Congratulations to Yonkers Middle-High School Valedictorian Sarah Ranginwala and Salutatorian Carolin Pulickal. Both will graduate with the highest, weighted GPA's in the Yonkers Public Schools.

Sarah will graduate with a 104. 27 GPA, but didn't make a big deal of being the #1 students in the YPS Class of 2022. "It feels nice, but honestly it was beccause my classes are weighted."

That's correct but those weighted classes are more difficult, and the IB Program at Yonkers Middle -High School is consistently ranked as one of the top high school programs in the nation.

Sarah's favorite teachers are Mr. John Krajovan (English), Dr. Lesia Kaszczak (Biology), Mr. German Arregui (Math). "I couldn't pick just one. These three teachers I have taken classes with for more than one year and they played a large part in my growth. I took (IB) Biology this year and it was the most enoyable course this year."

Extra curricular activities for Ranginwala include a Columbia University honors program and volunteering at Beczak Environmental Center. "I got in during my junior year and have taken astronomy and astrophysics every Saturday this year. It gave me a sneak peak into the college experience, and for students like me interested in STEM, I plan on going into bio-engineering as a career, it was great to see what it was like learning from distinguished professors."

"I also enjoyed volunteering at Beczak every weekend and clean up the park and try to help the environment. I took a course where we learned about the Hudson river and the organisms in it. It was interesting, and I never thought of myself as being interested in environmental science but I was glad I got to explore it."

Sarah was accepted into 11 colleges and will be attending New York Institute of Technology in the fall. "It was an economic decision and the school is diverse, like Yonkers High. Yonkers Police Arrest, Charge Fourteen Dealers in Nodine Hill Drug Sweep



Today, Mayor Mike Spano, Commissioner Chris Sapienza, and Westchester County Department of Public Safety Acting Commissioner Terrance Raynor announced a series of arrests which took place last week throughout the City of Yonkers, targeting street level drug dealers, including members of several local street gangs, as a result of an intensive six-month long investigation. Operation: Elm Sweep is a collaborative law enforcement effort between the Yonkers Police Department, the Westchester County Department of Public Safety, and the Violent Criminal Enterprise Bureau of the Westchester County District Attorney's Office.

Members of the Yonkers Police Department began executing arrests last Tuesday, targeting fourteen offenders who are the subject of this investigation. The majority of these arrests took place on the west side of the City. The defendants allegedly operated in and around the Nodine Hill Area, specifically the Elm Street corridor, and were engaged in illegal narcotics sales including crack-cocaine. Undercover officers were utilized in the course of this investigation.

Many of the defendants have extensive criminal histories, and many have been present or connected to group violence and violent incidents in the area, including: murders, attempted murders, stabbings and felony assaults, multiple incidents of shots fired, and illegal possession of firearms; two were present in the bodega deli where a Yonkers Police Detective was recently shot; the April 2021 shooting of a 6-year-old child on Ash Street and the June 2021 drive-by shooting on Elm and Oak Streets, where five people were shot, are associated with the same. Combined, the fourteen defendants have a criminal record representing over 100 arrests, more than half of which are felonies, with over 50 convictions; they have over 20 open cases, and 5 illegally possessed firearm arrests.

Visit Vinnie Bagwell's Masterpiece: Enslaved African Rain Garden on Yonkers Waterfront

Kicking off the City's Juneteenth celebration weekend, Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano along with sculptor Vinnie Bagwell, local artists, and community leaders will officially unveil The Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden (EARG), along the Yonkers waterfront at 20 Water Grant Street, on June 17th at 11 AM - 2 PM. The urbanheritage sculpture garden honors the legacy of enslaved Africans who resided and worked at Philipse Manor Hall in Yonkers. The garden's opening will feature the presentation of five life-size bronze sculptures of enslaved Africans who were freed decades before the Emancipation Proclamation.

"On behalf of the residents of Yonkers, I am proud our City is the permanent home to this poignant art exhibit that not only tells the remarkable story of some of our first residents but the place they and our city have in the nation's complicated history," comments Mayor Spano. "Public art has become a hallmark of Yonkers' diversity and vibrancy – and the Rain Garden joins the growing landscape of beautiful expression here. Through Vinnie's artistry and devotion to their journey, we are paying homage to the lives and sacrifices of our early ancestors and ensuring their voices are heard for future generations."

Created by sculptor Vinnie Bagwell, the public artwork interprets the legacy of five enslaved Africans who were among the first to be manumitted by law in the United States in 1799 (64 years before the Emancipation Proclamation). The sculptures named "Themba the Boatman," "I'Satta," "Bibi," "Sola," and "Olumide," will reside in a half-acre rain garden along the Hudson River esplanade. Each sculpture will be set in a vignette that includes a unique bench and landscape features of trees, shrubs and flowers with the backdrop of a stone-lined ravine flowing behind the sculptures. Each sculpture is designed to explore it for the entire 360 degrees, accented with prominent features on the backs of their garments.

Vinnie Bagwell states, "Public art sends a message about the values and priorities of a community. In the spirit of transformative justice for acts against the humanity of black people, I am grateful for those who supported this collective effort. The strongest aspect of the Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden coming to fruition is that it begins to address the righting of so many wrongs by giving voice to the previously unheard via accessible art in a public place while connecting the goals of artistic and cultural opportunities to improving educational opportunities and economic development. Here is the impetus for the realization of the Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden."

The Enslaved Africans Rain Garden Initiative was incorporated in 2015 as a non-profit 501.c.3 arts organization. The mission is to enlarge the perspectives



The 5th Annual Yonkers Pride Festival took place last weekend in downtown Yonkers. Congratulations to Steve Cruz and those involved for a wonderful, fun event. One Yonkers City Councilman, Anthony Merante's comments before the event were not only ignorant but should be considered insulting to every Yonkers resident.

Councilman Merante said that kids should stay away from the LGBTQ+ Pride Festival. His comments: LEAVE THE KIDS OUT OF THIS EVENT- I strongly feel that children do not belong in this environment. If a parent wants to teach their children about the LGBTQ community that is certainly fine but children's activities at an event with "Drag Queens" is not. Drag was created as a bawdy art form with both innuendo and explicit performances for adults. Regardless of there being music, face paintings and bouncy houses adjacent to this event, kids should not be included at an event with Drag Queens!

Nothing in law forced children to attend the event. Children attend with their parents. If the parents do not want their children to attend the event they simply don't bring them. I have enough confidence in the parents of children in Yonkers to make that decision. They certainly don't need Mr. Merante to be the one giving them motherly advice.

And I don't know where Mr. Merante gets his information from. Merante's comments: 'Drag was created as a bawdy art form with both innuendo and explicit performances for adults.' I attended the event on Saturday and there were no 'explicit performances for adults.' Maybe he got his definition of drag from a conservative talking points memorandum or an 18th Century encyclopedia. Nothing could be father from the truth.

Mr. Merante voted for the City of Yonkers budget. City funding including monies from the City Council Majority Leader's funds (he did vote for the current Majority Leader) partially paid for the event. If he was so concerned about that he should have as the CPA that he is have brought the issue up during budget negotiations. Not at the last minute attempting to ruin an event that takes place in many communities in Westchester.

This is the second controversy Merante has been involved with in less than 2 months. St. Ann's Church had wanted to rent out their empty school to the former Leake and Watts organization to provide a place for learning for immigrant young people, many of them treated poorly in their countries of origin. Staffing ratio would have been 2 young people to 1 adult. The young people would have had background checks to make sure they were not involved in any illegal activities in their country of origin.

And St. Ann's Church would have received \$500,000 for rental of the school, money desperately needed. All of my friends who go to that church tell me of the need for funds by the church. And the building would not sit vacant. All of those staff members would have spent money for food, etc. in the Midland Avenue shopping district. The church pastor was a big supporter. And yet again, we see Mr. Merante rallying the troops against it

The sad thing is that this episode occurred during and around Holy Week where we pray for those in need and to help the hungry and homeless. Enough pressure was put on the Pastor of the church and the Archdiocese to kill the proposal.

Now you have to understand a little of what's behind Merante's comments. He has the desire to run for higher office and for some crazy reason feels these moves are going to help him achieve his goal. Yonkers as a whole is very different than the Yonkers of 30 plus years ago that fought the Housing Desegregation case. He would like to be Mayor when current Mayor Mike Spano's term ends. Will NY Have "One Party Rule? Or Is A Red Wave Coming?

As elected officials in New York State debated a set of 10 gun control bills, State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins commented on the lack of participation from most of the republican members of the State Senate and Assembly

"You know, people talk about one party rule. Good. If that's what it takes to confront what we now is a public health crisis in our time, good." said Stewart-Cousins. "We're in a place where all of us have to work together to raise the consciousness to understand we're not coming for anyone's gun, but after a while the guns are coming for us."

NY Democrats are hopeful that a debate over guns and the overturning of Roe vs Wade will help in the fall election. On the other side are republicans across New York State, hoping for a Red Wave of support as a result of gas prices, inflation, baby formula shortages and crime.

In Westchester, republicans are focused on two congressional races and the race for Governor. In the republican race for Governor, a WCBS NYTV debate between the four candidates, Lee Zeldin, Rob Astorino, Harry Wilson and Andrew Guiliani resulted in Wilson and Astorino on the attack against Zeldin, who is the endorsed candidate of the NY GOP and is leading in the polls. Prior to the debate, a multi-million dollar ad buy from Wilson, which highlighted Zeldin's prior association with, and fondness for, former Governor Andrew Cuomo, when Zeldin was a state senator in 2014.

Many of the political pundits thought that Zeldin should have had an answer for the charges levied against him by Wilson's TV ads for the debate. But most came away unimpressed with Zeldin's response to the challenges and his demeanor.

Zeldin pivoted away from the criticism's and constantly called Astorino "Rolex Rob," a nickname that very few people outside of Westchester are aware of and even fewer republican voters have knowledge of. Zeldin also called Wilson a "Never Trumper" a dozen times during the debate for the fact that Wilson voted for former SC Governor Nikki Haley in 2020 and not Trump. Wilson also explained that his work with former President Obama in 2008 was to help save American corporations, and American jobs, after the financial crisis.

Westchester republicans we spoke to thought Astorino and Wilson won the debate. Wilson had a prepared response and looked reasonable; Zeldin looked "flustered, nervous and uncomfortable," and "Zeldin did not look like a governor on the debate stage," and "Zeldin was on the ropes through all the debate. He called Wilson a "Never Trumper" too many times," said Westchester and Putnam republicans we spoke to.

Astorino had one of the best quotes, picked up by the NY Media, when he said "This year is going to be the revenge of the normal people and I'll tell you why: because congestion pricing is another back breaker on the average New Yorker. All this does is it crushes the outer boroughs. It crushes the middle class,"Astorino also attempted to walk the fine line on Trump, by calling Jan. 6th "a horrible day in our nation's history," and added that Trump bears some responsibility" for the attacks on law enforcement. But Astorino also said that the Jan. 6th hearings were political theater.

For most of the debate, Andrew Guiliani was the outsider, starting with the fact that he had to participate remotely because he was unvaccinated. Guiliani's debate highlights included vowing to bring back the stop and frisk police policies of his father (Rudy), and promising to rehire NYC employees who were fired because they were unvaccinated. One Westchester republican we spoke to said he was disappointed in Giuliani's performance.

Republicans are searching for a candidate to run in the 16th Congressional district, which includes Yonkers and is currently represented by Rep. Jamaal Bowman. Rep. Bowman is being challenged in a democratic primary by two Westchester County Legislators: Vedat Gashi and Catherine Parker.


Carolin was born in Kuwait and thanks her parents for moving here, "so that my brother and I could have a better future. From a very young age they kept pushing me to do my best."

On This Day in Yonkers History ...

Monday June 20th

June 20, 1903: The cornerstone for the new Carnegie Library being built in Washington Park was laid at 2:30 p.m. Afterwards, attendees were entertained at a public concert given by Murray's Band.

June 20, 1914: Mrs. James Burns of Buena Vista Avenue jumped into action as soon as she spotted a canoe overturning in the Hudson River, capsizing by the swells from an excursion boat passing the National Sugar Refinery dock. Immediately she notified authorities, earning the gratitude of the three Yonkers men in the canoe, William Meehan, James White and John Manning.

June 20, 1922: Valentine's Press published Henry Collins Brown's new book titled "Old Yonkers 1646 to 1922 A Page of History," to celebrate Yonkers 50 years as a

Tuesday, June 21st

June 21, 1901: F. Wilkins of Bashford Street was the first victim of smallpox in the City of Yonkers. He passed away at the City Hospital.

June 21, 1907: The German Odd Fellows purchased the home of James Courter, first Mayor of Yonkers, for \$41,000 to use as a residence for old people.

June 21, 1927: People of Yonkers got the see the new Spirit of St. Louis-Lindbergh 10 cent airmail stamp when the Yonkers Post Office received 3,000 from Washington, DC. The stamp had been released in Washington three days earlier.

Wednesday, June 22nd

June 22, 1927: Well known automobile racer Barney Oldfield stopped by Yonkers Police Headquarters to visit his old friend Police Chief Quirk.

June 22, 1929: Escorted by a motor parade, hero George Fried was welcomed officially as a citizen of Yonkers by Mayor Fogarty. Captain Fried, who purchased a home in East Yonkers, directed the bad weather rescues of seamen from the British steamship Antinoe in 1926 and the Italian freighter Florida in 1929.

June 22, 1931: Patrolmen Samuel Kelly and Albert Liptack "raided" a card game with 75 cents in the kitty on the grounds of School Seven on Walnut Street. The money and two packs of cards were confiscated and the boys turned over to the custody of their parents.

Thursday June 23rd

June 23, 1911: After several trials, Gustave Segschneider of Yonkers lost a royalty suit against the Waring Hat Manufacturing Company. He patented a new brimcurling device while working for Waring; the company adopted and used it in their factory. After John Waring died in 1907, differences arose between the inventor and the new heads of the company, so Segschneider quit. He was trying to recover than \$33,000 in royalties he believed the company owed him.

June 23, 1921: The Yonkers Statesman became part of a new corporation formed by its merging with the Yonkers Daily News. The newly formed board members of the Yonkers Statesman and the Yonkers Daily News were Everett Adams, Charles Duell, George Edie, Arthur Lawrence, Arthur Maudlin, William Wallin and Elijah Yerks.

June 23, 1935: Because of its belief attacks against married women working were the opening shot in a campaign to send females "back to the home," the Yonkers Business and Professional Women's Club began a survey about why married women worked. The Club believed many women were supporting families, and they wanted the other reasons women worked to make their report complete.

Friday, June 24th

June 24, 1934: After an extended voyage from the west coast to the Atlantic Ocean and three weeks of exercises sharpening defenses of the Panama Canal, the USS Waters docked at the Mahlstedt Dock at the foot of Babcock Place. More than 5,000 residents visited the destroyer, showing our city's interest in US Navy ships. After leaving Yonkers, she sailed to Newport for two months of tactical exercises. The ship served in World War I, and was decommissioned at the end of 1922. After several years of inactivity, Waters was recommissioned in 1930. In July 1933 it became a unit of Destroyer Division 5, Destroyer Squadron 2, Battle Force Destroyers. It received seven battle stars during World War II, was decommissioned again at the end of the war, and sold for scrap May 1946.

June 24, 1954: After Textile Workers Union of America members had been on strike for 10 days, the Board of Directors of the Alexander Smith Inc. claimed heavy company losses and announced its Yonkers' plant would permanently close. Management claimed the Yonkers factory was the major factor in its overall losses. Operations in Brockton, Massachusetts; Greenville, Mississippi; and Philadelphia would continue. The company said they had streamlined production methods, consolidated some operations, closed and sold several buildings to other industries, such as Benson and Hedges, manufacturers of Parliament cigarettes.

Saturday, June 25th

June 25, 1924: After 14 families were forced to move, workers began converting the Windham Apartments at Riverdale and Hudson Street into a hotel for men only. Walter P. Getty owned the building.

June 25, 1931: Yonkers aviator Lucius Green and an unnamed companion were arraigned as rumrunners in Stamford Connecticut and charged with transporting liquor. Their plane was forced down on a field; responding police found a cargo of alleged wines and whiskeys in the cockpit.

June 25, 1955: After working as an OSS Agent and 82nd Airborne Division officer, Hollandborn Dr. Arie D. Bestebreutje was ordained by the Presbytery of Westchester in Pelham's Huguenot Memorial Church and served as Associate Pastor of the Asbury Methodist Church. Before the war, Bestebreutje studied Law in Holland.

Sunday June 26th

June 26, 1925: Newly-designated Italian Consular agent Lieutenant Guiseppe Brancucci was honored at a dinner held Yonkers Italians. The dinner was held at the Italian-American Club at 272 New Main Street.

June 26, 1930: The Navy dirigible Los Angeles passed over the City of Yonkers shortly before 8 a.m. as it headed north up the Hudson on a training flight over New York State. Based at Lakehurst NJ, the Los Angeles carried a crew of 34 men and 12 officers.

on the subject of slavery, bring humanity and dignity to the memory of enslaved Africans; foster environmental responsibility and green stewardship; employ artists to create culturally-resonant artwork to map the assets of communities; educate students in an art medium and advanced concepts unavailable in public-school programs; and foster cross-cultural dialogue worldwide.

The Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden is funded by the City of Yonkers, the County of Westchester, the State of New York Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation, the New York State Council on the Arts, the National Endowment for the Arts, ArtsWestchester, Con Edison, and Entergy.

Former Yonkers City Council Majority Leader, Patricia McDow, ArtsWestchester's CEO, Janet Langsam, the Yonkers Board of Education, Sarah Lawrence College, historians, scholars, community-based organizations, and community members collaborated with Bagwell to develop the creation of the "Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden"

The design, construction, and landscape architectural plans of the Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden were completed by BCT Design Studio, TJR Excavating Contractors, Inc., and Bowman Design Company.

Illegal narcotics sales and group violence are interconnected, and Operation: Elm Sweep intends to interrupt the violence by targeting the drug dealers and removing them from our communities. Working together with our law enforcement partners, Yonkers Police investigators secured County Court indictments against the thirteen adult defendants for Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance 3', a Class B Felony in the New York State Penal Law; the undisclosed youth will be adjudicated in the Youth Part of Criminal Court.

"Thank you to the men and women of the Yonkers Police Department for their unwavering commitment to protecting the quality of life for all in our neighborhoods," said Mayor Mike Spano. "This joint operation should send a clear message to those seeking to commit crimes of any kind in our city – we will find you and ensure you are prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. The vast majority of people in Yonkers are good, honest, hardworking individuals who want no part in the senseless violence these men seek to cause in our communities, and it will not be tolerated."

Commissioner Chris Sapienza stated, "Our Nodine Hill residents deserve the safety, security, and high standards of quality-of-life that is expected of a first-class city like Yonkers, and our Police Department is committed to providing and safeguarding those values. Yonkers Philharmonic Orchestra to Perform July 8 at Hudson River Museum Amphitheater, Opening Night Summer 2022






