them with electricity. Electric vehicles and heat pumps use only a fraction of the energy of their fuel-based counterparts and will see their environmental footprint continue to decline as the electric grid transitions to cleaner generation.

Like most climate solutions, eliminating combustion also comes with tremendous public health benefits due to reduced pollution. New York currently leads the nation in premature deaths from pollution caused by burning fossil-fuels in buildings that disproportionately impacts people with lower incomes, people of color, pregnant women, children, and older adults.

With the US becoming the world's largest exporter of liquified natural gas, we now see both gas and gasoline prices soar in response to geopolitical disturbances. EV sales are already booming because owners prefer their handling, fuel efficiency, and low maintenance. Many builders and home buyers are choosing all-electric buildings that are superior in comfort, health, affordability, and emissions.

None of these benefits have prevented the fossil-fuel industry and its allies from attempting to sow fear, uncertainty, and doubt about our clean energy future with culture wars over gas stoves and scaremongering over grid capacity and reliability.

Research highlighting the health risks from gas stoves has been accumulating for decades. American Medical Association, American Lung Association, NYS Public Health Association, the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America, and all NYS chapters of the American Academy of Pediatrics deem gas stoves a health hazard, particularly as asthma triggers for children. A recent public statement by a US Consumer Product Safety Commissioner just served to bring a long standing issue into limelight that some saw as an opportunity to help spark an anti-electrification backlash.

New York's climate scoping plan recommends a prohibition on new gas stove installations starting in 2035. The provocateurs of the controversy seem to be missing the point that by next decade, New Yorkers may want a gas stove as badly as they want lead paint or asbestos in their homes today. According to the Energy Information Administration, more than a quarter of US homes are already all-electric and a majority of Americans do not cook on gas.

Major utilities like Con Edison support electrification of our transportation and buildings and are confident in the electricity generation, transmission, and distribution systems to keep pace with the demand. Our electric grid is stressed in the summer while the heat pumps add to the winter electricity demand. Programs like SmartCharge help steer EV owners' charging behavior towards off-peak hours.

Cold-climate heat pumps and EVs would be just fine in upstate New York; much-colder Montreal's ban on fossil fuels in new construction starts next year, and 80% of new cars sold in Norway are now 100% electric. By the time the climate law's mandates fully take effect in the middle of the next decade, these technologies will be much cheaper and more versatile with advances in microgrids and vehicleto-grid and vehicle-to-vehicle charging.

Even fossil-fueled heating doesn't work during power failures without expensive generators. Electrification of our homes and vehicles actually has the potential to improve safety. Just like we stock up on groceries before storms, we'll be able to stock up on electrons. A fully charged Ford F-150 Lighting can power basic cooking and heating equipment for 2–3 days in an emergency. Anyway, the climate plan doesn't prohibit backup generators or pellet stoves.


On the road, a half-charged battery of a stranded EV can run the seat warmers for a couple of days – something that will deplete a conventional vehicle's fuel in hours even if a snow-covered tailpipe doesn't turn it into a lethal gas chamber first.

During the holiday blizzard in the Buffalo area, four people died in gasoline powered cars, at least 11 in their homes with fossil-fueled heating that doesn't work in power outages, and one from carbon monoxide poisoning. Generators couldn't keep up with blowing and drifting snow. A clinic was damaged from a catastrophic failure of their gas heating system. During the same cold snap, and also amid the terrible 2021 Texas winter storm, widespread gas network failures shut down power plants and caused millions of downstate customers to receive emergency warnings to curtail heating. Hundreds of residents of the New York City Housing Authority are without gas, some for weeks and months, due to dangerous leaks.

While power failures may not warrant delaying electrification, they indeed are a cause for serious concern. No amount of gas can help with electrically powered medical equipment, for instance. The frequency and duration of storm-related outages have been creeping up due to the worsening climate crisis and lackadaisical maintenance of our power distribution infrastructure. Inadequate winterization of substations caused widespread power outages in the Buffalo area during the historic Christmas blizzard. Our aging grid needs significant investments regardless of our climate goals.

Similarly, electrification isn't just about the climate; it's also about doing more with less, more cleanly, more healthfully, and more reliably. Instead of assailing this beautiful future with disinformation and divisiveness, let's use beneficial electrification as a reason to unite for cleaner, safer and healthier energy and demand a robust, world-class electric grid.

Manhattanville College 'DEI' Division Hope, Hype, Hoax?

Word has reached our offices of the creation of a "distinct Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Division" at Manhattanville College to further its agenda of "academic excellence, purposeful education and social justice."

Query: what campus pedagogical emergency compelled such an expansion? The private, 100-acre site, in what PR outfit Thompson & Bender calls "bustling" Westchester County with "easy access to robust entertainment options ...and business opportunities" appeared bucolic in a recent visit. What is now deficient in a program costing upwards of \$60,000 per year and which U.S. News and World Report ranks as a "Top Performer of Social Mobility?" Are we to infer that the "endemic intolerance and bigotry" which the education-industry complex has regularly warned us of the last few years has lately erupted or reached critical mass at Purchase? What are the evidence and data and how would a new "division" correct things?

Is this an example of the institutional isolation, even delusion, present in bureaucracies large and small? Less clinically, is higher education simply unready for the tasks of teaching modern youth? Is this the problem? The new realities of classic American trade and the boisterous workings of the complex "globalized" market suggest such a cause.

America's macroeconomic competition now resides in the Far East and the Indian Subcontinent, where English is the primary subject of foreign language study. Fully half of India's population is English conversant. Serious educators, both traditional and "awakening" will point their charges to the inviting professional and commercial opportunities in understanding, trading with and serving the product and service needs of a wanting (though steadily advancing) Third World, the customer-ready First and Second Worlds, and our own rich 330 million-wide domestic market.

The orderly backlog of US citizenship applications and the disorderly rushing of our borders by millions of our earthly cohorts demonstrates the appeal our progressive "Culture of Commerce." Nineteenth and twentieth century America analog industrial production ultimately made the modern world. If our winning but now-widely challenged course of new digital intellectual creation is to continue, its "Express Lane" of advancement must be unimpeded by seedy rest-stops of political convenience and correctness. The wages of competitive unpreparedness pause for no person or nation; as regularly exampled by the lagging European Social Democracies (measured by GNP; rates of employment, upward mobility, and business creation). The aggressive, market-attuned growth of leading Asian, Caribbean, African and Latin American economies, of course, demonstrate the fallacies of national "societal-lab" regimes.

Certainly, early grade-schoolers will profit by preparation for the demands of diversity, inclusivity, and fair-dealing in a constantly expanding world marketplace and an ever-evolving town square. As future idea, product and service creating individuals they will have pronounced advantages against those from ethnically homogeneous systems. But trying to catch-up on or make up at secondary and college levels "woke" or personal sensitivity training foregone in primary school is a waste of time and effort.

Resources would be better utilized accommodating the imminent demand for teachers and scholars, administrators, accountants, advocates, engineers and mechanics, artists and draughts people, actuaries, and bakers in emerging local and interconnected economies (as uncertain as hiring prospects post-Covid may presently appear). And somewhat closer to "real-time" than ever before as the shortage of workers primed for immediate deployment becomes more apparent daily.

Former centers of industry in Yonkers, New Rochelle, White Plains and Mount Vernon could again hum with the clatter of C-level executive operations, newly re-invented streetside retail, and even modern, spatially appropriate permutations of traditional craft and manufacturing; all to fulfill the local demands for goods, services and sustenance, and fresh consumer needs in commercially awakened India and communistically austere China.

We must also consider the overwhelming appetite for domestic and exportable energy in all its forms; including the geometrically burgeoned electrical demands of transport, appliance and utility sectors, as well as the cleanest forms available of "analog" fossil-fuels gas, oil and even coal. Perhaps most impactful for the near future, channeling first fissionable, and ultimately, "fusible" nuclear power in a manner consistent with modern safety norms and the public's comfort.

Real cultural and individual developmental objectives like these require aggressive national, state, and local policy formulation and implementation. In no way, do political choices like Manhattanville's announced "Diversity" strategy come even close.

Why was the scheme at Purchase and hundreds of colleges more adopted? Which campus constituency has sought such a desertion of the usual utilitarian, affirmative instruction in economic and civic involvement of the past to plain ideological social engineering? Did a dean espy a student cafeteria, tumultuous with kids but devoid of the ethnic diversity which our inclusive and equanimous ideal (including the author's) celebrates? Or have Manhattanville's faculty idealists just swerved off-course in pursuit of vague relevance?

One can imagine effective strategies: wider scouting for unique freshmen by admissions staff acquainted with business-practice, the micro-economics of student-families and international economics; consulting research on teen-human potential and consumer behavior; more reasonable, transparent pricing of prices and fees.

Wrong Way Drunk Driver

Arrested After Crash in Westchester

On March 23, 2023, at about 10:45 p.m., Troopers responded to the New York State Thruway southbound in Greenburgh, Westchester County, for a reported motor vehicle crash involving a wrong-way driver. The investigation determined that Juan Sinchim, 38, of Port Chester, NY, was driving northbound on I-87 in the southbound passing lane when he collided with another vehicle.





Joy and Brotherhood Music Performed in Hindi celebrating India's 75th Independence

The Westchester Music of India (MOI) Group, founded as an all-volunteer group in 2014, has successfully performed to an Indo-American model for MOI combining Western style chorus singing with fusion of Indian and Western instruments.

This past Sunday was the ninth and a historic performance, performing with a live orchestra of Western instruments augmented with certain Indian instruments, billed as "A Celebration of India's 75 Years of Independence with Joy and Brotherhood", at the PepsiCo Theatre, SUNY at Purchase, NY. In 1947, India and South Asian nations found freedom from colonial rule, when Great Britain's Union Jack flag came down and India's flag was raised.

Jawalharial Nehru was sworn in as India's first Prime Minister by Great Britain's Lord Mountbatten, on August 14, 1947. Later than night, Independence night, August 14, 1947, Prime Minister Nehru spoke at midnight, saying "At the stroke of the midnight hour, when the world sleeps, India will awake to life and freedom." The first morning of an independent India was August 15, 1947.

Mr. Abner Bishamber Lall, age 91, delivered a rousing and heartfelt speech to the hundreds attending the performance, remembering "I was a 15 year old boy, in 1947, when I saw the two flags of the Union Jacks descend, and then the twin flags of India's Independence raised for the first time."

In the summer of 1785, German composer Friedrich Schiller wrote the poem Ode to Joy as a celebration of the unity of all mankind. Ludwig van Beethoven Beethoven chose it for the fourth movement of his Ninth Symphony, and Ode to Joy was first performed May 7, 1824 in Vienna. The Ode's theme of of humans as free and rational beings and the sanctity of brotherhood and peace closely aligned with Beethoven's won beliefs. Symphony No. 9 was also the first time ever that human voice was included in a symphony.

Over the years, Beethoven's Ode to Joy has remained a protest anthem and a celebration of music and an expression for freedom of the human spirit. Protesters in Chile sang the piece during a demonstration against the Pinochet dictatorship. Chinese students broadcast it at Tiananmen Square. Leonard Bernstein, the former conductor of the New York Philharmonic, conducted it at a special concert in the German capitol on Christmas Day after the fall of the Berlin Wall.

The Joy and Brotherhood program displayed twelve different songs, all sung in India's national language of Hindi, and after an intermission, Ludwig van Beethoven's Ode to Joy was featured its historic first world's premiere performance, sung in Hindi! and conducted by Avinash Lall, who worked for months with the assistance of David Baranowski, conductor of the Hudson Chorale, and Wil Dannenberg, assistant conductor, for preparing the chorus to sing in Hindi for this performance. MOI gratefully thanked the Hudson Chorale, the Westchester Choral Society, Hudson Valley Singers, Westchester Chordsmen, Christ Church Tarrytown, the Yonkers Philharmonic Orchestra, the India Center of Westchester, and the MOI Orchestra, all whom contributed to this magnificent performance.

"I have received many unprompted messages from constituents who are dismayed at driving past signs for Donald J. Trump State Park," said Assembly-woman Levenberg, who has also opened a survey soliciting local opinions on the topic on her section of the Assembly website. "Frankly, it is triggering for many people to have a daily reminder of the hatred and vitriol Donald Trump unleashed in our nation's politics. Having one's name on a park or a sign along our roadways is an honor, one that Donald Trump does not deserve, given his behavior."

State Senator Brad Hoylman said: "New York wants nothing to do with Donald Trump. Just last week, Trump once again called for public protests. The last time he rallied his supporters, five people were killed and mass destruction of the U.S. Capitol ensued. Our public spaces should be named after people that embody the values of civility and inclusivity that New Yorkers are proud to honor. Our bill makes clear that Donald Trump is not that person."

The bill, also informally known as the "Anyone But Trump Act," passed the State Senate on June 10, 2021. Hoylman-Sigal and Levenberg hope that the time is finally right for the bill's passage in both houses.

"This park has tremendous potential, and we deserve a great state park," said Levenberg. "This park cannot be great with such an ignoble name."

Senator Hoylman-Sigal added, "It's the shame of New York that we have a state park named after a twice-impeached U.S. president. Let's correct this for the benefit of future generations."

Westchester State Senator Pete Harckham is also listed as a co-sponsor. The legislation was not voted on in the Assembly in 2021, but died in the Cultural Affairs Committee.

What is also interesting to note is that the park is located in both Westchester and Putnam Counties. Putnam County voters twice voted for Trump for President, with 56% of the vote in 2016 and 54% in 2020.

In the comments below the bill online, Cythia Radliff writes, I feel it would be a disgrace to change the name of the President Donald Trump park sign. I love President Trump and know many other people do."

And one of the many Trump voters in the area reminded us, asking the democratic legislators, "What if Trump doesn't get indicted? And what if he is reelected in 2024? Both are a real possibility, what happens then if we remove his name from the park? Do we put his name back?"

authorities immediately. Reinforcing what we know in OCFS, the vast majority of human services professionals approach their work with the utmost care and compassion."

Chenault became the elderly woman's caseworker in 2017. As the woman's physical and mental health declined, Chenault was responsible for arranging home health aides from a third-party provider to provide care. Chenault went on medical leave in March 2022, and the new caseworker at APS assigned to the elderly woman noticed there had been a substantial drop in her assets in just a matter of months. Further investigation revealed that the woman's bank accounts and retirement accounts were entirely depleted and as a result, she could no longer afford home health care. A forensic audit of her bank accounts identified a pattern of suspicious withdrawals and transfers, and the use of her ATM card at times when she was homebound. In total, Chenault is alleged to have stolen more than \$300,000 from the woman over a five-year period.

A Westchester County Grand Jury indicted Chenault on charges of Grand Larceny in the Second Degree, Grand Larceny in the Third Degree, Identity Theft in the First Degree, and Official Misconduct.

Westchester County Legislator James Nolan called for an investigation by the Board's Committee on Human Services, Human Rights and Equity of the practices of the Department of Social Services relating to the protection of the assets of adults under the care of its Adult Protective Services division.

"Last Friday's shocking allegations by the Attorney General's office revealing how a Westchester County caseworker looted \$300,000 from the assets of a 90-year Yonkers woman with dementia over the course of five years demands an explanation from the Commissioner of Social Services and the managers in charge," Nolan said. "Above all, the public needs to be assured that measures have been put in place since the fraud was discovered in 2022 to ensure this happens to no one else."

"A simple solution is to mandate that caseloads rotate yearly," Nolan continued. "This fraud was discovered by a co-worker but only after five years. An annual rotation of cases within APS would prevent fraud on such a massive scale."
