

Year Two of Cell Phone School Ban for Students, who Face a Digital Detox

New York State’s statewide student cell-phone ban took effect at the start of the 2025–2026 school year, in September 2025. This second year of the ban will state here in Westchester when classes start this week.

Many of us know that for millions of American students, summer vacation meant months of texting, scrolling, streaming and carrying a phone almost everywhere. Now, as schools reopen, educators like me face something that may even be harder than collecting homework. Getting students to be comfortable with putting their phones away.

A 2024 Pew Research Center survey found that 95 percent of American teens ages 13 to 17 have access to a smartphone, while nearly half say they are online “almost constantly.” One-third reported using at least one major social-media platform almost constantly. After

Yonkers Resident First Positive West Nile Virus Case in Westchester in 2026



County Health Department Reminds Residents to Remove Standing Water and Take Other Precautions Against Mosquitoes

On Sept. 1, Westchester County stated it had learned of its first positive human case of West Nile Virus this year, which was a confirmed in a Yonkers resident who had recently traveled outside the county.

Westchester County Health Commissioner Dr. Sherlita Amler said: “This first case of West Nile Virus is a reminder to take precautions to protect yourself from mosquitos. To avoid breeding mosquitos in your own yard, remove all standing water around your home after it rains, and use repellents when you spend time outdoors, especially from dusk to dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.”

West Nile Virus most often causes a mild or moderate flu-like illness, but can be more serious, especially for people age 65 and older, and those with underlying medical conditions.

St. John’s Director of Medical Toxicology Talks Warning Signs of Addiction & Teen Substance Use Disorders

Dr. Stephanie Widmer, an emergency medicine physician and Director of Medical Toxicology at St. John’s Riverside Hospital, says that substance use issues today have expanded to include synthetic drugs, as well as commonly abused drugs like alcohol and opioids. During a talk at Gorton High School, she explained that substance use is more dangerous than teens know, but treatment is available for teenagers who are struggling with a substance use disorder.

Dr. Widmer is triple board-certified in emergency medicine, medical toxicology, and addiction medicine. In addition to her work as an emergency medicine physician and the director of medical toxicology at St. John’s Riverside Hospital, she is also the associate program director of the St. John’s Emergency Medicine Residency Program. While helping patients with substance use disorders is part of her job, it has also affected her personally.

“This morning, I got dressed, and I pulled out a purse that I have not used in a long time. I went to empty it, and I pulled out three funeral cards from a friend of mine I grew up with who passed away from drug use,” she says. “So, if you think that it cannot happen to somebody that you love, I mean, we live in a county where this is really prevalent. I want to instill in young people that dying is not the only terrible thing that can happen with drug use. It can take away your passion, your creativity, your intelligence. It can rob you of your future, and if it does not kill you first, it can destroy your health. I would love to give young people a 360-degree view of what can happen.”

Dr. Widmer says that synthetic drugs have added a new layer of complications to substance abuse. “I’ve seen people come into the emergency department after smoking synthetic cannabinoids, and their blood pressure is on the floor,” she says. “They look terrible. It is really scary. And then the next day, we will get somebody who smokes something similar, and they are totally altered, like biting people, spitting. You do not know what you are picking up when you are buying a synthetic cannabinoid. It is not something that is grown naturally. It is not something that we can even say that we recognize—oh, I know that is _____ because they’re synthetic. Somebody is making them, so you can’t possibly know what you’re getting whenever you buy something unregulated.”

Another modern substance use issue is vaping, which has grown in popularity among teens and young adults. The CDC reports that as of 2024, 1.63 million teenagers (about 5.9 percent) used e-cigarettes.

Dr. Widmer explains that vaping can lead to serious lung injury in teens and young adults. “We’ve had young people come into the hospital and end up intubated for really extended periods of time because of this. And it is because sometimes these vaping cartridges are sold unregulated with contaminants in them that are harmful to people’s lungs.”

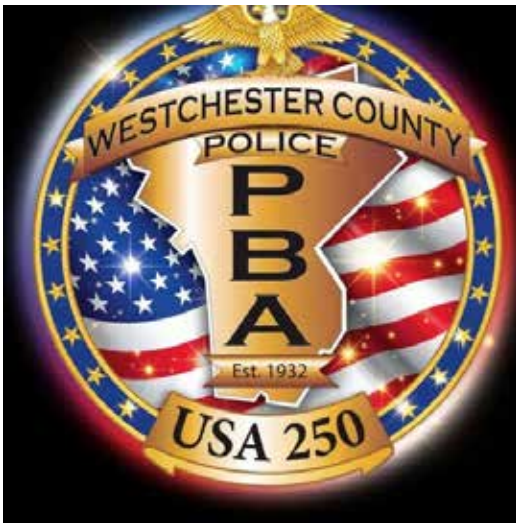
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Lawler Blasts Jenkins, Stands with County Police Seeking New Contract

The back and forth between Congressman Mike Lawler and Westchester County, over a new contract for the Westchester County Police officers, continues.

First is was Lawler who posted his support for a new contract for the Westchester County PBA. “The men and women of the Westchester County Police Department have gone three years without a contract. In that time, the county has not promoted a single sergeant or lieutenant, and the department is down three captains, five lieutenants, and five sergeants. It has gotten so bad that the county is pulling supervising officers out of the Westchester County Airport Precinct just to cover minimum patrol staffing. That airport handles over 170,000 flights a year, and the federal government is investing nearly \$18 million to modernize its air traffic control, funding I helped deliver in Congress. I stand with the men and women of the Westchester County Police PBA. County Executive Ken Jenkins should immediately settle a fair contract and make the promotions. The officers who keep Westchester County safe have earned that much, and they will have my full support. Westchester County Police PBA,” said Lawler.

Next, Westchester County Communications Director Catherine Cioffi issued the following response: “It takes an extraordinary level of hypocrisy for Mike Lawler to lecture anyone in Westchester County about public safety, responsible government or protecting working people. This is a ‘Congressman’ who has stood with Donald Trump while his administration decimated the federal workforce and dismantled critical government services. This is a ‘Congressman’ who has cast votes that have made food, gas and health care more expensive for the very families he claims to represent. And now, apparently desperate for another political headline, Lawler has decided to manufacture a public safety crisis in Westchester that simply does not exist.

“Every unit within the County’s Department of Public Safety has appropriate supervision and is overseen by a Captain. There are currently 43 Sergeants in the Department; when the five vacancies are filled, there will be 48. More importantly, Westchester County is safer today than when Lawler served in the Astorino administration, and the Department is funded at the highest level ever. Those are not political talking points – but facts, backed by budgets, staffing levels and public safety data.

“We respect collective bargaining, and we remain committed to reaching a fair resolution. Unfortunately, Lawler appears more interested in following the Trump political playbook: repeat a falsehood loudly enough from a soapbox and hope voters mistake it for the truth.

Westchester County Expands Students OMNY Program to Better Support Students & Families

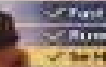

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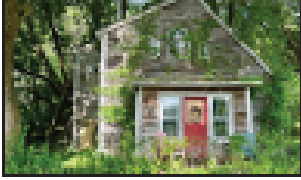


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History Comes Alive in Yorktown Through Revolutionary War Concert

Senator Shelley Mayer Announces State Grant for Scarsdale Police Department

But despite these new drug concerns, Dr. Widmer adds that older drugs like alcohol, marijuana, and opioids remain risky for teens.
“Alcohol remains a consistent concern among young people because many accidents and dangerous situations occur when people drink too much. The opioid epidemic also continues to be a growing concern.”
Addiction can begin in several ways for teens. In many cases, it starts with substances that may seem safe.
“Very often people start with marijuana, which is legal in many states,” says Dr. Widmer. “And people often believe that it is benign. But people get high, and they decide they like how it feels, and then they move on to other things, which is why I am sure many people have heard the term ‘a gateway drug.’ It is a gateway drug, and it is not the only gateway drug. There are many gateway drugs out there.”

That includes alcohol, a substance that has long attracted the interest of teenagers.
“Alcohol is certainly a gateway drug, and it is also very popular among young people,” Dr. Widmer explains. “When you combine substances and when you escalate the substances that you are using, it becomes even more dangerous because you’re mixing the receptors that are being affected. There is the possibility of impaired coordination, sedation, altered mental status, and accidents. It escalates rapidly when you start combining substances.”

Dr. Widmer adds that addiction is a health issue, and she wants teens to feel comfortable seeking help if they or friends are struggling with substance use.
“I want to be clear that addiction does not make someone a bad person,” she says. “This is not a character flaw. It is a disease. And people need to understand that to help people, you have to approach things on a case-by-case basis, but it’s really important that if you’re thinking that you maybe should get someone to help, you probably should get someone to help.”

Identifying the signs of addiction is not always easy, but Dr. Widmer encourages people to be vigilant and pay attention to changes in their loved ones.

“Sometimes it can be difficult, maybe because of our own biases, because of denial, because of other things,” she says. “But when you start to see loved ones behaving abnormally in any setting, it should cross your mind. Could this be drugs? Could this be addiction? There are certain symptoms that I look for in the emergency department: inappropriate sedation, sleepiness, inappropriate sweating, or signs and symptoms of withdrawal. But really, when personalities change, when the things that are important to them change, when they become more withdrawn, and they are not the person that you once knew, it is time to do a little bit of investigation.

To that end, Dr. Widmer encourages teens who suspect a friend is struggling with substances to seek help from supportive adults. “Go to a teacher or an adult or somebody that you trust, and talk to them about your concerns, and they can help guide you in the right direction because there is not a one-size-fits-all. There are many ways to help support people who may be struggling with addiction, but do not try to carry the world on your shoulders.”

Treatment options today are broad, including new medications to help with opioid addiction. “There are many options, and it depends on the substance, of course,” Dr. Widmer explains. “It also depends on how willing the person is to engage in treatment and what type of treatment is best for them. But there can be a good deal of therapy involved. There can be individual therapy, group therapy, and there are also medications to help with addiction.”

In some cases, inpatient treatment is necessary. “Generally speaking, when someone’s going through alcohol withdrawal, they should seek care in a hospital because that withdrawal can be life-threatening,” Dr. Widmer says. “There are medications that we can give for that. And then when it comes to opioids, there’s also opioid withdrawal. There are different medications that people can take in the hospital. But also, on an outpatient basis, there are prescription medications that can help people get off of opioids.”

Westchester County Department of Health staff will work with the resident to determine whether the exposure may have occurred during travel outside the county or closer to home.

Residents should walk around their property and remove any standing water to prevent mosquitos from breeding. Check flowerpot drip trays, kiddie pools, play equipment and other items left outdoors. Residents who notice large areas of standing water on public property should report them to the County Health Department at (914) 813-5000.

Througout the season, the County Health Department traps and tests mosquitoes to track the presence of viruses they carry. For more ideas on how to reduce the mosquito population near your home, go to

Perhaps someday, when this child is old enough to understand his story, he won't have to define his life by the way it began. His story can become one of survival — of being given a second chance before he was even old enough to know what a second chance meant.

There are still many unanswered questions, and the legal process will determine what happened and what consequences follow. But whatever happens next, one thing is already certain:

This baby survived.
In the middle of something horrific, there is a small but powerful light. A child who could have been lost was found. A life that could have ended has continued.
And sometimes, when everything seems darkest, the simple fact that a life was saved is enough to remind us that miracles can happen in the most unexpected places.

a summer of that access, a bell-to-bell restriction can feel less like a classroom rule and more like sudden digital withdrawal (Pew Research Center). It’s going to be tough.

The problem follows students into school. In February 2025, the National Center for Education Statistics reported that 77 percent of public schools prohibited cellphone use during class. Yet 73 percent of school leaders said phones had negatively affected attention spans, 72 percent cited mental-health effects and 53 percent said academic performance had suffered (National Center for Education Statistics). A lot of us know the problem. But many of us do not have the time to fix it.

Educators, my colleagues, appear to have even more worries. A National Education Association survey of 2,889 educators found that 90 percent supported prohibiting student cellphone use during instructional time. Among teachers working where students had access to devices, 73 percent reported classroom disruptions (National Education Association). Even though New York has phone bins and phone lockers, many students find ways to avoid them.

The broader screen-time picture is striking. A CDC report published in October 2024 found that 50.4 percent of teenagers spent at least four hours daily on screens outside schoolwork. Among those students, 27.1 percent reported recent anxiety symptoms, compared with 12.3 percent among teens logging less than four hours (CDC).

Public patience is shifting, too. Pew found in June 2025 that 74 percent of American adults supported classroom cellphone bans, up from 68 percent in 2024, while support for all-day restrictions climbed from 36 to 44 percent (Pew Research Center).

I would love to say just take the phone away. Throw it out. But that really does not work. Surprisingly, it does not immediately undo the habit. A 2025 study of 1,227 adolescents published in The Lancet Regional Health – Europe found restrictive school policies reduced phone use during school by roughly 40 minutes, but did not significantly reduce overall weekday or weekend use (ScienceDirect). I guess it falls on the folk at home.

So, there you have it. This may be September’s real challenge. Schools are not simply enforcing a rule. They are asking students to abruptly change a behavior that was reinforced all summer.

The first weeks may bring frustration, resistance, and students instinctively reaching for devices that are no longer available. They might even think they feel or hear a phone vibrating that isn’t there. For educators, like me, patience may be almost as important as policy. Here we go!

lion in damages and placed a significant financial burden on communities across New York, including here in Westchester County.

The decision comes just one day after Jenkins supported Hochul’s call for the Trump Administration to release \$87 million in critical counterterrorism funding being withheld from New York.

Jenkins said: “Here we go – political games again by the Trump Administration. Our first responders, emergency management teams, public works crews and municipal employees did not hesitate when this storm hit. They showed up, worked around the clock and did everything necessary to protect our residents and keep our communities safe. The federal government should show that same commitment to the people it serves.”

Westchester County Department of Emergency Services Commissioner Susan Spear said: “Westchester County was significantly impacted by a major blizzard in February. The County and local communities spent millions of dollars in emergency protective measures, snow removal costs, road and structure repairs, electric service restoration, emergency responses, and much more. We carefully documented our expenses and exceeded the required Federal eligibility thresholds for FEMA support and reimbursements. That is how the federal law is supposed to work. Our emergency personnel stepped up when called to respond to public safety needs during a major blizzard. But now the federal government has refused to honor their commitment to our communities and our first responders.”

Jenkins said: “It seems that Trump and Congressman Mike Lawler forgot they are New Yorkers because they are punishing their neighbors over political disagreements – it’s disgraceful. New Yorkers deserve representatives who will put the needs of their constituents ahead of party politics.”

The following documents were considered in connection with the notice of motion of the Plaintiff, dated July 30, 2026, (hereinafter “Motion Sequence No. 1”), seeking the entry of an Order granting the following relief:

Relevant Factual and Procedural Background

This matrimonial action was commenced on May 19, 2026, with the Plaintiff’s filing of a summons and verified complaint (hereinafter “Complaint”),¹ seeking the entry of a judgment against the Defendant dissolving the marriage between the parties to this action pursuant to New York State Domestic Relations Law § 170(7), asserting that the parties’ relationship had irretrievably broken down for a period in excess of six months and requests other ancillary relief.² The Complaint further provides both Plaintiff’s and Defendant’s last known address,³ with Plaintiff residing at 542 Center Street, Chula Vista, California 91910 (hereinafter “Plaintiff’s Address”) and Defendant residing at 25 Hubert Place, Apartment 1, New Rochelle, New York 10801 (hereinafter “Defendant’s Address”). Of note, it does not appear Plaintiff filed any required matrimonial notices, or included same within the Complaint, being the following (1) maintenance guidelines worksheet; (2) notice concerning continuation of health care coverage; and, (3) notice of automatic orders (hereinafter “Matrimonial Notices”).

On July 30, 2026, Plaintiff filed a motion by notice of motion, being Motion Sequence No. 1,⁴ seeking the above-referenced relief, and simultaneously filing a request for judicial intervention

(hereinafter “RJT”),⁵ which again identified the Plaintiff’s Address and Defendant’s Address, and further provided the following contact information for Defendant: a telephone number being (914) 563-5594 (hereinafter “Defendant’s Phone Number”), and an e-mail address being lucianovolcan1973@gmail.com (hereinafter “Defendant’s E-Mail”).

In support of Motion Sequence No. 1, Plaintiff filed *inter alia* an affidavit in her own name (hereinafter “Plaintiff’s Affidavit”),⁶ as well as an affidavit of due diligence executed by non-party Jose Montano (hereinafter “Montano Affidavit”),⁷ which set forth the efforts made to personally serve the Defendant with the Complaint, and the apparent refusal of Defendant to provide a current known location to effectuate service. Additionally, Plaintiff filed as a singular exhibit, copies of “WhatsApp” text messages and a telephone log (hereinafter “Supporting Documents”),⁸ which supported the efforts outlined in both Plaintiff’s Affidavit and the Montano Affidavit.

No further submissions were received by this Court regarding Motion Sequence No. 1.

Legal Analysis

A. Plaintiff’s Request For An Order Permitting Alternate Service Of The Complaint.

“In an action for a divorce, New York State Domestic Relations Law § 232 permits substituted service pursuant to CPLR 308 by court order upon a showing that personal delivery of the summons and complaint upon the defendant could not be effected despite efforts made with due diligence” (*Florestal v. Coleman-Florestal*, 124 A.D.3d 578 [2d Dept 2015]).

“CPLR 308(5) vests a court with the discretion to direct an alternative method for service of process when it has determined that the methods set forth in CPLR 308(1), (2), and (4) are ‘impracticable’” (*Astrologo v. Serra*, 240 A.D.2d 606 [2d Dept 1997]). Whether service is

“impracticable, ‘depends on the facts and circumstances surrounding each case’” (*MTGLQ Investors, L.P. v. Mayers*, 209 A.D.3d 1009 [2d Dept 2002]; *citing to Wells Fargo Bank, NA v. Patel*, 175 A.D.3d 1350 [2d Dept 2019], *quoting Liebeskind v. Liebeskind*, 86 A.D.2d 207 [1st Dept 1982]). “Although impracticability does not require a showing of actual attempts to serve parties under every method in the aforementioned provisions of CPLR § 308, the movant is required to make competent showings as to actual efforts made to effect service” (*Joseph II. v. Luisa JJ*, 201 A.D.3d 43 [3d Dept 2021] [internal citations omitted]).

The Courts have continuously focused on a movant’s “due diligence” or lack thereof, as a barrier to issue a court order for substituted service, finding consistently that such an order is obtainable only upon a showing that service “could not be carried out by personal delivery despite the use of due diligence” (*Rae v. Marciano*, 227 A.D.3d 738 [2d Dept 2024]). “Once the impracticability standard is satisfied, due process requires that the method of service be ‘reasonably calculated, under all the circumstances, to apprise’ the defendant of the action” (*Continmortgage Corp. v. Isler*, 48 A.D.3d 732 [2d Dept 2008], *quoting Mullane v. Central Hanover Bank & Trust Co*, 70 S.Ct. 652 [1950]). “In order to be constitutionally adequate, the method of service need not guarantee that the defendant will receive actual notice,” and “Indeed, in the case of persons missing or unknown, employment of an indirect and even a probably futile means of notification is all that the situation permits” (*Harkness v. Doe*, 261 A.D.2d 846 [4th Dept 1999] [internal citations omitted]).

“In an action for a divorce, New York State Domestic Relations Law § 232 permits substituted service pursuant to CPLR 308 by court order upon a showing that personal delivery of the summons and complaint upon the defendant could not be effected despite efforts made with due diligence” (*Florestal v. Coleman-Florestal*, 124 A.D.3d 578 [2d Dept 2015]). To obtain an

order permitting service by publication, “a party must provide support that service cannot be made by another method of service ‘with due diligence’ imposing an obligation on the plaintiff to exhaust all of the potential methods of service under CPLR § 308, including the seeking of a court order pursuant to CPLR § 308(5) for expedient service” (*Serrano v. Serrano*, 186 A.D.2d 912 [3d Dept 1992]) “Service by publication in matrimonial actions is disfavored and should be utilized only as a last resort where all other methods of service are unavailable, including possible methods of expedient service under CPLR § 308(5)”).

Upon review of the submissions made to this Court, the Plaintiff has met the impracticability standard set forth by the Appellate Division, Second Department. Plaintiff has not only shown an actual attempt to serve Defendant, but more importantly for this Court’s inquiry, she has shown a comprehensive search and effort to obtain any additional information regarding Defendant’s current whereabouts, in order to further attempt service in the underlying action. Moreover, while Plaintiff does not go step-by-step through each respective method of service offered by CPLR § 308, the Courts have been clear that no such effort is required so long as “due diligence” is shown in actual efforts made to effect service in some way (*Joseph II. V. Luisa JJ*, 201 A.D.3d 43 [3d Dept 2021]; *Rae v. Marciano*, 227 A.D.3d 738 [2d Dept 2024]). The Court finds those efforts have been met here.

After a review of CPLR § 308, despite her diligent efforts in obtaining further information regarding the Defendant’s whereabouts, the Court finds no other method of service included within the statute which is practical. Without new information regarding the residence, employment, general region of the state and/or country, that Defendant is located, methods of service such as “leave and mail”, “nail and mail” among others would be impossible to even attempt (CPLR § 308(1-4)).

The Court now turns to whether the method of service sought by Plaintiff is “reasonably calculated under the circumstances to apprise the defendant of the action” (*Continmortgage Corp. v. Isler*, 48 A.D.3d 732 [2d Dept 2008]). To that end, this Court finds Plaintiff has further met her burden. The Courts have been clear that the method of service “need not guarantee” that Defendant will receive actual notice, especially in situations where (after due diligence) the Defendant’s whereabouts remain unknown (*Harkness v. Doe*, 261 A.D.2d 846 [4th Dept 1999] [internal citations omitted]). In the case at bar, both Plaintiff’s Affidavit and the Montano Affidavit confirmed that Defendant responded to Plaintiff’s initial inquiry confirming he was not located in the United States at that time, thereafter identifying himself but subsequently failed to provide any further contact, further failing to provide a current location where divorce documents could be served. Therefore, this Court finds that service by publication pursuant to CPLR § 315 is permitted, however, this Court will further direct that Plaintiff shall also serve Defendant via, WhatsApp message to Defendant’s Phone Number and via e-mail to Defendant’s E-Mail, as Defendant has responded to electronic communication in the past.

While service by publication is generally unfavored in matrimonial actions, Plaintiff’s situation is the exception to the rule (*Serrano v. Serrano*, 186 A.D.2d 912 [3d Dept 1992]). Without any cooperation from Defendant’s family, friends, ex-employers, or an ability of the plaintiff to locate his social media presence, this is the Plaintiff’s last and only option to effectuate service. As a result, this Court grants Plaintiff leave to serve Defendant by publication, WhatsApp message and e-mail as set forth herein-below.

B. Other Relief.

To the extent relief is not granted or otherwise addressed herein, it is hereby denied.
