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## Empowering Health:

## Prostate Cancer Awareness Seminar Luncheon

On Saturday, January 18th, 2025, there was an important event at the Yonkers Riverfront Library. The third prostate cancer awareness seminar luncheon brought together nearly two dozen attendees for an insightful and impactful event aimed at increasing awareness about prostate cancer, particularly within the Black community. This event was made possible by a collaboration of five groups: Luther V. Garrison Masonic Foundation, James H. Farrell Lodge #34, Fans for the Cure, Covenantstone LLC., and RISEUP.

Prostate cancer is a significant health concern for men, especially Black men, who are diagnosed with the disease at a rate of one every 13 minutes. Dr. Michael Feuerstein, Chief of Urology at New York Presbyterian Hospital in Westchester and Assistant Professor at Columbia University, served as the guest speaker for the event. His presence added a critical layer of expertise, as he emphasized the importance of early detection, which can save lives. Dr. Feuerstein explained that nearly 100% of prostate cancer patients diagnosed early will survive for at least five years. However, the reality is stark—nearly 17 Black men die every day from the disease, highlighting the urgency for education and early intervention.

The seminar not only focused on statistics but also shared personal stories, including a moving testimonial from a man who had undergone surgery for prostate cancer. His story resonated deeply with the audience, illustrating both the emotional and physical challenges of facing the disease and the importance of seeking medical care when necessary.

Dr. Feuerstein's speech emphasized the role that women play in encouraging men to seek medical help. He explained that women are often the ones who push men to see a doctor, making them vital allies in the fight against prostate cancer. His remarks were met with appreciation from the audience, many of whom nod-ded in agreement, recognizing the truth in his words.

Reflecting on his experience at the event, Dr. Feuerstein shared his gratitude: "As a man... this was a great experience," he said. "I'm glad to be reaching out to the community." His words highlighted the importance of engaging directly with the public to share knowledge and empower individuals to take control of their health.

The seminar provided not only valuable information but also a sense of community, as attendees connected over shared experiences and a common goal: to spread awareness and improve health outcomes for men facing prostate cancer.

The event's success underscores the power of collaboration between community organizations and medical professionals in fostering awareness and providing support for those affected by prostate cancer. The hope is that by continuing these discussions and encouraging early screening, more lives will be saved, and the statistics will begin to shift in a positive direction.


For those unable to attend, the message remains clear: early detection is key. Prostate cancer can be managed effectively if caught early, and all men, especially those in high-risk groups, should be proactive about their health.



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# The Debate Over ICE in Westchester & Deporting Illegal Criminals

Westchester residents will soon be seeing more agents from the US Immigrations Custom & Enforcement, (ICE). With the election of President Trump, a new policy will be enacted regarding the detaining and deporting of illegal migrant criminals.

Westchester currently has a law that does not allow law enforcement in our communities to cooperate with ICE when they are detaining illegal migrants. This law, the Immigrant Protection Act (IPA), does not prohibit ICE from doing its job but requires it to go before a Federal Judge and get a court order before they detain these individuals in Westchester.

Opinions are split on the Westchester IPA, with supporters saying it helps protect the migrant community while opponents say it makes ICE's job tougher to complete.

Recently, ICE has worked in Westchester without the help of local law enforcement and will continue to do so.

More important, according to Tom Homan, Director of ICE, agents are focusing on removing illegal aliens that have committed crimes. Families and illegal migrants who have not committed crimes are not the current target of ICE.

A review of recent ICE activities in the NY Metropolitan area shows ICE activities occurring for noncitizens who presented a danger to the American public specifically targeted noncitizens for apprehension who had felonies or misdemeanors for domestic violence, sexual abuse or exploitation, burglary, unlawful possession or use of a firearm, drug distribution or trafficking, and driving under the influence. Drug traffickers and cartel members have also been detained and deported.

There have been no detentions of family members or persons in the US illegally who have not committed a crime, according to their website news, //www.ice.gov/news/releases/ero.

Homan has called this policy detaining the worst -first. "Right now, we are concentrating the worst first-public safety and national security threats. We gave them the direction to prioritize public safety threats. That's what we're looking for. We've been working with a target list."

"ICE officers throughout the country were told today, 'Go make arrests of those here illegally that have a public safety threat.' So, they've developed target sheets, an operational plan to go out in the field ... so they're out there right now looking for the most serious public safety threats throughout the country," Homan said.

On the first day under President Trump, ICE, under the guidance of Tom Homan, has reportedly arrested 308 individuals in the past 24 hours, focusing on those illegally in the U.S. who are considered public safety threats, such as murderers and rapists. This operation is part of a broader policy shift aimed at reducing illegal entries, with border apprehensions significantly dropping.



# Westchester County Earns Over \$212k in Energy Conservation Incentives Through



Through Demand Response Program

Westchester County received \$212,715.54 in total earnings for its participation in the NYISO and ConEdison Demand Response program(s), an initiative designed to reduce energy consumption, strengthen grid reliability during peak usage periods and prevention of blackouts. As part of the recognition for last year's performance, the County's Demand Response provider, NuEnergen, presented the County with a ceremonial check, reflecting payments earned for remaining on standby to reduce energy usage when the New York State energy grid is at risk of overload.

The Demand Response program is a vital tool in managing the stability of the energy grid, preventing blackouts and mitigating the need for new carbon intensive power plant construction(s). Westchester County earned \$31,196.62 during the winter season and \$181,518.95 over the summer, demonstrating the year-round importance of the initiative. By reducing power consumption during critical periods, the County not only generates significant revenue but also contributes to environmental preservation by curbing greenhouse gas emissions, lowering the overall strain on the grid, and minimizing brown-outs and blackouts.

Westchester County Executive Ken Jenkins said: "Our participation in the Demand Response program is a prime example of how Westchester County is leading the way in energy conservation and environmental stewardship. This initiative provides direct financial benefits that can be reinvested into the community and reinforces our commitment to reducing emissions and promoting grid stability. We are proud to partner with NuEnergen as our demand response provider and to continue taking steps that benefit both the environment and our constituents."

Director of Energy Conservation and Sustainability Peter L. McCartt said: "The Demand Response program allows our County to take meaningful action in addressing energy challenges faced by the energy transition. By strategically reducing energy consumption during periods of high demand, we are helping stabilize the grid, contributing to dirty emissions reductions, and improving air quality. This program exemplifies how local governments can drive impactful change, proving that sustainability efforts can generate environmental and economic rewards for our community."

NuEnergen's Representative Scott Besada said: "Westchester County continues to demonstrate exceptional leadership in energy conservation and sustainability. Their active participation in the Demand Response programs reflects a forward-looking energy management approach that benefits the County and the broader region. 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# Susan Spear Named Commissioner of the Department of Emergency Services



Susan Spear, First Woman to Head DES in its History

Susan Spear has been appointed commissioner of the Department of Emergency Services, becoming the first woman to hold that post in DES history, County Executive Ken Jenkins announced.

Spear, who served as deputy commissioner at DES since November 2020, replaces Richard G. Wishnie. He was named by Jenkins as his Deputy County Executive last week.

"Susan Spear has done a tremendous job as deputy commissioner, and she is the right person to lead the Department of Emergency Services into the future. I am grateful for her leadership at DES and for her exemplary service to our County during the Covid-19 pandemic and other major events in Westchester."

Spear said, "I am thankful to County Executive Jenkins for the trust he has placed in me and for his longtime support of this Department. I am proud to lead the outstanding men and women at DES who play such a vital role in keeping Westchester safe. On behalf of all of us at DES, I would also like to thank Richard Wishnie for his leadership and significant contributions to DES during his tenure as commissioner."

The Department of Emergency Services, which just celebrated the 25th anniversary of its creation, consists of four divisions: Fire Services, Communications (60 Control), Emergency Management (OEM) and Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

The Fire Services Division is comprised of four units: fire training, fire inspection, special operations, and fire prevention and protection. The division administers, coordinates and maintains the fire training program that is available to Westchester County's 59 fire departments. It also oversees specialized units, including the Hazardous Materials Response Team and the Technical Rescue Team.

The Emergency Communications Center, commonly referred to as 60 Control, provides primary dispatch service for 54 fire departments and 34 EMS agencies in Westchester. The center is staffed by communications specialists 24 hours each day and also handles all fire and EMS mutual aid requests going in and out of the County.

OEM provides planning, preparedness training and emergency response to major events. It works collaboratively with local, state and federal agencies to prepare Westchester for disasters and related response. During a major emergency and significant weather events, OEM may activate the County's Emergency Operations Center, a state-of-the-art facility where the County, local municipalities, hospitals, utilities and other agencies work together to keep Westchester safe. The division also maintains a stockpile of critical supplies that can be dispensed to local communities during an emergency.

The EMS Division collaborates with local, regional and state agencies to enhance the effectiveness of the County's Emergency Medical Services system. It provides medical training to County employees, EMS providers, firefighters, police agencies and other organizations. It also assigns EMS personnel to County events and facilities, and provides mutual aid coordination and incident management assistance during large-scale events.

"The next few years will bring new challenges, which DES is well-prepared to address with the support of County leadership. We plan to continue making progress on important capital projects and facilities improvements that will further enhance our training programs and resource capabilities," Spear said.

Spear's appointment as commissioner must be confirmed by the Westchester County Board of Legislators.



# On This Day in Yonkers History...



You're Out! Major League Umpire Bill Klem, from Yonkers, 1914

Monday, January 27th

January 27, 1923: Sara McPike was appointed secretary of the State Department of Labor; her official duties would start a month later on March 1st.

January 27, 1942: An anonymous Yonkers housewife offered \$500 to establish a fund for sponsorship of a Navy bomber to be called "The City of Yonkers." The woman, a client of attorney Albert Jordan, was a housewife of moderate means who wanted to do something concrete in the war effort.

January 27, 1943: Thousands of Smith Carpet workers at a company rally pledged to "...to work as hard for our boys on fronts all over the world as they are fighting for the people at home."

Major Clement Bishop addressing the workers the workers reminded the crowd they were "...the army behind the Army, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard—the soldiers of the production line."

Tuesday, January 28th

January 28, 1943: Yonkers Fire Chief Edward Siller began a campaign to compel people to remove "encumbrances from fire escapes!" Firefighters on inspection duty reported "flagrant violations" all over Yonkers. Siller believed people didn't think of fire escapes as emergency exits; instead, they thought the exits were "part of their apartments," using them to store food, put chairs on them and decorated them with flowerpots. He reported several firefighters were injured by falling items; worse, some fire emergency escapes were blocked, making them useless.

This was the first and "final warning; summonses would be issued" because it was the "only way the law can be enforced." Yonkers imposed fines ranging from \$5 to \$50 for a first offense, depending on how bad the blockage was.

Wednesday, January 29th

January 29, 1944: While on routine patrol, Patrolman Michael Novotny spotted what could have been the answer to a prayer for a thirsty police officer; being a good officer, Novotny followed the rules and reported a keg of beer rolling down Herriot Street! # New Real Estate Report Reveals Dramatic Growth In Westchester County



A new real estate report authored by RM Friedland reveals the explosive growth of housing in Westchester County since 2021, with about 12,500 new residential units delivered and another 15,000 units under construction.

Representatives from RM Friedland delivered their findings on January 14 in White Plains at the Business Council of Westchester's and the Fordham Real Estate Institute's annual real estate development conference.

"The amount of residential development that has occurred in Westchester County in recent years is unprecedented," said BCW president and CEO Marsha Gordon. "The report explores the impact of this development on the local economy and the countywide school system."

RM Friedland president Sarah Jones-Maturo said that Westchester County is responding to the national housing shortage head-on. "We believe Westchester serves as a microcosm for the nation, demonstrating how strategic planning, innovative policies and balanced development can create thriving communities," said Jones-Maturo.

One of the report's surprising findings is that Westchester County's new construction has not overcrowded schools. Westchester cities experiencing the most substantial new development activity, such as New Rochelle and Yonkers, have seen a notable decline in their overall student populations between 2018 and 2023. This trend challenges the commonly held assumption that increased residential development leads directly to overcrowded schools.

"The impact of these developments on the schools is minimal at this point," said David Cortez, CEO of Foretold Predictive Analytics, one of the keynote speakers. "I often hear from other people in the community, particularly homeowners, saying our schools are going to become overcrowded. That's not the case at all."

The report noted that New Rochelle has emerged as the clear leader in development within Westchester County, with more than 6,145 residential units currently under construction. This rapid growth is due to the city's strategic investments, its emphasis on transit-oriented projects, and the transformative impact of its Master Development Plan.

The report also pointed to Yonkers, whose key strength is the scale of its development potential, particularly as its downtown area expands further into Getty Square. This expansion is expected to unlock massive opportunities for mixed-use and residential projects.

John Barrett, co-managing director at RM Friedland, explained that the report does not include proposed housing units that are still under review for approval.

"As a company, we are tracking another 10,000 units that are not under construction yet, but they are appearing before boards, or the ideas have been floated with local municipalities. This is unprecedented for Westchester County," said Barrett.

The BCW-Fordham event featured two dynamic panels with members of the community that brought a tremendous diversity of perspective. The panels were moderated by Dr. Joshua Harris, executive director of the Fordham Real Estate Institute, addressing RM Friedland's findings.

The first panel: A Reality Check: The Impact of New Development included luxury and affordable housing developers and government officials with opposing views. Kenneth Morrison, managing member of Lemor Development, an affordable hous

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ing developer with proposed projects in Yonkers, reflected upon the challenges of building affordable housing. "Our 80-20 is 80 percent affordable and 20 percent market rate, so the uniqueness about that is that it is extremely expensive to build that kind of housing. This project that we're working on in Yonkers would be 166 units.... Interest rates went up over the last 12 months, turning a project that was feasible into a project that has a tremendous gap.... The issue that we have is trying to plug that gap without having to raise the rents."

Peter Chavkin, managing partner of Biddle Real Estate Ventures, a luxury housing developer that is best known in Westchester as one of the developers of Edge on Hudson in Sleepy Hollow, spoke of his success at the project. "In our condominium product called the Daymark, the first waterfront condominium project in the Edge on Hudson community (Sleepy Hollow), we have about eight months left on construction. We've sold 70 of the 100 units already. That's about two and a half times faster than we would have expected."

Mayor Yadira Ramos-Herbert provided further details on the status of new development in New Rochelle. "The model that my predecessors on the City Council experimented with is working. We have 11,000 units approved within a nine-year period, which is remarkable.... It's the opportunity to really reimagine your city, and so we're entering phase two of New Rochelle's renaissance, which is investment in that downtown and activating the first floors."

Mayor Mary Marvin expressed some concern about the impact of new development on the Village of Bronxville: "We're an outlier on the school issue.... We have 35 children that joined the last week of August. (The superintendent) had to add a sixth second grade, which took away the art room at the Bronxville schools, so now they have what they call 'art on a cart.' The current taxpayers are not thrilled about what happened to the art room."

The second panel featured representatives that support the infrastructure of our county. Leaders from the sectors of early childcare, energy/sustainability, healthcare and education were all represented. The panel was titled: The Development Surge: Community Opportunities and Challenges Faced.

Noam Bramson, acting in his role as Executive Director of Sustainable West-chester, urged consideration of the environment when discussing new development and touted Westchester's success. "A zero-growth philosophy is completely unrealistic and undesirable from a wide spectrum of considerations. The better way to look at it is to say we are going to grow. We should grow, but how do we want to grow? The sort of development that we're all talking about is entirely consistent environmental values and climate action because it's concentrated in areas that are walkable and that have access to mass transit."

Dr. Joseph Ricca, superintendent of the White Plains public schools, asked that developers work collaboratively with school administrators to ensure a healthy community. "With all the challenges, one of the things that we benefit from is a strong community. Even what we're doing right now, collaborating, and talking about how we can work together. I've had the privilege of working with Mayor (Tom) Roach for the last eight years in partnership with the Common Council and talking about smart choices that we can collaborate on for the benefit of the city and the children. That's what's attractive, the commitment to community throughout Westchester County."

Mark Mathias, Lightbridge Academy/The Barley House, expressed further concern about the environment and how that may affect his clients with young children. "I love the idea of emboldening the downtown areas of our Westchester communities.... I'm a big proponent of it, but I do share the concerns about impervious surface areas, the flooding issues that we've had in Westchester. Traffic is always an issue in every town we're in."

Tina Macica, AVP of design and construction, Department of Facilities & Real Estate at Montefiore Health System, provided insight into how her health system is addressing Westchester's growing population. "From a broader perspective, how do we serve the growing need? Being proactive and staying ahead of growth is crucial. We remain focused on recruiting top healthcare professionals and expanding access to high-quality care to meet the increasing demand."

Marsha Gordon said in closing: "As the report mentions, the collective efforts of all parties involved in Westchester County's development projects offer valuable lessons for regions grappling with housing shortages. By harmonizing development with community needs, the county has created a sustainable model for growth that fosters economic resilience, preserves quality of life, and positions itself as a beacon for modern urban and suburban planning."





Eichler Brewery... the employee answering the phone appreciated the Yonekrs police cooperation, so instructed Sheeky to "Go ahead and tap it!" He didn't. Instead, he found the driver who lost the keg and gave it back to him!

Thursday, January 30th

January 30, 1920: For the second time, Stephen Roberts made a hole-in-one on the Dunwoodie Country Club thirteenth hole. His first ace, on the very same hole, happened three years earlier.

January 30, 1923: Motion Picture heartthrob Rudolph Valentino was guest speaker at the Westchester Federation of Women's Club meeting at the Yonkers YWCA. He addressed more than 250 women on "What the Public Gets."

January 30, 1943: Boyce Thompson Institute dismantled a large crane used to provide night light to their greenhouses; once taken apart, it was donated to the Yonkers Scrap Metal Drive.

Friday, January 31st

January 31, 1916: Theater operator F. F. Proctor opened his 27th theater on South Broadway across from City Hall; it was known as the Palace.

January 31, 1919: Nationally known baseball umpire William J. Klem of 610 South Broadway, declared it was only a matter of time until baseball would become "America's national game and the world's favorite sport."

A member of the Baseball Hall of Fame, Klem had an uncanny eye for calling balls and strikes and was nicknamed the "Old Arbitrator."

Saturday, February 1st

February 1, 1927: Yonkers residents in the Gray Oaks area protested the change of name of the City Tuberculosis Hospital on Saw Mill River Road to Grey Oaks Hospital. The protesters maintained the hospital was not in the Grey Oaks community, but in Nepera Park, and the name would reduce their property value. They did not win. The property was sold to Precision Valve in 1957.

February 1, 1934: A flashlight proved to be the undoing of three teenage thieves caught in the act! While Patrolman Edward Merlin was walking his night beat, he noticed a moving light in Joseph Kohn's Rug and Linoleum Shop on New Main Street. Investigating, he found one teen and arrested him. After turning the fellow over to the Emergency Squad, he went back and found the other two hiding behind rolls of linoleum. When searched at Police Headquarters, one of the teens had money taken from Kohn's register.

Sunday, February 2nd

February 2, 1918: The weather in Yonkers was so cold there was a three inch layer of ice on the Hudson off Yonkers! The steamer Ben Franklin had to cut her way through the ice on the Hudson. The Hudson was frozen over for more than a month, and coal supplies were running low. Since Otis had not received word from the government a shipment of coal was on its way, the company closed down at noon to conserve fuel. The temperature at the Empire City Racetrack at 10 a.m.

February 2, 1931: For the second time, Yonkers' Carlos Henriquez won Wrestling Champion of all Spanish Speaking countries! Henriquez defeated Jack Russell in Mexico City after 32 minutes of grappling; the winner employed a flying tackle, throwing Russell flat. The audience of 8000 people included President of Mexico Ortiz Rubio, the American Ambassador Dwight Morrow and Governor Alfred Gomez of Toluca. This was one of the largest wrestling tournaments ever staged in Mexico City.



Homan also reported that over the first 24 hours of President Trump total apprehensions on the southern US border were 766. That compares to 10,000 to 12,000 per day under President Biden.

A Department of Justice memo states that federal prosecutors must "take all steps necessary to protect the public and secure the American border by removing illegal aliens from the country and prosecuting illegal aliens for crimes" committed in U.S. jurisdiction."

Westchester's two members of Congress disagree on the best course of action. Congressman George Latimer signed the IPA as County Executive.

Congressman Mike Lawler has supported ICE, and the removal of illegal criminals. Last year, a report from ICE revealed that there are tens of thousands of illegal immigrants with convictions for sexual assault and homicide convictions loose on American streets. The report from ICE specifically cites sanctuary city policies as "shielding dangerous criminals, who often victimize those same communities." Of a staggering seven million illegal immigrants not in detention as of July 2024, 425,431 were convicted criminals and 222,141 had pending criminal charges.

"As I have said again and again, sanctuary city policies are putting Americans in danger and getting people killed," said Lawler.

Immigration support groups in Westchester fear that the ICE policies will include detaining and deporting illegals who have not committed a crime.

The New York Immigration Coalition recently highlighted Oscar, a NY resident alien, from Honduras. "I came to this country when I was 14. I have lived here for 25 years. I have spent more time living and working here. I got married and have my children here and own my truck and work here. I love Honduras, but I feel American. I just don't have a paper that says I am an American."

There is no evidence that ICE is working to detain and deport illegal residents like Oscar and his family. Currently ICE is limited to working off a list of illegal alien

ordered that he undergo 5 years post-resupervision following his release from prison. lease D.A. Cacace said: "Mr. Ferrell set off the chain of events that resulted in Zyaire Fernandez's death. Today's sentence reflects the seriousness of his role in this tragedy. My office is committed to ensuring that our children are kept safe from gun violence and that our communities remain safe places for them to live, learn, and grow."

In November of last year, a jury convicted Mr. Ferrell of Manslaughter in the First Degree, among other charges. Attrial, prosecutors showed that Mr. Ferrell provided his 9 mm pistol to his stepson, Tyrese Coghiel, and told him to "do what you gottado." Shortly thereafter, Mr. Coghiel used the pistol to shoot and kill Zyaire.

After the killing, Mr. Ferrell retrieved the gun and proceeded to hide it in his oven alongside two explosive devices and ammunition, all of which were recovered by law enforcement during the execution of a search warrant.

At sentencing, Zyaire's mother stated: "Ever since that day, my life has not been the same. I miss my baby. He was 14 years old. He didn't deserve what happened to him."

The trial jury additionally found Mr. Ferrell guilty of several related charges and Judge Fufidio sentenced him on these charges as follows: two counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree (15 years' imprisonment on each), two counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Third Degree (3 to 6 years' imprisonment on each), Hindering Prosecution in the First Degree (3 to 6 years' imprisonment), and Tampering with Physical Evidence (2 to 4 years' imprisonment). All of these sentences are to run concurrently with the 25-year sentence for Manslaughter.

Mr. Coghiel, 23, pleaded guilty to Murder in the Second Degree in February of last year. Because of his cooperation with Mr. Ferrell's prosecution, it is expected that he will be allowed to change his guilty plea to Manslaughter in the First Degree. He is scheduled to be sentenced Feb. 20 before Judge Fufidio.

The investigation was conducted by the Mount Vernon Police Department's Major Case Bureau with the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Safe Streets Task Force and D.A. Investigator Jed Salter.

The case was prosecuted by Lana Hochheiser, Chief of the Homicide Bureau, and Assistant District Attorney Adrian Murphy.

Tyrese Coghiel used the gun to shoot Zyaire Fernandez at the Levister Towers housing complex in Mt. Vernon.

This will be the first election in Westchester after President Trump took the oath of office for a second term.

Sculti ran for County Executive four years ago, losing to Latimer-62%-38%. Some Westchester Republicans we spoke to said that although many of the bigger-name Westchester Republicans (County Legislator James Nolan, Assemblyman Matt Slater, Eastchester Supervisor Tony Colavita) declined to run, Sculti could do better this time.

"Trump did better in Westchester last November, and I think some of the issues she (Sculti) is running on could resonate. Plus, turnout will be lower in a special election," said a Yonkers republican.

On Nov. 5, 2024-Trump got 37% of the vote in Westchester, with Vice President Kamala Harris winning the county with 63%. In 2020, Biden beat Trump in Westchester -68%-32%. So Trump improved his totals in Westchester by 5% from 2020-24.

In 2022, Lee Zeldin got 40% of the vote for Governor, with Governor Kathy Hochul winning Westchester with 60% of the vote.

Sculti has also been involved in a group -Save our Schools for Westchester Children, which has advocated against DEI education and as she mentioned in her release-gender transitioning and boys playing in women's high school sports.

We are glad that the residents of Westchester County will have a choice when they vote on February 11 for County Executive.

But as one Westchester Democrat put it "Ken has to be elated that he is running against Sculti. But I'm not sure there is any republican who could beat Ken for County Executive. And that includes Trump, Astorino, you pick one."

Susan Spear, First Woman to Head DES in its History

Susan Spear has been appointed commissioner of the Department of Emergency Services, becoming the first woman to hold that post in DES history, County Executive Ken Jenkins announced.

Spear, who served as deputy commissioner at DES since November 2020, replaces Richard G. Wishnie. He was named by Jenkins as his Deputy County

"Susan Spear has done a tremendous job as deputy commissioner, and she is the right person to lead the Department of Emergency Services into the future. I am grateful for her leadership at DES and for her exemplary service to our County during the Covid-19 pandemic and other major events in Westchester."

Spear said, "I am thankful to County Executive Jenkins for the trust he has placed in me and for his longtime support of this Department. I am proud to lead the outstanding men and women at DES who play such a vital role in keeping Westchester safe. On behalf of all of us at DES, I would also like to thank Richard Wishnie for his leadership and significant contributions to DES during his tenure as commissioner."

The Department of Emergency Services, which just celebrated the 25th anniversary of its creation, consists of four divisions: Fire Services, Communications (60 Control), Emergency Management (OEM) and Emergency Medical Services

The Fire Services Division is comprised of four units: fire training, fire inspection, special operations, and fire prevention and protection. The division administers, coordinates and maintains the fire training program that is available to Westchester County's 59 fire departments. It also oversees specialized units, including the Hazardous Materials Response Team and the Technical Rescue Team.

The Emergency Communications Center, commonly referred to as 60 Control, provides primary dispatch service for 54 fire departments and 34 EMS agencies in Westchester. The center is staffed by communications specialists 24 hours each day and also handles all fire and EMS mutual aid requests going in and out of the

OEM provides planning, preparedness training and emergency response to major events. It works collaboratively with local, state and federal agencies to prepare Westchester for disasters and related response. During a major emergency and significant weather events, OEM may activate the County's Emergency Operations Center, a state-of-the-art facility where the County, local municipalities, hospitals, utilities and other agencies work together to keep Westchester safe. The division also maintains a stockpile of critical supplies that can be dispensed to local communities during an emergency.

The EMS Division collaborates with local, regional and state agencies to enhance the effectiveness of the County's Emergency Medical Services system. It provides medical training to County employees, EMS providers, firefighters, police agencies and other organizations. It also assigns EMS personnel to County events and facilities, and provides mutual aid coordination and incident management assistance during large-scale events.

The next few years will bring new challenges, which DES is well-prepared to address with the support of County leadership. We plan to continue making progress on important capital projects and facilities improvements that will further enhance our training programs and resource capabilities," Spear said.

Spear's appointment as commissioner must be confirmed by the Westchester County Board of Legislators.

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
