Democratic Primary; June 25 Early Voting Begins June 15

Westchester Democrats will be asked to cast their vote, by absentee ballot, early voting or on primary day June 25 to determine who their party's candidate for District Attorney will be.

Incumbent District Attorney Mimi Rocah is not running for reelection. Three candidates are running in the democratic primary: Susan Cacace, William Wagstaff and Adeel Mirza.

After careful weighing the candidates, their experience, their platforms and their vision, we've decided to endorse Susan Cacace in the democratic primary on June 25 and in early voting starting June 15.

Cacace has the perfect combination, in our view, of experience, and new ideas to move the office of DA forward.

Cacace has served as a County Court Judge for 14 years. At the time of her retirement, December 7, 2023, Cacace was the longest tenured County Court Judge of Westchester County, having been elected in 2005 and re-elected in 2015. She gave up her County Court seat to run for DA, which is a testament to her desire to serve the people of Westchester as DA.

Shortly after she took the bench, Judge Cacace's unique qualifications and expertise in the areas of crimes against children and sex offenses committed against the most vulnerable victims, our children and our elderly, lead to her assignment to preside over the Sex Offense Part in 2010 - a position that she has continued to hold for the ensuing 14-years. In this capacity, Judge Cacace was responsible for handling all felony sex crimes throughout all phases of their prosecution in the County Court.

City Council Approves Yonkers 2024-25 Budget in 6-1 Vote; 5.45% Tax Increase *Only Vacant Positions Cut*




Yonkers City Council members had to make tough budget decisions

As Bowman Makes Final Push, Latimer Up by 17 in Latest Poll

As Westchester Congressman Jamaal Bowman and his progressive supporters make a final push to try and help win his reelection, a new Emerson College Polling/PIX11/The Hill survey of the New York 16th Congressional District Democratic Primary finds 48% of voters support Westchester County Executive George Latimer, while 31% support incumbent Representative Jamaal Bowman. Twenty-one percent are undecided.

"Voters under 40 break for Bowman: 44% to 35%, while voters over 40 break for Latimer," Spencer Kimball, executive director of Emerson College Polling, said. "Democratic primary voters ages 40-59 break for Latimer 53% to 31%, while voters in their 60s break for Latimer 46% to 29%, and voters over 70 break for Latimer 53% to 22%."

Black voters break for Bowman, 48% to 34%, and white voters for Latimer, 62% to 20%. Hispanic voters are split evenly, with 36% supporting Bowman and Latimer respectively.

Fifty-one percent have a favorable view of the incumbent congressman, while 43% have an unfavorable view of him. Six percent are not familiar with Bowman. Sixty-five percent of voters have a favorable view of Latimer, while 23% have an unfavorable view. Twelve percent are undecided.

President Joe Biden holds a 69% job approval among Democratic primary voters, while 23% disapprove of the job he is doing. Governor Kathy Hochul has a 55% job approval, while 26% disapprove of the job she is doing in office.

The economy (22%) and housing affordability (21%) are the top issues for Democratic primary voters in the district, followed by threats to democracy (14%), healthcare (13%), crime (12%), and immigration (6%).

Forty-five percent of voters align more with George Latimer on the war between Israel and Hamas, 29% align more with Bowman, and 26% are unsure.

Voters under 40 align more with Bowman than Latimer on the war, 54% to 32%, while voters 40-59 align with Latimer 43% to 28%, in their 60s, 52% to

Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins Leads Passage of First-in-Nation Legislation to Regulate Social Media Algorithms for Children

New Regulations Require Parental Consent for Curated Feeds for Users Un-

Under the leadership of New York State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, the Senate has passed groundbreaking legislation to prevent social media companies from showing harmful and addictive content to children under the age of 18, and limit the collection and use of children's personal information.

"As we navigate the threats social media poses to our youth in today's ever-evolving technological landscape, I'm proud that, under my leadership, the Senate is the first in the nation to pass legislation that would prohibit how social media companies can target children," said Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins. "These bills place the power back in the hands of parents and protect our children from addictive and exploitative practices. Together, we will continue to take all necessary actions to protect the mental well-being of New York's children."

The Stop Addictive Feeds Exploitation (SAFE) for Kids Act would prevent social media companies from showing addictive feeds – with content designed to keep children "glued" to devices – for users under 18, unless they have parental consent. It would also prohibit social media platforms from sending overnight push notifications, so that addictive notifications will no longer wake children in the middle of the night.

The Child Data Protection Act will limit media companies from collecting, using, sharing or selling personal information and data of anyone under the age of 18. Both pieces of legislation aim to protect children's well-being and privacy.

"Our results suggest that gun buyback programs, have been inefficient use of tax payers dollars in the United States," the authors conclude."

"Perhaps deterring gun violence as alternate firearm-related policies, such as safe storage laws or stricter background checks would be more effective at deterring gun violence. Our findings also suggest that prior city (gun buyback programs) have been poorly designed to achieve their policy objectives."

In my estimation, the "Cash Bail Reform Law has been a dismal failure, releasing convicted felons back onto the streets to commit more violence.

Also, in a case where a felon kills an innocent person-the punishment should be "You take a life-you forfeit your own"-the verdict-- Life without parole.

The old adage applies here-"If you can't do the time-don't do the crime."

Former George Latimer Supporters Launch Westchester Progressives

New Grassroots Group Steps in With #LatimerLostUs Campaign to Support True Progressive Values in Heated NY-16 Primary

A group of volunteers and supporters that were behind George Latimer's County Executive run have come together to launch a new progressive, grassroots group opposing the 30-year politicians' controversial run for NY-16's congressional seat.

Brook Packard, a resident of George Latimer's hometown, Rye NY said, "We elected George to get MAGA Republicans out of Westchester. Now he's wining and dining with top Trump Donors, taking a million dollars from a Republican-funded PAC. They even registered thousands of Republicans as Democrats to vote for him. All to run against one of the most important progressive champions in Congress. He wasn't uplifting our values; he was uplifting himself."

The campaign's supporters cite Latimer's extensive support from Republicans, both through the AIPAC right wing lobby group which recruited Latimer to run and is spending over \$25 million to support him in what could be the most expensive primary ever, and directly from Trump fundraisers [he attended].

Said Sandra Bernabei (Founder, Antiracist Alliance, National Association of Social Workers President 2014-16) "We worked to build the Democratic party so we could keep unseating Republicans. We were ready to spend this year going all-in on helping Democrats, just like we went all-in on helping George beat Rob Astorino in 2017. Instead, we're now defending one of the most vital young Black progressives in Congress... from George! Running against Jamaal Bowman is dividing the party at the time we should be uniting."

Letter to the Editor: Reelect Congressman Jamaal Bowman on June 25th

To the Editor: I write to support the re-election of Representative Jamaal Bowman, in the upcoming Democratic Congressional primary on June 25th. In his two terms in office, Congressman Bowman has been a strong advocate for our community, and our district. He has brought in over \$1 billion in investments in education, child care, affordable housing, workforce development, as well as gun violence prevention – all solid investments that have immensely benefited his constituents.

Congressman Bowman's primary opponent, County Executive George Latimer, is campaigning on the slogan -- "Results, not Rhetoric" – to try and paint Mr. Bowman as a show horse, not a work horse. Elect me, says Mr. Latimer, and I will bring home the bacon since my opponent has not. This gimmicky catchphrase is transparently false, starting with the illogical premise that results and rhetoric are mutually exclusive. They are not, of course, and there's nothing inherently wrong about rhetoric either. We should always applaud solid results (which Jamaal has demonstrated), and captivating rhetoric (which he is a master of!). What's wrong with getting stuff done, as the Congressman has manifestly shown, AND speaking out for a more humane, equitable and inclusive multiracial society?

In stark contrast to his opponent, let's not forget that Congressman Bowman has also been a forceful spokesman for climate justice, having been an early champion of the "Green New Deal" (GND). He's also not afraid to take on the big polluters (i.e., fossil fuel power plants), and the fracking industry. He has also fought for a GND for Public Schools that would address the crumbling state of far too many public schools in underserved neighborhoods that suffer disproportionately from polluting infrastructure. Meanwhile, his opponent blithely vows that if elected "There is not going to be a George Latimer climate change bill." No surprise there from a pay to play County Executive whose "green" agenda includes keeping the Peekskill Wheelbrator, Westchester county's number one polluter, operating through 2029.

Jamaal has also demonstrated courageous and moral leadership in drawing attention to the plight of Palestinians and the need for both a permanent ceasefire in Gaza and a change in Israeli leadership. His opponent, meanwhile, fueled by millions in donations from right wing groups like AIPAC, has studiously avoided taking any concrete positions on Gaza, and in effect has validated the annexationist aims and ethnic cleansing of the extremist Netanyahu coalition.

Furthermore, during his televised debate last month with Congressman Bowman, Mr. Latimer infamously remarked "I'm not worried about who is giving me donations." I believe Mr. Latimer should be worried because many of us are (worried). We have learned of late that he has failed to file –as required by election law – a candidate financial disclosure statement. That failure does not install confidence.

Finally, let me express (and I'm certain I'm not alone in my sentiments) how fatigued and disgusted I am at the relentless deluge of flyers and attack ads that have saturated my e-mail inbox, TV screen, radio, etc. during this seemingly interminable primary contest. It is true that both candidates have engaged in this war of attrition. However, the sheer volume of Latimer's mailings and ad spots — enabled by over \$7 million in outside spending from reactionary groups such as AIPAC and MAGA donors --has been overwhelming. Win or lose, this does not speak well for the Latimer "brand," such as it is, and suggests a degree of desperation that his message has not been winning over any new voters.

On or before June 25th, (early voting begins on June 15), please vote to reelect Jamaal Bowman to Congress. I believe he is the superior candidate to deliver progress, and moral leadership to our district.

Yonkers IDA Votes Preliminary Approval of Incentives for Three Projects

The Yonkers Industrial Development Agency (YIDA) has voted preliminary approval of financial incentives for three new mixed-use developments representing a total private investment of approximately \$463.5 million. The three developments are projected to create a total of 1,100 construction jobs and 1,083 residential units including affordable senior housing.

The following projects received preliminary approvals at the YIDA's May 28 meeting. "The Yonkers IDA is pleased to vote preliminary approval of financial incentives for these three significant residential developments that will add over 1,000 new residential units to our City including affordable senior apartments. These projects will also create 1,100 construction jobs," said Mayor Mike Spano who serves as Chairman of the Yonkers IDA.

North Broadway Development. Developer AMS Acquisitions received preliminary approval of financial incentives for a multi-phase \$306.7 million, mixed-use development featuring 650 residential apartments in two 25-story towers on a site located at 18 North Broadway. The units would be comprised of 201 studios, 260 one-bedroom units and 189 two-bedroom units. Ten percent of the units would be designated as affordable. The project will also include 1,000 square feet of commercial space and 768 spaces in a parking structure. The development is estimated to create up to 800 construction jobs and 14 full- and part-time jobs when completed. The development will be built in

Monday, June 17th

June 17, 1907: The cornerstone of the new Sprain Ridge Hospital was laid; the hospital, donated by Alexander Smith Cochran, was founded to treat tuberculosis; Yonkers' Mayor Coyne and Professor C. Irving Fisher of Yale were the main speakers.

Sprain Ridge, a thickly wooded valley, slope and crest, was one of the highest points in Westchester. The name Sprain Ridge was from Colonial times; Washington's troops travelled the ridge going to and from the Battle of White Plains in 1776.

June 17, 1943: The famous Flying Fortress Memphis Belle landed safely at Washington's National Airport. The original ten-member crew, including Yonkers native John Quinlan, was on the plane. The Belle's last mission was recorded and shown at several Yonkers movie theaters. The crew was met in DC by several military officials, including Chief of Army Air Forces General Henry "Hap" Arnold, later the first commander of the US Air Force; Arnold was taught to fly by the Wright Brothers.

Tuesday, June 18th

June 18, 1944: Yonkers native William Tompkins, the last Civil War veteran in the area, passed away at the age of 97.

Tompkins ran away at the age of 15 to join the Union Army. He served as drummer boy, and drilled with troops in Washington DC before his mom found him and brought him home. At the time of his death, he was the tenth oldest Mason in the world.

June 18, 1944: A police escort met the "Torch of Freedom" traveling group at the North Broadway city line and lead it to Larkin Plaza and thousands of waiting Yonkers residents. City officials lit the Torch, a symbol of the cause of "liberty for which our men are fighting." Besides hearing from military heroes accompanying the torch, local leaders of the Yonkers Homefront also spoke, encouraging all to purchase war bonds. After lighting, it was returned to the contingent of war heroes heading to its last stop of the day, New York City.

The 2025 Adopted Budget increases the Maintenance of Effort to the Schools, bringing the total transfer to education to \$298.5 million -- making it the largest local share of any big city to a district outside of New York City. The adopted-to-adopted property tax increase is 5.45%.

Mayor Spano stated, "This budget is sound and responsible. Given the difficult year, I want to thank the cooperative effort of our City Council, as we make smart investments in our quality services for our residents, and making the vital investments in education so we can keep moving Yonkers forward."

"While we don't take breaking the tax cap lightly, this Budget enhances quality of life services Yonkers residents deserve and expect, and saves dozens of critical school positions," Mayor Spano added.

The 24-25 Adopted Budget includes additional access to capital funding provided by New York State, helping Yonkers Public Schools support positions that were initially slated to be cut due to the loss of non-recurring aid given by the American Rescue Plan and Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Acts.

"Special thanks to our State delegation for recognizing the needs of our students and helping Yonkers Public Schools avoid potential cuts in jobs and services, and continue the progress we've made in the District. I look forward to working with them to secure Yonkers Schools' proper funding in the future," commented Mayor Spano.

"As Council President and Budget Chair, I take my role seriously and I am grateful for the work that our finance department and consultants have done. As a lifelong resident and parent, I was determined to maintain the level of education that the children of Yonkers deserve. Although I understand the burden of any tax increase, however small, it was important to bridge the gap between the lack of federal funding and rising costs in order to fund our education and essential services," commented Yonkers City Council President and Budget Chair Lakisha Collins-Bellamy.

"By voting for this \$1.5 billion budget, we have committed to maintaining Yonkers as the safest city in New York, ensuring our 91% graduation rate, and preserving critical services such as multiple weekly trash pickups and rapid five-minute first responder arrivals. Despite a necessary 5.45% tax increase, we have increased city services and saved 47 jobs in the school system. This budget reflects our dedication to the well-being and safety of our community,"said Yonkers Council Majority Leader John Rubbo.

Yonkers Council Minority Leader Mike Breen said, "Faced with the daunting challenge of increasing health care costs that alone would have resulted in a 6% property tax increase, we scrutinized every possible way to cut expenses while ensuring the continuation of essential services that our residents expect and deserve. Remarkably, we were still able to enhance services in some areas, including the addition of two Parking & Code Enforcement Officers to address the quality of life issues that matter so much to us all."

Councilman Anthony Merante voted no, saying, "I will not be supporting this tax increase. I can't vote to break the tax cap without a real true plan for the people of the city of Yonkers. We failed the people from various angles.

"At the heart of my no vote is there is no plan for the future. Also, I find it difficult to vote on raises for ourselves. It is a conflict of interest to vote our own raise. It used to be for a subsequent council and mayor. I can't be a part of it to vote for a raise and a tax increase. I hope that we start dealing with the next year's budget soon, because I see a tremendous shortfall and another 5% tax increase coming," said Merante.

Wednesday, June 19th

June 19, 1852: The Yonkers Herald, Yonkers' first newspaper, began publishing under the leadership of Thomas Smith.

June 19, 1939: Sisters at the Convent of the Blessed Sacrament on Park Avenue quickly squashed an item run by Walter Winchell in his "On Broadway" column!

Giving it the top position in his column, Winchell wrote: "Will Yonkers NY editors please check the rumor the widow of an ex-President is at the Convent of the Blessed Sacrament—preparing to be a nun?"

The sisters told The Herald Statesman, "There is no truth to the report what-soever."

Thursday June 20th

June 19, 1942: Mayor Benjamin Barnes demanded protection of the city's waterfront and war industries; he requested the Common Council hire city guards and purchase a police boat.

June 20, 1949: Former Vice Mayor James Sullivan lost his appeal on his conviction on three felony counts in the Appellate Court on a 3-2 decision to uphold his conviction on all counts. He had been sentenced to serve one year in the Westchester County Penitentiary and fined \$1000. Sullivan was out under \$7,500 bail pending the results of his appeal. Since it was a close decision, it opened the way to file a new appeal.

The defense blamed the late labor leader William McGeory for the bookmaking installation; McGeory served as a Supervisor and Alderman while alive.

Friday, June 21st

June 21, 1907: The German Odd Fellows purchased the Tuckahoe Road home of James Courter, first Mayor of Yonkers, to use as a residence for old people. The building later became Hebrew National Orphan Home.

June 21, 1945: Yonkers native General Joseph Stilwell received a new assignment, command of the US Tenth Army; the Tenth was in the process of "mopping up Okinawa." Previously Chief of the Army Ground Forces, he was appointed to the Pacific theater.

Saturday, June 22nd

June 12, 1914: More than 2,000 members of Holy Name Societies in the New York Archdiocese attended their annual meeting in St. Mary's Church. The meeting was preceded by a parade through Getty Square.

June 22, 1928: The first full-length film feature with words shown in West-chester County opened at the Strand Theater. The Vitaphone movie, "Tenderloin," starred Conrad Nagle and Dolores Costello was a swift-moving crime drama. Directed by Michael Curtiz, it was produced and released by Warner Brothers and was considered one of Curtiz's most daring films. No prints are known to exist.

June 22, 1945: The US Navy commended Habirshaw Cable and Wire Corporation for its "outstanding performance in meeting quarterly schedules for Navy shipboard cable," cable which "aided materially in construction of the US Fleet." Copies of the letter from Admiral Cochrane were posted on all company bulletin boards.

Sunday, June 23rd

June 23, 1912: Commencement exercises at the John Mason School (School Six) on Ashburton Avenue not only marked the fiftieth anniversary of the school, but also marked the end of the twenty-five-year principalship of Amelia Walker.

June 23, 1943: Dorothy Dunbar Bromley's interview with Yonkers resident Anita Brenner was published in the New York Herald Tribune. Brenner, author of The Wind That Swept Mexico on the history of the Mexican Revolution, discussed the roots of the "Zoot Suit Riots" in Los Angeles a few weeks earlier; she said many of the three million Mexican residents in our Western states were discriminated against in courts, schools, land ownership and medical facilities. Her solution? Americans must dissolve racial prejudice by appealing to our patriotism and religion.

Two Westchester Accountants Plead Guilty to Tax Fraud Conspiracy

Damian Williams, the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, and Thomas M. Fattorusso, the Special Agent in Charge of the New York Field Office of the Internal Revenue Service, Criminal Investigation ("IRS-CI"), announced that GEORGE SANOSSIAN and JACK N. SARDIS pled guilty to conspiracy to defraud the IRS, on May 29 and June 5, 2024, respectively, in White Plains federal court. Sentencing for both is scheduled for September.

U.S. ATTORNEY DAMIAN WILLIAMS SAID: "AS THEY ADMITTED IN COURT, THE DEFENDANTS, BOTH CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS, CONSPIRED TO FRAUDULENTLY REDUCE THE TAX LIABILITY OF CLIENTS OF THEIR ACCOUNTING FIRM. THIS CASE SERVES AS A REMINDER TO ALL AMERICANS THAT THEY ARE REQUIRED TO TRUTHFULLY REPORT THEIR EARNINGS AND THAT CRIMINAL PENALTIES COULD AWAIT THOSE WHO FRAUDULENTLY DECEIVE THE IRS, AS GEORGE SANOSSIAN AND JACK SARDIS HAVE LEARNED."

Fattorusso said: "Schemes to conceal and reduce federal income and payroll tax liability, such as those utilized by Sardis and Sanossian, are unfair to every taxpayer who obeys the law and pays their fair share. These guilty pleas place the defendants a step closer to realizing the consequences of their actions."

According to the Informations, to which SARDIS and SANOSSIAN pled guilty, and statements made court: SARDIS and SANOSSIAN were certified public accountants and partners in an accounting firm in Scarsdale, New York, that provided accounting and income and payroll tax services to clients, including nine businesses in the construction industry (the "Clients"). From in or about 2012 through at least on or about April 15, 2018, SARDIS and SANOS-SIAN agreed with Clients to scheme to: (i) fraudulently reduce the income tax liability of the Clients; (ii) conceal wages paid to employees by the Clients and, thereby, fraudulently reduce the Clients' payroll tax liability; and (iii) conceal personal income of the Clients. The defendants advised the Clients to participate in a scheme to reduce their federal income and payroll tax liability, pursuant to which the Clients issued checks made payable to a shell company and gave the checks to SARDIS and SANOSSIAN, who then caused the checks to be cashed at a check cashing service and returned the cash, minus a fee, to the Clients. Some Clients used the cash to pay employees without reporting the cash wages on their IRS Forms 941, thereby evading both their employer contributions to Social Security and Medicare and their obligation to withhold income tax on those wages, which permitted the employees to evade federal and state income tax. The owners and managers of some Clients took the cash for personal use without reporting the income on their personal federal and state tax returns. SARDIS and SANOSSIAN caused checks to be cashed in this manner for Clients in a total amount exceeding \$2 million.

SARDIS, 66, of Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey, and SANOSSIAN, 70, of Scarsdale, New York, pled guilty to one count of conspiracy to defraud the IRS, which carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison. SARDIS and SANOSSIAN have agreed to pay restitution to the IRS and New York State, representing the additional tax due and owing as a result of their conduct, in the total amount of \$652,883.60.

The maximum potential sentence in these cases is prescribed by Congress and is provided here for informational purposes only, as any sentencing of the defendants will be determined by a judge.

Mr. Williams praised the outstanding investigative work of the IRS-CI in this case.

Called Park Square, the project would feature 339 units in a six-story building. The apartments would include 198 studios and 141 one-bedroom units. There would also be 20,000 square feet of ground-level commercial space and a 420-space parking structure. The project includes a green roof which will capture and direct stormwater into an underground detention system. The property was originally part of the Mulford Gardens Hope VI Revitalization project. The property was never developed and transferred to the City in 2019. The project is expected to create 200 construction jobs and 8 full-time and part-time jobs. The developer is requesting a \$3,802,292 sales tax exemption, a \$1,677,870 mortgage recording tax exemption and a 20-year PILOT.

221 Buena Vista. MSY Group received preliminary approval of financial incentives for development of a \$39.1 million affordable senior housing development

Description automatically generatedThe project consists of developing 0.47 acres of vacant land located at 221-223 Buena Vista Avenue into a multi-family 94-unit, nine-story affordable residential building for seniors. The building will have 40 one-bedroom apartments and 54 studio units and 47 parking spaces. There will also be a rooftop green space for residents to enjoy with a barbeque and seating area. The building will also offer high-end amenities including a community room and a fitness center. The project is expected to create up to 100 construction jobs. The property, which is within walking distance of a city park, takes advantage of passive recreation for seniors. Because the site is located on a dead-end street, the developer plans to build a turnaround to accommodate fire apparatus. The developer is also planning to install a new 750-foot long water main. MSY Group is requesting a \$1,819,375 sales tax exemption, a \$650,455 mortgage recording tax exemption and a 15-year PILOT.

And take my word, George Latimer knows what a fire alarm is. He needs no on the job training and will listen to people's needs versus have them listen to his.



Yorktown High School Senior Posts "From the River to the Sea" in Yearbook

Parents and students in the Yorktown School District are concerned and embarrassed about the 2024 Yorktown High School yearbook, that includes a quote below the photograph of Senior Renee Nfor that reads, "from the river to the sea," as her yearbook quote.

The phrase "from the river to the sea," has become more popular by Palistinian protestors after the October 7 attacks by Hamas on Israel.

According to the Anti-Defamation League, ADL, "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free" is an antisemitic slogan commonly featured in anti-Israel campaigns and chanted at demonstrations. This rallying cry has long been used by anti-Israel voices, including supporters of terrorist organizations such as Hamas and the PFLP, which seek Israel's destruction through violent means. It is fundamentally a call for a Palestinian state extending from the Jordan River to the Mediterranean Sea, territory that includes the State of Israel, which would mean the dismantling of the Jewish state. It is an antisemitic charge denying the Jewish right to self-determination, including through the removal of Jews from their ancestral homeland. Usage of this phrase has the effect of making members of the Jewish and pro-Israel community feel unsafe and ostracized. It is important to note that demanding justice for Palestinians, or calling for a Palestinian state, should not mean, as this hateful phrase posits, denying the right of the State of Israel to exist."

In an email to the Yorktown High School families, Superintendent Ron Hattar wrote, "This afternoon we learned that one of the quotes in the 2024 YHS year-book included language that is hurtful to members of our school community. We always strive to promote an inclusive environment for all students, and this quote runs contrary to our values. This was an oversight and we have already begun planning additional measures to include in our yearbook review process moving forward."

Some parents and students are asking for more information about how this phrase was allowed to be printed in the yearbook, and who had the oversight for the yearbook before it went to press?

"Was the yearbook advisor aware of this message, and did they let it go through? Or were they unaware of it?" posted one parent on social media.

One parent of a Yorktown High School student, Rabbi Robbie Weiner, of Temple Beth Am in Yorktown, told News 12, "The students are told that they shouldn't use words of hatred, political statements and things of this sort, this is absolutely hate speech."

One YHS student added, "From the river to the sea to me, means, I hear that and that's the land of Israel so I think no Israel. I was personally very upset that it was in the yearbook, and I wish they would address it a little bit more," said Tailia Pierson.

A second letter that went out to the YHS community offered students a reprinted Yearbook without the quote, or they can be provided with a sticker to cover up the quote.

Others have called for this unfortunate incident to be used as an opportunity to educate Ms. Nfor and all students on how hateful this phrase is.



Man Charged with Attempted Murder After Beating Social Worker Now on Life Support

A Westchester County Department of Social Service social worker remains in critical condition one month after she was attacked in Peekskill. Maria Coto, 56, knocked on the wrong door during a home visit and was beaten nearly to death by Hasseem Jenkins, 31.

The incident occured at 3pm on May 14, at apartments in the rear of 900 South Street, Peekskill. According to the criminal complaint, on May 14, Hasseem Jenkins, "... repeatedly punch[ed] [Maria] Coto with his fists and did repeatedly kick Ms. Coto with heavy boots ... above the head and body causing Ms. Coto to sustain severe brain bleed, swelling of the brain, and multiple facial fractures ..."

Neighbors in the apartments said that Jenkins grabbed Soto after she ran away from his apartment, threw her to the ground, repeatedly yelling "I'm going to kill you bitch."

Peekskill police quickly arrived after 911 calls were made and arrested Jen

kins, charging him with second-degree attempted murder, a Class A-1 felony, and first-degree assault. Soto was taken by ambulance to Westchester Medical Center and put on a ventilator.

In the complaint, the District Attorney's office states that the victim required immediate surgery at Westchester Medical Center and requires a ventilator in order to breathe.

The Peekskill Herald reported that Jenkins has a violent criminal history that includes disorderly conduct for fighting and violent behavior in 2023, and in 2011 he was charged with 2nd degree assault, a Class D felony, for punching a 16 year old boy in the face leaving a party.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said, "This unforeseen and tragic incident has prompted us to take immediate action to protect our personnel from further harm while they perform their duties on behalf of the County of Westchester. DSS staff perform essential work within the community, we respect them and we want to do all we can to keep them safe."

Westchester County has announced additional safety measures for its staff. Effective immediately, DSS will offer enhanced security escorts for staff during community and home visits. While DSS has long provided escort services, the new initiative expands their availability to cover more visits and programs.

Century Protective Services, Inc. will provide escorts on a case-by-case basis to assist DSS staff.

DSS Commissioner Leonard Townes said: "Due to the urgent nature of this situation, DSS has determined that an immediate contract with a security services provider is necessary. Our employees perform the most selfless work, and we want to ensure their safety every step of the way."

We join Latimer in saying, "Our thoughts are with Marie Coto and her family during this difficult time." Jenkins faces 25 year in prison.

I'm a mother who is angry about the lack of action on climate.

I am writing to ask you to cover the story of the medical dangers inherent in the use of gas stoves in people's homes.

Right now, mounting evidence suggests deleterious harms associated with gas stove use. (1)

In fact, New York State, as well as Illinois and California are considering legislation to promote informed consumer choice by requiring warning labels to be attached to new gas stoves. The California bill just passed the Assembly and is headed to the Senate.

The gas industry and appliance manufacturers are, of course, disputing the science and trying to cast doubt on it. This strategy echoes the way the tobacco industry tried to fight against public education regarding the harmful effects of smoking. That similarity of strategy is not just coincidence. The gas industry has fought against public understanding of the health harms since the 1970's often partnering with the same strategists and PR people who worked with the tobacco industry. (2)

The industry has recently been getting called to task for allegedly hiding the facts regarding the hazards to human health. Last year three separate class-action lawsuits were filed regarding allegations that the industry was obfuscating the truth about the harms from worsening indoor air quality. Another case was brought in May of 2024 in the District of Columbia Supreme Court accusing a manufacturer of GE appliances of breaking the Consumer Protection Procedures Act by failing to inform the public of indoor pollution risks. In addition, Judge Cacace served as the first presiding judge of the DWI Part of Westchester County, where she spearheaded the crafting of consistent dispositions of all felony-level DWI cases throughout Westchester County from its creation in 2014-2023.

And during this campaign, Cacace announced her support for new legislation to aid sexual assault victims and vigorous prosecution of sex crimes in Westchester. Legislation introduced by Senator Michael Gianaris and Assemblywoman Amy Paulin would allow New York State Courts to make evidence of prior sexual offenses admissible at trial. This legislative move follows the reversal of Harvey Weinstein's 2020 rape conviction by New York's highest court

"Evidence of other sexual assaults by the abuser should be admissible in court as long as it doesn't create an unfair bias. Victims should not be silenced.

"If elected DA, I will do everything in my power to make sure that sex crimes are vigorously prosecuted and that survivors of these heinous crimes get the justice they deserve."

We have confidence in Cacace's ability as DA to balance the needs of victims with the rights of the accused.

Cacace also has experience in the Westchester District Attorney's office, serving as an Assistant District Attorney for Westchester County from 1989 through 2003, where she tried felony cases as a member of the Superior Court Trial Division while also coordinating the Animal Cruelty Division.

Cacace, who has been rated 100% pro-choice by Choice Matters and as a 2024 Gun Sense Candidate by Moms Demand Action, wants to improve communications and relations between the District Attorney's office and the community.

"I feel it is incredibly important that our prosecutors have an opportunity to see the world through the eyes of a local kid from Mount Vernon, a senior citizen from Mamaroneck or an at-risk youth from Yonkers. I also believe it is important that people understand the efforts of law enforcement and that they hear from us on what we do and why we do it. Should I be elected district attorney, I look forward to building these programs and to expanding on what was already begun by current DA Mimi Rocah," wrote Cacace, in a recent OP Ed.

We find Susan Cacace to be the most experienced and qualified candidate running for Westchester District Attorney. Her opponents lack the leadership, ethics and commitment to Justice that Judge Cacace brings to the table, and what is critical to run an office with over 40 Police Departments that prosecutes more than 20,000 cases per year.

Adeel Mirza is attempting to lead a District Attorney's office that he was fired from and escorted out of the office. Now he wants to lead that same office.

We've seen many of the mail pieces coming out of the Mirza campaign and not only do they lack substance, but they seem to prioritize negative messages about his opponent. In fact, the Westchester Fair Campaign Practices Committee, recently ruled against Adeel Mirza and the campaign committee Mirza4DA, and determined that two mailers paid for by Mirza4DA were "unfair campaign practices" that violates the FCPC Principle that "The candidate will not use or condone any campaign material or advertisement that misstates, misrepresents or distorts material fact or any communication that misleads the public,"

William Wagstaff's campaign claims that the criminal justice system needs reimagining. While crime is steady in Westchester at large, we are wondering how an attorney with only 7 years of experience, none of which we are told has ever been prosecutorial, expects to run an office that processes approximately 20,000 cases a year. Aside from his lack of experience, how can the DA effectively prosecute cases without a strong, respectful, collaborative relationship with local law enforcement? As per the wagstaffforda.com website, we could not find any endorsements from local law enforcement groups before our publication.

And Wagstaff did not pay his Federal Income Taxes over a six-year period, totaling more than \$189,000, and he did not find his tax troubles worthy of mention to Westchester democratic leaders we spoke to, who were concerned and disappointment and had no knowledge of this before the story broke.

Wagstaff recently earned \$726,000 from the City of Mount Vernon as a "Special Prosecutor" but did not use his earnings to pay his taxes on time, resulting in several democratic leaders asking the question, if you can handle your personal finances, how can we trust you to run the office of Westchester District Attorney?

Susan Cacace has the combination of experience in the office that she now wants to lead, as a Judge for 20 years, and as a defense attorney. She has seen it all from all sides.

NYS Comptroller DiNapoli Issues Audit

Report on City of Yonkers Budget

The purpose of our budget review was to determine whether the significant revenue and expenditure projections in the City's proposed budget for the 2024-25 fiscal year are reasonable. Certain significant revenue and expenditure projections in the proposed budget are unreasonable. Furthermore, officials' continued practice of using debt to pay for recurring costs is imprudent. Our review determined the City's proposed budget:

Continues to rely on \$87.9 million in nonrecurring revenue, such as appropriated fund balance, one-time State funding and sale of property, to finance its operations.

Includes revenue estimates for temporary municipal assistance, police, real estate transfer tax, city and state mortgage tax, housing and buildings, parking violation bureau, hotel room and occupancy tax, metered water sales and sewer rents that may not be achievable.

Results in additional debt and interest costs because the cost of tax certiorari claims are bonded instead of being financed through the operating budget. Includes appropriations for police overtime, life/health/dental insurance, employee retirement, firefighting overtime and social security that are likely underestimated.

Does not include an appropriation for contractual settlements. Six of the City's eight union collective bargaining agreements (CBAs) have expired or will expire soon. The City could face additional expenditures when these contracts are settled.

Does not include a contingency appropriation, which limits flexibility to cover any unanticipated expenditures or revenue shortfalls. Includes \$100.8 million to service its debt obligations during 2024-25.

Includes \$100.8 million to service its debt obligations during 2024-25. This amount represents about 6.9 percent of the City's annual budget. Includes a \$58.8 million capital budget.

The City has included approximately \$10.1 million in operating costs for items such as \$5.4 million in textbooks, software and equipment in the Yonkers Public School District's budget. The remaining \$4.7 million in operating costs are for purchases such as vehicles, software and equipment for City departments which are a recurring expenditure and should be an appropriation in the annual budget. The City will incur additional costs if it continues to borrow for operating costs. Includes a tax levy of \$442,718,221.

The City's proposed budget also includes the Yonkers Public School District's (District's) budget. Our review determined the District's proposed budget:

Is structurally unbalanced with a budget gap of at least \$61.9 million. Relies on \$12 million of additional State aid for services and expenses, which may not be available in future years. Does not include a specific appropriation for contractual settlements. Two of the District's CBAs expired June 30, 2023. The District could face additional expenditures when these contracts are settled. Likely underestimates teacher retirement payments by approximately \$478,000 and charter school tuition payments by approximately \$206,000. Includes \$5.7 million for contingency; this amount is less than 1 percent of the District's budgeted appropriations. This amount may exhaust the current amount budgeted, limiting flexibility to cover any other unforeseen or unexpected costs.

Recommendations: Develop a plan to maintain fund balance at a reasonable level and discontinue the practice of relying on one-time revenues to finance recurring expenditures. Review the estimates for temporary municipal assistance, police, real estate transfer tax, city and state mortgage tax, housing and buildings, parking violation bureau, hotel room and occupancy tax, metered waters ales and sewer rents and amendas necessary.

Consider adjusting the appropriation for tax certiorari payments and provide a financing source for tax certiorari settlements.

Review appropriations for police overtime, life/health/dental insurance, employee retirement, firefighting overtime and social security and amend as necessary. Review the estimate for the City's contractual settlements, and the potential need for the District's contractual settlements and amend as necessary. Review the outstanding debt and review alternatives to borrowing. Consider identifying alternatives to borrowing funds for operating costs such as vehicles, software and equipment. Eliminate the \$61.9 million gap in the District's budget request. Review the estimates for teacher retirement payments and

charter school tuition payments. and amend as necessary. Review the estimates for the contingency appropriations and amend as necessary.

17%, and over 70 49% to 22%.

A plurality of Democratic primary voters (43%) are less inclined to support a member of Congress who opposes a ceasefire in Gaza, while 37% are more inclined to support a candidate who opposes a ceasefire. Twenty percent say it has no impact on their support.

Male voters are more inclined to support a candidate that opposes a cease-fire in Gaza, 41% to 36%. Female voters are less inclined to support a candidate that opposes a ceasefire, 47% to 35%.

Half (50%) of Democratic primary voters think the U.S. government is spending too much on aid to Israel in the war with Hamas, a third (33%) think the U.S. is spending the right amount, and 17% think the U.S. is spending too little. Regarding humanitarian relief to Palestinians in Gaza, 46% think the U.S. is spending too little, 34% the right amount, and 21% too much.

A majority of voters (55%) think there is about the same amount of crime in their area as there was a year ago, while 28% think there is more crime, and 17% find there is less crime.

Sixty-four percent of Democratic primary voters approve of President Biden's executive order that prevents migrants from seeking asylum at the U.S.-Mexico border once the average number of daily encounters hits 2,500 between ports of entry, while 23% disapprove, and 13% are unsure.

The polls comes after the last debate between Bowman and Latimer was held on June 9 by the League of Women Voters of Westchester. The debate was held online on Zoom, and did not include any "knockouts" on either side.

Bowman's supporters tried to highlight a comment Latimer made about Bowman not paying enough attention to the Westchester communities in his district. "You get as much money as you can from outside the district. Your constituency is Dearborn Michigan, your constituency is San Fransciso," said Latimer.

Jasmine Gripper, Co-Director of the New York Working Families Party, has issued the following statement. "George Latimer has traded in his dogwhistle for a bullhorn. The diversity of NY-16 is one of its strengths, but you wouldn't know it from Latimer's campaign. His bigoted comments against Arab-Americans is the latest in a series of racist appeals that have only served to divide the community. Voters in NY-16 deserve leadership that will treat all constituents with decency and respect. That's not George Latimer."

Latimer's campaigin responded with, "another day another lie from Jamaal Bowman. George's comments were taken out of context, because in the same breath he also mentioned San Fransisco. The realilty is the incumbent has failed the distirct and has lackluster support. The majority of the incumbents donations come from thousands of miles away."

Bowman recently received the endorsement from more than a dozen clergy members citing his strong moral leadership and steadfast commitment to uplifting the needs of working families as key reasons for their support. Rev. James Duckett, Rev. Dr. Stephen Pogue, Rev. Patrick Goodman, Rev. Louis, Rev. Carlton Spruill, Rev. Gene Girtman, Rev. Verlin Williams, Bishop Angelo, Rev. Debra Jenkins, Bishop Leslie Rawlings, Elder Diane Berry, Rev. James Robinson, Rev. Stephen Green, Rev. Mark Thompson, Rev. Veron House, Rev. Willie Spencer, Rev. Robert Williams, Rev. Nancy Rosario, Rev. Donna Modeste.

"Congressman Bowman is the champion we need in Congress," said Pastor Mike McBride, founding member of Black Church PAC. "His commitment to peace and justice at home and abroad is consistent with our values and we are excited to endorse his campaign to continue to serve in Congress. Now more than ever, we need moral and principled leadership on issues impacting the most vulnerable."

Bowman also commented on the recent poll, stating "The voters of our district have been flooded with polls and attack ads for months, dividing our community and distorting my record. AIPAC's Republican megadonors have spent a record setting \$13 million dollars to sow disillusionment and depress turnout. But this election is about the many versus the money. Our volunteers are talking to tens of thousands of voters across the district every week, and our data shows consistently that through direct conversations, voters see through the lies and are energized to reject AIPAC's attempt to buy this seat. On June 25th, we decide." A poll in April also had Latimer with a 17 point lead

A recent NY Times story has Bowman stating that "I'm still a member," of the Democratic Socialists of America, (DSA) and "I didn't let my dues lapse."

The story continues, "Pressed by members to explain why his office had publicly stated otherwise, he added: "Media has a tendency to talk about B.S., and not focus on the race. And we wanted to make sure we were focusing on our race at that time and getting re-elected."

Bowman was endorsed by DSA in 2020, not endorsed by DSA in 2022, and has now been endorsed for the democratic primary this year.

DSA was criticized for posting this on Twitter-X after the October 7 attacks by Hamas on Israel. 'One could (and should) very well argue that in a settler colonial context there are no such things as "civilians", but disregarding that even, it's total folly to honestly compare settlers perpetrating pogroms to resistance groups deploying violence to liberate themselves.'

DMFI PAC Chairman Mark Mellman said, "That Congressman Bowman admits to having lied to get re-elected is a sad commentary on his character. His hostility to the truth is only matched by his hostility toward his own constituents — all of them — and President Biden. Bowman falsely attacked 'everyone in [his] district,' as well as President Biden, for dehumanizing an entire people. It's hard to imagine why anyone would vote for a candidate who lies to them and then attacks them all."
