> We Endorse: George Latimer for Congress Democrats Have Had Enough of Bowman

The Democratic Primary election in New York's 16th Congressional District this Tuesday may very well be one of the most important primaries in the country this year. Not only will it determine who will represent this solid blue district in the U.S. House of Representatives, but it will also be a bellwether for the future direction of the Democratic Party.

When Jamaal Bowman, a self-proclaimed 'radical,' was elected in 2020, he aligned himself with 'The Squad,' the most extreme far-left caucus in the House. He began representing what he calls a 'movement.' However, we question whether this 'movement' truly aligns with the views of his constituents.

Refusing to compromise his rigid ideology, he voted against many of President Biden's bi-partisan accomplishments, including the infrastructure bill, the debt ceiling deal, the child tax credit, and the federal budget. Bowman's votes mirrored that of Marjorie Taylor Green and other members of the far-right Freedom Caucus. Although the far-left and far-right voted against these bills for different reasons, it highlights that both extremes refuse to compromise for the greater good of the country.

During his campaign speeches, and in his address to district leaders at the Westchester Democratic convention in the spring, William Wagstaff, candidate for Westchester District Attorney, referenced his criminal past.

"Almost 20 years ago, when I started law school, I was on Federal house arrest," said Wagstaff.

Many Westchester Democrats have wondered what crime Wagstaff was convicted that resulted in his house arrest. Other democrats are not aware that Wagstaff was convicted of a crime while eeking to become the chief law enforcement official in Westchester.

A criminal search resulted in discovery of the case -USA vs. Wagstaff, Federal Case # case number: 7:04-mj-00115 filed in 2004, charged Wagstaff with Fraud with identification documents. He pled guilty and was sentenced to three years' probation, which included house arrest.

Questions Raised as Mirza Drops Out of Race for Westchester DA, Endorses Wagstaff

Adeel Mirza, one of three democratic candidates for Westchester County District Attorney, ended his campaign on June 14, just one day before early voting began for the Democratic Primary on June 25. In his statement, Mirza endorsed William Wagstaff for Westchester DA.

"I ran for District Attorney because, after almost two decades in the Westchester DA's office, I had the experience to run the office, reform it, and keep families safe. Throughout this campaign, I have had the incredible opportunity to visit every corner of our county, meeting people, leaders, and activists who care deeply about our communities' futures. I am deeply grateful for the support and encouragement from every community in Westchester."

"The District Attorney's office is a vital piece of that future, and whoever holds the office must be someone who holds our Democratic values – and always has. That is why, after much reflection and many conversations, I have decided to stop campaigning and back William Wagstaff for District Attorney. I have gotten to know William throughout this race, and he is kind, generous, thoughtful, and reform-minded. He will run the office with integrity and keep families safe while pursuing justice for all, regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, gender identity, or economic status," said Mirza.

Some have questioned the timing of Mirza's exit from the DA's race. "What kind of deal did Adeel cut with Wagstaff? What is he getting for getting out and endorsing Wagstaff?" asked one Westchester Democratic leader.

Mirza's departure now leaves Wagstaff and Susan Cacace as the two remaining democrats in the race for Westchester DA. Cacace's campaign commented on Mirza's departure from the race. "We are not surprised by Adeel Mirza's decision to stop campaigning in the race for Westchester District Attorney, nor are we surprised by his questionable decision to endorse William Wagstaff. What is truly disappointing is that Mr. Mirza's campaign was built solely around disparaging Susan Cacace, the only woman in the race for DA, a lifelong Democrat and clearly the most experienced and qualified candidate.

"The choice for the next Westchester DA has only become clearer. Susan Cacace's decades of experience as a Westchester County Court Judge, Assistant DA and criminal defense attorney make her far more qualified to keep Westchester safe than any other candidate. This sentiment is shared by current DA Mimi Rocah, the Westchester County Democratic Committee and dozens of other well respected elected officials and law enforcement organizations throughout the county who have proudly endorsed Susan Cacace.

"Undecided voters should ask an important question. Will William Wagstaff, who seeks to become the chief law enforcement official in the county, accept the endorsement of an accused sexual harasser who was disgracefully fired from the DA's Office and whose campaign was run by a convicted felon? The race for District Attorney is far too important to ignore these important decisions," stated the Cacace campaign.

Mirza recently settled a sexual harassment lawsuit filed by a former colleague in the Westchester DA's office, and most of the more than \$100,00 spent

Yonkers Councilman Merante Gives Back Pay Raise to Local Organizations




On June 11, Yonkers City Councilmember Merante presented a \$ 500 check to the Homefield Association at their monthly meeting. The Homefield Association is a community group that serves the Homefield section of Yonkers. In addition to having a community center they also sponsor various activities throughout the year for the families of the Homefield community.

When the Yonkers City Council voted to give themselves a historic 20% pay raise late last December, 6th District Councilmember Anthony J. Merante VOTED NO. Merante vehemently objected to this pay raise which he felt was unwarranted for a part-time job. Merante. a Certified Public Accountant said "The Council should not vote for salary increases for itself, only for future elected officials. He quipped to his current colleagues and to those potentially seeking office, "if you don't like the salary, then don't run for the office". Merante is the only Yonkers Councilmember to refuse a City funded car and free gas, This too he felt was a needless expense being charged to taxpayers.

Merante has now embarked on a "Give Back Program". He will be donating a portion of the recent raise back to local organizations. Merante said, " I wanted to help those who are helping others in the community. This program will continue throughout my time in office. And Now, the End is Near!

Well Friends, if you think Tuesday, June 25 is simply National Strawberry Parfait Day, National Camp Counts Day (honoring the amazing day and sleep away camps we still have in this country) or National Goat Cheese Day, you must have been sleeping under a rock for the last several months.

Tuesday, June 25 is Primary Day for Federal, State, County and local offices in NewYork State.

Yes, we are talking among other contests the Primary for Congress in New York's 16th District which features incumbent Jamaal Bowman being challenged by Westchester County Executive George Latimer. One of the most expensive primaries in the history of this country, the last numbers I saw showed over \$23 million dollars being by the candidates. That's a lot on money!

People on both sides of the battle are passionate about the candidates and their positions on the issues. I find this level of passion to be almost equal to the national passion on the Biden /Trump race. Many friendships have been strained, new alliances between people of all political stripes have been formed, and though it's hard to believe there are still people who don't realize they are eligible to vote in the NY 16 Primary.

Bottom line is that if you have received a crazy amount of mail from candidates Bowman and Latimer, you live in the district. Early voting at specially designated sites, which are probably not your normal polling location continues through this Sunday. Do we really need these early polling locations to be open for 2 weeks prior to Primary Day for all elections or should they only be open for the Presidential Election every 4 years. It will be interesting to compare the percentage of people who vote in a highly contested Presidential Primary to the the percentage of people who vote in a highly contested Congressional Primary as we have on Tuesday.

Board of Elections staff have a difficult enough job recruiting poll workers for the big presidential elections where you have a steady stream of voters vs. elections like the Congressional, state and county elections which attract far fewer people. The only reason the Board of Elections can obtain the large numbers of workers they need is because they have increased the pay scale. Bottom line is that it's a 5:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. job not always working in the best of conditions. Yes they have talked about voting by mail but the elected officials are afraid they would lose their power.

I have been very clear with you who I am supporting for Congress in NY 16, a man who I believe will uphold the dignity of the office as his distinguished predecessors had whether it be Nita Lowey, Elliot Engel, Richard Ottinger, Mario Biaggi or Peter Peyser. That man is Westchester County Executive George Latimer.

Last week I shared with you some personal reasons why I am backing my friend George that go far beyond what you will see in the public endorsements that run in our regional newspapers. Most newspaper editorials are written by editorial boards based on stories contained in their newspapers and don't truly represent personal knowledge of the candidates.

When I support a candidate, I know their positions on issues of importance to the community as I live in that community. When the current Congressman Mr. Bowman voted against the Infrastructure Bill, I spoke to local officials, real estate leaders, union leaders and the folks like you and my neighbors who are





Hidden Crisis: LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness Soars In New York

As LGBTQ+ Pride flags flutter proudly in the resilient city of Yonkers, a less visible yet profoundly felt struggle grips its LGBTQ+ youth and LGBTQ+ youth across America: homelessness. This pressing issue underscores a critical need for compassion and support, illuminating a challenge that demands attention and action.

According to News12 Westchester, "A study in 2019 found 30% of youth in foster care are identified as LGBTQ+ and 5% as transgender. This is a statistic that reveals a stark reality compared to their peers. Similar challenges persist across neighboring cities like White Plains, New Rochelle, and Mount Vernon, where significant percentages of LGBTQ+ youth find themselves without stable housing. According to the Office of Children and Family Services in New York, "LGBTQ minors who are homeless are at the highest risk for sex trafficking and sexual exploitation."

One individual's journey speaks volumes about the hurdles faced by LG-BTQ+ youth. After bravely embracing their true identity, this young person in Westchester County was met with rejection and found themselves without a place to call home. Their story mirrors those of many others who confront family discord, discrimination, and a lack of supportive resources across America.

Despite the data, there's hope. At The LOFT LGBTQ+ Community Center in White Plains, NY—a hub for vital services—individuals of all ages access essential resources, including information about housing assistance, counseling, and peer support groups. The LOFT fosters an environment that affirms and supports LGBTQ+ folx. Meanwhile, the Westchester LGBTQ+ Advisory Board's advocacy highlights the urgent call for policy reforms and increased funding to strengthen these initiatives.

Looking ahead, it's clear that a united front is needed. More inclusive shelters, enhanced support services, and educational campaigns to combat prejudice are all vital steps toward ensuring that every individual, regardless of identity, finds the safety and dignity they deserve.

Reflecting on their journey, one individual expresses a mix of hope and determination. "No one should face the struggles I did," they share. "We need more understanding, more kindness, and more opportunities for everyone to thrive."

In the heart of Westchester County, these are more than just numbers on a page; they represent lives filled with resilience and the courage to seek acceptance. Together, we can build a community where everyone has a place to call home, where no one is left out in the cold.



On This Day in Yonkers History ...



Alan Benson, Socialist Candidate for President, 1916, from Yonkers

Monday, June 24th

June 24, 1953: Audience members attending a softball game at Sullivan's Oval in Nodine Hill were surprised to see a young doe take part in the action! The doe, resting in a nearby backyard, was startled when the noise startled her; she took off across the field. She made a brief return several minutes later... delicately touched first base, then second... then disappeared into left field and into the night!

June 24, 1953: Efforts of the Yonkers Railroad Company to make work during the summer heat more bearable for its drivers, led to what the company called "Summer Cocktail Parties." Held Wednesdays in July and August in Getty Square, the featured drink for the Summer Cocktail Party was buttermilk!

Besides company drivers, traffic cops in the Square were special guests.

Tuesday, June 25th

July 25, 1942: The State Department listed a Yonkers man as one of the 600+ Americans being returned to the US in an exchange program with Japan. M. Caslae of Yonkers was listed as returning from Hong Kong... but no one by that name was listed in the Yonkers City Directory!

July 25, 1942: Seventeen-year-old Carl Kazimir of Walnut Street became the youngest pilot to solo at Yonkers Seaplane Base. He had just eight hours of training with instructor Ray Schulte.

Wednesday, June 26th

June 26, 1928: An unknown burglar made a bold attempt to rob the F. and W. Grand store at 8 Palisade Avenue! He rented an apartment above the store and drilled through the floor. 

Over 60 Electeds Call on Gov. Hochul to Stop Algonquin Pipeline Expansion

At a rally on June 17, 69 state and local elected officials delivered a letter calling on Governor Hochul to take an early stance against Enbridge's dangerous proposed fracked gas pipeline expansion, dubbed Project Maple, by committing to denying any upcoming permits for the project.

The proposal would significantly expand the amount of fracked gas transmitted through the Algonquin Pipeline, contrary to the intent of New York's climate law which mandates greenhouse gas emissions reductions of at least 85 percent by 2050 and the state's nation-leading ban on fossil fuels in new buildings, which will go into effect in 2026.

Last fall, at a rally outside the shuttered Indian Point nuclear site, feet from the Algonquin pipeline's path, New Yorkers delivered a letter from more than 90 environmental groups urging elected officials to take a stand against the destructive project.

Food & Water Watch Senior New York Organizer Santosh Nandabalan said: "The clock is ticking to move New York off fossil fuels, and make good on our landmark climate law. Enbridge's fracked gas expansion proposal will take us in the wrong direction. We are proud to stand with elected officials throughout New York in demanding Governor Hochul come out against this dangerous project. Hochul must commit to denying all state permits for Enbridge's last ditch fossil fuel expansion."

State Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg (95th District) said, "Why would we build infrastructure that will be obsolete before the end of its life? As renewable options become less expensive and easier to choose, more and more consumers are rejecting outdated dirty energy options. We need to have the courage to reject fossil fuel industry lies and say no to things like Project Maple. We have a state law, the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act, that actually obligates us to do this. We cannot take this step backward; we must push forward with building our renewable energy future, where we will see lower costs and cleaner air and water."

State Assemblymember MaryJane Shimsky (92nd District) said: "I join my government colleagues, environmental groups, and citizens throughout New York and up the East Coast from New Jersey to Massachusetts — in opposing the proposed enlargement of the Algonquin Gas Transmission Line. This project would pose new risks to our environment and local communities, including those near Indian Point, and would put New York that much farther from meeting its climate goals. I urge Governor Hochul to protect the progress we have made in reducing our reliance on fossil fuels, and deny Enbridge the permits needed for any further expansion of the Algonquin pipeline."

Bowman Hasn't Voted in Congress

Since May 23

Westchester Congressman Jamaal Bowman has been Missing in Action in the House of Representatives, and has not cast a vote since May 23, according to Politico. And one vote that Bowman missed is a vote on the National Defense Authorization Act.

The National Defense Authorization Act, (NDAA), authorizes funding levels for the U.S. Military. House Republicans included in the bill restrictions for service members and their families to access abortion care. Specifically, the bill would bar the Defense Department from paying for service members or their family who have to travel out of states for abortion care.

Democrat Rep. Mikie Sherrill, a Navy Veteran and member of the Armed Services Committee, said that Republicans were attempting to "shove their extremist culture war agenda down the throats of the American people."

Bowman was absent for this vote, and his opponent, Westchester County Executive George Latimer reminded voters in the district about Bowman's absence from more than 50 votes on the House floor over the past three weeks.

"Yesterday, 207 House Dems voted against the National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things further restricts the ability of servicemembers & their families to access abortion care. Jamaal Bowman missed the vote, causing it to pass by 1 single vote. I believe we should always prioritize #RealResults-NotRhetoric. My opponent has voted against key Democratic policies like @ JoeBiden's infrastructure bill. Yesterday he could have stood on his principles & stopped this anti-choice, anti LGBTQ+ legislation from passing. He didn't," said Latimer on X.

Latimer's reference to the 208-207 vote was for the House Rule for the 2025 House Defense Authorization Bill. And while the actual bill passed 217-199, if Bowman was present to vote against it, the Bill would have been defeated. In the House, if there is a tie, the item fails. Bowman was not present for either votes.

Coordinated by the Central Committee of Veterans, color guards and uniformed members from every Yonkers post accompanied the funeral cortege as it headed to the cemetery. Yonkers Police escorted the procession to the city line, where NYS Police took over until they reached the state line, where Connecticut State Police escorted the procession. Post Seven, American Legion, fired the 21gun salute, and Past Commander Thomas Pyne sounded Taps at Nichols' grave.

June 27, 1942: The Young Men's Chamber of Commerce, later known as the Yonkers JayCees, were in the middle of a quandary! NY Press wrote about its "Hop In" program. The young men distributed car stickers to people willing to give rides to servicemen in Yonkers; drivers put the decals on their cars, alerting servicemen free transportation was available in the stickered car.

After distributing hundreds of stickers to Yonkers drivers, the supply ran out. Once the New York press publicized the program, the Young Men's Chamber of Commerce was inundated with requests for decals from communities outside Yonkers.

Friday, June 28th

June 28, 1916: Yonkers Red Cross women provided quite a send-off at the Yonkers train station to the First Artillery boys on their way to Mexico. The Park Hill Inn, Frankfort's Inn, the French Bakery, Blanchard Lunch, and Post's Dining Room donated more than 1400 sandwiches; Shanley's donated 40 gallons of coffee. Seven thousand cookies were distributed to those gathered at the station.

June 28, 1918: Allan L. Benson of Yonkers, Socialist candidate for President in 1916 who renounced the Party because of its anti-American sentiments, spoke at a War Savings Stamp rally at Philipsburgh Hall.

Saturday, June 29th

June 29, 1900: School Four students were treated to an outing at Hickory Grove on the former Valentine estate. After participating in games and contests, the children were served ice cream and cake at tables built by Charles Valentine.

June 29, 1923: After witnessing "tapping of the old Croton Aqueduct," Water Bureau Superintendent Harry Foley announced all danger of a "water famine" was gone. The tapping sent 2,000,000 gallons into the Saw Mill River daily. sick and tired of getting flat tires when they take local roads to buy their groceries at the supermarket. These same people don't buy Bowman's pathetic rationale that he knew the bill had enough votes to pass, wanted more dollars in a bill that would address more needs and that's why he voted against the bill.

June 29, 1953: After lobbying for the word "SLOW" to be painted at the intersection of Mile Square and Palmer Roads, Tenth Ward Councilman Joseph Prior found the job was incomplete! The word "SLO" was painted, with no "W." The "W" appeared on the pavement in a short time.

Sunday, June 30th

June 30, 1923: Because of intense lobbying by First Ward Alderman William O'Mara for his constituents, benches and a drinking fountain were installed at the City Pier.

June 30, 1934: Thousands of Yonkers fans gathered in front of The Herald Statesman to get an up-to-the-minute description of the Jack Sharkey-Primo Carnera world's heavy weight championship fight. Besides having a large corps of telephone operators answering calls, they had a direct line from Madison Square Garden Bowl in Long Island City. Carnera knocked out Sharkey in the sixth round.

June 30, 1953: Alexander Smith, Inc. continued to "streamline" its Yonkers mills; it moved machinery from two Saw Mill River Road buildings to other buildings. Rumors circulated Yonkers the company was leasing the buildings it was emptying since it planned to leave Yonkers.

"In my opinion, this disqualifies him from getting my vote," said Tom Meier, Chair of the Yonkers Democratic Committee. "The question for voters is whether to put him in charge of the DA's office in Westchester when he has no experience as a prosecutor and that he has a criminal record.

"And it is my understanding that the crimes he committed were at his father's gas station. He frauded the people who were customers at his father's business. This is not a victimless crime and he has shown no remorse for it.

"In fact he is wearing the crime he committed as a badge of honor and a reason for voters to elect him DA, and hasn't shown any remorse for what he did. While I believe in second chances, if you are running for chief law enforcement officer for Westchester County, District Attorney's need to be held to the highest standards.

"When you combine this with the fact that he didn't pay his taxes, it all adds to a lack of character. I want someone impeccable leading the office of DA, and someone who abides by the laws, and who sat as a judge and who worked in the DA's office. That person is Susan Cacace.

"Everyone has to be held accountable to the law, including our former President. It doesn't motivate democrats in Yonkers to vote for him," said Meier.

A Sound Shore Democratic leader said, "To say that you should be elected DA based on the fact that you stole credit cards from your father's customers is nonsense. That's doesn't quality you."

"My concern is that you did this and then 20 years later you didn't pay your taxes and you made up a nonsensical excuse. If you were making \$375,000 per year from the City of Mount Vernon as a special prosecutor, and you had a lot of other income, but you couldn't pay your taxes? It's the age old question-if you can handle your personal finances, why should we trust you to manage the Office of District Attorney?"

"Wagstaff acknowledges that he has no experience as a prosecutor but will "reimagine" the job. But given your past, are you really ready and qualified to be our DA?

Others have wondered if Wagstaff would pass a background check to be a law enforcement officer. "Mr. Wagstaff seeks to become the chief law enforcement officer in Westchester County. But the reality is that because of his past conduct it is highly unlikely that he could pass the background check to get hired as a probationary police officer. This, combined with the fact that he has no experience whatsoever as a prosecutor, should tell voters that he is unfit and unprepared to be our next District Attorney," writes former Yonkers PBA President Keith Olson.

Eastchester Democratic Chair John Filiberti said, "As a democratic chair, I'm very concerned about the quality of candidates that carry our banner in November. The republicans would have a field day running against him if he is our candidate in November, Susan Cacace has four times the experience than Wagstaff, and we need to remind people that he has virtually no criminal court experience. This should not be a competitive race in my opinion. She is by far the best qualified to become district attorney."

Wagstaff was charged in Federal Court with Fraud because one or more of the banks that were frauded by Wagstaff's illegal activities contacted the FBI. Or the crime, or fraudulent activity, must involve interstate or foreign commerce. Why was Wagstaff placed under house arrest when he was charged with probation? Local attorneys say that he may have been placed under house arrest before his final conviction, or that his house arrest was part of his probation sentence.

We confirmed with the Cacace campaign that the candidate has not been convicted of a crime.

Westchester District Attorney Mimi Rocah, who is not running for reelection and has endorsed Cacace said, "Susan Cacace's extensive experience as both a prosecutor and a judge makes her an outstanding choice for District Attorney. She has a deep commitment to justice, and I am confident she will continue to advance the crucial work we have undertaken over the past four years to modernize the District Attorney's Office. Susan is the clear choice to lead the office, and build on a record of public safety and fairness."

Wagstaff was hired as a part-time Special Prosecutor by Mount Vernon Mayor Shawyn Patterson-Howard, who is one of Wagstaff's biggest supporters.

The Journal News was the first to report that Wagstaff did not pay his income taxes six years until he began to run for District Attorney. A total of \$189,112 was overdue including \$112,712 for 2020.

The Wagstaff campaign claimed that the candidate was waiting for future lawsuit settlements to come in to pay his past due taxes, but that excuse made no sense to most democrats. And Wagstaff didn't share his tax troubles to the Westchester Democratic Executive Committee.

by Mirza's campaign were negative attacks against Cacace. And Mirza's final comment in his statement was,"What we can not have is a District Attorney who has run on the Republican and a Conservative Party lines – we need a Democrat who has always been staunchly pro-choice and supports common sense gun legislation. William Wagstaff will be a District Attorney we can be proud of, and I am asking all my supporters to vote for him."

Some Westchester democrats questioned the rationale for attacking Cacace, the only woman in the race, who is seeking to replace Mimi Rocah. "I think Adeel wanted to get back into the DA's office. But the way he went about it, sending out mailings attacking Cacace, without introducing himself to voters, resulted in dismal poll numbers that had him behind Wagstaff and Cacace."

Recent polling in the race had both Mirza and Wagstaff far behind Cacace, with a large segment of Westchester democrats undecided. The reason? The Bowman-Latimer race for Congress was sucking all of the oxygen out of the DA's race.

Polling in Bowman-Latimer had very few voters undecided. They have made their minds up and are already voting early. But in the DA's race, almost half of democrats have yet to make up their mind.

Now polling will have to be conducted with just two DA democratic candidates to choose from: William Wagstaff and Susan Cacace.

In Congress, George Latimer will protect abortion rights, stand up to the NRA, and fight for President Biden's agenda—just like he's always done. Make a plan to vote by June 25th!"

Another criticism of Bowman and his congressional staff is that they never return calls or perform constituent services. Greenburgh Supervisor Paul Feiner said, "I deal with thousands of complaints a year and do it personally, and I reach out to every elected official," said Paul Feiner, the town supervisor of Greenburgh. "I practically never get a response from his office."

Total spending on the race has now reached \$22 Million, which includes \$7 Million for Bowman.

Yonkers Police Sergeant Indicted for Assaulting Man During Arrest

Defendant allegedly repeatedly kicked and punched a man as he was being taken into custody following a high-speed police pursuit of a stolen car

On June 17, Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah announced today that a Yonkers Police Department sergeant was indicted on assault charges for repeatedly kicking and punching a suspect during an arrest in March.

DA Rocah said: "Police officers are sworn to protect us and uphold the law. The Yonkers Police Department was proactive in identifying one of their officers as acting outside their training policies and promptly referred this matter to my Office. The facts learned during the course of our investigation were presented to a Grand Jury who returned an indictment charging the defendant with offenses related to his alleged use of excessive force."

The defendant, identified as Sgt. Hector Cartagena, 55, was indicted by a Westchester County Grand Jury for Assault in the Second Degree and Attempted Assault in the Second Degree, felonies, and Assault in the Third Degree, a misdemeanor.

The defendant was arrested today by the DA's Office Criminal Investigator's Squad and arraigned before New York State Supreme Court Justice James Mc-Carty in Westchester County Court. His next court date is July 31.

At approximately 9:44 p.m. on March 14, while a suspect was being placed into custody, the defendant allegedly kicked the suspect four times and punched him 10 times in the face, causing him to sustain a fractured orbital bone.

Prior to the incident, the suspect allegedly led police on a high-speed chase following reports he had stolen a vehicle. The pursuit ended in a crash on Warburton and Glenwood Avenues in Yonkers. The suspect is being prosecuted by the DA's Office on grand larceny, assault and reckless endangerment charges.

According to the Yonkers Police Department, their Internal Affairs Division initiated a preliminary investigation at the scene and determined that the defendant utilized force in a manner not consistent with department policies. Yonkers police placed the defendant on restrictive duty and referred the matter to the Westchester County District Attorney's Office.

The case is being prosecuted by the Public Integrity and Law Enforcement Integrity Bureau of the Trials and Investigations Division.

The charges against the defendant are merely accusations, and the defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

Yonkers Police Union: Sergeant Indicted for Assault will be Vindicated

The story about Yonkers Police Sergeant Hector Cartagena, and his recent indictment by Westchester DA Mimi Rocah for assault stemming from an arrest caught on video continues, with the Yonkers Police Captains, Lieutenants and Sergeants Association supporting Cartagena and calling out Mayor Mike Spano and Police Commissioner Chris Sapienza for not giving him due process.

The statement from Det. Capt. Michael Hanley, President, Yonkers CLSA, reads, "The members of the Yonkers Police Captains, Lieutenants, and Sergeants Association fully support Detective Sergeant Hector Cartagena. We ask you all to remember that this decorated, long serving officer is innocent until proven guilty.

"This pursuit started with a suspect who stole a civilian vehicle and proceeded to lead numerous police units on a high speed chase throughout the City of Yonkers. The perpetrator intentionally caused accidents with several police vehicles that resulted in injuries to police officers. The perpetrator's actions throughout this pursuit endangered the lives of numerous citizens of the City of Yonkers. The Detective Sergeant was performing his official duties in attempting to subdue a violent felon who was resisting attempts to be taking into custody.

"Every person in this great country is afforded a right to due process. Unfortunately, based on the statements issued by Mayor Spano and Commissioner Sapienza, Detective Sergeant Cartagena has been denied this right. Their rush to judgement on a 25 year veteran of the YPD with an honorable record is disappointing, and these comments could have a negative impact on his right to a fair trial

The Yonkers Police Department released the following statement, and provided a bodycam video of an arrest that resulted in the suspension and arrest of YPD Sgt. Hector Cartagena. This information came hours after Westchester DA Mimi Rocah announced that Cartagena was indicted for assault.

The YPD writes, "In March 2024, in line with the goals of transparency and commitment to the community, the Yonkers Police Department proactively informed the Westchester District Attorney's Office and the public of the actions taken by a member of the Department during the apprehension of a suspect after a dangerous vehicle pursuit that raised concerns and sparked an internal investigation. On March 14, 2024, just after 9:45 PM, Yonkers Police Department officers pursued a suspect in a stolen vehicle through City streets while the suspect caused several collisions with police vehicles, injured several officers, drove recklessly, and endangered the public. These officers followed procedure and protocol to keep the community safe while attempting to apprehend him. The pursuit ended with a crash at the intersection of Warburton Avenue and Glenwood Avenue.

Upon apprehending this suspect, force was used to place the suspect into custody. As is Yonkers Police procedure with all uses of force, an investigation into the use of force was promptly initiated at the scene. The Yonkers Police Internal Affairs Division immediately responded and reviewed the actions taken by the Officers.

In this preliminary investigation, it was determined that one member of the department, Detective Sergeant Hector Cartagena, utilized force in a manner not consistent with training, procedures, or Department values. It was evident from this preliminary review that this member acted alone in these actions and all other Officers on the scene followed policy and procedure.

The Yonkers Police Department proactively presented this incident to the Westchester County District Attorney's Office within twenty-four hours and promptly informed the Department of Justice. As such, this incident was investigated by the Westchester County District Attorney's Public Integrity Bureau. The Yonkers Police Department cooperated fully with all aspects of this investigation which upheld our initial findings and resulted in the recommendation of criminal charges.

Earlier today, Detective Sergeant Hector Cartagena appeared in Westchester County Court where he was arraigned on charges of Assault in the second degree, Attempted Assault in the second degree, and Assault in the third degree as a result of his actions.

As a result of this incident, Detective Sergeant Hector Cartagena has been suspended without pay. He has been a member of the Yonkers Police Department for twenty-four years and was assigned to the Crime Scene Unit.

"After a review of this incident, I am outraged by the actions of this particular supervisor. His actions serve to negate the great work exhibited by the other officers involved to safely apprehend the suspect at the scene," said Yonkers Police Commissioner Christopher Sapienza. "His actions further harm our relationship with the community, which we have worked so hard to build. Our immediate Internal Investigation and swift referral to an outside agency for investigation show that such behavior will not be tolerated by this department. We appreciate the objective and thorough review of the incident completed by the Westchester County District Attorney's Office and we will continue to cooperate with them as appropriate. Our mission and commitment to our community remains steadfast-we are here to serve you with integrity and respect."

"The actions of this police supervisor are indefensible. It's the very definition of disrespect for the badge and we condemn it," said Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano. "This unfortunate incident should not be a reflection of the men and women who serve and protect this City with integrity every day. That's why we initiated this investigation and alerted the proper authorities, ensuring our role in constitutional policing. We have made substantial changes to our policies and procedures when it comes to excessive force and we will continue to review our internal policies and procedures to prevent this from happening again. This type of behavior will never be tolerated."

Bowman's votes, inflammatory rhetoric, and stunts, such as pulling a fire alarm that delayed a crucial vote in Congress, left many Democrats feeling unrepresented. 
