On June 22, Yonkers Democrats will be casting their ballots for several important elected offices, including Council President, three other City Council seats, County Legislator and County Clerk. The big race in Yonkers next week is for City Council President. Mike Khader is the incumbent, who is running for re-election. Normally, an incumbent Council President does not have a serious challenger within their own party.

But Khader does have that serious challenger, she is Lakisha Collins-Bellamy. We have been supportive of Khader in the past, but several factors have made us pull back our support, based on conversations with dozens of Yonkers democrats.

First, he does not have the support of any of his colleagues on the City Council, and most important, all four Council democrats are supporting Lakisha over Khader. One prominent democrat told us that this factor, "is like Andrea (Sen. Stewart-Cousins) having no support of the democratic senators in her caucus."

Second, it is hard to find any elected official that supports Khader's re-election. Those elected officials who are undecided have questioned what, if anything, Khader has done

Third, members of Khader's inner circle, and family, do not support him. This includes Assemblyman Nader Sayegh and others.

Fourth, we are concerned how Khader will be effective if he is re-elected, now that the gloves have come off and Khader has accused Mayor Mike Spano of being "100%" behind the recent accusation made against him.

Fifth, the accusations made against Khader and his council presidents office, from female employees should be a concern for everyone. We acknowledge that they are only allegations at this point.

Sixth, most of the support for Khader comes from Yonkers democrats we spoke to who are more fatigued with Mayor Spano and the Spano family, then they are with Khader, which is not a suitable reason to support the Council President.

Seventh, We believe that overall, the City of Yonkers has been governed ably and effectively over the past 10 years under Mayor Spano. We had thought that Council President Khader's independence over the past four years was a benefit to the people. But we are now concerned that Khader's independence that he touts hasn't resulted into any meaningful results, and as Mayor Spano was quoted as saying "He (Khader) seems to have an issue with everyone."

Eight, threats have been made against members of the Jordanian community that have contributed or supported Collins-Bellamy, and threats have been made against members of the Yonkers Democratic Party, by anonymous sources, but whoever was is supporting Khader.

We have been impressed with Lakisha Collins-Bellamy during this campaign, and more impressed with her service to the people of Yonkers and the City that she was born and raised in. Collins-Bellamy serves on the Yonkers Board of Education and she works as an attorney for the Municipal Housing Authority, and serves on the Yonkers Police Reform Commission.

Lakisha has direct experience in three of the most important issues facing Yonkers: education, housing and crime and policing. This experience would serve the people of

The narrative that we see in Yonkers, is that overall, City government is working and for the most part, serving the needs of the people. We would like to see that progress continue, but we now see an irreparable split between the Mayor and Council President.

The allegations against Khader are just that, only allegations, but they do not paint a portrait of an elected official that welcomes support. In today's #metoo climate, the claims made against Khader concerning female employees in his office are concerning to us. And having covered 4 city council presidents over the past 25 years, we are concerned



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# \$20 M in Funding for New Park in Ludlow, Yonkers Announced

Many Westchester residents do not know that most of their sewage heads to Yonkers, and the Westchester Treatment plant located in the Ludlow, Southwest portion of the city. And most Westchester residents are unaware that the treatment plant emits odors and fumes that are difficult for the residents to deal with and live near.

The County Legislator for this area, (17th District) is Jose Alvarado. Legislator Alvarado recently commented on the treatment plant and the resident in his district, "The Sewage Treatment Plant has been a sore subject in the Ludlow Park community for decades. Sitting on the Hudson River, the plant is a source of air pollution to the disgust of our residents. Despite cries from locals, officials have done little to fix the problems caused by the plant.

"I have always recognized the air pollution from the plant as a serious health hazard. For years, I have worked to fund various remedial projects to correct the problem. The Ludlow Park community has borne the burden of the entire county's waste for decades now. Rather than building a plant in another part of the county, Ludlow Park has born the environmental impact. It is well past the time to right this injustice and clean up the plant." Stated Legislator Alvarado.

"I do not believe that in my lifetime I will see another plant built, whether in the north or elsewhere. Rather than watch our residents get sick, we need to fix the problems that are causing the unhealthy air, while working on responsible development in the surrounding area. I continue to work to keep improvement projects funded and moving forward.

"I have also worked to establish more green space along the water. I have secured \$10 million for a county park in the vacant lot adjacent to the plant. I have also partnered with Yonkers Mayor, Mike Spano to establish more green space for our residents along the waterfront.

"Over 19 years, I have supported and advocated for efforts to clean the air in a phased-in approach. Through that work, projects have been undertaken to modernize engines, blower aeration, and flood prevention systems. We have executed four phases of odor control projects.

"Last year alone, \$35 million dollars was allocated for further improvements across the facility. \$108 million and counting to clean the air for Ludlow Park residents, but we need to do more. I have joined with County Executive George Latimer to request an additional \$69 million in federal

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# Alzheimer's Association Welcomes FDA Approval of Aducanumab



Good News for Thousands of Westchester Families

On behalf of those impacted by Alzheimer's disease, the Alzheimer's Association enthusiastically welcomes the recent historic FDA approval of aducanumab (Biogen/Eisai) for treatment of Alzheimer's disease.

"We are excited about the potential for this new drug to slow the progression of Alzheimer's for countless people in the Hudson Valley and beyond," said David Sobel, Executive Director of Alzheimer's Association Hudson Valley Chapter.

"This approval is a victory for people living with Alzheimer's and their families," said Harry Johns, Alzheimer's Association president and chief executive officer. "This is the first FDA-approved drug that delays decline due to Alzheimer's disease. This means individuals may have more time to actively participate in daily life, have sustained independence and hold on to memories longer. We can experience longer — the relationships we hold most dear — our families and friends."

Aducanumab addresses Alzheimer's in a new way compared to previously approved drugs. This therapy slows progression of the disease, rather than only addressing symptoms. It is the first approved therapy of this type; it demonstrates that removing amyloid from the brain may delay clinical decline in people living with Alzheimer's. Amyloid is the protein that clumps into sticky brain plaques that are a hallmark of Alzheimer's disease.

"This FDA drug approval ushers in a new era in Alzheimer's treatment and research," said Maria C. Carrillo, Ph.D., Alzheimer's Association chief science officer. "History has shown us that approvals of the first drug in a new category invigorates the field, increases investments in new treatments and encourages greater innovation. We are hopeful and this is the beginning—both for this drug and for better treatments for Alzheimer's."

"Eliminating barriers to access is our highest priority" said Joanne Pike

"Eliminating barriers to access is our highest priority," said Joanne Pike, Dr.P.H., Alzheimer's Association chief strategy officer. "The Alzheimer's Association will do everything in its power to ensure access to the drug for all who will benefit. We know that infusion therapies have been made available under Medicare and insurance for conditions like cancer and multiple sclerosis, so it is reasonable to expect this for aducanumab."

Early diagnosis has demonstrated better health outcomes for individuals and their caregivers. The approval of this new therapy makes early detection and diagnosis even more critical to ensure individuals receive the most benefit at the earliest point possible.

"This therapy will be of great interest to many, but it is not the only important element of Alzheimer's treatment and care. The Alzheimer's Association has made it a priority to partner with health care systems, physicians, and the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services to ensure early and accurate diagnosis, and access to treatment, care management and care planning," said Pike. What happens when you go to visit a friend or shop in Monsey, New York where



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








## Mayor Spano Appoints Anthony Pagano Yonkers Fire Commissioner

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano announced that Anthony Pagano is returning to the Yonkers Fire Department this week as its Acting Commissioner. Pagano first served as the Yonkers Fire Commissioner from 2002 to 2011. Pagano's nomination will be presented in the coming weeks to the Yonkers City Council for final confirmation.

"Tony brings his impressive list of credentials to the table and years of experience to back it up – including his quick decision-making skills and on-the-job knowledge of the inner workings of the Department," said Mayor Spano. "I have no doubt Tony will be an exceptional fire commissioner, and I welcome him back to the City of Yonkers.'

Anthony Pagano was appointed to the Yonkers Fire Department on November 18, 1982. Starting in 1989, he served as President of the Yonkers Firefighters Local 628 for 14 years. As President, he was responsible for the overall operation of union activities, which included labor relations, communication, financial and legislative operations, political action, community services, and fund raising. In 2002, Pagano was named Fire Commissioner, a position he held for nine years, and during which time, he was responsible for approximately 430 firefighters and fire officers. After serving a total of 29 years in the Yonkers Fire Department, Pagano retired in December 2011.

Acting Fire Commissioner Anthony Pagano added, "I look forward to working with the Spano Administration and I thank the Mayor for the opportunity to serve the 200,000 residents of Yonkers once more, including the firefighters and fire officers. I guess some people do get to dream twice, as my dream came true both times."

As commissioner, Pagano is responsible for the command, control, administration, disposition and discipline of the Fire Department, while coordinating and planning the activity and efficiency of all firefighting units in the City of Yonkers.

Pagano replaces interim commissioner John Folkerts, who will return to serve as Chief of Operations in the Yonkers Fire Department.

\$69 million in federal funds to improve the facility further. The \$69 million will go toward the installation of caps on the tanks of the sewage in the treatment process. With the support of our Congressmember, Jamal Bowman, together we intend to lobby the federal government until the funds are allocated," said Alvarado, who showed his knowledge of what is perhaps the biggest county issue for the residents of the 17th District.

Legislator Alvarado joined last week with County Executive George Latimer and Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano to announce funding for a \$20

Park in Ludlow on the Hudson River and near the plant.

What is now just a vacant overgrown lot will one day be the site of the second Hudson River access point in Yonkers and the County's newest park. The County, at the request of County Legislator Jose Alvarado, has included \$10 million in the 2021 capital budget – project number BLA1A – to build the public park. The City of Yonkers has also allocated \$10 million dollars for the project. The park will be located in the southwest section of Yon-

kers, with breathtaking views of the Palisades and Hudson River.

County Executive George Latimer said: "With my partners in government Legislator Alvarado & Mayor Spano, the County is eager to bring this beautiful waterfront space to life. The residents who call this neighborhood home deserve waterfront access – and there is no good reason why this scenic view has been shuttered. We stand here today with a vision and look forward to one day stand here as this vision comes to fruition.'

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano said: "Thank you to Westchester County for matching the City's contribution in this joint public partnership. Once transformed, the park will breathe new life into the community by making another direct access point to the Hudson River. Working with County Executive George Latimer and County Legislator Jose Alvarado shows the

realm of possibilities when local government works together."

Alvarado said: "The creation of a new scenic riverfront park in southwest Yonkers has been a dream for our community, and for me personally, for years. The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us all just how important green space and outdoor recreation is, especially for residents of the most densely populated areas in our County. This is something our great community needs and deserves. My heartfelt thanks go out to County Executive Latimer and Mayor Spano for their support in helping me make this project a reality. I look forward to the day we can all join together here again for a ribbon cutting."


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# On This Day in Yonkers History...

June 21, 1913: Alexander Smith Cochran, who recently had purchased the colt "His Majesty" for \$20,000, purchased \$12,000 "Early Rose" from John Madden to add to his stable. Cochran had watched the two-year-old chestnut filly run several fast trials at Belmont before deciding to buy her.

June 21, 1916: By a two vote margin, Directors of the Park Hill Country Club, voted to allow Sunday tennis on the club's courts.

June 21, 1937: For the first time since 1931, the City of Yonkers was able to pay teachers and other Board of Education employees their full "vacation pay;" nearly 1,000 employees were paid \$708,000 according to Comptroller James Hushion.

Tuesday, June 22nd

June 22, 1899: Class President "Vinegar Joe" Stilwell graduated from Yonkers High School.

June 22, 1907: Mrs. Alexander Smith formally laid the cornerstone of the new Sprain Ridge Hospital Administration Building. The hospital, founded by Alexander Smith Cochran, was created to treat incipient tuberculosis. Other speakers were family member Thomas Ewing, Cochran's friend Dr. Sherman, and Mayor Coyne, who expressed the gratitude of the citizens of Yonkers.

June 22, 1944: Captain Lee Haas of Berkeley Avenue reported to The Herald Statesman the jubilation of the Italians when Americans entered Rome; he likened it to a parade on Fifth Avenue.

Wednesday, June 23rd

June 23, 1780: Grenadier and English regiments pitched camp at the Philipse house

June 23, 1928: The first full-length film feature with words presented in Westchester County opened at the Strand Theater matinee. The Vitaphone movie, "Tenderloin," starred Conrad Nagle and Dolores Costello in a swift-moving crime drama. Directed by Michael Curtiz, it was produced and released by Warner Brothers and was considered One of Curtiz's most daring films. No prints are known to exist.

June 23, 1943: Dorothy Dunbar Bromley's interview with Yonkers resident Anita Brenner was published in the New York Herald Tribune. Brenner, the author of The Wind That Swept Mexico on the history of the Mexican Revolution, discussed the roots of the "Zoot Suit Riots" in Los Angeles a few weeks earlier; she said many of the three million Mexican residents in our Western states were discriminated against in courts, schools, land ownership and medical facilities. Her solution? Americans must dissolve racial prejudice by appealing to our patriotism and religion.

Thursday, June 24th

June 24, 1928: Although asked to changed the name of the park to the original Tippets Brook, the County Park Commission announced it would keep the name Tibbetts Brook Park. The name had become "established thorough long its long usage." The family name, Tippets, was found on the official map of the City of Yonkers from 1700s. The Tippets family purchased the land from Elias Doughty, Adriaen Van der Donck's brother-in-law, and later lost it because they were loyalists.

June 24, 1943: After meeting with a representative of a large American tobacco company, Mayor Benjamin Barnes suggested the Common Council create a "City Hall Cigaret Fund," to buy cigarettes at discounted prices for overseas soldiers. The War Department had stopped sending overseas packages b civilians, and asked tobacco companies to come up with their own schemes to send cigarettes to our servicemen. Each pack of cigarettes was to cost five cents and would be labeled as being a gift from the people of Yonkers. They then would be sent to ports of embarkation and shipped by convoy to the men overseas.

Friday, June 25th

June 25, 1927: A former Yonkers dump in Tibbetts Brook Valley opened to the public as a new \$3,000,000 Westchester County Park at ceremonies emceed by V. Everit Macy, president of the Commission, with more than a thousand people participating. Approximately 12,000 attended. Tibbetts Valley was chosen by Native Americans for their councils because of its secluded location and was the scene of many stirring encounters in the Revolution, as the British Headquarters were in Kingsbridge and Americans advanced and retreated through this valley. After forfeiture, it remained in its natural state until Leonard Jerome purchased most of the property, some 1,025 acres he called "Valley Farms.

Over the years people acquired property, including the Westchester Parks Commission. The area of it near Yonkers Avenue became a dumping ground for Yonkers DOW. For many years a branch of Tibbetts Brook flowed through a creed bed of tin cans and trash, a discolored and polluted stream.



Saturday, June 26th

June 26, 1877: Aldermen Shonnard, Murphy and Morse opened an investigation into charges of "official corruption" against First Ward Alderman Joseph Riley. Riley, accused of attempting to extort City Treasurer George Cobb, allegedly "tried to induce" Cobb to pay \$750 to ensure he would stay in his position, with the guarantee any candidate nominated by Mayor Gibson would not be confirmed. Riley was questioned by the committee, strongly denied the charges, and stated he had neither received a bribe nor asked for one. Apparently he was not believed as the committee brought him before the entire Common Council a few weeks later.

June 26, 1922: Main Street proprietors Frank Knepfer and William Breslaw opened their stores for Yonkers residents to hear a championship match between Welterweight Champion Jack Britton of Yonkers and Benny Leonard, the first use of a radiophone in Yonkers. Benny was disqualified because he hit Britton when down in the thirteenth round. Several audience members, including news reporter Ernest Hemmingway, suspected Leonard had thrown the match.

Sunday, June 27th

June 27, 1931: After forty years of service as an engineer, Yonkers resident Daniel Lawson made his last run on the Putnam Division of the New York Central Railroad, bringing his locomotive to the Bronx Roundhouse at 167th Street for the last time. Lawson and his specially decorated locomotive were met by company officials, fellow workers and friends to celebrate his unique records of never being absent, never being late and never striking anyone while at the throttle of his engine.

June 27, 1944: Yonkers Marine and Quartermaster Sergeant Hubert Lloyd of Caryl Avenue received cigarettes supplied by the "Yonkers Cigaret Fund" while stationed in the South Pacific; he promptly write a letter to City Clerk Francis Heafy, chairman of the fund, who happened to be a neighbor on Caryl Avenue. He wrote, "It might interest you to know that the fine record shown by labor and industry there (Yonkers), a record which tops the entire Country, is greatly appreciated out here... it is, indeed, heartening to know that your home town is in there pitching."
