"For the past 12 months, I have been harassed by so-called "activists and community leaders", when in reality they are anarchists and extortionists. I applaud the council members for sitting through two nights of commentary by city employees and residents. It was the political theater at its best, just blocks from Lionsgate. The individual members made up their minds even before the Council President presented the legislation in the rules committee. She would have never put it forward if she didn't have the votes.

There were a few unscripted surprises. Mike Breen parted with the Yonkers

Westchester County Board Bans Sale of Flavored Tobacco-Menthol Cigs 11-6 Vote





County Legislators Johnson, Alvardo vote Yes County Legislators Tubiolo and Nolan vote no

On Nov. 28, the Westchester Board of Legislators (BOL) passed a bill banning the retail sale and distribution of flavored tobacco products in Westchester County. The final vote was 11-6 and was closer than some had believed. When enforced in six months, the legislation will be one of the most comprehensive in the state by banning all tobacco flavors, including menthol, mint, and wintergreen.

"This is a positive step for public health in Westchester County. It is good policy and protects the vulnerable from continuing to be exploited by Big Tobacco. We seized an opportunity to shield our citizens, especially children from the challenges of nicotine addiction and related health risks," remarked Legislator Williams Johnson, sponsor of the bill and Chair of the Committee on Health, "In passing this legislation, our Board has set an example for other jurisdictions to follow. The lives of our children and families are worth so much more than the millions of dollars tobacco manufacturers make from the intentional, long-term destruction of our communities."

"People under 25 are more susceptible to nicotine dependency because the human brain is still developing. Menthol enhances the effects of nicotine on the brain leading to lower impulse control and higher risks of lifelong addiction. By banning these lethal products, we are going to save lives," Chairwoman Catherine Borgia commented, "I congratulate Health Committee Chair Legislator Williams Johnson for her tenacity in getting this legislation over the finish line."

Majority Leader Legislator Christopher Johnson added, "The road to getting this bill passed was full of roadblocks. But, even with intense pressure from the tobacco industry, we remained resilient to make Westchester pioneers in the fight against flavored tobacco. We urge our counterparts in other counties to do the same."

Six county legislators voted no. They are, Legislators Ben Boykin, James Nolan, David Tubiolo, Margaret Cunzio, Terry Clements and Tyrae Woodson-Samuels.

Yonkers Zoning Board of Appeals Launches New Webpage & Public Comment Portal

Board Agendas, Schedules, Applications, Archives & More Available at www. YonkersNY.gov/ZBA

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano announced the City's Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) launched its new webpage, www.yonkersny.gov/ZBA, in its continued efforts to provide more transparency and accessibility for residents. In cooperation with the City's Department of Housing and Buildings (DHB), the ZBA page allows the public to access agenda items, schedules, zoning applications, archives and portal to provide public comment. All public notices also will feature a custom QR code, linking directly to the new ZBA webpage.

"One of our responsibilities in government is to provide residents the tools they need to be active and effective members of their community," said Mayor Spano. "The Yonkers ZBA, led by Wilson Kimball, understands that accessible government is good government when implementing these changes. With these new, yet simple features to our website, Yonkers is encouraging the public to be part of the decision making process that can affect them and their neighbors."

"Mayor Spano tasked the Department of Housing and Building and I with improving customer service in regard to the ZBA. I want to thank the Mayor, the City's DHB and IT departments and the ZBA Board for working hand and hand to make these changes possible," commented Wilson Kimball, Yonkers ZBA Chairperson.

The Zoning Board of Appeals is a seven-member board appointed by the Mayor. The Board hears petitions for area and use variances from the Zoning Ordinance along with appeals from the interpretation of the Commissioner of the Department of Housing and Buildings. Meetings are usually held on the third Tuesday of each month in the Ceremonial Court at Yonkers City Hall at 6:00 p.m. All applications to the Board must be filed at least 22 days prior to the meeting and are filed and processed in the Department of Housing and Buildings. The agenda is prepared by the DBH and is published in the required news publications.



Yonkers Man Sentenced to 17 Years for Violent Hate Crime Against Asian Woman



Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah and Yonkers Police Commissioner Christopher Sapienza announced that Yonkers resident Tammel Esco, 42, was sentenced on November 29, 2022, to $17\frac{1}{2}$ years in state prison for the March 2022 violent hate crime against a 67-year-old Asian woman in Yonkers. The defendant, who pled guilty on September 27, 2022, to Assault in the First Degree as a Hate Crime, a violent felony, has been held without bail since his arrest by the Yonkers Police Department on March 11, 2022, the day of the attack.

DA Rocah said: "Today we close a chapter on one of the most vicious and shocking hate crimes we've seen in Westchester County. The successful prosecution of this case is the result of the courage and cooperation of the victim and her family, the partnership of the Yonkers Police Department, and our dedicated team who worked tirelessly on behalf of the victim. This is a case that has traumatized not only the victim and her family, but also her neighbors, the Westchester community, and the broader Asian American and Pacific Islander community. As Westchester DA, I remain unequivocally committed to seeking justice for victims of violent crime and fighting hate in all forms."

Commissioner Sapienza said: "Tammel Esco brutally assaulted an innocent victim in a hate-filled attack; he will now spend the next seventeen years of his life in prison as a consequence of his actions. I only hope the victim and her family can find some degree of peace now that justice has been served. Let this sentence be a clear message to others who would perpetrate violence in our communities, that Yonkers and Westchester law enforcement will commit every resource to hold violent criminals accountable. I extend my sincere gratitude to the Westchester County District Attorney's Office for prosecuting this case with maximum effort, and our Yonkers Police Officers and Detectives for their diligent response and investigation."

On March 11, 2022, at approximately 6:07 p.m., the defendant yelled at the victim, who is of Filipino descent, that she was an "Asian bitch." The defendant then approached the victim from behind as she entered the vestibule of her apartment building on Riverdale Avenue in Yonkers and punched her in the head, knocking her to the ground. The defendant continued to punch the victim more than 100 times, repeatedly stomped on her upper body in his construction boots, and then spit on her. The victim and defendant both lived in the same building.

The Yonkers Police Department arrested the defendant shortly after the incident, which was captured on video surveillance.

The victim was transported to Westchester Medical Center in Valhalla, where she was treated for bleeding on the brain, multiple facial fractures, and bruising and lacerations to her head and face.

The victim appeared in court to read her impact statement: "Because of the viciousness and hate of Tammel Esco, I lost the place I called home for over 24 years, the place where I raised my daughters, and my longtime neighbors... As the attack happened, all I could think was, 'Please Lord let me live, please Lord my daughters need me.' A complete stranger heartlessly spit, beat and kicked me over 100 times just because of my heritage... My only hope is that God and the criminal justice system will see fit to make sure this never happens to any other innocent family again."







Term Limits Council Meeting Brings Me Back in Time-By Dan Murphy

The Yonkers City Council meeting held on Nov. 22, to consider extending term-limits for the Mayor and Council to 4 terms (16 years) was one of the wild Yonkers Council meetings that covered close to 20 years ago.

Emotions on both sides of the issue resulted in an enflamed public in attendance.

I believe that this passion for or against term limits, came to a boil in the council chambers as a result of the toxic, online and social media presence covering Yonkers politics.

I wrote about Mayor Spano considering a 4th term over the summer. I have been talking to many elected officials and democrats and republicans, about what will happen when and if term limits would be on the council agenda at the end of the year. Some of my conversations focused on the belief that the Mayor would not run for a fourth term.

In the early fall, a rally was held in opposition to changing term limits. Five people showed up. Many of the prominent Yonkers democrats did not take a stand on this issue.

Onto the council meeting Nov. 22. The crowd overflowed into the hallway. Several attendees were asked to leave the chambers. One of those persons was Hector Santiago, the Stop and Shake founder.

A video from the chambers shows police officers not in uniform escorting Santiago into the hallway. Santiago says that he was assaulted by a police officer in the hallway. The Yonkers Police say that "Hector was being escorted from the chambers for unruly behavior; in the hallway, he struck a detective; the detective struck him back, the group fell to the floor, and he was placed under arrest. This incident, like all criminal incidents, will be adjudicated in a court of law with due process afforded to all parties," said YPD Lt. Dean Politopoulos

We still don't have the police report. Santiago is considering legal action. It is unfortunate that Hector had to spend the night in jail. More to come.

The Council vote was 4-3. Three members of the council, Councilwoman Corazon Pineda-Isaac, and Councilmen John Rubbo and Anthony Merante are either considering a run for Mayor or have considered it recently. Rubbo voted for extending term limits so he is not expected to run, but look for Merante and Pineda-Isaac, who both voted against extending term limits, to make an announcement in the spring.

Council President Lakisha Collins-Bellamy and Council Majority Leader Tasha Diaz were both criticized by many in attendance for their vote in favor of extending term limits. Council President Collins-Bellamy ran a council meeting with one of the more raucous crowds that I have seen in 20 years. She did the best that anyone could have done, except if she cleared the chambers of visitors.

And she explained her vote, and put to rest any rumors about her becoming a city judge or members of her family and city jobs.

Majority Leader Diaz also responded to accusations made against her, online, and in the audience. She also explained her comments that night in an OP-Ed in our paper on pg 1. We reviewed the video and found Diaz responding not only to members of the audience, but her fellow members of the council, to what she thought was hypocritical behavior. She was loud, but wanted to get her point

GOP and voted in favor of extending term limits. Chairman John Larkin released a statement condemning the extension of term limits by council vote. The Yonkers GOP would have preferred to see a referendum, giving residents a voice in the legislation. However, Breen's defection should not be seen as a surprise. He attempted the assembly race without Spano support and did not succeed.

In the few pieces of legislation Breen has initiated, he seems to favor the mayors' need. The removal of the PE designation from the commissioner of building's requirement was bad legislation. Breen equates that to a hospital administrator not being a physician, a flawed analogy. The mayor is the administrator, and the commissioner is the department head. How many hospitals hire an accountant to run anesthesiology? And let's not forget that it was Breen who introduced the legislation to extend term limits in 2018.

Corazon Pineda-Issacs presented a concise and cogent argument against extending term limits. In retrospect, this should not be seen as a surprise either. Her words were eloquent, and her analogies were spot on. The council spent six weeks debating how trash should be picked up, but ten days on voting rights.

The real surprises came when the Council President and Majority Leader spoke. Lakisha Collins-Bellamy suffered a family tragedy and deserves credit for placing her duties in front of family obligations. She took the opportunity to set the record straight before her vote. Although this was not the right venue, I understand the emotion.

Tasha Diaz was completely out of line. She must have felt that the Council President's speech would eclipse her "shining" star. Diaz addressed and disparaged her constituents and members of the gallery. Council members are not to enter into discussions with the gallery. Her words were inflammatory, which led to an altercation in the gallery and an arrest. She once again proved her unsuitability for public

Politicians and elected officials need to have thick skin. If you can't take criticism, find another profession. If you think you can make everyone happy, you are deluded. Tuesday night's performance by the council was an embarrassment to our city

The subject of term limits and the irrational behavior of some council members is not about the mayor or his performance. Mike Spano has achieved a lot for Yonkers in the last four years. I don't think we would have gotten here without Spano and his team at the helm, but legislation cannot be about one person. I advocated for a third term, because in 2018 Yonkers was in a financial mess and Mayor Mike

had the trust of Governor Cuomo. While the mayor has done a good job in the last four years, he is not the only person capable of running this city and we are not in the same dire position as 2018.

This saga is far from over! This, too is the corrupt, self serving politics of Yonkers!



On This Day in Yonkers History...



A young Mark Twain lived in Yonkers

Monday, December 5th

December 5, 1905: A large number of men and women from Yonkers attended a dinner at Delmonico's, honoring Mark Twain on his seventieth birthday. Twain had lived in Yonkers for a year at at 523 Riverdale Avenue.

December 5, 1917: City Hall was bombarded with complaints about trash not being collected. The Commissioner of Public Works was blamed; shortly after the election, he said he did not have money to pay men for the rest of the year, so dismissed all the workers and teams in his department. John Fry, President of the Real Estate Board of the Chamber of Commerce, stated that conditions had gotten so bad it was "becoming a menace to public health."

Tuesday December 6th

December 6, 1905: Harper Brothers, after purchasing Metropolitan Magazine and the Daily Telegraph, appointed John Kendrick Bangs of Yonkers its editor.

December 6, 1918: Former President William Howard Taft visited Yonkers and spoke at the British Day Celebration Committee meeting held at the new Armory on North Broadway.

December 6, 1935: Head Librarian Grinton Will was notified approval of a third mural for the Yonkers Public Library Children's Room was given by the Works Progress Administration. The mural was to be painted by Yonkers artist David Hutchinson who created the two already installed in the Children's Room. One of the murals currently is on display at Will Library on Central Park Avenue; the others are in storage.

Wednesday December 7th

December 7, 1867: Yonkers resident Charles Thompson demonstrated and promoted a cable-driven passenger railway, the West Side and Yonkers Patent Railway.

December 7, 1909: Leo Backeland patented Bakelite, the first thermosetting plastic.

December 7, 1926: Mayor William Walsh announced he wanted the Common Council to change the name of Trevor Park; he wanted it named after a "more direct benefactor to the city."

Thursday, December 8th:

December 8, 1922: Although told by the State Prison Commission they needed to upgrade our city jail or build a new one, City officials appeal before them to explain why they could not. Their excuse was the extensive school building program Yonkers had adopted to the tune of \$3,000,000. After listening to the arguments of Mayor Taussig and Corporation Counsel Lewis, Commission President Thomas Kennedy ruled the new jail could be deferred... temporarily.

December 8, 1950: Lieutenant Colonel Douglas Crier passed away. He served our country twice, once as a young man in the World War and the second during WW II, when he was appointed commander of the 23rd internal security Battalion. At the time of his passing, he not only was President of the NAACP, he was the Yonkers City Court Bookkeeper in charge of collecting fees.

Friday, December 9th:

December 9, 1936: Yonkers WPA workers anxiously waited confirmation of the rumor that WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins had stopped the wholesale dismissals of program workers throughout the country. Hopkins had a Yonkers connection; his sister Adah Hopkins Aime lived on Hawthorne Avenue and had served as Executive Secretary of the Yonkers Red Cross.

December 9, 1947: The Yonkers Common Council changed zoning on cityowned property in the western portion of the former Untermyer estate, hoping to tighten building restriction. The move changed zoning from an "S" to an "S-1," increasing the size of a residence to 10,000 square feet. This followed a recommendation of the City Planning Board to maintain the "open character of the property retained as much as possible."

Saturday, December 10th:

December 10, 1924: Workmen excavating on McLean Avenue near Harding Avenue unearthed two skulls believed to be those of Native Americans. Historians

Legislator Woodson-Samuels said, "My community was not involved in this discussion, they are not around listening to committee meetings. History shows us prohibitions don't work, and bans don't work. We should be enforcing the laws on the books, and incorporating more education. Whether its levying a tax on these products to work with partents and schools to protect their children from these products. If the youth are getting their hands on these products, they are getting them illegally, from a black market that will exasperate. I grew up on the south side of Mt. Vernon. We all know there has been many examples in history where the intention was good but the repercussions unforseen, and my community always bears the brunt. I stand opposed to this legislation. I'm going to stand with Eric Garner's mother and black law enforcement. This has not been an impartial, balanced process."

Legislator Terry Clements said, "Some thing don't require legislation, they require education."

Legislator James Nolan said, "I don't smoke but its my choice, and it should be anyone's choice if they want to continue to do it. The government should not step into anybody's life and do this. It's an 8 minute drive to the Bronx from my district, which makes it easy to open up the black market. Teenagers are getting it right now, and small business have reached out and said we don't want this. So when you run for reelection next year, don't ask for their support."

Legislator David Tubiolo said, "I have concerns of unitended consequences. My constituents in Mt. Vernon and Yonkers have grave concerns about the unintended consequences. Maybe we should be discussing banning all cigarettes."

Legislator Ben Boykin said, "The companies making these products target people of color, and people of color lack access to health care. This board has taken steps to raise the age to 21, but they are still gettingh access and smoking. While I do believe that this is well intended legislation, it does not stop solve the probme of getting access to menthol products and using them. I am also troubled that this legislation is targeting a certain population. Prohibiton does not work."

Legislator Jose Alvarado said, "I support this legislation but this is not a silver bullet. Twenty years ago, we banned smoking in restaurants and it was a move in the right direction. I have kids and my older kid was exposed to smoking in school. I am hoping that the access of flavored tobacco will be reduced. Let's invest in patches and other ways to help people break away from being hooked."

Legislator Damon Maher said, "We are working against powerful forces. This seems like common sense to many of us. If Hazel Dukes and the NAACP supports this legislation, that means something to me. This is not a right that we are taking away, its a burden that we are lifting from people. If you are pushing and selling tobacco, knowing what we know, you have no shame."

Legislator MaryJane Shimsky said, "I started smoking when I was in high school for 15 years. I started with Marlboro's and it made me sick, and I found the wonders of menthol. People who are smoking have been purposely addicted by an industry that is a death factor. We are not in a position to ban tobacco products entirely, but we can look at the public health consequences of flavored tobacco."

Majority Leader Johnson added, "This is not a bad police bill its a public health bill. When someone is thrown to the floor that is bad policing. And the idea that we will lose \$40 million in economic impact is absurd."


Kevin O'Flaherty, Director of Advocacy for the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, said after the vote, "Today, the Westchester County Board of Legislators voted to end the sale of flavored tobacco products. Not only will this landmark legislation save lives by protecting kids from the deadly consequences of smoking, but it also promises to advance health equity throughout the County. We urge County Executive George Latimer to sign the bill into law without delay."

Speakers at the meeting included Gwen Carr, who lost her son Eric Garner at the hands of the NYPD while he was selling "loosies" or single cigarettes. "I do not smoke, but i just think that this is a racist bill because they are only talking about menthol cigarettes. Why don't you ban all cigarettes? But you aren't touching Marlboro Country. 85% of black and brown people choose to smoke menthol, and my son died because of unintended consequences."

Damon Jones, Publisher of Black Westchester Magazine and a member of Black Men in Law Enforcement said, "I am appalled listening to black people endorse a bill that punishes black people. I understand that we want to save our children, but its already prohibited to sell products under the age of 21. The law is not working and there is no enforcement. If you want to save the black community, Mt. Vernon doesn't have a full functioning hospital. Are we about black people's health? This is hypocrisy, unless you ban all cigarettes. But white folks smoke the other kind."

Dr. Hazel Dukes, president of the New York State Conference of the NAACP, and Legislator Jewel Williams Johnson, wrote the op-ed in Amsterdam News last week that directly addresses the argument raised in the Board's meeting this evening that the proposed ban will lead to further criminalization of members of the Black community in Westchester County

Enforcement of this ban will rest solely with the County Department of Health and not by any other agency, especially not those responsible for criminal law enforcement. There are no criminal penalties to individuals for using flavored tobacco products, however fines will be issued to businesses found out of compliance.

at the time believed the skulls belonged to members of Chief Nimham's tribe, who assisted the American forces against the British.

December 10, 1936: Author Charles Driscoll of Park Hill, an authority on Pirate Lore, sent out his pirate-theme Christmas cards with a bit of "spice." A vocal member of the defunct First National Bank of Yonkers' Depositors Committee, his card showed one pirate forcing two others to walk the plank, with the legend on the back, ".... The approach of the holy season of Christmas always reminds me that ten million of us were robbed of our savings in March 1933."

Sunday, December 11th:

December 11, 1949: Colonial Heights' William C. Handy, universally recognized as the "Father of the Blues," edited and updated a book he published in 1926. "A Treasury of the Blues... Complete Words and Music of 67 Great Songs from Memphis Blues to the Present Day" contained pieces "simply arranged in convenient keys for the average singer and pianist."

December 11, 1955: Yonkers soon would have its first bank office in a railroad station! The First National Bank announced it would open a branch in the New York Central Railroad's Yonkers Station west of Larkin Plaza. You still can see the initials on the kiosk the bank used.




