NY Mets General Manager Zachary Scott was the latest drunk driver in Westchester, arrested on Aug. 31

The recent news of three prominent cases of drunk driving in Westchester made this reporter ask the question, with all of the technological advances in our society, why can't we stop Drunk Driving?

On August 31, 2021, at approximately 4:17 a.m., Zachary Scott, the General Manager of the New York Mets baseball team, was discovered asleep behind the wheel of his car while stopped at a traffic light on South Lexington Avenue in White Plains. White Plains Police woke Scott, who was initially disoriented and confused. He admitted to drinking earlier in the night and failed the three standardized field sobriety tests that were administered. Following his arrest, Scott refused to submit to a chemical test to determine

his blood alcohol content. Scott, 44, of Rye, was charged in White Plains City Court with Driving While Intoxicated, a misdemeanor. Earlier in the evening of Aug 30, Scott attended a fund raising party hosted by the owner of the Mets, Steve Cohen,

at his estate in Greenwich, Ct.

Several members of the Mets also attended. The Mets left at 9pm in a bus, which took them back to CitiField in Queens, NYC. Scott left the party around the same time and apparently headed to the pubs in White Plains along Mamaroneck Avenue.

Zachary Scott made an irresponsible decision to drive while under the influence," said Westchester DA Mimi Rocah said. "We are thankful nobody was hurt or killed but we will continue to hold people accountable for this kind of reckless and potentially dangerous conduct in Westchester County."

Governor Kathy Hochul visited the aftermath of Hurricane Ida in Westchester County on Sept. 3, going to Yonkers and then to Mamaroneck. The Governor visted a flooded portion of Warburton Avenue in Yonkers that resulted in a landslilde of a parking lot and a cancellation of

MTA service on the Hudson River line. "I can commit here today that the state will provide the resources for this project to get the engineering and design phase underway. My heart goes out to the first responders here representing those all over the State of New York. They teamed up with our State Police to literally save people from the raging waters that had turned their streets into rivers," said Ho-

'So when people talk about these 500-year events, 1,000-year events, none of us are buying it anymore. Mother Nature has changed because of what man has done – man-made, man-induced climate change, the extent of greenhouse gases that have destroyed our environment have left us vulnerable, and we all stand together – local, state, and federal officials – to build the resiliency while we can, but also to address the specter of climate change with a greater sense of urgency because the future of climate change is right now," said Hochul, who also visited Mamaroneck with both U.S. Senators from NY, Majority Leader Chuck Schumer and Kirsten

Gillibrand. Both Schumer and Gillibrand pointed to a study by the U.S. Corps of Engineers for Mamaroneck, which has been flooding out during every recent storm. "Though the study was completed and we successfully fought for construction to be authorized and it was in the 2018 Water Infrastructure Act, I put it in there with Senator Gillibrand's help, the Trump administration in another one of their vicious moves, because it was anti-New

York, decided not to move forward with construction," Schumer said. 'They disregarded the loss of human life here, they disregarded the destruction to the village, the cost to the village and the taxpayers, the cost to the small businesspeople, they just said 'no.' They let many other projects

in other states go forward in states that were friendlier to them.' The project would involve deepening the Mamaroneck River and Sheldrake River and building breakwater walls along the Sound Shore. 'The construction of the Mamaroneck and Sheldrake River Flood Risk Management Project is critically important to the families of the village, to the local economy and the future of the community," Gillibrand said. "We have been hit by these severe weather storms constantly, constantly over the last decade. This country is being devastated from flooding, from tornados, from wildfires. This is the impact of global climate change on our new normal and it is devastating, it is heartbreaking, it is deadly."



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Bus Driver Shortage Could Affect Your Child's Ride to School



The Yonkers Public Schools and the Board of Education realized on August 27, 2021, that hundreds of new students will not be bused to school for their first day on September 3, due to an shortage of bus drivers. Calling it a 'profound challenge, the school district released a short statement at 6pm on September 1, two days before the first day of school.

"A shortage of licensed bus drivers makes it impossible for the District's seven vendors to provide the additional routes needed to transport 474 new students to school; this number increases daily with new enrollments. Urban school districts throughout the country are facing the same challenge. The Yonkers Public Schools transports 11,300 students on 464 yellow buses and vans. For the students who will not be receiving transportation this Friday, parents/guardians will be notified tomorrow, September 2, by the Transportation Department," read the statement.

There are 26,000 students in the Yonekrs Public Schools. If the district

transports 11,300 by school bus or van, then more than 15,000 older students take the Bee Line bus to school, while younger students walk with a family

member or get dropped off.

School districts in Westchester and across the state are dealing with similar shortages, but not as extreme as in Yonkers. Most bus companies barely have enough drivers to cover their school routes but have no substitute drivers as a back up.

Most of the reasons for the shortage is COVID related. Many drivers are retirees, or older, and are now relucant to drive. Some waited for their unemployment benefits to expire, and may now come back to drive.

Some Westchester school districts operate their own fleet of buses while other school district contract out with bus companies. Certification of a new bus driver can take up to 12 weeks. Some school districts may have to consider asking the State for a waiver if the shortage becomes more severe.

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Latimer, County Government Recognize Sept. as Suicide Prevention & Awareness Month

Month-Long Messaging Campaign on the Importance Suicide Prevention and Overall Mental Health

Upholding Westchester County's Commitment to suicide prevention, awareness and the importance of overall mental health, Westchester County Executive George Latimer, the Department of Community Mental Health (DCMH) and several community partners recognized the month of September as Suicide Prevention & Awareness Month. The month-long messaging campaign was created to help educate Westchester County residents on the appropriate ways to discuss mental health crisis in identified communities, and remind them of the resources available

Prior to the Press Conference, volunteers from the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) and DCMH placed pinwheels on display at Glen Island Park in New Rochelle. The display of 78 pinwheels represent the number of completed suicides (78) in Westchester County in 2020. The display includes statistic signs and walk signs, and the pinwheels will remain on display throughout the month of September as part of Suicide Prevention and Awareness Month.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said: "Throughout the month of September, the County will be encouraging residents to participate in a variety of workshops, training courses and task force initiatives to help our communities engage in suicide prevention efforts, and help them to practice good mental health. It is not always easy to speak up if you think a family member or friend is struggling or dealing with a mental health crisis, and we want to give you the tools to start that discussion. Helping those around us is everyone's business, and we want everyone to know about the support and services that are available to them in Westchester."

Commissioner of DCMH Michael Orth said: "It's everyone's responsibility to support each other's mental health. We can all help prevent tragedies in our own communities by learning to recognize and take seriously the signs of depression and emotional pain. It is important that we reach out to family members, friends, neighbors and colleagues and open the door for conversation."

Hudson Valley/Westchester Area Director for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) Maria Idoni said: "September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. This is a time for each of us to reach out to those around us and take steps to prevent suicide. It's important that we know how to talk about suicide, and connect ourselves and our loved ones to help if we ever need it. Together, we can help #StopSuicide."

Westchester County's Suicide Prevention and Awareness Plan includes: Westchester County Suicide Awareness Pinwheels Display and Reflection For the first time in Westchester County, in partnership with the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP), the County will display one pinwheel to represent every suicide in Westchester from the year prior. The pinwheels will be displayed at Glen Island Park New Rochelle throughout the month of September, for visitors to pause and remember those we lost to suicide.

DCMH Social Media Awareness Campaign: Daily social media awareness information and activities related to Suicide Prevention and Awareness.

Soul Shop Faith Based Training: On September 29, DCMH in partnership with AFSP and Calvary Church, will be offering "Soul Shop: Ministering to Faith Communities Affected by Suicide." It's estimated that one out of every two people in a given congregation has personally been affected by suicide. Soul Shop trains faith community leaders to offer support, hope and connection to those in their congregations. Soul Shop equips participants with the resources and guidance they need to foster hope and healing in their community.

Mental Health First Aid Training: DCMH will provide Adult and Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training to Westchester County's communities. Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. Adult Mental Health First Aid Training offers training to address the needs of adults. Westchester will also be launching Teen Mental Health First Aid Training targeting adolescents and young adults in the near future.



Remembering Willie Faulkner

Deacon Willie James Faulkner Sr. a longtime resident of Pelham, NY, departed this life on August 21, at the age of 80. Willie was born in Gadsden Alabama on April 5, 1941 as the only child to Henry James Faulkner and

Willie graduated from Carver High School in Gadsden Alabama in 1959. He attended Jackson State University where he played on the football team as an offensive lineman. He graduated with a degree in education

Willie served in Vietnam as a member of the US Army. After relocating to New York, Willie attended NYU, where he received a Master's Degree in Education. Willie met and married the love of his life Bessie Mae Harvey on June 30, 1964, they had two children, Willie Jr. and one daughter Munester.

Willie had a long career in the Yonkers Public Schools where he was remembered and loved. He also served as a Board member for the Yonkers Police Athletic League, where he never stopped helping young adults. He liked to give back to the underpriviledged by giving and exposing them to sporting events and broadway plays. "I don't know what else to do because this is what I was put here to do."

Willie was a long time member of Shiloh Baptist Church in New Rochelle where he was ordained as a Deacon. His loving compassionate spirit, generosity and devotion to others exemplified the tenets of Christianity.

Willie was an active member of James Farrell Lodge, and was a founding member of "Minority Athletes Networking" (MAN), where he worked with members of the NY Giants Football team to raise money for scholarships for underpriviledged young black men. He was close friends with NY Giants, George Martin, Pepper Johnson and Harry Carson, who attended several PAL fund raisers with Willie.

Willie is survived by his wife, Bessie Mae, son Willie Jr. and daughter Munester, and three grandsons who live in Yonkers.

Editor's Note: As a young board members of the Yonkers PAL, I can remember how Willie used his connections to the NFL to help the PAL hold a raffle for two super bowl tickets year after year, and that fund raiser brought in tens of thousands of dollars, to help the PAL.

We spoke to former PAL President Howard Berman who said, "Willie was very involved with the PAL, going way back to when he was a counselor at Roosevelt High School. Many of the students at Roosevelt would come to the PAL and Willie got involved then."

Willie raised thousands of dollars for the PAL by obtaining two Super Bowl tickets that we would raffle off. He never stopped working for kids and

he helped a lot of kids change their lives for the better." God Bless Willie Faulkner

Man Who Fatally Stabbed Peekskill HS Student Sentenced to 20 Years in Prison

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah announced that Jahliv Niles, the Peekskill man who fatally stabbed a Peekskill teen in 2020 and subsequently attacked a fellow detainee at Westchester County Jail, was sentenced on September 2.

Niles, 20, was sentenced to 20 years in state prison with five-years postrelease supervision for the fatal stabbing of 17-year-old Omarion McKenzie. He was also sentenced to two years in prison with three-years post-release supervision for attacking a fellow detainee at Westchester County Jail in Valhalla.

Niles pled guilty on May 11, 2021, to Manslaughter in the First Degree and Assault in the Second Degree, both felonies. Both sentences will be served con-

On March 27, 2020, at approximately 11:15 a.m., Niles, who was 18 at the time, approached McKenzie on Howard Street in Peekskill, and fatally stabbed him in the chest, stomach and back. McKenzie was taken to NewYork-Presbyterian Hudson Valley Hospital in Cortlandt Manor where he was pronounced dead. Niles fled the scene, but was identified and arrested by Peekskill Police following their investigation.

The Westchester County Department of Public Safety assisted in the investi-

On May 19, 2020, Niles attacked a fellow detainee at Westchester County Jail, where he had been held since his arrest following the Peekskill incident.

"Family and friends of Omarion McKenzie have been forced to mourn a life that was tragically cut short due to a senseless act of cruelty," DA Rocah said. "This sentence will bring some measure of closure and justice to them and to the Peekskill community."

The case was before Judge Barry Warhit in Westchester County Court and was prosecuted by Cold Case Bureau Chief Laura Murphy and Assistant District Attorney Brian Bendish.

hicular homicide after a collision he caused in December 2019 while intoxicated resulted in the death of a Mount Kisco man, Diego Trejo, in a head on collision. Schuster now faces a minimum of 1-3 years in prison.

On August 23, Yorktown resident Mark Cope was arraigned on Monday for a wrong-way, head-on collision he caused while intoxicated in December 2020 which resulted in the death of an Ossining mother, Cope, 41, also faces a minimum of 1-3 years in prison, and is charged with three counts of aggravated

Two days before Christmas 2020, at 907PM, Cope drove northbound in the southbound lane on Route 9 in Peekskill when he crashed head-on into the car driven by Ossining resident Shina McClam, McClam, 32, died at the scene. Mc-Clam's six-year-old daughter and 18-year-old niece, who were passengers in the car, suffered non-life threatening injuries from the crash and were transported to Westchester Medical Center in Valhalla. Both spent one-week in the hospital.

Drunk drivers come in all types: Rich and poor, young and old, most are men, but some are women. Sometimes, whenever possible, I like to be home by 9pm on the weekends.

How can we all be safe? Mothers Against Drunk Driving, MADD, asked, "Imagine a world without drunk driving...Ten thousand fewer families would get the call or visit from law enforcement letting them know their loved one isn't coming home, hundreds of thousands of people would not be injured, families would remain together and intact, and our country would save \$132 billion in costs each year.

"Now, that world is possible. A generation ago it would have sounded absurd that inflatable bags of air would help protect us in a car crash; now, every new car has them. Today's cars can parallel park themselves and have anti-theft sensors that can shut down the engine. Tomorrow's cars will protect our families from drunk driving by automatically determining whether or not the driver is impaired."

Thirty-three states require those convicted of drunk driving of using an ignition interlock, or in-car breathalyzers, force offenders to provide a sober breath sample before operating their vehicles. But research shows that if adopted nationwide, an additional 1,000 lives could be saved each year. That should be a nobrainer, and Congress and President Biden should act immediately.

But for those first time offenders, breath or touch sensors can prevent a drunk driver from operating their vehicle. Autonomous vehicle technologies have the potential to eliminate many types of roadway fatalities, including drunk driving. Technology holds the key to unlocking a future of No More Victims.

MADD has been working on this technology since 2006, and would only come into play if someone tries to drive impaired. Other technologies being studied include driver monitoring systems, touch-based systems that can read your blood alcohol concentration (BAC) through your fingertips and air-sampling systems that can test and isolate just the air exhaled by the driver. MADD has challenged the auto industry to move quickly to develop these technologies to start saving lives.

Other groups believe that tougher criminal measures can help eliminate drunk

https://www.alcoholproblemsandsolutions.org writes, "The single most effective measure to reduce drunk driving is automatic license revocation. Automatic license revocation along with required jail appears to be even more effective. Confiscating license plates and drinking and vehicle impoundment can also work. But it appears that we can't 'jail our way' out of the problem."

While the number of drunken drivers has gone down by 2/3 since 1982, we can and must do better.

And I haven't included two of the increasing segments of impaired driving: Distracted driving on your cell phone and drugged driving.

And what about the bars? How can we hold them more accountable? And what if the General Manager of the Mets was fired for drunk driving? Would that deter others and keep me and my family safer on the roads at night?

Before she became J Smiles, she was Janay Smith, an engineer, product designer and lawyer. "The disease crippled my mother in less than six months. She was fully functioning, running her own forensic accounting firm in January. By six months later, I was in charge of what she ate, getting her clean and managing all of her money. She was 62 when it happened," she recalled. "The shock and trauma of my father's death sped up what the neurologists said would likely have taken 10 years. Prior to this, I didn't know that an event like this could trigger Alzheimer's.'

She said the Alzheimer's Association has been very helpful to her. "I'm mostly connected with the Georgia Chapter — I have the app, and I use the services to find resources, that has been very useful to me. As an only child, a single person and a primary caregiver who didn't see it coming, I'm often anxious as to if I am doing it correctly, and the Alzheimer's Association to me is the standard bearer of information. I've been able to contact the office when I have specific questions when I am confused, and that's been helpful."

but very few are competitive, with democrats holding a massive 16-1 majority. Legislator Margaret Cunzio is a registered conservative, and the only nondemocrat on the BOL. And Cunzio faces a challenge from democrat David Vin-

Westchester republicans are running county board candidates in seven races: District 1 (Parts of Cortlandt, Yorktown & Peekskill) – Joe Torres, District 2 (Bedford, Lewisboro, Mount Kisco, North Salem, Pound Ridge, part of Somers) -Gina Arena, District 3 (Mount Pleasant, North Castle and parts of Greenburgh and Ossining) – Margaret Cunzio

District 4 (New Castle, parts of Somers & Yorktown) – Robert Brower District 9 (Parts of Cortlandt, Ossining and Peekskill) – Charles Braue District 10 (Parts of Eastchester and New Rochelle) – Anthony Giacobbe District 15 (Parts of Yonkers and Bronxville) – James Nolan.

The race in District 15-between Nolan and democrat incumbent Legislator

Ruth Walter, is the one that everyone has their eyes on.

Republicans still have control over three Westchester Towns; Eastchester, Yorktown and Harrison, and the GOP is expected to hold on to their majorities in Eastchester and Yorktown. Eastchester, Supervisor Anthony Colavita is seeking re-election to a 10th, 2-year term. His challenger is democrat John Eickemeyer. Two seats are up on the Eastcherster Town Board, with democrats Eileen DeLucia and Niamh Hartnett-Merluccio challenging republican town board members Luigi Marcoccia and Theresa Nicholson.

In Yorktown, republican Supervisor Matt Slater is running unopposed but the Yorktown Democratic Party has nominated a slate of council candidates and hope to take the majority on the Town Board.

In Harrison, popular, incumbent Mayor Ron Belmont is not running for reelection. This gives Harrison democrats a chance to take the Supervisor's Office and a majority on the town board.

Democratic Town Board member Frank Gordon is running for Mayor, against republican Rich Dionisio, who is hoping to keep Harrison in the GOP column. Two other town council-board races make this a big local election.

There are also judicial races in Westchester that deserve your attention, which we will report on in the weeks to come.





The State of New York History: Governor Hochul and the New York State History Community

The change in governors marks a change for the New York State history community as well. While the outgoing Governor was not hostile to history he was no friend to history either. Besides specific groups or events which piqued his interest or had a connection to him, he did not display much in interest in New York State history beyond pro forma proclamations and declarations which any Governor would make. The change at the top provides a real opportunity for the history community even though it has no or minimal advocacy efforts beyond preservation at present.

The signature achievement of the outgoing Governor for New York State history was the Path through History project. It was launched on August 28, 2012, in Albany. I was at the event as were hundreds of other people from around the state. I even met the Governor in the Executive Mansion at a reception courtesy of Mark Schaming. At that time he was head of the New York State Museum. Now he is Deputy Commissioner of Cultural Education which includes the Museum. He also was in charge of the Path through History project back in 2012 when it was announced. But that only lasted for another two months before the project was transferred to I Love New York where it remains to this very day.

That transfer should have been a clue to what was coming. The well-meaning people in Tourism had no particular expertise in New York State history. There also were no joint committees to foster the development of state history tourism either. It is not my intention here to recap the many many blogs I wrote on the subject of the Path through history before giving up on it. Suffice it say, it became a branding logo with a website and signs. It did not create paths through history. It did not generate tourism revenue. It did not generate sales tax. It simply became another venue through which local history organizations could market programs over a few weekends just as they already did through their websites, newsletters, and press releases.

This development was very disappointing. The watchwords of the project when it began were "collaboration and cooperation." This meant among other things that history organizations would not go it alone but would work with each other and create joint programs. This was especially critical for the smaller organizations which often failed to meet the criteria and standards of the participating organizations. Originally, the project was for the "jewels" of New York State history. This meant the large organizations that were destination sites on their own and had sufficient parking or accessibility, bathrooms, staff, and hours open for seven-day 9-5 tourists.

While the "jewel" criteria was dropped, the "cooperation and collaboration" never materialized. There was no funding set aside in the REDC process dedicated specifically to developing paths meaning multiday multisite events for a weekend or week-long program. There was no staff in I Love New York or the Office of New York State history (a euphemism for one person, Devin Lander) to develop them. In short, it remained every organization for itself with most too small do anything beyond a request for its own site.

Some organizations have tried. For example the Fort Plains Museum and Historical Park in the Mohawk Valley has an annual conference on the American Revolution along with two days of bus tours to nearby and generally small sites. It sells out. Sometimes these local sites really have to strain to schedule sufficient volunteers to handle an incoming bus of 55 adults. I mention this venture (besides having participated in it several times) because with the upcoming American Revolution 250th such paths will be precisely what are needed. For my blogs on the American Revolution 250th Commission legislation, passed but not yet signed by the Governor, see The NYS American Revolution 250th Commission: A Big Step Forward.

To summarize, a rejuvenated and well-thought out Path through History Project is one area where the new Governor can make her mark in New York State history where her predecessor failed to in a positive way. This will be critical in the coming years as the State experiences a series of anniversaries with tourism and education components that should be addressed in an organized and not piecemeal-let's-reinvent-the wheel manner.

These state-wide anniversaries requiring paths to be created include:

2024 Bicentennial of the return of Lafayette

2024 Centennial of the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic

2024 Centennial of the Indian Citizenship Act (national)

2025 Bicentennial of Erie Canal

2027 Bicentennial of New York's "Juneteenth," 38 years before Texas. These are in addition to the American Revolution 250th which will end in

November 2031 for New York.

The incoming Governor is far better qualified to meet the needs of the New York State history community. I say this not because she has a background in such history but because of her training in office. For the past few years she has held what is routinely regarded as a "ceremonial" position. As such she has spent a lot of time outside of Albany travelling to a multitude of local events. These events from time to time include history sites and conferences (I have seen her at some and read about her at others).

The irony is that of all the incoming governors she probably has the most contact with New York State history since Roosevelt. He was, after all, a municipal historian in addition to his other jobs. She has visited sites and met with people in the history community throughout the state.

I realize that she has a lot on her plate now. History might not seem like a high priority. Still there are a few opportunities that come to mind. Association of Public Historians of New York State (APHNYS) – invite her to speak on-line or in person at the upcoming annual conference in September in Oswego

Museum Association of New York (MANY) - invite her to speak on-line or in person at one of the upcoming fall regional meetups Fort Plains Museum and Historical Park – invite her to speak on-line or in person at the October 15-17 William Johnson conference.

In fact, wouldn't that be a great setting for signing into law the American Revolution 250th Commission which the Legislature passed during New York State History Month. It would be right there in the midst of so many historical sites and nearby Indian Nations which have been designated as collaborators under the act. Much as I would like to see the signing here in the Hudson Valley where I live and which has so many American Revolution sites, we do not have an upcoming conference or so many of the Indian Nations mentioned by name in the bill nearby.

Even if the new Governor is unable to attend any of these events, it is still beneficial to notify her and the staff who actually will get the request, that the New York State history community is here and looks forward to working with her.

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School Districts Must Balance the Educational Performance of All Children with the Safety and Health of All Children.

At this writing, a segment of the school population in Mount Vernon and Westchester remains at risk with the continuing surge of the Delta Variant of the Corona Virus.

Accordingly, I write to ask the Mount Vernon City School District (MCSD) to consider the hybrid option of instructional learning for kindergarten to sixth grade (under 12) demographic, in the months of September and October in 2021. Here are the reasons why.

First, we are

all aware that the under 12 demographic is at significant risk, owing to the inability to administer a vaccine to the group - CDC guidelines. Masking offers some protection, but there are invariably members of that group who are not capable of meeting 100% compliance for medical reasons. One example is asthma.

This is critical as the immunocompromised are prioritized within the adult population to receive a third dose of the vaccine, for additional fortification. Yet, that same sub-demographic within the under 12 population are forced to participate, at great risk, in the in person instructional learning setting.

Second, we have seen the irrefutable data of rise in cases immediately upon school re opening (August of 2021) around the country. New York will not be an exception.

Finally, Pfizer board member Dr. Scott Gottlieb predicted on Friday (9/3) the strongest wave of Covid-19's Delta variant would arrive weeks into September. And what we have seen thus far "was a Delta warning." "I think our true Delta wave's going to start to build after Labor Day here in the Northeast and northern part of the country," he added. "This is going to be a highly regionalized epidemic. And so I do think that Labor Day and [the] return to school are going to be incubators for spread that's going to lead to that Delta wave."

Some children, who are likely to get infected, may suffer the fate of "Long Covid" --a potential of life-long liver and kidney disease, after recovery from covid. In worst case, God forbid, hospitalization and death. In addition, after testing positive, they will be sent home to quarantine and further spread infection and disease. For those reasons, I humbly ask the board to reconsider the current position of in-person learning for our most vulnerable students: under 12 years demographic; especially those with pre-existing medical conditions.

Dual concerns of loss of learning, and 30% vaccination rate

Anecdotal data suggest the severe "loss of learning" or poor educational performance in some school districts, especially in Mount Vernon, over the last 18 months, where remote educational instruction was dominant. This, buoyed by New York State and CDC guidance, provide cover for the full-speed-ahead action plan. Still, the district deserves high marks for its concerted and continual efforts to improve the vaccination rates within its school population. However, this is a Herculean task considering the City of Mount Vernon, which hovered at 30% in July of 2021, has the lowest vaccination in Westchester County, and arguably New York

That statistic alone: 30% – reflecting an exceptionally low community vaccination rate - should be a trigger for a carve out.

As board members attempt to balance those concerns, I urge the MVCD to demonstrate leadership to the other school districts in Westchester County by using a "scalpel" to carve out a hybrid option and communicate that posture, until a vaccine is available; or new data materializes that make for safer, educational options.

Don't Worry, Sprain Lake Will Refill Once Again




a recent photo of Sprain Lake, which is already refilling

Over the summer, we received the following letter from Nicholas. "I was just fishing in the Sprain Reservoir and the water level was significantly lower then it was the last time I fished there which was about 8 weeks ago. The water level is getting lower and Elm Trees are over six feet tall. I'd like to point out that these trees are where 8 to 12 feet of water should be 20 to 25 yards from where the old shore line used to be.

The obvious question is if the gates have been repaired and closed why isnt the lake filling up again? City Councilman Anthony Merante, who represents the area around Sprain Lake, has been checking the progress with City of Yonkers Engineer Paul Summerfield, who wrote, "I am pleased to inform you that after significant preparation of the Gate House lower shaft walls, the 5th and final sluice gate was installed on Thursday, August 19. The gate's control spindle still needs to be installed, however, the sluice gate opening and all other gates remain closed and the reservoir will begin to finally start filling up. The new roof on the Gate House will be installed in the next few weeks."

Summerfield explained the work earlier this year. :Repairs to the dam controls were started 18 months ago to make the dam system functional again, in order to meet NYS DEC safety requirements to be able to drain the dam within 14-days. This renovation project would restore the banks of the reservoir, the spillway and spillway channel that feeds into Grassy Sprain Brook; remove the existing nonfunctioning 48" diameter drain valve below the dam embankment and install a new valve; replace 5 cast iron gates housed in the stone gatehouse in the reservoir; and restore the valve house and gatehouse. The dam and associated structures were built in stages between the late 1800s and early 1900s and so the aged gates and the valve needed to be custom fabricated – a lengthy process. The valve itself was lowered 30 feet down into the valve chamber and assembled in place. The dam system also prevents excess water from spilling on to Tuckahoe Rd. The \$1.6m project was funded largely by a grant from NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. The reservoir supplied drinking water to much of Yonkers before it was decommissioned in the 1970s. Yonkers now obtains its water from the NYC reservoir system in the Catskills."

Councilman Merante said, "Its welcomed news that Sprain Lake is filling up. Its natural beauty will be ready to be enjoyed by everyone from golfers at Sprain Lake Golf course, to fishermen or just travelers on the adjacent parkway enjoying a water view."

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
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Visit Westchester's Oldest Country Fair, Yorktown Grange Fair Sept. 10-12

11am and another at 1pm.


