Mr. Stop & Shake, Shakes Down the City for \$50,000

Hector Santiago, better know for his role in creating and operating the Stop & Shake initiative in Yonkers, which aims to better relations between the community and the police, settled a lawsuit that he filed against the City and the Yonkers Police Department after an incident that he claimed resulted in his injury at the hands of a cop.

We have to go back to the City Council meeting held in Nov. of 2022. The Council was debating and voting on the extension of term limits. Emotions were extremely high on both sides of the issue. Ron Matten correctly dubbed it Mania-

Several Yonkers police officers were in the packed chambers, with more offices outside. There is video tape of the meeting.

Santiago got involved with an officer in the council chambers after he was asked to leave

As he was leaving, a confrontation ensued with police officer Russell

Russell says that Santiago lunged at him and missed, resulting in Kilgore striking Santiago and placing him under arrest. Santiago said that Kilgore assaulted him.

There is no video clearly showing what really happened. Santiago was placed under arrest for resisting arrest and spent the night in jail.

Santiago sued the City, YPD and officer Kilgore, for false arrest and imprisonment, and settled recently for \$50k.

There are mixed opinions about the settlement. Most understand that municipal governments look to settle cases for a smaller amount all of the time. If the case went to trial, Santiago's attorneys would have argued that this is a case of police brutality, even though there is no proof of that.

Guns to Gardens Coming to Westchester to Help Turn Unwanted Guns into Garden Tools

Are you tired of hearing of gun tragedies? A group called "Guns to Gardens" is coming to Westchester this fall to try and get unwanted guns off the streets and turn them into Garden tools.

"Guns to Gardens" is a national movement, which works to reduce gun violence by reducing the number of guns in homes and communities. Guns to Gardens Safe Surrender events are offered regularly across the nation, but none yet in New York. At these events, unwanted guns are dismantled, and the leftover parts are later forged into garden tools by trained blacksmiths.

Locally, a Safe Surrender event will be held on Saturday, November 16, at the Scarsdale Friends Meetinghouse, 133 Popham Road, Scarsdale. While the Safe Surrender event is not a traditional gun "Buy Back," the church will distribute grocery gift cards to thank gun owners for disposing of unwanted guns.

On August 3, an introduction event was held in Mt. Vernon at the First Presbyterian Church in Mount Vernon, to show the public about the group and how the process works. Mount Vernon Mayor Shawyn Patterson-Howard and County Legislator Shanae Williams were in attendance, along with Liz Schutt from Guns to Gardens, and including Dr. Nancy Dodson of Scarsdale Friends Meetinghouse, and Mark and Cameron from Raw Tools Buffalo, who dismantle firearms and turn them into useful tools. Members from SNUG and Moms Demand Action also attended.

First Presbyterian Church in Mount Vernon, in partnership with South Presbyterian Church in Dobbs Ferry, Scarsdale Friends Meeting, and RAWTools Buffalo, are promoting the event and working together for this new and interesting group.


Mark Stradley, a high school counselor in the Buffalo City Schools, learned how to be a blacksmith in 2019 to show his students that it is possible to heal from gun violence and to choose the way of peacemaking. "I've been in the Buffalo Public Schools [system] for about 15 years, and I've lost probably about a half a dozen students to gun violence," he said. "And even more students that have lost a parent or a loved one to gun violence." Recently, Stradley applied for and received funding from Governor Hochul's Project RISE to take his tools on the road to bring his message of hope and healing to cities that have experienced high levels of gun violence throughout New York State, including Mount Vernon and Yonkers.

Local volunteers heard about Stradley's plan to travel the state and demonstrate turning guns into garden tools and invited him to the First Presbyterian Church in Mount Vernon.

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City of Yonkers Announces Traffic Improvements for Opening of New Justice Sotomayor School



Starting August 22, Lawrence Street at McLean and Van Cortlandt Park Avenues to be Converted to ONE-WAY WESTBOUND

Yonkers Traffic Engineering Department today announced the City is converting Lawrence Street between McLean Avenue and Van Cortlandt Park Avenue into a one-way westbound street in order to improve traffic conditions for the new Justice Sonia Sotomayor Community School, scheduled to open in September.

Starting August 22, Yonkers Traffic Engineering Division will modify the traffic control signage to accommodate the one-way conversion. Residents and visitors to the block of Lawrence Street will be required to enter from McLean Avenue and exit onto Van Cortlandt Park Avenue. Parking will be permitted on the south side of the street and parking will be prohibited on the north (school) side between 7AM and 4PM on school days.

Traffic improvements are being implemented in accordance with an environmental impact study that accompanied the planning and construction of the new Yonkers Public School. The change in traffic direction accommodates school buses dropping off and picking up students in the front of the school on Lawrence Street.

Monday, August 19th

August 19, 1911: Yonkers own runaway bride returned home from Italy!

Helen Andrus Hobbs was the daughter of Congressman and former Yonkers Mayor John E. Andrus. Because of her parents' objections to the marriage, Helen told them she was going to NYC to shop; once there, the couple married.

The bride met the groom, son of a Massachusetts knitting mill owner and 1909 Yale All-American tackle Henry Hobbs, thorough her brother and Yale football star Hamline; at the time of the wedding, Hobbs was head football coach at Amherst and worked in a department store.

Arriving back in NY, Mrs. Hobbs told the press the couple was "perfectly independent and glad to be so." Mr. Andrus was reported despondent and not in a forgiving mood when he learned of the marriage via telegram.

Five years later, Helen Andrus Hobbs sued for divorce for desertion and returned to her parents' home with four-year old daughter Elinor. Hobbs was not allowed to see Elinor for thirteen years; after twelve hearings and writs by the court allowing visitation, until Supreme Court Justice Morschauser ordered Helen bring the girl to his chambers.

At the time of the divorce, Hobbs was in France, serving with the American Field Service; when the US entered the war, he joined the Army.

Tuesday, August 20th

August 20, 1917: Mrs. William B. Thompson of North Broadway gave \$10,000 to the Preparedeness League of American Dentists to equip six dental ambulances for New York State troops.

August 20, 1943: Several leaders in the war veterans' organizations wanted to combine all nineteen organizations into one large veterans' group. The sponsors thought the knowledge and experience of the men who served in previous wars would be invaluable to those returning; the new organization would "bear more weight and have more influence than nineteen separate ones." Yonkers had nine American Legion posts, five VFW posts and several garrisons of the Army and Navy Union. It was not expected to happen as several posts were considered "community posts," such as Dunbar in Crestwood and Bajart Post in McLean Heights.

Wednesday, August 21st

August 21, 1914: School Superintendent Charles Gorton announced concern about Yonkers schools opening in September. Yonkers teachers, teachers who traveled to Europe for summer vacations, were stranded; their return to Yonkers was delayed because of the outbreak of the European war.

August 21, 1930: Salvation Army officials were shocked when Federal Agents raided the cellar of their store at 6 New School Street. A large John Street bottling plant had taken it over to brew beer!

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Will RFK Jr. Be On the Ballot for President in NY?



Presidential candidate Robert F. Kennedy Jr.'s campaign received an unfavorable decision from NY state Supreme Court Justice Christina Ryba this week after she found that a lawsuit filed against RFK Jr.'s nominating petitions in NY were fraudulent because it listed a Katonah address as Kennedy's home. Judge Ryba said that RFK Jr.s stays at the Katonah home of his friends was "virtually nonexistent" and used for the purpose of maintaining his voter registration in NY.

The multi-million dollar legal effort to remove RFK Jr. from the ballot was funded by Clear Choice PAC, a democratic group intent on throwing Kennedy off the ballot not only in NY but across the country.

Kennedy is appealing the decision and explained the reasons why the Judge was wrong and why he listed his friends Katonah address as his domicile.

"As many of you saw, yesterday a NY judge disqualified me from New York ballot access, despite the nearly 150,000 signatures my campaign obtained from New Yorkers wanting to see me as a choice this November. The ruling came after the plaintiffs argued I am not in fact a resident of New York, which I am.

"I'll still be on the ballot, don't worry about that. We will appeal this decision, and we will win. The worry here isn't about my campaign for president. The worry is about the state of our country and the DNC's all-out, anti-democratic lawfare campaign.

"You have to put the same domicile on petitions in every state in the country. Some of those states say your domicile HAS to be the place where you vote. I've never voted anyplace else than New York. We have the best ballot access attorney in the country and he said this is the only way to do it.

I'm being accused of deceiving people about my domicile, but I took legal advice and I was told: You're gonna be sued whether you claim Massachusetts where you have a house, California where you have a house, or New York where you have a house. The only place you legally can claim is New York.'

"My driver's license is here. I vote in this state. My car is registered here. My law license is in this state. My law office is in this state. I pay income taxes in this state, and I vote here. New York has been my domicile my whole life. I've lived in New York for 60 years."

Kennedy's primary residence is in California, where he lives with his wife, Cheryl Hines, an actrees, and their children. The couple also have a home on Cape Cod.

"Your domicile is the place you intend to return, and when Cheryl's acting career is over, we will return to New York and live in the Town of Bedford, where I have lived for 40 years, and this is the Town where I intend to retire to.If you acted in good faith on the advice of counsel, you cannot be convicted of fraud.

The Kennedy campaign has filed an appeal in NY State court, and also a Federal action. "Under the 12th Amendment there's only three requirements to run for President of the United States. That you are 35, that you are born in this country, and that you are a citizen of this country. I meet all three of those . The states are not allowed to impose additional burdens on candidates appearing on ballots in all 50 states. That is what the truth is and we will prevail." said RFK Jr.

The Kennedy campaign has collected enough signatures to be on the ballot in all 50 states, something the media has failed to report on.

A New Generic Diabetes Drug Shows How Medical Innovation Works



Launch of the first-ever generic GLP-1

The drugmaker Teva Pharmaceuticals made history in June by launching the first-ever generic version of a GLP-1 diabetes drug. This revolutionary class of medications, which are also growing increasingly popular as treatments for obesity, has proven astoundingly effective in helping diabetes patients manage their condition.

The launch is good for millions of Americans living with type 2 diabetes. It's also a textbook case of how the life sciences industry is supposed to work. Leaps in innovation soon lead to mass-scale availability.

The list of people and organizations who deserve credit for the GLP-1 success story is long. What's undeniable, though, is that none of it would have been possible were it not for our country's system of intellectual property protections.

When the first GLP-1 drugs came on the scene two decades ago, they were greeted by the medical community as a major step forward in the treatment of diabetes. In the years since, GLP-1 drugs have established themselves as among the most powerful tools available for improving glycemic efficacy, promoting weight loss, and lowering blood pressure.

Now that the first generic GLP-1 therapy has launched, these drugs will be available at a lower cost.

Patent protection plays an indispensable role in that process. Inventing a new treatment is a high-risk, high-reward endeavor. Bringing a new drug to FDA approval costs an average of \$2.6 billion, counting the investment dollars lost on the nearly 90% of drugs entering clinical trials that fail along the way.

Patents make it worthwhile for scientists and investors to take that risk. Patents give their holders a sole right to sell the products they have developed for a limited period. If a drug succeeds, drugmakers can use that window of protection to earn back their initial investments and make a return — before low-cost generics enter the market.

In the case of GLP-1 drugs, this process worked perfectly. What began as early-stage laboratory research undertaken with patent protection led to approval of a real-world drug — and now a low-cost generic. Now, patients at all income levels can reap the health benefits of this remarkable therapy.

Stories such as these are common. To date, the FDA has approved more than 32,000 generic drugs — including more than 900 last year alone. Over 90% percent of prescriptions filled in the United States are generics. But there would be no generics if patent protection didn't give drug developers the incentive to start the process.

This state of affairs is rarely reflected in the public debate over drug prices. The conventional wisdom suggests that drug prices have gotten out of control. But while this is true in specific cases, high-priced brand-name drugs represent a small minority of prescriptions filled. And the brand-name prices will come down as generics enter the market — which they will.

This is exactly as it should be. When America's life sciences ecosystem works as intended, it can simultaneously drive medical science forward, while also promoting affordability through a vibrant generic market.

As the country and the rest of the world experience another year of scorching heat waves, private for-profit utility companies — who we rely upon for our basic necessities like heating, cooling and electricity — are keeping us reliant on climate-wrecking fossil fuels while reporting record profits.

This is perhaps the single biggest reason we must elect Kamala Harris this November: so that she can FINISH THE JOB on climate.



Thursday, August 22nd

August 22, 1947: Westchester Air Associates was announced as the first tenant of the new Yonkers Skyport, Yonkers' third seaplane base on the Yonkers riverfront. Joseph Mirsky constructed the base on property near the ferry slip on Alexander Street. Designed to accommodate four-passenger and ten-passenger seaplanes or amphibians, its horseshoe-shaped float made it possible for planes to taxi in so passengers could alight from the airplane's door. The other riverfront bases were the Hudson Valley Flyers on our northern city line and the Yonkers Seaplane Base at Ludlow.

August 22, 1952: Otis Elevator announced "Lady Drivers" had their own parking section in its new parking lot on Alexander Street, each space labeled "Reserved for Lady Drivers." The section had wider spaces and an "extra wide aisle" to make it easier for women to get in and out. Formerly the former Lloyds boathouse, the company bought the field at an auction; it adjoined property Otis rented for four years, The company filled the area behind a concrete bulkhead to extend it 330 feet into the river; after grading and paving, it would hold an additional 30 cars.

Friday, August 23rd

August 23, 1928: Dr. Leon Pisculli, Park Hill Avenue, announced he would be a medical observer on the Roma, the plane that would attempt to fly non-stop from the US to Rome. Scheduled to be piloted by Italian aviator Cesare Sabelli, Roger Q. Williams and Captain Frank Bonelli, when the Roma finally took off for the Italian capitol, it was without the good doctor, Sabelli or Bonelli. Instead, Roger Q. Williams and Capt. Lewis Yancey made the flight and landed in Spain. Yancey married Gertrude Civelli from Yonkers; the couple lived for many years on Lawrence Street.

Saturday, August 24th

August 24, 1943: Alexander Smith & Sons Carpet announced company engineers Griffin Ashcroft and Oliver Beckwith developed a new tire retread of cotton and reclaimed rubber made on carpet looms; it used 40 percent of the rubber needed for a standard retread and lasted just as long. Although not on the market, it was displayed in the window First National Bank.

August 24, 1952: Gertrude Caulfield Cooney was honored by Crescent Post, American Legion. The only female member of the Post, she served as a Yeoman in World War I.

Sunday, August 25th

August 25, 1917: The Federal Sugar Refinery Company announced plans to build a pier extending several hundred feet into the Hudson on its property at the foot of Herriot Street.

August 25, 1943: Jack Lambert, graduate of Hawthorne JHS and Yonkers HS, was the first voice heard in the Hollywood film "Bomber's Moon." He played the turret gunner and was heard discussing the beauty of the moon. Lambert went on to be a fairly well-known character actor, appearing in crime dramas and westerns, appearing in movies such as "Vera Cruz," "The Killers," "The Enforcer," and "How the West Was Won," among others. He appeared in TV shows such as "Gunsmoke," "Daniel Boone," "Wagon Train," "Get Smart" and "The Andy Griffin Show." He was a regular (as Joshua Walcek) in Darren McGavin's "Riverboat."

Margery Rossi, pastor of South Presbyterian Church in Dobbs Ferry and acting Coordinator of the Gun Violence Prevention Ministry of the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship, described the combined spiritual and practical sides of the

blacksmithing demonstration: "In scripture we find that the prophet Isaiah envisioned a time of peace and prosperity for his community with the iconic words 'they shall turn their swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks.' Today, people in our nation mostly use guns instead of swords and spears to commit violence, and so, in order to bring this vision of peace and prosperity to life for our communities, we are turning guns into garden tools as a witness to our faith, and to help people understand that we can take steps to end gun violence, and we can bring peace and healing to our communities. This demonstration is an opportunity to bring healing to survivors and to educate our communities about the Guns to Gardens movement."

According to the CDC, over 43,000 Americans die every year from gun violence. More than half of the gun deaths are from suicide, followed by homicide, family violence and unintentional shootings. A difficult moment can turn into a tragedy simply because a gun is nearby. According to the U.S. Surgeon General, gun violence is now the number one killer of American children and youth.

A GENERAL ORDINANCE INSTITUTING AN EIGHT-MONTH MORATORIUM ON SELF-STORAGE FACILITIES WITHIN THE CITY OF YON-KERS IN ORDER TO CONDUCT A THOROUGH REVIEW OF HOW TO BETTER SERVE THE CITY'S ECONOMIC GROWTH.

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Yonkers has adopted the abovementioned legislation that amends the City Code to enact a temporary moratorium on self-storage units whereby no approval for the permitting of new units may be granted by the City with the exception of those projects that have obtained zoning board or site plan approval or where amended site plan approval is sought. This moratorium is specifically determined to be necessary to provide adequate time for the City to delve into its zoning laws and land-use strategies to assess whether the City's economic goals would be better served by utilizing the space currently occupied by self-storage facilities for other purposes, including but not limited to affordable- and market-rate housing.

A person or entity with standing may appeal to the City Council for relief from the provisions of this general ordinance (the "Moratorium"). The City Council shall have the power to grant such relief or so much relief as determined by the City Council to be necessary and appropriate.

This ordinance shall be effective immediately and shall remain in effect for a period of eight months, and may be extended for an additional eight months if deemed necessary.



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
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
NY Met Jose Iglesias Sings OMG at Playland

Mount Vernon's Rai Benjamin Wins Two Olympic Gold Medals\ in Paris Olympics!

Wins 400 Meter Hurdles, defeating Rival Who Beat Him in Tokyo Olympics

One of the most difficult feats in all of athletics is for an olympian to win a medal in one olympics, and then come back four years later to win another. Mount Vernon's Rai Benjamin is now one of those special athletes after winning the 400-meter hurdles at the 2024 Paris Summer Olympics on Aug.9.

Three years ago, Benjamin won the Silver Medal at the Tokyo Olympics, losing the Karsent Warholm from Norway, who ran the race of his life with a new world record. Almost immediately after his second place finish, Benjamin committed himself to returning to the Olympics in Paris and capture gold.

Last month, Benjamin defeated Warholm and posted the fastest time in the 400-Meter Hurdles this year. But Warholm still owned the world record, so many were predicting that he would win another gold.

But anyone paying attention to Benjamin's passion, work ethic, and growing confidence knew that he was going to win Gold. And as the race began, it was Benjamin leading Warholm, and as Benjamin ran to victory, Warholm seemed to falter on one of the last hurdles.

"I just focused on running my own race, and i knew that if I did that I would win today," said Benjamin after the race to Bruce Beck.

"What does this say about the great Mt. Vernon atheltes?" asked Beck.

"It says alot of great athletes have come through Mt Vernon, Ben Gordon and a slew of basketball players.

"Denzel Washington if you are watching we did it. I know all of Westchester was watching. Thank you for your support going through the whole process to get back here," said Benjamin, 27, who now has two gold medals and one silver. He won a Gold in Tokyo as a member of the mens' 4 x 400m Relay.

"This color of medal has eluded me for so long – to get it done in this fashion at the Olympic Games in front of friends and family, in front of everybody means so much to me. I don't think I ever doubted it – it was more just stay patient and keep showing up every day. I told myself this has to go my way one day – and it went my way today and that's all I can ask for."

Rai Benjamin is now one of those special olympians, winning a Gold and Silver in Tokyo and a Gold in Paris. Congratulations!

Benjamin was also a member of the Men's 4x400 meter relay team that won the Gold Medal, with Rai running the anchor leg up against Gold Medalist Letsile Tebogo on the final night of the games.

Congressman Jamaal Bowman said, "Congratulations young man and to all the coaches who prepared him for this historic moment."

Magic Johnson said, "Cookie and I went crazy when Rai Benjamin won the 400 meter hurdles! Congratulations to him on earning his first gold medal in the event."

Mt. Vernon Mayor Shawyn Patterson-Howard said, "@kingben your outstanding victory in the 400m hurdles is a monumental achievement that has filled the entire city of Mount Vernon with immense pride and joy. Rai Benjamin, you have shown the world the true meaning of dedication, excellence, and heart. We are so proud of you!!

Thank you for representing Mount Vernon with such grace and determination. Keep shining on the world stage, and know that your hometown is cheering you on every step of the way!

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Harris Leads Trump 53%-39% in New York

Harris Also Leads by 12 points with 3rd Party Candidates Included in Siena Poll

Vice President Kamala Harris leads former President Donald Trump 53-39% among likely New York State voters, the first time the Siena College poll has included Harris in a horserace against Trump. In late June Trump trailed President Joe Biden by a narrower 47-39%. In a six-way election horserace, Harris leads Trump 49-37%, with seven percent for Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. and four percent for the other three minor party candidates, according to a Siena College poll of New York State likely voters released on August 6.

Harris has a 53-43% favorability rating, up from 42-47% in October 2023. Voters strongly support the proposed constitutional amendment on November's ballot, called the Equal Rights Amendment, 68-23%.

"The landscape has changed since the last Siena College poll. The change at the top of the Democratic ticket has had a noticeable, while not dramatic, effect on the horse race. Harris has the support of 86% of Democrats, up from the 75% support Biden had in June. And while independent voters support Trump over Harris 47-40%, they supported Trump over Biden 45-28%," Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg said. "Harris leads with Black voters 81-11%, up from Biden's 59-29% lead in June.

"The gender gap has widened with Harris replacing Biden. Currently Harris leads with women by 34 points, 64-30%, up from Biden's 51-33%, or 18-point lead. The race moved far less with men, who favor Trump over Harris 49-43%, compared to the 46-42% lead men gave Trump in June," Greenberg said. "Interestingly, it wasn't young voters that moved the needle. Among voters under 35, Harris leads 49-34%, down a little from the 51-32% lead Biden had in June. Harris' big pickup was among voters 35-54, who favor her 54-40%, after backing Trump 44-41% over Biden in June.

"Among all the presidential candidates that are likely to be on New York's ballot, Harris is the only one with a positive favorability rating," Greenberg said. "And looking at the race if it is a six-way election, Harris' lead falls slightly from 14 points to 12 points. At the moment, 11% of voters – and 19% of independents – say they will vote for a minor party candidate.

"Voters think that Harris is prepared to be President for four years, 58-42%, and more narrowly, 51-48%, they say Trump is prepared. Not surprisingly, 88% of Democrats say Harris is prepared and 88% of Republicans say she is not. However, while 94% of Republicans say Trump is prepared, even one-quarter of Democrats concede he is prepared," Greenberg said. "Independents say Trump is prepared, 61-38%, but Harris is not prepared, 52-46%."

Voters Support Proposed Constitutional Amendment Called ERA on November's Ballot 3-to-1 "Democrats support New York's so-called ERA amendment – which adds anti-discrimination provisions to the State Constitution and protects abortion rights – by an overwhelming 89-7%. Independents support it 64-23%. Republicans oppose the amendment, 55 32%," Greenberg said. "While men support the amendment 56-31%, it is supported by women 79-15%. It is strongly supported in every region, and with white, Black and Latino voters."

Harris' growing lead in NY will help several democratic congressional candidates who are looking to defeat incumbent republican members of Congress. In Westchester, former Congressman Mondaire Jones is looking to defeat Congressman Mike Lawler, and three congressional races on Long Island and two in the Hudson Valley north of Westchester could decide which party has the majority in the House of Representatives in 2025.

Night Nurse Sentenced to 30 Days Jail for Endangering Mamaroneck Infant in Her Care

Defendant was captured on video slapping and shaking the five-week-old baby

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah announced today that a Brooklyn woman was sentenced Monday to 30 days of incarceration for endangering a 5-week-old infant who was in her care while employed as a night nurse.

DA Rocah said: "This defendant violated her professional and moral responsibilities when she repeatedly struck a defenseless newborn in her care. We hope that today's sentence ensures the defendant will not be able to harm any other children in the future."

In addition to 30 days in jail, the defendant, Gwendolyn Blake, 40, was also sentenced to three years of probation by Judge Ronald Meister in the Town of Mamaroneck Justice Court after pleading guilty in May to two misdemeanor counts of Endangering the Welfare of a Child. As a condition of her probation, the defendant is prohibited from working with the elderly, the young or any other vulnerable population. The court also issued a permanent order of protection. The DA's Office recommended 60 days of incarceration.

On Aug. 30, 2023, at approximately 6 a.m., the defendant, who was employed as a night nurse to care for a family's newborn in their home in the Town of Mamaroneck, struck the baby while he was crying. The defendant, on the following day, repeatedly slapped the infant's face, grabbed his head and shook him. Both incidents were captured on surveillance video.

Following an investigation, the Town of Mamaroneck Police Department arrested the defendant on Sept. 5, 2023.

In a statement to the court, the victim's parents said: "This is a preemie who is colicky because of his low birth weight and instead of being treated with love and compassion, he was abused for being in pain.... This has been a nightmare for our sons, our family, and our community. We will never be able to trust anyone with our children and are overly skeptical of anyone they interact with.... Gwen Blake knew what she was doing behind closed doors, lied to our faces, and went about her business every single day seemingly without a care in the world. She is violent and poses a significant risk to innocent families."

One person is law enforcement told us, "It's \$50,000. After the attorney takes a third, what will Hector come home with?"

Others are not happy that Santiago got anything from the City, and its taxpayers. "I watched the video. He was asked to leave numerous times and <u>re</u>fused. Eventually, he had to be let out of the chambers. That seems reasonable to me. I'm more concerned about the sex abuse settlements from the 1970's that we are paying. I wish you would cover that and total that up," said a Yonkers homeowner.

We wrote two stories about the incident, and our relationship with Santiago. I appreciated the work that he did with the police and Stop & Shake, and was happy to report on his good community work.

But I was disturbed by what I saw on the video. The Council chambers that evening were getting a little crazy. Councilmembers and the public started getting into heated exchanges, and that tension is also related to what happened between Santiago and a few Yonkers cops.

The police report from that night includes- "While at scene the room was filled to capacity and tensions began to escalate as speakers from the public discussed City matters for 3 minutes at a time. While City council members were addressing the room several arguments began to erupt between the occupants of the chamber. The City Council President (Lakeisha Collins Bellamy) on several occasions advised the patrons in the room that if any individual continues to be unruly, they would be asked to leave.

"An argument began to escalate in my proximity between a male Hispanic (later identified as Hector Santiago S1) and several males. Mr. Santiago(S1) was also standing up and yelling at the City Council members. Mr. Santiago was cupping his hands around his mouth to amplify his voice which continued to disrupt the proceedings. As Mr. Santiago continued to yell at the city council, the City Council President again asked for order several times referring to the crowd.

"As the crowd began to settle, Mr. Santiago continued to amplify his voice by again cupping his mouth and directing his words at the city council causing the proceedings to cease and numerous people to redirect their attention away from the meeting and towards his actions.

"The assigned Detective then approached Mr. Santiago with the intent to speak with him and defuse the situation. With a low even tone I asked Mr. Santiago to lower his voice. Mr. Santiago then shouted at me stating "Fuck That Tell that shit to these guys" pointing in the direction of other members of the chamber.

"I again advised Mr. Santiago to lower his voice to which he responded, "I don't have to do shit!" I then advised Mr. Santiago that if he did not cease his actions, I would have to escort him out of the chamber in order to allow the proceedings to continue peacefully. Mr. Santiago then turned towards me in an argumentative manner and shouted "I ain't going nowhere!" causing several people to turn and look to see what was going on. I then advised Mr. Santiago that due to his actions he had to leave the Chamber.

"The assigned Detective then attempted to guide Mr. Santiago in the direction of the exit by placing my hand at the small of his back. Mr. Santiago continued to yell, causing several people in the chamber to respond to our side of the room to see what was happening and again redirect their attention away from the meeting.

"Mr. Santiago was then escorted out of the chambers. As the assigned Detective began to guide Mr. Santiago towards the stairway area, Mr. Santiago yelled "Get the Fuck Off of me!" and struck the assigned Detective in the chest and neck area with his left elbow and forearm with an upward motion forcefully jolting me back. At this time the assigned quickly reacted and struck Mr. Santiago once with a closed fist in the face in order to stop his actions and to place him under arrest.

"The assigned Detective then attempted to detain Mr. Santiago by grabbing a hold of his upper torso. As he continued to actively resist by turning away from me and refusing to comply, numerous Officers then grabbed hold of Mr. Santiago and took him to the ground. Detective Specialist Licht was then able to place Mr. Santiago under arrest without further incident," end of report.

Santiago denies almost everything in the Police report and has a different version of events. "For clarification, There was no fight, I did not argue with anyone sitting in the benches, nor was I attempting to "resist"... I have been working in the field long enough to know how that plays out .. However, I now understand how "Stop Resisting" is used to gaslight audience

"After being manhandled by police out of the city council chambers, I was struck in the face and tackled to the ground while in a cast & sling from shoulder surgery I just got. This ordeal has put my healing journey in real jeopardy.

"I was accused & arrested by a plain clothed new Rochelle detective but was taken to Yonkers jail.

"The 8 years that I put in for Stop & Shake is gone. I know the routine, but when I got to the hallway I was assaulted and arrested by a New Rochelle police officer. I had surgery on my rotator cuff and was not involved in any fight. One Yonkers police officer recognized me and helped me get into the lobby. City Hall has no cameras. I thought that the council chambers would be a safe place for me to be," said Santiago, in several interviews with us 2 years ago. He was charged with obstructing justice, resisting arrest and disorderly conduct.

We spoke to Santiago who told us he believes the video shows a highly charged police officer strike at him.

The City Council has to approve any settlement made by the City's Corporation Counsel and Law Department. We have not seen a council agenda with this item on it, and the council only meets once in the summer.

This item will probably on the agenda in September. Usually, in settlements, the council rubber stamps the settlement, after being advised by counsel that this is the best legal option for the city and its taxpayers.

There are some who believe that Santiago was simply expressing his constitutionally protected free speech in the council chambers and the police are at fault.

Yonkers resident Eileen O'Connor, posted two years about her recollections of the council meeting that night." I witnessed this event at Yonkers City Hall at the City Council meeting, and it made me sick and angry. Hector was standing in back of me telling Tasha Diaz to "stop talking and Vote".. He repeated that several times, then was surrounded by Black shirts who told him they wanted to talk with him outside. No IDs as cops; couldn't tell who they were. They force walked him outside the Chamber to the hall and that's where I lost sight of him.

"The Black shirts triggered this incident. Hector Santiago, founder of Stop and Shake, was a casualty of police/black shirt violence. Despicable. The Yonkers underbelly was on full view both nights. I see this as a call to all decent minded people to stand up to this mob/goon mindset. The Yonkers City Council needs to stand up and start showing leadership here. The statements made by the YCP president and Councilwoman Tasha Diaz set the stage for this. It all seemed orchestrated."

Ratepayers Mobilize for Utility Justice

Activists from 17 states across the nation are launching a week of action to demand utility justice, holding for-profit utility companies accountable for hiking prices and fueling the climate crisis. Climate activists and ratepayers are holding 25 coordinated actions in a nation-wide escalation to address local utility issues and raise awareness around an industry that has monopoly power and is central to the climate crisis.

Led by People's Action Institute and 350 Network Council, coordinated actions are part of a national trend to hold utility companies accountable for price hikes and greenwashing. According to consumer price index data provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, average electricity prices for families in the United States have been raised nearly 31 percent since 2021. With longer and hotter summers, many people are at a breaking point.

"Instead of prioritizing clean and affordable energy, for-profit utility corporations hike rates on families, making it more expensive to heat and cool our homes while they are burning the planet," said Sophia Cheng, Climate Justice Campaign Director at People's Action Institute. "Across the country, people are speaking out because we are at a crossroads. We can keep paying utility corporations more each year to enrich CEOs profiting off of dirty power, or we can demand a transition to affordable, clean energy with public oversight and authority."

Years of organizing has yielded a massive federal investment in clean, reliable energy, but instead of seizing this opportunity, many utility corporations are doubling down on fossil gas and other harmful fuels while they hike rates across the country.

In Nevada, members of Progressive Leadership Alliance Nevada are protesting to stop NVEnergy from nearly tripling proposed service charges of \$16.50 to \$44.40. In Buffalo, New York, People United for Sustainable Housing are calling for corporate accountability and pushing back against National Fuel's proposal to hike rates nearly 13.7%. Rights and Democracy New Hampshire and 350 New Hampshire are rallying in Manchester, NH to protest Eversource's call for a 42% rate hike.

A recent study found that 27% of Americans struggled to pay utility bills or kept their homes at an unsafe temperature due to cost concerns. In addition to fighting back against rate hikes, activists across the country are organizing to stop expansions of dirty power and pressuring lawmakers to stop taking political contributions from for-profit utility corporations they are responsible for regulating.



"It is time to question not only where our energy is coming from, but how decisions are made by utility companies and who benefits from those decisions," said Chantelle Rioux, 350NH, of 350 Network Council. "For too long, for-profit utility companies have used their deep pockets and monopoly power to hike up energy prices, while buying political influence and dragging their feet on the urgent change that is needed."

Activists point out that there is not only momentum for change: there is money. The two-year-old Inflation Reduction Act unlocked \$369 billion in federal investments to support the transition to 100% clean, renewable energy.

"It does not take an expert to know that for-profit utility companies cannot keep taking more money from families only to double down on fossil fuels that are making our planet too hot to live on," said Rioux. "There is public will and unprecedented funding on the table to enact change and we are ready to fight for it."

The American Friends of Lafayette is celebrating that visit to Westchester. There will be three buses on 150 people traveling along Route 1 including a Lafayette interpreter and Virginie Lafayette, a direct descendant.

The communities along the way will be sponsoring free Lafayette Day activities in recognition of this event. Bring your family. Bring your friends. Spread the word. Connect to this bicentennial event in American history.

1:00-3:00 Ruby Dee Library Park, New Rochelle

The Huguenot & New Rochelle Historical Association and the Thomas Paine Cottage will have a family programming day that will depict life in New Rochelle at the time of Lafayette's visit. It will be similar to a Colonial Fair. It will have reenactors, music, petting zoo and interactive activities for the children. This event commemorates Lafayette's historic visit to Penfield's Square House Inn and Tavern, now part of the Rye Historical Society, where he dined with his son George Washington Lafayette during his 1824 tour of New York. Cell Phone Ban in Schools, continued from pg 1-

According to a Pew Research survey released in June, 72 percent of high school teachers nationwide say student distraction with cell phones is a major problem in their classrooms. As part of her commitment to address this issue and create more positive outcomes for students, families, and educators, Gov. Hochul stated this spring that she plans to propose a statewide policy to address excessive smartphone use in schools.

Hochul added that many schools across the state currently have individual policies that seek to address cell phone use in their classrooms. We were not able to find a list of NY school districts that have banned student cell phones, but we four upstate; the Hoosick Falls SD, the Schoharie school district. the Newburgh School district high school and the Middletown School district.

The roundtable was held at the Yonkers Public Schools Board of Education and included State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, State Senator Shelley Mayer, Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano, and County Executive George Latimer.

Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins said, "We are here today with a shared goal of discussing how to best move forward to foster an educational environment that maximizes student learning and supports student mental well-being. I want to thank Governor Kathy Hochul for bringing together stakeholders to discuss how smartphone use in our schools impacts the learning environment and student mental health, and to explore potential ways to address this issue. Our work demands that we confront the challenges that arise in modern life, including the new opportunities brought by advances in technology."

State Senator Shelley B. Mayer said, "I deeply applaud Governor Hochul for organizing this important roundtable and drawing attention to the challenges of cell phone use in schools. We had a productive conversation about how to combat children's cell phone addiction to improve social interaction, mental health, and academic opportunities. Thank you to Governor Hochul and her team for convening this roundtable and to the City of Yonkers for hosting it."

Mayor Mike Spano said, "The City of Yonkers and Yonkers Public Schools were proud to serve as the host City and District for this important roundtable. It's critically important to gain perspective from all over the state about how this will impact the academic day, our students, our teachers, and our administrators. Technology has no doubt evolved and can be used to enhance learning, but it should not restrict our children from socializing and staying on task academically."

While Hochul has yet to reveal any draft proposal or details of her plan, concerns have already been raised about who will pay for the cell phone pouches that students would be required to place their phones in when they come to school. State legislators want the state to pay the cost, while Hochul so far, has been non-committal on who would have to pay. The states of Pennsylvania and Delaware have allocated funds for school districts to use to pay for cell phone pouches.

Other education groups have called for the decision to ban cell phones in schools to remain in local control and come from local schools or school boards.

The States of Florida, Virginia, South Carolina, Indiana and Louisiana, and the Los Angeles school district, the second largest school district in the US, have already banned cell phone use by students in schools, and have either implemented the plan or will do so this school year.

The NY State United Teachers Union, and the NYS Parents Association, have both indicated support for Hochul's plan. But some parents are already asking for their children to be allowed to use their cell phones during lunch recess. Other concerns about a ban are if some students use their cell phones for art classes, or for after school jobs.

Hochul is opposed to letting each school district decide whether to ban or not to ban cell phones. "It seems to me that a district-by-district approach does not work, and I don't anticipate that a piecemeal approach will be my approach," said Hochul.

Other concerns some parents have raised involve reaching their student-child during an emergency, including gun violence in school.

It is unclear if the ban would extend to SUNY college students.

Who will be responsible to enforce the ban is another unresolved issue, with teachers indicating that they don't want to be the cell-phone police.
