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NY Cannabis Director Visits Westchester, Says No Legal Pot for Sale Until 2023

Chris Alexander, Executive Director of New York State's Office of Cannabis Management, came to Westchester on Aug. 25 to discuss the progress being made towards licensing individuals and businesses to both grown and sell marijuana legally in the Empire State.

Alexander and staff from the NYS OCM gave a presentation at the Will Library in Yonkers on the same day that applications for a license to sell marijuana opened online.

On March 31, 2021, the NY legislature passed and then Gov. Cuomo signed into law the Marijuana Regula-

tion and Taxation Act, (MRTA), which permitted new Yorkers to possess up to 3 ounces of pot legally.

But as Alexander and other staff members explained, there are currently no approved licenses to sell marijuana in NY. So, any storefronts or trucks selling

pot in Manhattan are not legal. New Yorkers can smoke marijuana anywhere that they are permitted to smoke cigarettes, but anyone who wants to grown marijuana in their home must technically wait for 18 months, to give time for the farmers and small businesses to

grown and sell pot on the market and be able to turn a profit. August 25 was the first day that the office of cannabis management opened and launched its Conditional Adult-Use Retail Dispensary (CAURD) program for New Yorkers to apply for a license to sell marijuana and to secure the first licenses to open dispensaries, or pot stores across the state.

The application process is lengthy and requires a \$2,000 application fee. The first round of licenses will be given to those New Yorkers who have been convicted of a marijuana related offense, and who have operated a small business.

New York State has expunged some 400,000 marijuana related convictions of residents, and it will be those same residents who will be encouraged to apply for a license to sell pot. The deadline to complete a CAURD license application is Sept. 26.

Alexander made some news at the Yonkers event by predicting that no licenses

On September 11, 2021, Westchester County Executive George Latimer said, "we have had 21 years of commemorations--its hard to say something that somebody hasn't said before. there's a theme on 9/11 that focuses on our first responders, and the bravery and the sacrifice of those who died, and the bravery of those that survived the day, but didn't survive the days that followed.

'in respect of that we put up the wall of remembrance, understanding that the people who died that day we mourn, but the people who sacrificed thereafter we morun as well. and the family members today realize that west takes that sacrifice to heart," said Latimer. The Westchester County 9/11 First Responders Memorial is located next to The Rising memorial at Kensico Dam Plaza, Valhalla

Why Did a Harrison Cop, Making \$242k, and Caught for Stealing a \$535 Light, Retire?

On August 5, Harrison Police officer Sokol Biberaj stole a Velux deckmounted laminated skylight worth from a loading dock in Greenburgh. Biberaj, was later caught on video driving off with the light, valued at \$550, and was arrested by Greenburgh police on August 19 and charged with Petty Larceny, a misdemeanor.

On August 25, Biberaj wrote to Harrison Police Chief John Vasta announcing his retirement, effective Sept. 8. Biberaj served for 15 years with the Harrison Police Department, and seven years with the NYPD prior to his service in Harrison, giving him the 20 years for a pension.

According to Govsalaries.com Biberaj earned a salary of \$226,253 in 2020. Other reports had his current salary at \$243,000. That salary would include a massive amount of overtime, according to sources in Harrison we spoke to.

People in Harrison, and in the law enforcement community in Westchester, are shocked at Biberaj's behavior for several reasons. First and foremost, why did he decide to steal a light from a warehouse that he should have known had

"Why risk your career and do such a stupid thing? When we see cases like this, is the reward worth the risk?" said one Westchester official.

The second question that we are trying to find an answer to is why did Biberaj retire? The reason is that you cannot be convicted of a crime and keep your job on the Harrison Police Department. But that policy doesn't jive with the criminal record of another Harrison Police officer who remains on the force.

In May we wrote about Officer Frank Corvino, who landed on the front page of the Journal News for a two-year old domestic violence incident. In April 2021, Corvino pled guilty to second degree harassment, with no jail time and anger management and parenting classes required. But Corvino remains on the force on desk duty.

No Sympathy for Sobbing Attorney Who Stole \$3.7 M From Disabled

The Westchester DA's office, and Judge Minihan, wanted a tougher sentence, and so did the vitims

A disgraced attorney, who was raised, lives and works here in Westchester, was sentenced to 1-3 years in jail for stealing more than \$3.7 Million from eight different clients. Westchester DA Mimi Rocah's office made the announcement about the sentencing of Laurieanne DeLitta, 51, who lives in Briarcliff and had a law office in Armonk, and who attended the New Rochelle

DeLitta stole from the estates of families who were using their funds to pay for nursing home care for some and for the care of several disabled children, including adults with Cerebral Palsy.

"Attorneys should be held to the highest standards of ethics and integrity," DA Rocah said. "Ms. DeLitta violated her oath and professional duties in every way when she broke the law and stole from her clients. My Office has no tolerance for such conduct.'

Westchester County Court Judge Barry Warhit agreed to the sentencing of 1-3 years for DeLitta's crimes, but good reporting from Robert Cox, editor of talkofthesound.com, tells us there is more to this story.

"After the sentencing, Assistant District Attorney Cooper Gorrie, the prosecutor in the case, told the families that Delitta would have to serve the first year but might then be paroled for the remainder of her sentence. He explained that under New York State law one year is counted as 7/8th of a year, so 319 days or about 10.5 months," writes Cox, (https://talkofthesound.com/2022/09/06/laurieanne-delitta-disbarred-attorney-who-stole-from-children-with-cerebral-palsyand-the-elderly-sentenced-to-prison/)

Not only were the families who were victims of DeLitta's crimes not happy with the sentencing, but ADA Gorrie and County Court Judge Anne Minihan, who imposed the agreed upon sentence, wanted a longer jail sentence, with Cox writing, "over what ADA Gorrie told Judge Minihan were the strenuous objections of the People," and "When Delitta was put in handcuffs shortly at about 11:30 a.m. and remanded to state prison, Minihan looked at the victims and said, "I'm sorry", in reference to the light sentence."

While some believe that Judge Warhit gave DeLitta "a light sentence" because she was an attorney, others had just the opposite view. "She should have known better because she was an attorney, and a woman who lived a life

Bivalent Booster designed to better protect against Omicron and Delta Subvariants of COVID

Beginning this Friday, September 16, the Westchester County Health Department will be offering the bivalent COVID-19 vaccine booster. The new bivalent vaccine, which contains pieces of both the Delta and Omicron strands of CO-VID-19, is designed to provide better protection than previous boosters against the virus

The Health Department will have the Pfizer Bivalent Booster (12 and older) and the Moderna Bivalent Booster (18 and older) available. The Health Department has been directed by the FDA to no longer provide the monovalent booster, however all other vaccines for all other age groups will still be available.

The bivalent vaccine is only approved as a booster shot, and can only be administered two months after your previous booster or your original series of the COVID-19 vaccine.

The bivalent booster will be available at the Westebester County Health Do

The bivalent booster will be available at the Westchester County Health Department Clinic, 134 Court St, White Plains, NY 10601.

Vaccine clinics are held on Fridays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. On Friday, September 16, the bivalent booster will be available from 1 to 3

First Positive West Nile Virus Case in Westchester in 2022

Westchester County has learned of its first human case of West Nile Virus this year, which was confirmed in an Elmsford resident with multiple underlying medical conditions, who is recovering at home. Health Commissioner Sherlita Amler, MD, said: "This first case of West Nile Virus should remind us all to take precautions against mosquito bites by removing standing water from our property, especially after recent heavy rain and flooding, and using repellents when we spend time outdoors, especially from dusk to dawn, when mosquitoes are most active."

West Nile Virus infection most often causes a mild or moderate flu-like illness, but can be more serious particularly for people 60 and older, and those with other health complications. In 2021 and 2020, three people were diagnosed with West Nile Virus, and in 2019, one Westchester County resident had the virus.

The Westchester County Department of Health evaluated standing water around the resident's home and nearby catch basins, and treated those with larvicide as needed. Residents should inspect their property and remove any standing water to prevent mosquitoes from breeding. Residents who notice large areas of standing water on public property should report them to the Westchester County Department of Health at (914) 813-5000. Masks No Longer Required on Westchester Bee Line Buses & Metro-North Railroad, Subways

Effective immediately, (Sept. 7), masks will no longer be required on West-chester County Bee-Line Buses, and Bee-Line ParaTransit. Earlier today, New York Governor Kathy Hochul removed the mask requirement on public transportation.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said: "Largely steady COVID rates are making COVID part of our new reality, but not an illness that should impact our day-to-day life as it did two years ago. As always, those who feel more comfortable wearing a mask should do so, but that is a choice not a mandate."

Latimer is still encouraging those who are eligible to receive the fourth CO-VID-19 vaccine. New York State still requires masks at health facilities, including nursing homes.

The MTA also announced that the mask requirement on public transit is being lifted. Following guidance from New York State Department of Health Commissioner Dr. Mary T. Bassett, effective immediately masks are optional on all forms of public transportation, including subways, buses, commuter railroad, paratransit services, and in stations. Free masks will continue to be available at subway station booths upon request as well as on commuter railroad trains. To eliminate confusion for riders, the Authority is rolling out a new campaign throughout stations and on subways, buses, and commuter railroad trains. Digital signage will encourage riders who prefer wearing a mask to continue to do so, while also ensuring awareness that it is now optional for all.

Westchester Board of Legislators Reopens to the Public

The Westchester County Board of Legislators announced it will resume inperson meetings at the Michaelian Office Building, located at 148 Martine Avenue in White Plains, NY, beginning September 12, 2022.

In an effort to maintain compliance with the State's Open Meetings Law, an executive order was issued in March 2020 authorizing virtual access to public meetings due to the coronavirus pandemic. The order has been extended multiple times so Public Bodies may continue to run and function. Virtual access has permitted the Bodies to meet the stipulations of providing viewing access to the public, as well as providing reasonable notice of meetings.

The Board will officially institute a hybrid model requiring participants to register via Webex (an online teleconferencing system) in order to participate remotely and attend via livestream, as well as permitting physical attendance to all of its meetings. Aside from its bi-weekly Board meetings, all County legislative committee meetings are subject to the new model.

"We feel now is the best time to reopen our Chamber to the public because the worst of the pandemic is behind us. COVID helped us evolve as an institution, marrying traditional procedures with modern technology. By making our rules more flexible, we will be more inclusive and transparent, and that is a great thing for democracy," said Chairwoman Catherine Borgia (D – Cortlandt, Croton on Hudson, Ossining, Briarcliff Manor, Peekskill).

The County legislature has provided various methods of access for participation to continue to promote equitable civic involvement throughout the pandemic. Among the aforementioned teleconferencing services, constituents can use telephone devices, and can send written comments to the Clerk at BOLPublicComments@westchesterlegislators.com or by mail to Clerk of the Board of Legislators, 148 Martine Ave., 8th Floor, White Plains, NY 10601.

Others believe there is another reason that Biberaj retired so quickly. "He ran as fast as he could to secure that pension, and the reason is not about stealing a skylight. If he got caught stealing from this warehouse in Greenburgh, how many other times did he steal, or commit other crimes?"


Biberaj lives in Dobbs Ferry, so the theft in Greenburgh was nearby his home. Perhaps he scoped out the business, New Castle Building Products, or drove by it frequently, before committing the crime.

Some are connecting Biberaj's retirement with another former Harrison Police Officer; former Chief Anthony Marraccini. In 2019, Marraccini was sentenced by Federal Judge Kenneth Karas to 18 months in prison for tax evasion.

First it's clear that Marraccini did not pay his taxes, and he has given the J Pirro defense, that his accountant and his wife did the bookkeeping and filed the taxes and he just signed the return. But some close to the Harrison police department tell us that Marraccini was "just trying to expose wrongdoing in the department and ended up getting tied up with the IRS."

Biberaj was also a real estate agent and a landlord, with some estimating his income from real estate to be close to or more than his police salary. Others questioned how he landed the job with the HPD in the frist place. The last rumor is that the Department of Justice is investigating things in Harrison.

Connecting the dots to everything going on in the HPD will take some time.







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Nurses Rally Demanding Westchester Medical Center Provide Safe Staffing



On Sept. 8, over a hundred members of the New York State Nurses Association at Westchester Medical Center rallied in front of the hospital today. During the rally, nurses called attention to unsafe working conditions in the hospital as a result of understaffing. Nurses highlighted the need for a fair contract with fair and competitive wages, a real plan to recruit and retain nurses, and improved patient care through safe staffing.

Westchester Medical Center nurses are the backbone of public health in Westchester County and beyond — providing lifesaving care to a six-county area. However, Westchester Medical Center is not retaining frontline nurses. The hospital loses over 20 nurses a month and has failed to hire enough nurses to fill vacant positions to meet patients' needs.

"Our nurses are challenged daily to deliver safe patient care with short staffing," said local bargaining unit president David Long, RN. "Our medical-surgical nurses are taking assignments of as many as 7 or 8 patients with little or no support staff. Unfortunately, many nurses are leaving because they are being overworked. We are losing more than 20 nurses monthly due to resignations and early retirements. We currently have nearly 100 vacant nursing positions."

Nurses sounded the alarm on poor staffing conditions and about Westchester Medical Center administration's refusal to put the safe staffing ratios they negotiated as part of New York's hospital staffing law into the nurses' union contract. The rally comes after nearly a year of negotiations between NYSNA nurses and management at Westchester Medical Center.

Local bargaining unit second vice president, Mary Lynn Boyts, RN, said, "They refuse to put negotiated and agreed upon safe nurse-to-patient ratios in our contract because it will hold them accountable. Now they are refusing to negotiate a modest salary increase that will help recruit and retain nurses needed to be compliant with New York's staffing laws."

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, Westchester Medical Center nurses working on the frontlines have been understaffed and under-resourced. They have not received COVID-19 bonus pay unlike healthcare workers at many other hospitals. Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, Westchester Medical Center Health Network CEO Michael Israel increased his total compensation by 33.5%. In 2021, he made \$3.4 million total compensation, making the CEO of this public hospital among one of the highest paid hospital executives in New York state. [1]

Nurses at Westchester Medical Center also join the over 30,000 NYSNA members who will be bargaining contracts for the first time since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. NYSNA nurses are bargaining for improved patient care, including safer staffing levels and better pay and working conditions to recruit and retain nurses. Elected officials from Westchester attending the event included State Senator Shelley Mayor, Assemblyman Tom Abinanti, State Senator Peter Harckham and Assembly candidate Dana Levenberg.

A spokesperson for Westchester Medical Center sent us this comment. "Discussions between our WMCHealth Network and the New York State Nurses Association (NYSNA) regarding the terms and conditions of a new contract are ongoing. Added talks with NYSNA are scheduled, and we look forward to continuing our collaboration with the union to finalize a fair and equitable agreement reflecting the outstanding care our WMCHealth nurses provide to our patients each day."

Largest Electric Bus Company in New York Announces Plan for Major Yorktown Facility



Bird Bus Sales & Service, the largest electric bus company in New York, announced its plans for a major Yorktown facility. Bird Bus Sales & Service recently closed on the 2.71-acre property at 3805 Crompond Road, the site of a former Taconic Kia dealership. Founded in 2010, Bird Bus sells, services, and supplies parts of Blue Bird Buses. The company supplies the Blue Bird brand to school districts and contractors locally and nationally.

"With the change to electric, by 2027 all new bus purchases will be 100% electric and by 2035 all school buses on the road are going to be 100% electric. Therefore, moving up to Westchester is a great opportunity for us to work with the towns, to work with the local school districts to help convert all buses, said Robert Reichenbach, president of Bird Bus.

Bird Bus expects to open its facility by the end of the year. It will store 48 new vehicles on the site for its sales operations, and all bus storage will be located on a screen, paved surface. The property will also have 18 customer parking spots and

Yorktown Supervisor Matt Slater said that he and the Town Board are focused on securing new uses for empty retail properties. "Bird Bus's new location is an obvious use for a site that already serviced and stored vehicles," said Supervisor Slater. "Bird Bus's reuse of this dealership will return a long-empty property to productive use."

Bird Bus currently operates in Elmsford, where its lease is expiring with no option for renewal. "We're always looking for people to come here and invest, but more importantly, we would like those people to be true community partners," Councilman Sergio Esposito said of his conversation with Bird Bus representatives, who offered electric vehicle charging opportunities for Yorktown residents. "They want to be part of the community."

As part of their effort to keep Bird Bus local, on August 25 Westchester County officials granted the company financial incentives that included sales tax and mortgage-recording tax exemptions, as well as a Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreement.

"It's going to be a pleasure having something finally occupy this building," said Councilman Tom Diana. "They're actually going to be able to convert the diesel buses into EV buses—the cost is still in flux—but it's a positive thing in terms

Councilman Ed Lachterman said that Bird Bus will help diminish skepticism about the practicality of electric vehicles. "It will be very interesting to be at the forefront of this revolution right here in Yorktown," said Councilman Lachterman.

Councilwoman Luciana Haughwout linked Bird Bus's move into Yorktown with the Town's motto: Progress with Preservation. "Not only do we maintain the fabric of our community, we're constantly looking to evolve. We're evolving not only to meet our community's needs, but to meet the world's needs," said Council-

Bird Bus's move into Yorktown and the payment of back taxes on the property allow Supervisor Slater to create a Taxpayer Protection Fund with the back taxes collected. The fund will offset reduced Town property taxes that the PILOT incen-

"While it is important to keep companies in Westchester County, we don't want our homeowners to shoulder the tax burden of these incentives," said Supervisor Slater.

The reuse of the car dealership is the latest example of repurposed properties to address changing market demands. The former Toys 'R Us has been converted into a CubeSmart self-storage and a developer has proposed razing the former Kmart at the Yorktown Green Shopping Center and converting the property into

will be given out until "the middle of next year, (2023)."

While Alexander's announcement was reported on in the marijuana media as a delay, most in attendance accept it, and overall, New Yorkers are willing to wait for the process to be completed properly, regardless of any self-imposed deadlines.

be completed properly, regardless of any self-imposed deadlines.

And that was the takeaway of most who listened to Alexander and his staff in Yonkers:

That the Office of Cannabis Management is intelligently making the rules and regulations –

But it does mean that you will not see a legal Marijuana store in the State of New York

until next summer. Some Indian reservations upstate are already selling pot.

Alexander did explain that a number of conditional licenses were handed out earlier

this year to Hemp growers, in order for them to grow pot, and build supply in anticipation of the storefront pot dispensaries -so that they could have legal supply to draw on.

One attendee asked Alexander if she could grow pot in her home, make edibles, and sell those edibles to dispensaries. "You'll see regulations come out sooner – in the next two

sell those edibles to dispensaries. "You'll see regulations come out sooner – in the next two months or so – but middle of next year you'll see those applications open for cultivation, for processing, and to do the activities you just laid out."

New Yorkers who use marijuana for medical purposes can still purchase weed legally.

New Yorkers who use marijuana for medical purposes can still purchase weed legally. The NYS Dormitory Authority has been designated to help find suitable spaces across the state for small business owners to open dispensaries.

A family member of a relative that was convicted of a marijuana related offense can

also apply and fall under the justice involved requirement. Convictions for marijuana of-

fenses must also be documented and proven by the applicant and must have occurred before 2021.

Qualified business ownership experience for applicants must include a 10% ownership in the prior business experience, and that business must have been profitable for two years.

Some non-profits can also apply.

Only one license will be given to applicants, and for those who do not qualify for the first round of licenses, other opportunities will be made available and interested New Yorkers could get involved in the business of weed in New York in a variety of other professions and businesses.

A cannabis fund has also been set up by NY State to help provide small business loans to those who receive a license.

Alexander also explained that there are two tiers of growing licenses; one to cultivate and one to process, and one owner could have both licenses, but they are not yet available. Applications for cultivation and processing are expected to be handed out next year.

The NYS Dormitory Authority has identified and located 150 locations, to provide approved license holders with a retail space, and a lease, to help them get open.

One attendee asked Alexander what will happen in communities on Long Island, (and in parts of Westchester) where most of Nassau and Suffolk Counties have opted out and have refused to permit to have legal marijuana dispensaries. "Yes, we have localities that have opted out, but as we roll out the progress, some of those communities are getting back in. This is an evolving landscape as they see we are building out a quality program."

Tax benefits for new marijuana owners will also be part of the plan because "it will be expensive to operate in this space. Part of this is to make sure that future entrepreneurs are created.

In attendance at the Yonkers meeting was State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, and Senator Shelley Mayer. "This opportunity exists because people who you elected wanted to stop criminalizing marijuana and expunge the records of those in the black and brown and young communities who were arrested. And we wanted to find a way to give back to those communities and the people who were most disproportionately affected. It was not easy to pass, our former Governor wanted the revenues in the general fund, but we held out to build opportunities for the next generation. Chris Alexander has been working to find a way to do all of this and has looked at the way other states are doing this. It's important to vote because who sits in these seats matter."

Anticipated state revenues of \$245 Million per year will not be realized until 2024. Most will go into a cannabis tax revenue fund, with 40% going to education and 4% to localities.

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

Assemblyman Nader Sayegh's 9-11 Legislation, to Find Forgotten Victims, Gains Momentum

Thousands of civilian employees, including construction workers involved in the massive cleanup of Ground Zero 21 years ago, are eligible for World Trade Center victims' health coverage but have not registered for essential benefits. Today, New York State Assemblyman Nader Sayegh, Assemblyman J. Gary Pretlow and State Senator Brian P. Kavanagh joined 9/11 legal advocate Michael Barasch and construction industry leadership to call for public hearings and passage of legislation requiring employers to make their employees aware of their eligibility.

While most uniformed emergency responders have enrolled in the World Trade Center Health Program, it is estimated that only 10 percent of other workers and citizens who would qualify for the coverage have enrolled.

New legislation introduced by Assemblyman Sayegh this session, the "9/11 Notice Act" (A-9715), would require businesses with 50 or more employees that were in operation between September 2001 and May 2002, and within the Lower Manhattan exposure zone, to inform their current and former employees, of their right to register under the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Reauthorization Act, which reauthorized the WTC Health Program for 75 years, ending in 2090.

This year marks the 21 st anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attack at the World Trade Center. After the collapse of the Twin Towers, an estimated 1.2 million tons of debris, soot, and toxic ash laced with cancer causing carcinogens blanketed lower Manhattan and parts of Brooklyn.

The U.S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency told New Yorkers that the air was safe to breathe and encouraged more than 400,000 people in lower Manhattan to return to work, school and their homes; however, it was not safe. In fact, the air was proven to be deadly and linked to more than 4,610 deaths by 9/11 related illnesses some 20 years later—an ever-growing number that exceeds the 2,966 people who died on the day of the attacks.

Assemblyman Nader Sayegh (D-Yonkers, 90 th AD) who sponsored the 9/11 Notice Act, said: "Not all of our 9/11 heroes wore uniforms. Those who came back to their jobs south of Canal Street and got New York's economy moving again are also heroes, and they breathed the same toxic air as our first responders."

He continued, "With the 9/11 Notice Act, we can notify these New Yorkers of their right to healthcare under the World Trade Center Health Program and make sure those facing the prospect of a 9/11 related illness get access to healthcare and avoid costly deductibles. Medical expenses, especially for cancer and respiratory ailments, can be extremely expensive. Patients are often left with huge bills they cannot afford, averaging \$42,000 in the year following a cancer diagnosis. The new legislation is designed to locate lost 9/11 victims, as much as 400,000 people, to let them know they have a lifeline and do not have to drown in debt while gaining access to life-saving treatments on the road to recovery."

The 9/11 Notice Act would require companies with 50 or more employees that were in Lower Manhattan (South of Canal Street) from 9/11/2001 thru 5/30/2002 or had employees working there to notify – via letter/email/text, etc – their employees, retirees, or former workers that they are eligible to register for the World Trade Center Health Program and how to go about it. By enrolling in the WTC Health Program, all costs related to hospitalizations, treatments, and medications are fully covered.

of privilledge-living in Briarcliff. She stole from these families for five years, this wasn't an accident-she knew what she was doing and should have been punished more," said one Westchester attorney.

In her statement to the court before sentencing, DeLitta said, "I'm sorry your honor. I just want to say that all of these people who are here today are people who in some capacity or another I care very much for and I am so sorry that I abused their trust and I know it's inexcusable and there's no no reason. I. It was just too much responsibility and something happened and everything got out of hand and I would never want to hurt them. I told them lies because I wanted to fix it and I wanted to make it true. As I know that probably nobody believes me. I will spend every waking moment of the rest of my life to make it up to these people the best that I can. And I'm sorry to your honor, to Mr. Corrie and to Mr. Siegel and the Court and my colleagues for embarrassing the profession and I'm sorry to my family."

Judge Minihan had no sympathy for DeLitta, saying, ""Here's the thing. You can't do you can't make it up. Right even if you were to pay back every single cent with interest. You can't get that back. That's the thing with trust. ... They went to somebody they trusted to do right by them. ... I would find it very hard to believe that any of those people will ever go to a lawyer and be able to trust that person again. .. So it's not just you and it's not just them. It's the entire profession. It's built on trust. It's built on reputation. Once it's gone, it's gone. Forever. I mean, when you talk about people who have built a life and saved and saved and saved and in the end, what do they have? They have a house that they're going to expect that the proceeds from that sale are going to go to their children... They trusted you and you took that money so now it looks like they didn't take good care of their people... Nothing makes it better."

Judge Minihan also spoke to the families, "It's an imperfect system. This was a negotiated disposition. And this is the first that I'm coming into it. And I'm going to impose the sentence that was promised to you but make no mistake, that this is not just... this isn't money, money is money. And that, you know, this is this is victimization."

On the date of sentencing, Sept. 6, DeLitta's attorney was more than one hour late (to add insult to injury). While waiting for her attorney, DeLitta was seen outside the courtroom sobbing and apologizing to the families, who wanted none of it, and did not forgive her.

Cox wrote it correctly when he said that DeLitta "failed to take accountability" for her actions, only explaining that "things got out of control."





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
