Man Gets 14 Months for Throwing a Dog Out of Moving Car; Will 13 Time Shoplifter Go to Jail?

One story that received great interest from our readers was the sentencing of a Mount Vernon man for killing a 12-week old puppy in Yonkers. According to Westchester DA Mimi Rocah's office, "Thaddeus Jones, 34, a passenger in a car that was driven by his friend, grabbed the friend's 12-week-old Pitbull puppy named "Lady" and threw the puppy into oncoming traffic on Yonkers Avenue. The puppy was immediately struck by a car and killed. When questioned by police following the incident, the defendant yelled "F_k your dog," to his friend."

"Jones pled guilty last November to Aggravated Cruelty to Animals, a felony, and was sentenced on Jan. 5 by Judge James McCarty to 14 months in jail.

DA Rocah said: "This defendant killed a puppy for no reason and will now face consequences behind bars. This kind of depraved conduct toward animals will not be tolerated in Westchester County. My Office will continue to direct resources to prosecute animal abuse and mistreatment and hold offenders accountable."

Jones could have received up to a 2-year maximum jail sentence. Rocah's office sought a sentence of 18 months. Two of our readers wanted Jones to receive the maximum sentence. "Since animal cruelty is a heinous crime and needs to be treated as such, It is good to hear that the despicable human who threw a puppy out of a moving car into traffic, killing the innocent pup, has been sentenced to 14 months behind bars - and I hope there is such a thing as "prison justice" and this scum gets a taste of his own medicine. However, the sentence must also include a life-long ban on this monster ever coming into contact with an animal again. Animal abusers are a danger to all," writes Christina DeRespiris, from New Rochelle.

M. Lebrya, from Cortlandt writes, "What's to say.... when an act is so heinous as to be almost unbelievablle. Such as a 34 year old grown man violently killing & cursing his victim in the vileest, ugliest words in front of the whole world to hear. His victim? A 3 month old female puppy. There is nothing, absolutely nothing, that a 3 month old puppy could've possibly done to deserve this fate, ending her life before it's hardly begun. Or should being thrown out of a car window into traffic be anyone's life-ending fate? If any animal cruelty case deserved the two year allowable maximum jail sentence, it would seem to be this one. Yet the prosecuting Assistantt District Atorney & Animal Cruelty Coordinator, MaryAnn Liebowitz & Judge James McCarthy apparently agreed on a lesser 14 month sentence 'for some reason.' Meanwhile County DA, Miriam Rocah, proudly announced the lesser jail sentence on Jan. 5, 2023. City Councilmember Shanae Williams to Run for County Legisaltor Will Challenge Johnson in Dem. Primary

On Jan. 9, Yonkers City Councilmember Shanae Williams announced her candidacy for Westchester County Legislator, in the 16th District. "Today marks the day the residents of Yonkers' 16th Westchester County Legislative District can expect accountability, transparency, and above all else, action from your County Legislator. I am running for County Government to ensure that we finally address issues that affect our everyday quality of life such as homelessness, affordable housing, better youth supports and safety nets, and equitable access to county resources," said Williams, who has served for 4 years on the Yonkers City Council, and whose term expires at the end of this year.

"My experience, history and record on the City Council, coupled with my dedication to the community has primed me to serve as the next County Legislator. I have been a resident of the 16th District for over 24 years. I have spent 12 years working in city government with the last 6 years on the City Council creating policies and initiatives that impact the people of Yonkers. These include fighting for more affordable housing, providing funds for education, youth programs and nonprofits, creating the homeless task force that led to solutions for this vulnerable population, allocating funding for our public servants including police, fire and public works employees, and having invested in the city's infrastructure while focusing on climate solutions."

Williams will challenge the incumbent democrat, County Legislator Christopher Johnson, in a democratic primary in June. The winner of the democratic primary in June will almost certainly get elected in November in the democratic

We spoke to Williams, who told us:

Why I am running. "I don't see the current legislator representing our district. The reason why I'm running for County Legislator is to help the people in my district. We need representation and that's why I'm running."

On the City Council, Williams has worked on the issue of homelessness, with many residents and businesses in the first council district seeing more homeless on the streets. Westchester County is responsible for the services and funding of the homeless population throughout Westchester, and in Yonkers.

"The issue of homelessness has been near and dear to my heart since I started on the council. There has been an increase in our homeless population in our city and our streets, and it impacts that quality of life for all of us. This is a county issue, and I have tried to work with our county legislator on this issue, but I think we need someone else representing us, to make sure the county steps up.

"If elected, I would try to combat homelessness by supporting issues and

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Student Stabbed at Yonkers Middle High School by Two Other Students



On Jan. 6, members of the Yonkers Police Department responded to reports of a stabbing incident at Yonkers Middle High School at 840 AM. Preliminary investigation has yielded that a 16-year-old student victim was assaulted by two 17-year-old student suspects: a dispute that originated in the area of a second-floor bathroom escalated to physical violence when the two older students punched and kicked the younger student, and then one of the older students stabbed the victim with a knife. School Security immediately responded and stopped the fight.

The victim was transported to a local area trauma center in stable condition and is undergoing surgery to treat his injuries. Both suspects were placed under arrest and it is anticipated they will be charged with felony assault; due to their ages, no identifying information will be released. The knife has been recovered. The motivation for this incident remains under active investigation.

There were no threats to public safety and the school resumed normal operations.

Both 17-years-olds have been charged with second-degree attempted murder and first-degree assault, according to Yonkers Police.

The two suspects are considered Adolescent Offenders and will appear in youth criminal court. There names will not be released.

"The situation was quickly brought under control by school personnel. There is no threat to public safety," Yonkers Public Schools Communications Officer Jerilynne Fierstein said. "The school's Pupil Support professionals are available to assist students or staff. There will be additional District staff at the school throughout the day."

Mayor Mike Spano said, "We believe this is an isolated incident, I want to assure students and parents that we continue to review all school safety protocols and make appropriate changes as needed. The safety and security of our students and

staff remain a top priority, while providing them with a safe space to learn and thrive."



City of Yonkers Sues Mt. St. Vincent College, Contractor, for lack of work at City Park

The City of Yonkers recently filed suit against Mt. Saint Vincent College and Concrete Contracting Construction, for their lack of completion of renovations at Fay Park, located in the Ludlow neighborhood of Yonkers at Abeel Street and Depeyster Street.

On Nov. 27, 2018 the city and college entered into a Memorandum of Understanding for the purpose of collaborating on a large project to redo/restore the softball and baseball fields located at Fay Park.

The purpose of the arrangement was to help the college meet its need for additional athletic playing fields to serve the students at its adjoining Bronx campus. The arrangement would also allow Yonkers residents to benefit from these improvements at a reduced cost to the city.

The project was to be completed in two phases. The college was responsible for completing Phase I, at its expense, and the City of Yonkers would complete Phase II at a cost not to exceed \$560,000.

The First Phase involved renovating two fields both the infield and outfield and drainage and irrigation systems. The college retained Concrete Contracting Construction, to perform the Phase I work.

On March 30, 2019 the college and contractor entered into an agreement for the college's portion of the work at Fay Park, which the city was not a party to.

It was believed that the City of Yonkers would be a third party beneficiary for the construction contract and the contractor knew that. The work was set to begin on June 15, 2019.

As of Jan. 2020 the work was still incomplete and failed to progress from that point forward and work that was performed was unfinished or defective.

Eventually, the City claims in its suit, defendants abandoned the work at Fay Park, and due to defendants negligence and abandonment, Fay Park was left in a state of disrepair and the fields were effectively destroyed. And City residents were unable to use Fay Park, and still are to this day.

The ballfields are now overgrown with vegetation and dirt, left in a hazardous condition. Starting in the spring of 2020, the city and the college began conversations about how to fix the problem, with the college explaining that it had no intention of continuing to work with the contractor, who failed to perform the agreed upon work.

The City received numerous complaints about the park from residents and organizations. Sports teams could no longer play on the field and some residents complained of flooding from the damage at the park.

The City hired its own contractor to complete the work at a cost of \$700,000 in March 2022. In April 2022, the City proposed that the college pay \$250,000 of the cost, with the City paying for \$470,000.

The College did not agree to move forward, and the City is now suing the college for breach of contract, with damages of \$700,000.

The City is also suing Concrete Contracting Construction for \$700,000 for their failure to perform their contract with the college and the damage to Yonkers.

The City is also claiming damages because the park and ballfieds are now in worse condition than when the agreement was made, and that the subsequent lack of performance created a nuisance for the residents and taxpayers of Yonkers. The total amount sought by the City is \$3.5 Million.

Residents in the Ludlow neighborhood have been complaining about the damages at Fay Park for some time. Resident Eileen O'Connor said, "Residents of Ludlow Park were without a safe, open neighborhood space, in the middle of the pandemic of the century. Both Adults and Children were unable to walk to their field and play ball for the last 3 years. We are very glad the COY did the repairs needed so these fields can be used in the spring. We can't wait!!"

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Yonkers Police Warn of Key Fob Hacking Scheme

Keyless entry systems, which allow drivers to unlock and start their vehicles without a physical key, have become a common feature in many new cars and can also be added as an upgrade. While this technology is convenient for drivers, it has also made it easier for thieves to steal vehicles. Using advanced hacking techniques, thieves can gain access to a car's computer system and drive the vehicle away without ever having to possess the owner's key fob. As a result, it is important for car owners to take precautions to protect their vehicles from theft.

In order to keep your key fobs from getting hacked, keep them away from parts of the house that are within a close range of your car, such as near your front door or garage. For more information on how to prevent key fob hacks, read this article.

What is signal boosting?

Unlike signal boosting important information on social media, the "boost" in this context means stealing a signal. Hackers can use a device that tricks the car and your key fob into thinking they're within proximity of each other, then emit the fob's unlock signal without touching any buttons on the fob or car.

Signal boosting is normally used to unlock a car, but a similar tactic can turn on vehicles with keyless ignitions, too. There are also other remote key fob hacks, such as rolljamming, that record and spoof your key fob's unlock signal, though they're much harder to pull off. But all that someone needs to perform a signal boost is about \$20 of equipment.

How to stop thieves from signal boosting your car fob

So how do you prevent a signal boost attack? It's not like you can activate two-factor sign-ins or install anti-malware on your key fob. The solution is actually pretty simple: block signals from reaching your key fob.

There are several ways to do this, but a Faraday bag is the most reliable. These bags create an electro-magnetic barrier that stops any signals from getting in or out of the bag, just like the "Faraday cages" the bags are named after.

You can buy inexpensive Faraday bags, boxes, and wallets online. Just put your keys (or other wireless devices you want to sequester) in the bag while you're home, especially at night.

If you don't have a Faraday bag, putting your keys in a thick metal object—like a refrigerator or a safe, for instance—would be better than leaving them out in the open, but we can't promise it will block a hacker's signal boosting as effectively as a Faraday bag. At the very least, keep your keys at the other end of your house while you're at home. The further away your keys are from your car, and the more walls and other obstacles there are between them, the harder it will be for the signals to reach.

Couple a Faraday bag with other anti-theft measures like a steering wheel claw and security cameras, and the chances of someone breaking in and potentially stealing your car become much lower. Oh, and don't keep spare keys, fobs, garage door remotes, or other valuables in your car. That way, if someone still manages to get in (windows are breakable, after all), they won't find much to steal.

funding programs on the county level. There has to be shared accountability and partnership. We have been doing that on the city level, with a program called Project Outreach, with Westhab, where caseworkers have worked with the homeless on the streets and get them into drop-ins, feed them, cloth them and help them with issues like substance abuse or mental illness. It's more about finding them a shelter, most need treatment.

"The program has been successful, but the city cannot sustain the program. The City Council funded the program for \$2 Million, but long term, it's the county government's responsibility.

The County has not stepped up for Yonkers, and the current legislator has failed to make sure that it happens. The county, through the DSS, and its temporary housing assistance program, needs to work with non-profits to keep this going. I'm running to make sure this happens.

Williams wants to make sure that Westchester County government funds the city of Yonkers, the county's largest city, fairly and that Yonkers gets its fair share of funding.

"I want to make sure that county government prioritizes the people of Yonkers. In Mount Vernon, the county funded Memorial Field with \$40 Million, and it needed to happen. But in Yonkers, the kids in this district did not have a pool for last summer when the pool at the Y broke. We asked the County for \$1 Million to fix the poll and they said no. We need leaders who make sure we get equitable access and funding for the people of Yonkers.

As the biggest city in Westchester, Yonkers deserves its fair share. Right now,

we have leaders who can't deliver.

When we asked Williams if she was surprised by the lack of results by Legislator Johnson, she said, "No, I'm not surprised. He is absent and doesn't follow through. We need someone to do the work that is required. We don't have a fighter for us on the county board and we have to put the people of this district first. I want a fighter for Yonkers, and we don't have that now.

Williams ran for Westchester County Clerk in 2021, and narrowly lost to long-time clerk, democrat Tim Idoni, receiving 49% of the vote. "It was a great experience, and I learned a lot about the county. I ran a race with no support and little funding and almost won. The people knew I care and that we needed change and I hope that those democrats will help me in this race. I'm the same person and I'm here to inspire and help.

Williams and Johnson also differ on another issue, banning Menthol cigarettes. Johnson voted yes for the ban, which was vetoed by County Executive George Latimer. Williams did not support the ban and wrote a letter to Latimer urging him to veto. "We need legislators to focus on common sense laws and not harm small businesses and communities of color. This ban would have directly affected small businesses and the black and brown and Arab population.

Williams has served on the council since 2018. "We have done a lot of good things on the council and I'm so proud of the work I have helped accomplish. But I see that there is so much more that can be done for the people of Yonkers on the county level, and I want to go up to White Plains and get it done.

"I believe in democracy and earning the vote of the people. I believe that any candidate who wants to make an impact as a leader must take their case to the people by sharing their views, their record, and an action plan for change. I am optimistic that after a review of my record and ideas, the voters of the 16th district will vote for me as their next County Legislator to bring the much-needed change and a breath of fresh air to the county,"

Williams was appointed to her council seat in 2018, and won election in 2019. She also ran for Westchester County Clerk in 2021 and got 49% in the democratic primary, coming very close to beating longtime County Clerk Tim Idoni.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer delivered in his weekly address, an update on the number of COVID cases to residents of the county. Latimer, as he has done for the past three years, calmly presented the data and the facts, which showed the following:

9 COVID Deaths in Westchester last week. In comparison, Westchester had 47 deaths for same period in 2022 and 38 deaths in 2021.
3,028 active cases, compared to 36,345 in 2022 and 10,238 in 2021.

263 Hospitalizations in 2023, compared to 627 in 2022 and 489 in 2021.

Latimer's message was that while COVID cases, hospitizations and deaths are rising they are no where near the numbers of 2022 and 2021. Vaccinations began in 2021.

Hospital beds filled with COVID cases are also down compared to 2022 and 2021. April 2020-1,194 residents--2,7000 hospital beds total. -44% at one time occupied from COVID. Only 9.7% of total capacity of hospital beds are filled with COVID cases now.

"More Westchestser residents are vaccinated 85% estimated. We made no vaccinaton mandate in Westchester. This was the residents of Westchester making an educated decision to get vaccinated," said Latimer. 85% vaccination rate has gotten us a lower number of cases and a lower number of hospitalizations and deaths," said Latimer. "COVID is going to be with us, it will not be eradicated. We have not reached anything like the point of going back to 2022 and 2021 numbers. This is not the centralzing force of our society. we have tried to strike that balance in Westchester County."

A total of 2,943 Westchester residents have died since the pandemic began in 2020.

Some residents are wondering if another individual will serve jail time after being arrested. The Yonkers Police wrote on Jan. 6. "Remember him? Franklyn Rosario, 25-years-old and from the Bronx, was arrested yesterday for shoplifting from Marshall's on Central Park Avenue - again. Only this time 1st Precinct Officers Joseph DiBenedetto and Keith Terraforte were on scene before he could leave the area...with help from Marshall's loss prevention who followed and pointed him out. Franklyn was a real tough guy the other day when a couple of good Samaritans tried to stop him from shoplifting and he pushed past them; this time when approached by police, he tucked tail and tried to run, but didn't get too far. Now he faces felony larceny charges including weapons and drug possession, obstruction, resisting arrest and more. We think it's fair to say that society is fed up with blatant thieves like Franklyn, to the point that civilians are now taking action - which we advise against for your own personal safety. But to stop recidivist criminals like him – this is his 13th arrest – there must be consequences for bad behavior. And no, shoplifting is NOT a victimless crime: prices go up, quality-of-life goes down, criminal acts beget other criminal acts, businesses leave, etc. The Yonkers Police will always do our part to deliver perpetrators of crime into the legal system where they must be held accountable.

On This Day in Yonkers History...



1930's movie star Mary Pickford

Monday, January 16th

January 16, 1928: The monoplane owned by A. R. Martine of North Broadway was forced to abandon its third attempt to break the world's endurance record because of sleet. Piloted by Clarence Chamberlin and Roger Q. Williams, another attempt was made within a few weeks.

January 16, 1945: Accused of altering a signal monitor report by a handwriting expert, Lieutenant Edward O'Connor offered testimony of fellow officers to prove he was not involved in the Copcutt Lane gambling incident. Officer John Terry, Radio Telegraph Division, was on duty at the time of the incident. He stated no calls had come through from the area of Copcutt Lane. O'Connor's attorney Paul Bleakley asked the charges be dismissed for lack of evidence; Trial Commissioner Francis Duffy reserved decision. While questioning Patrolman Fred Connolly, Broderick intimated Connolly, claiming he pushed aside the night watchman, and threatened to arrest all the men there. It was the first time anyone had suggested Connolly had entered the building, and there was no evidence presented to support the claim.

Tuesday, January 17th

January 17, 1928: After several long moths of litigation, Surrogate Judge George Slater announced the estate of Charles Otis of Buena Vista Avenue, the last surviving son of Elisha Otis, was settled. At the time of the probate, Margaret Otis Nesbit Otis announced she was the widow of the deceased. A cousin of Otis, she was his housekeeper, and eventually married him. She settled for \$131,000. The remainder was split between nieces and nephews who were named in Otis' will.

January 17, 1949: John Flynn, former president of the Yonkers Junior Chamber of Commerce (Jaycees) received the US Junior Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service Award, presented for his "outstanding service and accomplishment contributing to the enrichment of a NY community.". He was the originator of the Yonkers Civic Service School in 1945, a project that won both national and state awards and was adopted by other municipalities throughout the country. Flynn was Yonkers Mayor from 1961-1966 and NYS Senator from Yonkers 1967-1986.

Wednesday, January 18th

January 18, 1933: The protest by Alberta Miller, mother of slain fire fighter Warren Miller, over daughter-in-law Anne Miller receiving her son's pension after fatally stabbing him, was denied. Assistant Corporation Counsel Raymond Hannon stated Yonkers had no legal grounds to withhold the pension since Anne was exonerated in the fatal stabbing of her husband; Medical Examiner Amos Squire ruled the stabbing was "justifiable homicide" and she acted in self-defense.

January 18, 1954: Robert Jacobson Pharmacy and YPD helped save a NYC life! Jacobson's had a large refrigerator, and was able to store a variety of serums. St. Elizabeth's Hospital desperately needed a rare gas gangrene serum. The hospital sent out a call... Jacobson's had it! Sergeant Lester Brent sped to the pharmacy to pick up the lifesaving medicine, then raced to the city line where NYPD officers waited to rush it to the hospital.

Thursday, January 19th

January 19, 1944: Yonkers Postmaster William Cronin announced 38 postal workers were given 60-day deferments by local draft boards. Cronin filed deferment applications with local boards and sent copies to the Post Office Department in Washington as additional depletion of the Yonkers staff for war service would cause sharp curtailment of service and elimination of some deliveries.

January 19, 1954: School 26 mothers kept their children home from school because of the "hazardous conditions" of roads leading to the school. The day before, one of the school buses had gotten stuck in a snow bank on the school grounds; it took an hour to extricate it. Only 44% of the children attended and just 24 of the 165 students who rode school buses went to school.

Friday, January 20th

January 20, 1932: City Judge Charles Boote ordered police to arrest any young man who attempted to "pick up" an unescorted girl on the street. Enraged by a lothario who not only tried to entice a girl into his car, he insulted and used profane language to the officer who attempted to reprimand him. Boote directed, "Officers, from now on, whenever you see any boy stop an automobile and attempt to speak to girls they do not know, place everyone in that car under arrest immediately."

January 20, 1939: The Yonkers Academy of Medicine asked city officials to help eliminate people with "political influence and financial means" from receiving free medical treatment at the municipal clinics!

Saturday, January 21st

January 21, 1931: H. H. Sheldon, Professor of Physics at NYU, labeled the laying of beer hose through the Yonkers sewer system as "the outstanding engineering feat" in bootlegging! "...a four-inch hose make of rubber and copper was strung through the city sewer system for a distance of 6,000 feet. It ran from a soft drink brewery to a garage more than a mile distant. To lay such a tube, bend it around corners, would be an engineering job of high order, even if done openly. To lay it secretly presents extraordinary difficulty. Yet it was done."

January 21, 1931: Yonkers gave a ticket to Mary Pickford's car! She was in Yonkers to attend a preview of her latest picture "Kiki," at the Strand Theater. Her chauffeur parked in front of the World War Memorial, and received a summons. Because he was unfamiliar with our parking regulations, Judge Boote gave him a suspended sentence.

Sunday, January 22nd

January 22, 1931: A solemn High Funeral Mass was said at St. Denis Church for Alfred McCann, pure food crusader, lecturer, author, radio star and Park Hill resident. Because of the popularity of McCann and his radio show, WOR Radio broadcast it outside the church for the large crowd there. The family received many messages of condolence, including from Cardinal Hayes and former Governor Alfred Smith.

January 22, 1958: Public Safety Commissioner Milton Goldman announced all-night-traffic-lights would be turned off, either at 10 pm or 1 am. Only lights at 16 major intersections, such as McLean and South Broadway, would remain on 24 hours a day.



#25-Growing up, Mary J. Blige turned to singing as an escape, and early on she often wrestled her demons in performance. "There would be times where she would be in the studio singing and it would be the dopest take in the world, but she would be crying," producer Chucky Thompson recalled of working on Blige's second album, My Life. But the singer took a firmer grip on her life and career, and her singing gained in turn — the deep emotion intact, the pitchiness eliminated. Most of all, the character — someone who's been through it and refuses to give up. —M.M.

45-Voices change — that's what aging does. But although Ella Fitzgerald's style deepened — her voice gained in character and her phrasing in perception — her voice itself generated the illusion of youthfulness for decades, all the way to her sixties. What a run! Fitzgerald's famously precise enunciation was right there from her first recording, 1938's "A-Tisket — A-Tasket," with Chick Webb's orchestra. But if rock-raised ears may find Fitzgerald's portrait-painter precision a mite proper, the very grain of her voice is always wonderfully earthy. She's sensuous, learned, and spry, and she's worth hearing in every phase of her career. —M.M.



BCW Celebrates Hollywood On Hudson With Tour of Lionsgate Studio Another Active Year Voting Final and Preliminary

More than 100 business leaders and BCW members attended a special reception at iPark in Yonkers on January 5th to get a behind-the-scenes peek at the Great Point Studios/Lionsgate facility that is transforming Yonkers into Hollywood on Hudson.

Great Point Studios CEO Robert Halmi, Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano and New York State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins attended the evening reception, where they described a city that is quickly becoming the East Coast equivalent of Burbank, California, a satellite community of Los Angeles where many media and entertainment companies operate production facilities.

Halmi, a Westchester County native, has repeatedly stated that he chose Yonkers to build three film and television production studio campuses because the city lies within a critical 25-mile radius from Manhattan. "We have everything on campus, from all the latest technology, lights, LED panels, flying cameras, anything anybody could need to make whatever they could dream of," said Halmi, adding that his facility will transform Yonkers. "We're building a business that will be here forever and people will move to be here. People will think that they're coming to Hollywood, but they're coming to Yonkers. It's going to be the


By the completion of construction in December 2023, the \$500 million Great Point Studios in Yonkers will be the largest media production facility in the Northeast, and it will consist of three locations. The location in downtown Yonkers on Wells Avenue will be the headquarters and primary production center. The South Campus at the former Rising Ground/Leake & Watts property will house the largest LED screen stage in the United States. The North Campus on North Broadway will be leased by Mediapro, a European film and television production company that also occupies space at the Wells Avenue location.

"This is truly Hollywood on the Hudson and I'm very excited about that," said Mayor Spano. "We know it means jobs. We know that it means revenues for the city. We also know that it means people will have a new idea about Yonkers."

"We all know somebody who is going to be inspired by what happens here," said State Sen. Andrea Stewart-Cousins. "We will compete with Hollywood with the talent and the vision, and with the cooperation of all the people here, we will become everything we all envision.'

Last month, the Connecticut-based iPark, an entity of National Resources, closed on its \$52.6 million acquisition of the former Rising Ground/Leake & Watts complex. Great Point Studios' South Campus will also house a new media high school for the Yonkers Public Schools. The new school will open unprecedented opportunities for Yonkers youth interested in media careers at a time of explosive content production due to online streaming.

"From the fiber optic network that Great Point Studios is creating to allow instant editing of footage on site as it is recorded, to the educational initiative that will allow Yonkers students to land six-figure media jobs upon graduation, this company is at the forefront of innovation," said BCW CEO Marsha Gordon.



Yonkers IDA Continues Record of Success with Approval of Financial Incentives for Developments Representing \$277 Million in Private Investment





Over Past 4 Years, Yonkers IDA Has Provided Financial Incentives to Projects Representing Private Investment of More Than \$1.76 Billion

Continuing its record of success, the Yonkers Industrial Development Agency (IDA) reported another active year for 2022 voting final and preliminary approval of financial incentives to residential and commercial projects representing a total private investment of \$277 million. The developments are projected to create over 500 new residential units and 1,255 construction jobs.

Since 2019, the Yonkers IDA has voted financial incentives to development projects representing a total private investment of more than \$1.76 billion. The developments are projected to create approximately 3,760 new residential units and approximately 4,600 construction jobs. Ten percent of all new residential units are set aside for affordable housing.
