

Dr. John A. Morgan-Yonkers First Black Doctor

Born and raised in Nevis, John Alexander Morgan came to New York in 1892 to attend Union Theological Seminary. After completing his studies, he enrolled at New York's Flower Hospital and Homeopathic College and earned his medical degree in 1900, one of four Black doctors licensed in NYS. He practiced first in Harlem, the neighborhood's second black doctor. He moved to Yonkers in 1904; not only was he the Terrace City's first Black doctor, he became one of Yonkers' most respected physicians, a leader in Homeopathic Medicine.

Shortly after the Morgan family moved here, fifty prominent residents surprised them, both welcoming them and pledging support to anyone needing Dr. Morgan's services. After several speeches of appreciation, caterer extraordinaire Francis Moultrie served his signature ice cream and delicious cake! The Morgans appreciated the sincere welcome and kindness their new community showed.

Dr. Morgan quickly became involved in Yonkers, regularly speaking at events, conferences, churches, athletic clubs, women's clubs and youth groups. Although his main concern was improvement of Black citizens' lives, he also spoke of the value of church membership and community service. He lectured on health issues, especially tuberculosis; he wanted Yonkers to know how to recognize it, treat it, and avoid it.

He addressed organized labor about helping the unemployed or needy. If an eloquent, passionate speaker was needed... he was there for Yonkers.

His son Adolphus tragically died in 1915, drowning in the Hudson near Habirshaw Wire's Glenwood plant. As the steamer Washington Irving sailed down the Hudson, Adolphus was swimming with two friends. A huge swell

Westchester Deputy County Executive Ken Jenkins, who served as the Chair of the NYS Independent Redistricting Commission, IRC, has completed what is almost an impossible task in today's hyper-partisan climate, when members of the IRC voted 9-1 to agree upon a set of congressional lines for New York's 26 districts.

The IRC was formed after New York voters passed a referendum in 2014 which called for the creation of the IRC, in the hopes that both parties could work together to come up with an acceptable, and fair set of congressional lines.

Yonkers City Council Approves \$8.5 Million Settlement from 2015 YPD Car Chase-Crash

The Yonkers City Council approved a settlement of \$8.5 Million stemming from a tragic high speed police chase and crash in 2015 at their meeting on Feb. 13. And combined with an earlier settlement of \$1.5 Million for this same accident, the matter is finally closed for the city and the victims.

The incident occured on Nov. 23, 2015, when Yonkers Police received a 911 call about two persons in a van breaking into parking meters. The same van was linked to a robbery earlier that day.

When YPD officers attempted to pull over the vehicle a high speed chase ensued, with estimated speeds of 90 MPH. When the van reached Warburton Ave. near the Greystone train station, it crossed over the yellow line and crashed into another vehicle traveling south.

The driver of the other vehicle, 46-year old Sharlene Stinson, died at the scene. The two persons in the van were teens. 16 year old Jerry Crawford died a Westchester Medical Center. The 14 year old, now 22 years old, identified as Sha'de Lane, suffered severe injuries that required 24 hour care.

The \$8.5 Million settlement is broken down as follows:

\$500,000.00 to pay an existing Medicaid lien.

\$500,000.00 to cover a loss of services claim to caretaker, Christine Vargas.

\$2,801,379.99 for attorney's fees.

\$1,448,620.01 for a trust for the victim, Sha'de Lane.

\$3,250,000.00 to three structured settlement annuities for Sha'de Lane.

Last year, the City Council approved a \$1.5 Million settlement for the family of Sharlene Stinson.

Both lawsuits claimed that Yonkers police conducted the high speed chase with a reckless disregard for public safety. But in approving the settlement, Council Anthony Merante said that Yonkers police did nothing wrong. "Corporation Counsel has recommended that we accept this settlement, but that night there were bad decisions made by kids, and parents, make sure you know who your kids are with. The police didn't do anything wrong that night. Today, the police might have backed off from the chase, but tonight the taxpayers have to pay for Police officers doing their job. I'm disappointed in the system."

The Council approved the settlment by a 6-0 vote, with Council President Collins-Bellamy absent.

Yonkers Democrats Endorse Latimer for Congress, Cacace for District Attorney

The Yonkers Democratic Executive Committee met on Feb.7 and endorsed George Latimer for Congress and Susan Cacace for District Attorney.

"I am so honored to have earned this endorsement," said Cacace. "As Democrats, we are leading the way in making our criminal justice system stronger and fairer by not only holding wrongdoers accountable, but also showing compassion and finding better ways to prevent crime and get at-risk people on a better track.

"I am officially announcing my endorsement of Yonkers native Judge Susan Cacace for Westchester County DA. Her immense experience as a former prosecutor and a County Court Judge make her uniquely qualified to be out next District Attorney," said Yonkers Democratic Chair Tom Meier

George Latimer was also selected by 80% of the weighted vote of the Democratic Exec. Committee, defeating Congressman Jamaal Bowman with 20%.

"We interviewed all of the candidates, and its obvious that the incumbent doesn't really embrace and respect the deemocratic party. He has ignored the party until he wants an endorsement. He is more of a Working Families Party candidate. The majority of our committee supports George Latimer for Congress."

Cacace defeated William Wagstaff in the exec. committee vote for DA by a 60%-40% margin. "Even though the party has spoken, it is disappointing -i'm that some members of the democratic party are not abiding by the results of the committee," said Meier. Both Bowman and Wagstaff are running in democratic primaries against Latimer and Cacace in June, and both have the WFP endorsements.





Stealing Ice Cream?

In the 'I thought I heard everything' column today, can you believe that thieves were caught stealing an Ice Cream Truck in West Haven, Ct. Monday night. The truck had about \$30,000 worth of the luscious dessert and was making a delivery in West Haven, parked in a parking lot when a 35 year old man stole the truck.

Was he after the truck? Nope. He was after the ice cream in the truck. We learned that more and more stores are locking up the ice cream that they sell to prevent thieves from stealing it. I guess if you have refrigeration capacities, the theft of ice cream is, no pun intended a hot commodity. Thieves sell the ice cream to dealers, stores and the general public in cash deals. Everyone loves ice cream, so if you can get a half gallon of Breyer's for \$2, it's a great deal if you own a grocery store and want to sell it for \$5 to customers. As long as you keep it frozen during movement from freezer to freezer, you are in good shape. You don't the product will drip out and make a bloody mess.

What is going on in this world? Do people feel they can steal whatever they want. You go into a grocery store or pretty much any type of store from Target to Stop and Shop to the neighborhood Bodega and so many products are locked up. It's so bad you can't purchase a bar of soap until someone in the store takes it out of a locked cabinet.

The thing that makes no sense is after the store clerk takes the product out of the case, they give it to you to hold on until you hit the register. If the item is small enough you put it in your pocket or pocketbook and can easily walk out of the store without paying for it. Chances are you can just walk out of the store with the item in hand and no one will notice. What should occur as that the item is brought by store staff to the register and you pick it up and pay for it when it's turn to pay for your order.

Let me give you another scenario of what I observed occurring at a local supermarket 2 weeks ago. Many people use hand held scanners when they are buying their groceries. Many people put groceries in their carts without scanning them. But this situation is a bit different. A man went to the grocery store and used the portable scanner. However, he didn't scan several packs of beer which he put in the underbelly of his shopping cart.

When you buy beer you are supposed to be carded for age by the sales clerk. The gentleman didn't scan the beer so the alert for the salesclerk to check his identification including date of birth never came up. He goes to walk passed the very effective sales clerk and she asked him if he forgot to scan the beer. He shows her his receipt on which she cannot find the beer. She. Tells him if he scanned the beer an alert would have come up for her to check his I.D. The receipt was very long, and he grabbed it from her hands and said I don't have time for this and walked out, free beer in tow.

Several issues here. The clerks at the various stores are told not to intervene in possible theft situations. Many of these stores have security guards and they too are not supposed to interfere. What then is the need for security guards? Why not let people run wild and free with the merchandise from the stores. The top management even penalizes clerks who interfere because they are told not to. Stores need to put active plans in place to prevent stealing.

Many stores in and around Yonkers employ Yonkers cops who are off duty to provide security. As one officer who was patrolling the store where the beer was stolen told me, they are told not to confront potential thieves by both the store management and those that assign them from the Police Department.

Bottom line is that the more things, whether it be ice cream, beer, or Gucci bags in Los Angelos get stolen, the higher prices will be for you and me. Bottom line. You must shop in a store that has active procedures in place to

WESTHAB Awarded \$240,000 From Keybank Foundation to Bring Tutorinig, College and Career Advising to Dayspring Teens

KeyBank Foundation awarded Westhab a \$240,000 multi-year grant to create a pipeline to college and careers for low-income students at Dayspring Community Center in Yonkers, NY. Starting September 2024, the program will support 30 9th- to 12th-grade students from Dayspring's youth program in proactively exploring and choosing the post-secondary path that suits them best.

To develop the program, Westhab will work with the Yonkers Partners In Education (YPIE), a Westchester-based nonprofit with expertise in ensuring students are ready for, enroll, and complete college. Staff will help students academically prepare for college and navigate and complete the college application process. For students not interested in college, staff will assess teens' skills and interests and, through partnerships with programmers and guest speakers, help inspire potential career pathways. Participants will be connected to additional supports, such as Dayspring's Employment Services, to help actualize their plans.

YPIE Executive Director Samuel Wallis shared his excitement about the project, "We are thrilled to partner with Westhab to ensure teens at Dayspring Community Center are prepared for success in college and careers. We know how important it is to meet students where they are, and we look forward to working with students in a trusted community center like Dayspring. We are grateful to KeyBank for its generous support to make this partnership – and critical service for students – possible."

Over three years, the program hopes to make more significant shifts in the trajectory of the community. "This generous investment by KeyBank Foundation will help individual students but also aims to create a more lasting change in the community by nurturing an ongoing college-ready culture for high school students. "We hope to broaden futures and disrupt cycles of inequality that we see in Nodine Hill," said Mr. Soto.

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Senate Passes Senator Mayer Bill to Establish Statewide Office of Flood Prevention/Mitigation

On February 13, the New York State Senate unanimously passed a bill sponsored by Senator Shelley B. Mayer to establish a cabinet level Office of Flood Prevention and Mitigation. The bill heads to the New York State Assembly for a vote and then, hopefully, to the Governor's desk for signature.

Through Mayer's legislation (S.3335), the Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation will be tasked with coordinating existing state work on flooding, supporting municipalities in their efforts to prevent and mitigate flooding, and researching flooding impacts and mitigation in New York.

New York State is facing intensifying climate change related hazards and storms, causing long term devastation. Westchester and the surrounding Hudson Valley, Long Island, and New York City in particular face challenges recovering from destructive storms and are often unable to fully recover from one storm before another one strikes. It remains critical to the future of the state that proactive measures are taken to abate flooding.

This legislation will assess the areas of the state and populations at greatest risk, identify the best current emerging practices in flood management, preparedness, and resiliency and make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature to help develop a high-level strategy for addressing flooding in our state.

From December to January, Senator Mayer conducted a survey of her constituents regarding their concerns and priorities. Twenty-five percent of the respondents marked Flooding and Climate Change as one of their top priorities.

Senator Shelley B. Mayer said, "I am very pleased that my bill, S.3335, to establish an Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation has passed the Senate. During severe storms like Hurricane Ida, we lost community members and countless people endured severe damage to their homes and more faced financial burden. Since Ida, residents and businesses in my district and in neighboring communities have been impacted by increasingly intense and frequent storms brought on by climate change, and are often hit with another downpour before they can rebuild. The Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation will provide New Yorkers with a strong, coordinated and strategic approach to tackling the effects of climate change, requiring all levels of government and agencies within government to work together to identify and execute mitigation and resiliency plans. It will help provide municipalities, counties, and individuals with the tools we need to tackle the scale of the work ahead."

Senator Pete Harckham, Chair of the Senate Committee on Environment Conservation, said, "People want meaningful action on the climate crisis, environmental protections and stormwater mitigation. To do so, we need to put as much effort as possible into passing climate and stormwater legislation this year to safeguard our communities statewide. The time for action is now, and I am grateful to my colleagues in the Senate for passing Senator Mayer's Office of Flood Mitigation and Prevention bill."

Assemblyman Steve Otis said, "Flood events and damage have become a frequent and repeated challenge throughout the state. Our state agencies have responded by offering more resources, expertise and guidance to local governments to address flood recovery, mitigation, and preparedness projects. A new State Office of Flood Prevention will be an added benefit. The unit will coordinate state agency assistance and provide a central office for local governments to access expertise from state government."

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said, "Westchester County is no stranger to the devastating impacts of flooding exacerbated by climate change. Senator Shelley Mayer's bill, establishing the Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation, marks a crucial step towards coordinated action. By pooling resources and fostering collaboration among municipalities, this initiative promises to empower our communities with effective strategies to combat flooding and safeguard our residents' well-being."

The Westchester SPCA has put out an urgent call to its supporters to help fund an effort to rescure at leat 40 cats and kittens found in a White Plains apartment.

"The SPCA's cat team is currently boots on the ground in White Plains in the midst of a horrific hoarding rescue. Our Humane Law Enforcement Unit received an urgent call from a landlord after neighbors began complaining of a deathly smell coming from an apartment in their building. Our officers quickly responded and so far have discovered nearly 40 terrified cats living in filth and garbage. All of the cats are dehydrated and most are sick and suffering with severe upper respiratory and eye infections. One of the cats just gave birth to a single tiny kitten who is clinging to life and was found on the cold floor, living in mounds of feces.


"Food and water stations have been set up and we anticipate it will take days to capture everyone. While it's hard to assess how many more cats could be living in the ceiling and furniture, our team will not stop until every single one is rescued. All of these poor felines have been neglected for far too long and desperately need medical care, as well as time, to recover both physically and emotionally.

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On This Day in Yonkers History...

Monday, February 26th

February 26, 1934: The funeral for hero Yonkers Police Officer Patrick Whalen was held at St. Denis Church. Whalen gave his life rescuing a child in the RKO disaster.

As his cortege traveled through Getty Square, hundreds stood at attention saluted as the cars passed. When they passed the RKO building, the Police Band played a dirge; when the cars passed St. Mary's, the church bells played "Nearer my God to Thee" and "Lead, Kindly Light." St. Mary's students lined South Broadway in front of the church to pay tribute to the hero who died saving one of their schoolmates.

St. Denis Church overflowed with people from all faiths, retired and active police officers, city officials, friends, and people wanting to pay respects to this hero officer.

Tuesday, February 27th

February 27, 1941: Reports of a kidnapped baby in the Square sent YPD into action! When the mom saw her baby was gone, she ran to Getty Square Traffic Officer Gizicky who immediately contacted Lieutenant Comey. The alarm went out over the police radio system immediately, and patrol cars responded quickly with sirens blaring. They conducted a wide area hunt and quickly found the missing baby! None of the kind responding officers officially reported the incident. Why? Mom had left the baby in a carriage when she went to shop in Grant's, what moms did in those days. She met a friend, chatted, and browsed several counters; when she went outside, her baby was gone! How did our brave officers find her little one so quickly? Mom had left the baby in its carriage inside the store entrance, not outside.

Wednesday, February 28th

February 28, 1939: Common Council President Albert Fiorillo received a threatening letter but didn't flinch! Police Chief Edward Quirk ordered protection for the Council and assigned Detective William Daly to keep an eye on the Aldermen. The City Hall maintenance crew cleared the Council chamber, carefully inspecting it to ensure bombs weren't hidden in corners, under desks or benches.

According to The Herald Statesman, "The Aldermen didn't bat an eyelash... but welcomed the anonymous menace as an excuse for an outbreak of shenanigans that made the machinations of an old-time Bolshevik conspiracy fade into insignificance." Instead, they played pranks on each other, hiding a cigar box with a long string under a desk or leaving a note written in red ink on a desk. Blocks of wood were pretend bombs. Someone planted a fake bomb on Ninth Ward Alderman Slater's car, but he drove away without incident. A few minutes later, the fake bomb "exploded" on someone else's car! The joker had put it on the wrong car.

New Law Requires Merchants to Provide Credit Card Surcharges to Consumers

Westchester County Executive George Latimer, New York State Assembly-woman Amy Paulin and County Director of Consumer Protection Jim Maisano are working together to ensure that residents are well-informed about a new law aimed at promoting transparency in credit card transactions. Effective February 11, 2024, this new state law mandates that merchants in New York State must provide clear and conspicuous disclosure of credit card surcharges to consumers

Latimer said "Transparent pricing is essential for consumers to make informed decisions. This new law will empower Westchester residents by ensuring they have clear visibility into any credit card surcharges they may incur and I thank my colleague in government Assemblywoman Paulin for her efforts on its passage and Governor Hochul for signing it into law."

Paulin added: "This new law protects New Yorkers from hidden surcharges by requiring sellers to clearly post the price of a credit card surcharge. Credit card surcharges now have to be disclosed clearly so that customers are fully aware of them upfront and not just when they go to pay. The new law also prevents businesses from charging a higher fee than what they are charged by the credit card companies. This legislation is ultimately about transparency, fairness and preventing consumers from being misled when making purchases using credits cards. I thank Jim Maisano, Director of the Westchester County Department of Consumer Protection, for bringing this important issue to my attention. His idea is now a law which will protect New Yorker consumers."

The new law limits credit card surcharges to the amount charged to the business by the credit card company and requires businesses to clearly display the total price inclusive of any surcharges before checkout. It aims to prevent consumers from being surprised by hidden fees and ensures that they have a clear understanding of the costs associated with credit card transactions.

Maisano said: "This law reinforces the principles of fairness and transparency in commercial transactions. We are committed to ensuring that consumers are protected from deceptive practices, and this legislation is a significant step forward in achieving that goal."

Thursday, February 29th

February 29, 1944: Most of the Arthur G. Blair Shipyards were idle; they had laid off 3,000 people company wide and would not rehire anyone until the ships expected for repair and conversion work actually arrived.

February 29, 1956: The NYS Senate Cities Committee hearing on the measure authorizing transfer ownership of parts of Wells Avenue and surrounding streets to Otis Elevator's Yonkers plant. Presiding Senator Thomas Desmond of Newburgh called the proposed transfer rule "very unusual legislation... particularly to a Legislature largely composed of lawyers. The Legislature would be loath to adopt this act." Desmond suggested the plan be modified and negotiated with the opposition, further recommending the changes be acceptable to both the opposition and Otis.

The Herald Statesman challenged the legislation as "unwarranted, wasteful of public funds and possibly unconstitutional," as soon as the Mayor and Common Council requested the legislation.

Friday, March 1st

March 1, 1913: Journalist John Edward Bruce, President of the Negro Society for Historical Research in Yonkers, was appointed Auxiliary Chairman of the Committee on Public Comfort for the Wilson- Marshall Inauguration! Bruce appointed Yonkers men to assist him in Washington for the event: Francis Moultrie, Samuel Giddings. Sterling Lambert, W. J. Spennie, Reverend A. H. Hill and Attorney Stephen Bennett.

March 1, 1930: Meeting at Eagles Hall on Elm Street, thirty-five men of all nationalities and backgrounds formed an unemployment council to fight unemployment in Yonkers. The started the campaign with a treasury of \$2.45.

Saturday, March 2nd

March 2, 1928: James Lessner of South Broadway was awarded \$50,000 for injuries suffered while working on a New York City elevator. The case, heard in White Plains Supreme Court by Justice Joseph Morschauser, was ended quickly when the twelve-man jury returned the verdict for the plaintiff after deliberating less than 15 minutes. Lessner, a elevator repair mechanic, was injured while working on an elevator. A janitor touched the control switch, sending the elevator crashing to the ground floor. Lessner had suffered such serious injuries, his arm was paralyzed.

Sunday, March 3rd

March 3, 1934: Yonkers Rotary Club launched a campaign against obscene literature, focusing on the type banned from mailing but still selling at Yonkers' newsstands.

March 3, 1942: Habirshaw Cable and Wire Corporation, one of Yonkers' top industries, began refitting its old Bare Wire Plant on Saw Mill River Road to convert it to a defense industry plant. Concentrated effort was underway to bring the old mills to the intense production level needed to meet war needs. Production need was so great, as soon as each machine was installed, it was "pressed into service," without waiting for the rest of the department to be ready. Habirshaw manufactured many products: rubber and lead covered copper wires, paper insulated power cables, telephone and telegraph wires, signal wires, parkway cables, and other types of cables. The plant being refurbished had closed during the depression years but once employed 200 people.

While PO Vazquez was speaking to the woman, ESU Officers Michael Mirabella, Jason Philipps, Richard Fernandez, and Brendan Moore established a rope safety system and secured it to the structure of the building in a matter of minutes. This system was secured to Officers for safety in the event that an Officer fell or had to go over the ledge to attempt the rescue.

PO Vazquez was soon joined by Deputy Chief Monaco, who leads our Crisis Negotiation Team. After about five minutes of negotiation, Officers observed the female begin to lean backward over the edge, so they rushed in to prevent her from falling and bring her to safety. The female was transported to an area hospital for evaluation and referred to the Mobile Crisis Response

In recent years, that has not happened, with IRC members voting with their republican or democratic colleagues, and unable to come to an agreement. That resulted in NY Democrats in the Assembly and Sentate drawing their own congressional lines. And those lines were challenged by republicans in court, resulting in a special master named to draw the congressional lines in 2022.

Jenkins has avoided that fiasco by getting democrats and republicans on the IRC to agree, and compromise, and come up with a set of congressional lines that were acceptable to 9 of the 10 members.

"I am proud to say that we have worked collaboratively and cooperatively and will be voting on a single consensus plan, for the first time. Every member made a good faith effort to bring to fruition the 2014 Amendement to the (NY) Constitution. We had the goal of seeking compromise, and this is a victory for the commission process and for small d democracy in the state of New York," said Jenkins.

The one set of agree upon congressional lines now go to the State Legislature and Governor Hochul, where they can be approved or rejected. If the NYIRC's lines are rejected, the democratic controlled Assembly and Senate must come up with new lines within the next week; petitioning will begin for congress on Feb. 27 in NY. But the democratic drawn lines could be challenged in court, resulting in confusion again as the country will be watching the outcome of the five competitive NY congressional races that could determine which party has control of the House in 2025.

Westchester's two congressional districts, NY-16 and NY-17, will basically remain the same, with only minor changes. In District 17, Congressman Mike Lawler, a republican, and his democratic challenger, former Congressman Mondaire Jones, both agreed and called on the state legislature to accept and adopt the lines drawn by the NYS IRC.

"I urge Albany to follow the procedures and rules spelled out in our constitution this time around, and adopt a map issued by the Independent Redistricting Commission," said Jones.

"It is imperative that the New York State Legislature acts swiftly to adopt and pass these bipartisan maps to prevent complications with the petitioning process and the upcoming primary season," said Lawler, who won election to the House in 2022 by defeating Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney by 2,100 votes

In District 16, Westchester County Executive George Laitmer is challenging Congressman Jamaal Bowman in a democratic primary. Latimer said, "This is only the next step in a long process; it is now in the hands of the legislature, and we are confident in the ability of Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins and Speaker Heastie to complete this process fully and fairly. Regardless of the timing or the ultimate disposition of the lines, we look forward to continuing to bring our message of progressive results that benefit the people of our area, in whatever neighborhood they live and in whatever jurisdictions are ultimately assigned to CD-16."

Some NY Democrats were unhappy with the outcome from the NYS IRC, including Congressman Hakeem Jeffries, who serves as the Democratic Minority Leader and will become Speaker of the House if democrats retake control this November.

"Instead of remedying several of the substantive issues raised by good government groups related to communities of interest, the IRC map ignores or exacerbates them in parts of New York State, including the upper Hudson Valley," said Jeffries in a statement.

Two democratic state senators called the new maps "a disgrace," State Senator James Skoufis, and "I thought we would be getting different maps; it appears we didn't really get different maps," State Senator Liz Kruger. If NY Democrats decide to reject the proposed lines and draw their own, they need a 2/3 majority in both the Assembly and Senate to do so.

NYS IRC Republican Commissioner, Charles Nesbitt, estimates the map to be more than 90% similar to the Congressional map already in place.

Westchester State Senator and Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins said, "The Senate Majority is eager to review the proposed map submitted by the IRC. We plan to discuss and decide our subsequent actions soon, taking into account the election cycle calendar. This process is critically important and we are committed to concluding it in a manner that upholds fairness and democracy."

We agree with the NY Daily News, who wrote, "They should end this non-sense and approve the IRC's map."

Most Westchester democrats we spoke to thought that the best course of action would be to accept the lines and win the congressional races needed to retake the House majority. "I would be shocked if they don't accept the IRC lines. It was a 9-1 vote, that is a mandate to accept the lines and move on. Plus Suozzi's win in NY-3 shows us that democrats can do it with the lines in place," said a sound shore democrat.



Westchester Elected Officials & Environmental Groups Support Passage of NY HEAT Act.

On Feb. 16, Westchester legislators and advocates held a press conference calling on Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie to champion passage of the NY HEAT Act in the Assembly One House Budget expected next month. Governor Hochul included key provisions of the bill in her budget proposal in January; advocates are calling for passage of the full bill, which includes provisions to save low- and middle-income New Yorkers money on their energy bills.

Food & Water Watch Senior New York Organizer Santosh Nandabalan said, "New Yorkers are paying through the nose to finance climate chaos. It's time to stop the consumer-subsidized expansion of our dirty, dangerous, fracked gas system. Speaker Heastie must stand with Westchester families struggling to keep the lights on and pass the NY HEAT Act in the Assembly One House budget."

The NY HEAT Act would ensure an affordable transition off climate-killing fossil fuels by 1) stopping the expansion of the dirty, toxic gas system and 2) reducing utility bills by eliminating gas subsidies and directing the PSC to implement the goal of capping energy bills at 6% of income. Low- and middle-income households are the most impacted by volatile gas prices and high energy bills, paying three times more of their income on energy bills than other families.

A new analysis by Win Climate finds that nearly 1 in 5 Westchester County residents pay more than 6% of their annual income on electricity, gas, and delivered fossil fuels. Using data from the Census, the analysis finds that the NY HEAT could save these Westchester families as much as \$183/month on energy bills. The push for cost savings comes as Con Edison begins phasing in rate hikes that will total an additional \$60/month by January 2025 for customers who pay for gas heat.

"It is exciting that elements of the NY HEAT Act have made it into the Governor's Executive Budget proposal, but we need the whole thing," said Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg. "I have constituents calling and writing to my office about unaffordable energy bills constantly. New Yorkers need relief in their energy bills now – we need the 6% cap on household energy costs that is written into NY HEAT. This is a critically important goal."

State Senator Pete Harckham, chair of the Senate Environmental Conservation committee, said, "The New York HEAT Act notably removes the 100-foot subsidy that incentivizes gas line expansion and will protect ratepayers with low incomes from shouldering too much of the transition costs to sustainable energy sources. The record-breaking heat from our recent summers and the climate-change fueled storms we are experiencing are telling us to enact this legislation in a hurry."

State Senator Shelley Mayer said, "For many years, I have heard from my constituents about the unacceptably steep increases in their gas and electric bills. Residents are keeping their home temperatures low and limiting their consumption, yet they are not seeing any relief from the high bills. I share the frustration that so many others have expressed. I thank Senator Liz. Krueger for carrying this bill in the Senate, and am determined to pass the New York Heat Act with my colleagues in the Senate and Assembly to protect New Yorkers from rising energy bills."

Will Westchester Homeowners Ever Get Their State & Local Tax Deductions Back?

Thanks for Trying Congressman Lawler

Westchester Congressman Mike Lawler's attempt to lift the Federal Tax deduction for State and Local Taxes, (SALT), failed without getting a vote on the House floor. Many New York Democrats did not support Lawler's attempt to lift the \$10,000 cap on SALT as a deduction on your Federal Income Taxes.

But a handful of Lawler's fellow republicans also did not support his effort. And while the issue is complicated, we applaud Lawler for his efforts to highlight the issue.

Prior to 2016, Americans could deduct 100% of their SALT from their Fed-

eral income taxes. That changed after former President Donald Trump passed a large tax cut with the help of republicans in congress in 2017.

In exchange for a lower tax rate across the board for all Americans, the rules on deducting your SALT from your Federal return were also changed, to a \$10,000 maximum deduction. For many Westchester homeowners who pay \$25,000+ in property taxes every year, the caping of SALT was difficult.

But on the other hand, the same Westchester homeowner who lost some of their SALT deduction should also have paid less in Federal Income taxes because of the Trump tax cut.

House Democratic Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries and US Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer both opposed Lawler's plan.

"When I came to Congress, the very first bill I introduced was the SALT Marriage Penalty Elimination Act to provide immediate tax relief to hard working middle class families throughout the Hudson Valley. Over the last 13 months, I fought tirelessly, including with members of my own party, to get a bill to the floor to receive fair consideration and an up or down vote," said Congressman Lawler

"Rather than join me in bipartisan cooperation to deliver for all New Yorkers Hakeem Jeffries, and House Democrats from across New York chose to play politics and stop SALT relief dead in its tracks, while Governor Hochul and Senators Schumer and Gillibrand remained silent. They put partisan politics ahead of what is best for the people they represent and it's shameful."

"While I am disappointed in the result, I remain undeterred. Along with my New York Republican colleagues, I will continue to fight for SALT tax relief and work towards a bipartisan legislative fix," concluded Congressman Lawler.

Lawler's opponent in November, former Congressman Mondaire Jones, said, "Mike Lawler worked hard to put Donald Trump in the White House in 2016. Then Trump's 2017 tax scam bill capped the SALT deduction at \$10,000 and forced households in the Lower Hudson Valley to pay thousands more dollars in annual taxes. Now Rep. Lawler wants credit for trying to make minor improvements to a problem he helped cause. In fact, there's not a crisis Lawler claims to be trying to solve that Republicans aren't responsible for creating in the first place. This fall, voters can fire Lawler and finally end the least productive Congress since the Great Depression," Mondaire Jones said.

"When Mondaire represented the Lower Hudson Valley in Congress, he was instrumental in convincing a majority of his House colleagues to support SALT relief, which would have raised the cap on the State and Local Tax deduction from \$10,000 to \$80,000 for both individuals and families for 10 years. In comparison, the legislation Mike Lawler is pushing – and which just failed to even be considered for a vote today by a large margin – would just raise the cap for one year and would apply only to some taxpayers," said Shannon Geison, Campaign Manager for Mondaire for Congress stated.

But Jones was also unable to get SALT relief legislation through Congress and signed by the President.

Westchester County Executive and Congressional candidate George Latimer called the SALT cap "a disaster." "The SALT deduction cap continues to be a thorn in the side of Westchester residents. It's a disaster for our community, limiting our ability to fully deduct our state and local taxes, unfairly burdening homeowners and hindering economic growth," said Latimer. In the face of this challenge, Latimer has taken action to alleviate the strain on taxpayers by working to mitigate the impact of this policy through five consecutive years of either freezing or actually reducing the County portion of homeowner's property tax bill.

Latimer added: "Here in Westchester, our Administration has provided some respite for County property owners by reducing the tax burden while still maintaining – and even expanding – top level services for our community."

Latimer is challenging Congressman Jamaal Bowman in the 16th District-NY. Rep. Bowman voted against Lawler's plan to lift the SALT cap.

Lawler and Jones are running in New York's 17th Congressional District, parts of Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess, and Westchester Counties.

Undercover Mom Blamed by Lakeland School District for Exposing Sex-Personality Test for Middle School Students

As a taxpayer and former parent in the Lakeland School District, I do not agree with the attempts by the school board to blame the parent-undercover mom for their inproper oversight of the teacher involved, Science Teacher xx Tinkle, and the personality test that he was giving his middle school students.

I agree with the school board in questioning the undercover mom for why she took a year and a half to expose her video and the sexualized personality test. But regardless of the time lapse, I thank her for bringing this to the light of parents and taxpayers in the Lakeland School District. Her actions were certainly NOT reprehensible, but the personality test given by Mr. Tinkle was reprehensible, in my view.

The fact that the school district immediately removed the video and the website link that was available to anyone proves what a mistake was made. And while the district is pursuing their legal options, I am sure that parents are doing the same for the negligence shown to their students.

In my view, the reason why the undercover mom exposed her videos to @ Sage Ops and Libs of TikTok (which has 3.7 Million views) is because she wanted the district to notify all parents and students that may have been involved or who may have seen the borerline pornography associated with this personality test. The district has refused to notify all parents, instead deciding to wait for parents and students to come forward, and then take appropriate action. And so, the Mom went to the new, online media.

And this story is not over. Another two videos were posted by @Sage Ops. One with LSD Assistant Superintendent Tracy Norman, and another video of the Lakeland School Board meeting.

We agree with a Twitter-X post from Gays Against Groomers NY, who wrote "We are living through very challenging times when it comes to parenting and having children in school. Not only do parents have to worry about schools hiding their child's transition from them, but parents also have to be concerned about their child's school giving their child links to websites with sex toys and assignments that talk about groping to middle schoolers. Schools, like this one located in the Lakeland Central School District in New York, will not be honest with parents when confronted. NY State Police Arrest 139 People for DWI During Super Bowl Weekend

The New York State Police announced that troopers issued 6,876 tickets during a special STOP DWI traffic enforcement period over Super Bowl Weekend. During the campaign, which started on Friday, February 9, 2024, and ran through Sunday, February 11, 2024.

State Police increased patrols and conducted sobriety checkpoints to deter, identify and arrest impaired drivers. The initiative was funded by the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) and was also carried out by local law enforcement agencies across the state.

During this enforcement period, State Troopers arrested 139 people for DWI, and investigated 245 crashes, which injured 37 people. State Police did not respond to any fatal crashes during the weekend.

As part of the enforcement, Troopers also targeted drivers speeding and aggressive drivers across the state. Below is a sampling of the total tickets that were issued. Speeding - 2,180 -Distracted Driving 192-

During last year's Super Bowl enforcement State Police issued 8,311 tickets and arrested 141 people for DWI.

In the Lower Hudson Valley region, which includes Westchester County, there were 43 DWI Arrests, 344 arrests for speeding, and 46 arrests for distracted driving.

from the ship washed over the young man, submerging him. Yonkers Yacht Club members dove in to search for Adolphus, as did his dad. Yonkers Police and Life Saving Corps combed the area for hours. His body was found that evening by volunteers using grappling hooks. Fourteen-year-old Adolphus was a School Six Class of 1915 graduate.

After this family tragedy, Dr. Morgan lobbied Yonkers government to purchase patrol boats and build bathhouses at swimming spots on the river.

Concerned about lynchings and riots in St. Louis, New York City, Ossining, and elsewhere in 1917, Messiah Baptist and the AME Zion churches formed a Civic League to assist new Black Yonkers residents; they elected Dr. Morgan president. His meetings focused on the causes and remedies for the unrest, and how to improve their lives.

Dr. Morgan advocated to prevent the movie "Birth of a Nation," from being rerun in Yonkers. The movie promulgated erroneous history told Director DW Griffith by his Confederate soldier father, and Griffith wanted his movie accepted as truth. Morgan led a 1918 delegation asking Mayor Wallin to prohibit showing this movie in Yonkers; a few weeks later it ran three days at Proctor's and one day at The Orpheum.

He joined several local organizations, rising to prominence in the Knights of Pythias, and served as its NY State Grand Medical Registrar; he was an active member of the James Farrell Lodge, Prince Hall Masons. He was official advisor to the Alpha Physical Culture Club, the first independent athletic club organized by Blacks in New York State.

An active Socialist, he was their party candidate for Coroner several times; he

ran for the NYS Assembly in 1930. An Advisory Board Member of the Yonkers Council for Protection of Foreign Born Workers, he opposed anti-alien legislation and promoted naturalization for immigrants.

In the 1920s, he was an active member of the Conference for Progressive Political Action. Elected Financial Secretary of the Yonkers Progressives August 1924, he addressed its 1925 meeting featuring keynote speaker Eugene Debs, the 1924 Socialist Candidate for President; Debs spoke about the need to rebuild and reorganize our country.

The 1925 NYS AME Zion Church Annual Conference was held at Yonkers' new AME Zion Church, designed by noted architect Lansing Quick. Dr. Morgan, speaking on behalf of Yonkers' professional men, welcomed 300 delegates and visitors from throughout NYS to the five-day event-filled symposium.

The good doctor donated prizes for the annual Schoolboys Races and was involved in the Messiah Baptist Church War Relief Circle for Black soldiers. He raised money for all three Yonkers' hospitals and helped organize a City-Wide Committee to celebrate appointment of Thomas Brooks, YPD's first Black officer. During the Depression, he worked on the Colored Citizens Unemployment Relief Committee. One of its first events was the 1931 performance by Hemsley Winfield's "The Bronze Ballet Plastique" at Saunders High School, advertised as "the first Negro dance recital in America." (Winfield attended School 13 and Yonkers High School.)

A faithful member of the Sunday Men's Club, he served many years as its Vice President. A men's intellectual discussion group, the club's purpose, according to its incorporation papers, was uplifting "the condition of the Negro race," bringing "members together on Sundays for religious and moral instruction and discussion to inculcate sound ideas of religion and morality." They presented literary discussions, speakers on many topics and cultural programs, with topics focused on the life of Black Americans.

An active participant in area medical associations, he continuously upgraded his skills by attending medical conferences and clinics, especially the NY Homeopathic Medical College's demonstrations of the latest laboratory techniques, methods and equipment. He put them to good use successfully treating Dog Catcher Edward Smith, bitten by a rabid dog, using the Pasteur treatment to prevent hydrophobia. The same year, Smith survived a second rabid dog bite; although he went into convulsions, it wasn't fatal. The original series of treatments had given Smith the ability to fight the fatal disease a second time.

John Morgan, avid Socialist, respected physician, devoted family man, and leading Yonkers citizen for 27 years, passed away at home August 13th1931, survived by his wife Mary and three daughters.

The funeral cortege, with six honorary pall bearers (Arthur Giddings, Monrow Foy, Hilary Harris, John Jackson, Toler Brooks, Harry Carter) walking beside the hearse, made its way to the church. Members of the Masons, Odd Fellows, Friendly Society, Lincoln Lodge #17, Knights of Phythias, Order of Druids Lodge, Friendly Society, and doctors from Westchester County and New York City medical societies brought up the rear of the cortege. Judge Gerald Nolan and Corporation Council Harry Laragh officially represented the City of Yonkers.

His funeral, held at Memorial AME Zion Church, was punctuated by the music and hymns Dr. Morgan so loved. An estimated 1,000 people overflowed the Irving Place church onto the sidewalk and street, which was closed for the funeral.

The Yonkers Socialist Party unanimously adopted a resolution, here in part: "Resolved, that we have learned with heartfelt grief the sad tidings of the death of Dr. John A. Morgan... many years one of the most earnest, ardent and intelligent strugglers for the emancipation of humanity... His splendid personality and broad cultural gifts endeared him to a wide circle of appreciating friends. For us, he lives on... not as a mere memory, but as a vital factor in our thoughts and activities."

In 1956, daughter Mae Morgan Robinson donated a beautiful baptismal font at St. Augustine's Episcopal Church in memory of her father. The dedication ceremony incorporated baptism of three babies; no doubt Dr. Morgan smiled his blessings down on them.
