At a recent meeting of the Yonkers Police 3rd Precinct Community Council, Congressman Jamaal Bowman said that he stands by a decision to place Joanne Chesimard aka Assata Shakur, who killed a Police Officer in 1973, on a Wall of Heroes at the Bronx Middle School that he worked.

Shakur, was convicted of killing NJ Trooper Werner Foerster, in 1973, but fled to Cuba. She remains on the FBI’s most Wanted Terrorist List.

Bowman was asked a question from Marty Dolan, who is also running for Congress against Bowman and George Latimer in a democratic primary in June.

Here is the Q&A between Bowman and Dolan, which was recorded, and included Police officers attending the Precinct Council meeting.

Dolan: “At your school, you had a Wall of Heroes, and you included a big photo of Assata Shakur, who is a convicted cop killer and who has been on the FBI’s Ten Most Wanted list.

I would like you to make a statement here that you would support the extradition Asata Shakur, and that you think that it was a mistake for you to teach


The Yonkers Police Department has arrested a suspect in the early morning shooting incident on Mount Carmel Place that occurred on Feb. 26.

At just before 5:00 AM on February 26, 2024, the Yonkers Police Department received a report of a male injured in a vehicle in the area of Willow Street and Mount Carmel Place. Upon arrival, units discovered a male with an apparent gunshot wound to his head inside this vehicle, a red pickup truck. Despite life-saving efforts from first responders, this male was unfortunately pronounced deceased at an area hospital. This male is identified as Francisco Gordillo, a 51-year-old Yonkers resident. Our heartfelt condolences go out to his friends and family.

Detectives from our Major Case Squad, Crime Scene Unit, and Digital Forensics Unit responded to the scene to investigate. This investigation yielded that

The Untermeyers and Women’s Right to Vote

Samuel Untermeyer was a proponent of Women’s Suffrage and Women’s Rights long before Minnie embraced this side of the struggle; in fact, she worked against women voting. In 1908 Mrs. Untermeyer was elected Vice President of the League for the Civic Education of Women; members of this organization, some of New York’s most prominent families, were “vowed enemies of woman suffrage.” Their battle cry was “Women of America, your attention please. Don’t be deluded into believing you should be allowed to vote. Equal suffrage leads to an unseen peril.”

That December the New York Times reported Mrs. Samuel Untermeyer attended a League meeting held at the Berkeley Lyceum; the audience was almost totally comprised mostly of women, with only 5 or 6 men in attendance. A letter from President Roosevelt was read, a letter that began, “Personally I believe in woman’s suffrage but I am not an enthusiastic advocate of it because I do not regard it as a very important matter.”

Minnie must have had serious second thoughts because a few weeks later she shared the stage with other society matrons, including Samuel’s competitor J. P. Morgan’s daughter Anne, at a Cooper Union pro-Suffrage rally. The Presidents of the Woman’s Trade Union, the Central Federated Union and the Brooklyn Labor Union also were on the platform.

Women’s rights, particularly the right to vote, had become a joint project of New York Society and the American Labor movement.

The New York World announced Minnie’s change of heart with the headline “Suffrage Gains Pair of Noted Women Converts;” her attendance at a Westchester Suffrage meeting had caught the reporter’s interest. She “...frankly confessed she had resigned as vice president of the League for the Civic Education of Women... and was going to join both of the leading suffrage societies of New York.” Minnie outlined her plan to advance the suffrage cause; she would hold a meeting at Greystone, with speakers being “...working girl suffragists instead of the ‘upper tenners.’” Samuel, who “...had always been a suffragist,” would be happy to preside at the meeting.

After New York elite came out in force for Women’s Suffrage, meetings and fundraising events became elegant receptions, such as for the Equal Franchise Society. Held at the home of its President Marie Louise Mackay in a home decorated with flowers and palms, the entertainment was provided by Nathan Franko’s orchestra; three society hostesses poured tea for the guests.

New York Society became involved with the rights of factory working girls, particularly during the shirtwaist maker strike. Thirty-thousand female workers were trying to improve their deplorable working conditions; two hundred fifty-one companies had settled, but the leadership of the employers’ organization

America Has a REAL Policing Problem

Imagine a profession so dangerous that you must strap on a bulletproof vest and wear a gun on your hip before you start work. An occupation so difficult that a split-second mistake can put you in the grave or behind bars. Envision a line of work that is so scrutinized that you are required to mount a camera on your chest so the entire world can see your every misstep. Consider a job so stressful that the suicide rate is 54% higher than other professions (<https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC8056254/>). Imagine choosing a career that offers all this and you have to work on holidays and birthdays and make far less money than your friends and family. This is the job of the American police officer. Is it any wonder that cops are retiring and resigning in droves and that recruitment for new officers is in crisis?

The job of the police officer has always been a difficult one. As a recently retired police detective, I can personally attest to this, having spent more than 34 years with the City of Yonkers Police Department in New York. Despite the danger and difficulties that I faced throughout my career, I say with no hesitation that I absolutely loved the profession I chose. I love it still. That is why it breaks my heart knowing that the dangerous and unsustainable burdens being put on today's police officers have resulted in a nationwide police recruitment and retention problem. This is a huge dilemma, not only for the law enforcement community, but for our nation as a whole.

The U.S. Department of Justice recognized this problem in a recently published report titled "Recruitment and Retention for the Modern Law Enforcement Agency" (<https://bja.ojp.gov/doc/recruitment-retention-modern-law-enforcement-agency.pdf>). This important report points to a myriad of reasons behind the recruitment and retention dilemma. Some of these issues include standard pay and benefits, the negative public perception of law enforcement, the increased stress and burnout caused in part by the erosion of public trust in the profession, concerns of officer wellness and safety, rapid changes in community expectations of police and more. The DOJ acknowledges a "historic crisis in recruiting and retaining qualified candidates" while crucially recognizing the impact this crisis has on violent crime reduction, overall public safety and community trust.

Evidence of the recruitment issue can be found all over the country. Only days ago, Louisiana Governor Jeff Landry declared a state of emergency due to a police officer shortage. According to Landry, police departments in the state are experiencing record low staffing levels due to the recruitment and retention crisis "resulting in increased crime and less public safety."

Disturbingly, in the wake of the police involved beating death of Tyre Nichols in January of 2023, there were reports that despite offering a \$15,000 signing bonus, the Memphis Police Department was compelled to lower its hiring standards in order to maintain staffing levels prior to the Nichols killing. These lowered standards included asking for waivers for candidates with criminal records. Nichols' beating death resulted in five Memphis officers being charged with second-degree murder (<https://www.nydailynews.com/2023/02/07/memphis-police-lowered-hiring-standards-ahead-of-tyre-nichols-beating-former-lieutenant-claims/>). Incidents like this highlight the importance of maintaining a highly effective police hiring process. I think it's fair to say that the only thing worse than not hiring enough police officers is hiring the wrong police officers.

The City of Alameda Police Department in California is finding it so difficult to attract police candidates that it is offering a \$75,000 signing bonus to take the job (<https://abc7news.com/alameda-police-department-75k-signing-bonus-recruit-incentives-officer-pay/14334580/>). Additionally, the Arcata City Council, also in California, recently voted to offer a \$50,000 bonus for new officers because it was struggling to fill vacant police positions (<https://www.times-standard.com/2023/04/20/arcata-council-oks-50k-hiring-bonus-to-draw-more-police-officers/>). Proving the recruitment troubles are not confined to the west coast, the Lebanon PD in New Hampshire is offering a \$30,000 signing bonus, representing nearly half of their starting salary. Police Departments all over the country are being forced to offer huge signing bonuses due to a lack of people wanting to become a police officer.

Even more confirmation of the nationwide "badge drain" can be seen in the nation's largest police force, the NYPD, where officers are leaving in droves (<https://nypost.com/2023/03/10/nypd-cops-resigning-from-force-in-2023-at-record-pace/>). It is believed that more than 3,000 police officers either resigned or retired in 2023. In my neighboring City of Mount Vernon, the retention

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Yonkers Loses 10 Minutes

Friends, we put on our Yonkers hat for a few moments this week. In the late 1990's the Yonkers Parking Authority at the request of city merchants led by a robust Chamber of Commerce instituted a policy where motorists parking their cars on Yonkers streets were given a free 10 minutes of parking time before they had to pay for parking.

These 10 minutes would allow motorists to run into the dry cleaners, the pharmacy, the liquor store or any place they could transact business quickly and not have to pay for meter parking.

Many parking meters on Yonkers streets still to this day have 10 minute free buttons. Street Signs above them clearly inform motorists that if they push the button they get free 10 minutes of parking. A nice perk for a motorist running into a store for 10 minutes or less.

BIG NEWS! The Yonkers Parking Authority has made a decision that, to quote Executive Director Gail Burns, 'no new meters will have the 10 minutes of free parking button.' Again quoting Burns, 'The decision was made because of the fiscal constraints of the Parking Authority to do away with the free 10 minutes of parking.'

Reaction has been swift. This writer is not happy with this decision as he frequently uses the free 10 minutes of parking button. Neither is Rising Media Group Editor Dan Murphy who in travels about town frequently uses the 10 minute button. To quote Robert Stauff, former Parking Authority Board Member, 'At the time I was a member of the Parking Authority Board, we added the 10 minutes to the Parking meter, an action designed to benefit shoppers and merchants alike. Taking the privilege away is a negative from my perspective.'

I spoke with Yonkers Chamber of Commerce President Kevin Cacace. To quote Cacace, 'It will be missed. But with installation of new meters it gives you flexibility to extend the time which is helpful to consumers.' Going out to eat Cacace gave as an example of this.

My research shows that at one point in time Cincinnati, Ohio had a program similar to the Yonkers one. It is a good idea that apparently did not catch on nationwide. In my travels I see many people in Yonkers use it. I have also seen the program abused in a situation where a man was having his hair cut at a Barber in Yonkers, the Haircut took a little under a half hour and 3 times he went out to push the 10 minute button so he would not have to pay for parking.

I would note that I was on Lake Avenue on Monday and in conversations with motorists coming out of their cars 3 of the 5 people I spoke with planned on using the free 10 minute button while 2 of the three were not familiar with it. Does the City of Yonkers Make any Money off the T-shirts Sold Around Town?

Yonkers spokeswoman Christina Gilmartin said that, 'No, the City of Yonkers does not benefit from these sales or aware of them.'

According to my research of the laws, a mere use of the name City of Yonkers does not infringe on copyright laws or require permission. Use of the City Seal or logo or use of copyrighted material would.

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano issued the following statement:

"I don't want to discourage people from promoting the City of Yonkers. However, we have a legal right to our City seal, and it should be protected. If anyone is improperly using the City seal, whether to financially benefit from it or not, we reserve the right to pursue legal action."

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Congressman Bowman Holds Town Hall Celebrating Black History Month



On Feb. 27, Congressman Jamaal Bowman, Ed.D. (NY-16) held a Black History Month Town Hall at Yonkers Riverfront Library with nearly 100 NY-16 constituents in attendance. Monday, February 26th

February 26, 1934: The funeral for hero Yonkers Police Officer Patrick Whalen was held at St. Denis Church. Whalen gave his life rescuing a child in the RKO disaster.

As his cortege traveled through Getty Square, hundreds stood at attention saluted as the cars passed. When they passed the RKO building, the Police Band played a dirge; when the cars passed St. Mary’s, the church bells played “Nearer my God to Thee” and “Lead, Kindly Light.” St. Mary’s students lined South Broadway in front of the church to pay tribute to the hero who died saving one of their schoolmates.

St. Denis Church overflowed with people from all faiths, retired and active police officers, city officials, friends, and people wanting to pay respects to this hero officer.

Tuesday, February 27th

February 27, 1941: Reports of a kidnapped baby in the Square sent YPD into action! When the mom saw her baby was gone, she ran to Getty Square Traffic Officer Gizicky who immediately contacted Lieutenant Comey. The alarm went out over the police radio system immediately, and patrol cars responded quickly with sirens blaring. They conducted a wide area hunt and quickly found the missing baby! None of the kind responding officers officially reported the incident. Why? Mom had left the baby in a carriage when she went to shop in Grant’s, what moms did in those days. She met a friend, chatted, and browsed several counters; when she went outside, her baby was gone! How did our brave officers find her little one so quickly? Mom had left the baby in its carriage inside the store entrance, not outside.

Wednesday, February 28th

February 28, 1939: Common Council President Albert Fiorillo received a threatening letter but didn’t flinch! Police Chief Edward Quirk ordered protec-

the children in your school that a cop killer should be on the Wall of Heroes.” Bowman: “So, who are you to tell anyone how they should engage with their own history. My school included Black and Latino students and we try to teach as much about Black and Latino history as possible. The good, the bad and the ugly.

“When we talk about the Founding Fathers, do they talk about Thomas Jefferson owning slaves and raping them? No we build a statue for Thomas Jefferson. So who are you, or anyone, to say how kids should deal with their own history?”

Dolan: “So you refuse to denounce a cop killer?”

Bowman: “I will refuse to denounce because I’m answering the question the way I want to answer it. We, our kids in my school learned the history of a people off the walls — and many other people and so, that’s what we did. Period.”

SW YonkersHamletHub, The NY Post and Yonkers Insider were the first to report about Bowman’s comments. Members of the Yonkers Police Department from the 3rd Precinct were at the meeting and sitting behind Bowman during his comments.

Dolan told Yonkerstimes.com that he was surprised by Bowman’s response. “We have to teach children about success. We can’t glorify violence.”

“I call on all New Yorkers to ask Jamaal Bowman to issue a statement denouncing Assata Shakur and supporting her extradition. I also call on Alexandra Ocasio Cortez, the leader of the Squad to denounce Jamaal Bowman and to seek his removal from the Congressional Progressive caucus – because he is not a Progressive, he is a Radical. Our campaign’s central platform is \$400 billion of federal assistance for state and municipal governments so we can help our police do their jobs,” said Dolan, a lifelong resident of Irvington, who has worked an experienced strategist, investor, and financial advisor for the past 40 years, representing US business interests all over the United States and internationally.

Dolan said that the number one issue facing the people of the 16th District is “income inequality,” and “restructuring the economy to help Americans who are paying an unfair tax burden.”

Dolan has thoughtful and unique ideas about ways to reform the tax system. (martydolanforcongress.com.)

tion for the Council and assigned Detective William Daly to keep an eye on the Aldermen. The City Hall maintenance crew cleared the Council chamber, carefully inspecting it to ensure bombs weren't hidden in corners, under desks or benches.

According to The Herald Statesman, "The Aldermen didn't bat an eyelash... but welcomed the anonymous menace as an excuse for an outbreak of shenanigans that made the machinations of an old-time Bolshevik conspiracy fade into insignificance." Instead, they played pranks on each other, hiding a cigar box with a long string under a desk or leaving a note written in red ink on a desk. Blocks of wood were pretend bombs. Someone planted a fake bomb on Ninth Ward Alderman Slater's car, but he drove away without incident. A few minutes later, the fake bomb "exploded" on someone else's car! The joker had put it on the wrong car.

Thursday, February 29th

February 29, 1944: Most of the Arthur G. Blair Shipyards were idle; they had laid off 3,000 people company wide and would not rehire anyone until the ships expected for repair and conversion work actually arrived.

February 29, 1956: The NYS Senate Cities Committee hearing on the measure authorizing transfer ownership of parts of Wells Avenue and surrounding streets to Otis Elevator's Yonkers plant. Presiding Senator Thomas Desmond of Newburgh called the proposed transfer rule "very unusual legislation... particularly to a Legislature largely composed of lawyers. The Legislature would be loath to adopt this act." Desmond suggested the plan be modified and negotiated with the opposition, further recommending the changes be acceptable to both the opposition and Otis.

The Herald Statesman challenged the legislation as "unwarranted, wasteful of public funds and possibly unconstitutional," as soon as the Mayor and Common Council requested the legislation.

Friday, March 1st

March 1, 1913: Journalist John Edward Bruce, President of the Negro Society for Historical Research in Yonkers, was appointed Auxiliary Chairman of the Committee on Public Comfort for the Wilson- Marshall Inauguration! Bruce appointed Yonkers men to assist him in Washington for the event: Francis Moultrie, Samuel Giddings. Sterling Lambert, W. J. Spennie, Reverend A. H. Hill and Attorney Stephen Bennett.

March 1, 1930: Meeting at Eagles Hall on Elm Street, thirty-five men of all nationalities and backgrounds formed an unemployment council to fight unemployment in Yonkers. The started the campaign with a treasury of \$2.45.

Saturday, March 2nd

March 2, 1928: James Lessner of South Broadway was awarded \$50,000 for injuries suffered while working on a New York City elevator. The case, heard in White Plains Supreme Court by Justice Joseph Morschauer, was ended quickly when the twelve-man jury returned the verdict for the plaintiff after deliberating less than 15 minutes. Lessner, a elevator repair mechanic, was injured while working on an elevator. A janitor touched the control switch, sending the elevator crashing to the ground floor. Lessner had suffered such serious injuries, his arm was paralyzed.

Sunday, March 3rd

March 3, 1934: Yonkers Rotary Club launched a campaign against obscene literature, focusing on the type banned from mailing but still selling at Yonkers' newsstands.

March 3, 1942: Habirshaw Cable and Wire Corporation, one of Yonkers' top industries, began refitting its old Bare Wire Plant on Saw Mill River Road to convert it to a defense industry plant. Concentrated effort was underway to bring the old mills to the intense production level needed to meet war needs. Production need was so great, as soon as each machine was installed, it was "pressed into service," without waiting for the rest of the department to be ready. Habirshaw manufactured many products: rubber and lead covered copper wires, paper insulated power cables, telephone and telegraph wires, signal wires, parkway cables, and other types of cables. The plant being refurbished had closed during the depression years but once employed 200 people.

when one of the candidates visited the city at the invitation of the Yonkers Mexican Chamber of Commerce. Xochitl Galvez Ruiz attended a lunch at the Dos Maria Restaurant, 200 New Main Street.

County Legislator Jose Alvarado welcomed Galvez Ruiz to Yonkers and presented her with a proclamation from the Westchester Board of Legislators. About 50 Mexican Americans, and supporters of Galvez-Ruiz attended the lunch.

Outside more than 100 protestors rallied against Galvez Ruiz, who is the nominee from the Broad Front for Mexico party. Galvez Ruiz is the opposition candidate. Incumbent President Andrés Manuel López Obrador is not running for reelection. Claudia Sheinbaum is running on the ruling party MORENA (the National Regeneration Movement) line.

Polls have Sheinbaum ahead of Galvez Ruiz by at least 10 points. A third candidate is well behind both women, Jorge Álvarez Máynez

Yonkers police formed a perimeter outside the restaurant to protect Galvez Ruiz when she left the lunch. What was most notable was the number of protestors who showed up for an event that very few in the media were made aware of, and also the anger and intense opposition they had to Galvez Ruiz.

Signs and chants of "disgrace", "rat" and "corrupt" met Galvez Ruiz as she left the event and got into a van and quickly departed.

The Yonkers Voice has video from the event inside of Dos Maria, and The Yonkers Ledger wrote a story on the visit. We can find no other media coverage of this event.

Millions of Mexicans living abroad can vote in the upcoming Presidential election, and some votes can be cast over a cell phone. With a large Mexican-American community, we hope to report more on the upcoming election in Mexico.

Fears of violence in the upcoming Presidential election have many Mexican American concerned about who the next President will be. On Feb. 27, two candidates for mayor in the Maravatio were shot and killed. Both candidates were running against each other, as members of the National Action Party and Morena. They were shot and killed hours apart. Many put the blame for the violence on the drug cartels of Mexico. More in the weeks to come. Email us at dmurphy@risingmediagroup.com

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
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CSEE Athlete Scholars Learn Patience and Resolve

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

the victim was inside his vehicle with several people known to him. An argument ensued between the victim and one of these individuals, later identified as Ludvin RAMOS-CERVANTES, the suspect. RAMOS-CERVANTES briefly left the scene; however, he returned to the vehicle shortly thereafter with a firearm. This argument turned violent when RAMOS-CERVANTES produced a .45 caliber firearm and fired one round, subsequently striking Gordillo in the head and killing him.

Ludvin RAMOS-CERVANTES is an 18-year-old resident of Yonkers. He was apprehended late in the day on February 26, 2024, and has been charged with Murder in the 2nd Degree.

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano stated, "We don't want to see anyone lose their lives to violence, especially in our City. I commend our Yonkers Police Department for making an arrest and hopefully helping to bring this family some closure."

"Regardless of the severity of a dispute, escalating the situation by introducing a weapon and resorting to violence is never acceptable," said Police Commissioner Christopher Sapienza. "I commend our Detectives for their hard work, as always, in finding the facts surrounding an incident, apprehending the person accountable, and delivering them to the justice system."

The case is being prosecuted by the Westchester County District Attorney's Office, and additional information may be released as it becomes available.

issue has been described as an "epidemic" with nearly 100 officers leaving the MVPD since 2020, roughly half of the entire police force (<https://www.cbsnews.com/newyork/news/mount-vernon-police-union-says-low-pay-has-led-to-dozens-of-officers-leaving-for-other-departments/>).

So where do we go from here? First and foremost, we need our elected officials to admit and understand this very real dilemma. Again, understanding how recruitment and retention are inexorably tied to reducing violent crime, to bonding with the community and to overall public safety is paramount. This is not simply a problem for law enforcement agencies. This is a problem for all of America. If we want our police departments comprised of our best, brightest, most dedicated and diverse people; something we all should want; we must see the problem for what it is and have the desire and determination to fix it.

Like most problems, solutions to this one will likely be found through sound and productive discourse. Our public officials must convene with members of the law enforcement community (from both the supervisory and rank and file levels) as well as community leaders, put everything on the table and present realistic and timely solutions. Topics of discussion should include finding ways to improve salaries, benefits and pensions for police officers, the impact that criminal justice and police reform has had on the recruitment and retention of police officers and finding ways to enhance officers mental and physical health and wellness, just to name a few.

The last 14 years of my nearly 35-year career with the Yonkers Police Department was spent as the President of the Yonkers Police Benevolent Association. Representing the men and women who risk their lives protecting the City of Yonkers was an honor I will cherish for the rest of my life. It also taught me an awful lot, including what it takes to maintain and foster a healthy, productive and compassionate police department. At the core of the success we've had in Yonkers, which includes consistently being named one of the safest communities of our size in the country (<https://yonkerstimes.com/wallethub-names-nyonkers-the-safest-city-in-new-york-state-and-8th-safest-in-the-us/>), has been cultivating solid morale amongst the men and women who serve our community. Yet even in the Yonkers PD, where morale and work conditions are better than most and despite a well-organized recruitment effort, we had an astounding 40% less people take our last entry exam held in 2021 as compared to the prior exam in 2017.

America has a problem. Let's fix it before it's too late.

ognizing the reality that it is here, and that the cannabis industry has great potential for creating jobs here in the City of Mount Vernon.”

Patterson-Howard also disagreed with the view of some that marijuana use, is a “gateway drug” that leads to the use and abuse of other drugs like cocaine and heroin. “Other states that have legalized cannabis have found that not to be true.”

“We will ensure that safeguards are in place, and we will work to protect the industry by dealing with illegal cannabis in stores that don’t have licenses,” said Mayor Patterson-Howard.

Contractor Indicted for Manslaughter in Mamaroneck Trench Collapse Death



Laborer killed after approximately nine-foot-deep trench caved in on top of him; excavation allegedly lacked required protections in violation of safety regulations

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah and the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) Regional Administrator Richard Mendelson announced on Feb.26 that the director of project development for construction company Lecher Development LLC was indicted on criminally negligent homicide and reckless endangerment charges in the death of Jose Vega, a 46-year-old laborer, after an approximately nine-foot-deep trench collapsed burying him under dirt at a residential construction site in the Village of Mamaroneck in 2021.

DA Rocah said: "For the first time in Westchester County, we are seeking to hold a contractor accountable for the death of a worker at a construction site that allegedly lacked proper safety measures. My Office will seek justice for the family of Jose Vega and continue to ensure workers' safety remains a priority across the county to prevent fatalities like this one."

OSHA Regional Administrator Mendelson said: "On behalf of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and the U.S. Department of Labor, we commend the District Attorney's Office for pursuing this case vigorously and bringing criminal charges for a preventable workplace death. OSHA issued civil citations and penalties for this fatal trench collapse. The addition of this criminal enforcement effort by the District Attorney sends an even stronger message that high-hazard industries, such as excavation, must follow safety standards."

A Westchester County Grand Jury indicted the defendant, Michael Conway, 59, of Bethel, Connecticut, for Criminally Negligent Homicide, a felony, and two counts of Reckless Endangerment in the Second Degree, misdemeanors. The defendant was arrested by the Village of Mamaroneck Police Department and arraigned on Friday before Supreme Court Judge James McCarty in Westchester County Court. Bail was set at \$5,000 cash, \$10,000 bond, and \$25,000 partially secured bond at 10%.

The defendant's next court date is March 22.

It is alleged that at approximately 12:40 p.m. on May 4, 2021, the defendant directed two workers to dig a trench without proper shoring or cave-in protections in place at a residential construction site on Shore Acres Drive in the Village of Mamaroneck. It is further alleged that the defendant, as the site supervisor, knew the excavation was in violation of OSHA regulations, which require a trench deeper than five feet to have protections that prevent the walls from caving in. The approximately nine-foot, unprotected trench collapsed, completely burying Mr. Vega under dirt. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

The investigation was conducted by the Westchester County District Attorney's Criminal Investigator Squad with assistance from OSHA's Tarrytown Area Office, the Village of Mamaroneck Police Department, and the Westchester County Department of Public Safety.

The District Attorney thanked the following agencies for their assistance in the attempted rescue and recovery of Mr. Vega: the New Rochelle Fire Department, the Village of Port Chester Department of Public Works, the Village of Mamaroneck Fire Department, and the Town of Mamaroneck Ambulance District. **Minnie Untermeyer James Jebusa Shannon
(American, 1862–1923)**

As the interim vice president and associate provost for innovation at the University of Notre Dame, I've seen firsthand how universities are partnering with innovative startups to grow our economy and deliver life-changing new products to people across the country and around the world.

These partnerships simply wouldn't be possible without an obscure, but hugely important, reform passed in 1980 known as the Bayh-Dole Act. Unfortunately, the National Institute of Standards and Technology, an agency within the U.S. Department of Commerce, just announced a new policy framework that would completely undermine Bayh-Dole — with potentially disastrous consequences for universities like ours.

To offer some historical perspective, prior to Bayh-Dole, if the federal government provided researchers grant funding, the government retained title to any patents that resulted from their work.

Under this model, the government rarely licensed those patents to companies that could turn potentially good ideas into viable products. Fewer than five percent of the nearly 30,000 patents held by federal agencies were ever licensed, meaning that taxpayers' money was effectively wasted on sound research that never made it beyond the lab.

Bayh-Dole revolutionized American research with one simple change: decentralizing university intellectual property management from D.C. bureaucrats to folks on the ground at universities across the country. Now, commercialization professionals license universities' innovations to companies, which have the resources and expertise to turn those insights into tangible products that transform people's lives.

Consider my own institution. Using federally-funded research done at the University of Notre Dame, the IDEA Center — the University's commercialization and entrepreneurship organization — has helped launch incredible startups that are working to be a force for good in the world. For example, Drone Response, provides first responders with an AI-driven command and control solution that leverages cutting-edge drone technology in life-or-death situations. Notre Dame is even helping advance new innovations in material science thanks to Tessellated, a startup that produces high-tensile-strength film that could be used to make aircraft lighter.

Notre Dame has helped launch close to 200 startups in total. These companies generated over \$136 million in revenue and raised more than \$86 million in venture investment in 2022 alone.

Notre Dame's success is just one of many bright spots all across America. Over the last quarter-century, academic tech transfer supported by the Bayh-Dole model bolstered U.S. GDP by up to \$1.9 trillion and helped create 6.5 million jobs. This model also fuels the formation of approximately three startups per day, with nearly 70% located in the same state as their home university.

As the global economy shifts towards high-tech, research-intensive industries, researchers consistently find that universities catalyze growth and boost wages for everyone by attracting and keeping talented folks and innovative companies invested in their local community.

Unfortunately, there's a challenge emerging in Washington. The National Institute of Standards

refused to reach an accord. Instead they called the police to arrest the picketers.

"The Rich Out to Aid Girl Waistmakers—Carnegie Hall Packed at Protest Meeting Against the Arrest of Their Pickets" read the New York Times headlines. The article continued, "Fifth Avenue and the lower east side, both represented chiefly by women and girls, joined last night in filling Carnegie Hall to protest against... the continued encroachment of the police... upon the rights of the striking shirtwaist makers and their sympathizers." Along with the Untermeyers, other prominent society names in the concert hall boxes were Belmont, Morgan, Sage, Hay, Gillespie, Straus and Laidlaw.

Mrs. Oliver Belmont was one society member who "put her money where her mouth is." The arrested pickets were thrown into the notorious Blackwell's Island prison for what witnesses said were no offences. Recognizing the injustice, Mrs. Belmont offered to guarantee their bail with some properties she owned. When the girls finally appeared in court, the Belmont lawyer, who had been kept waiting all night, with the deeds, could not be found. The society matron put her Madison Avenue townhouse up as security instead.

National figures began throwing their influence behind the campaign, guaranteeing large attendance at the 1913 New York City Suffrage Parade. A weekend affair, it began with an evening pageant at the Metropolitan Opera House. The standing room only audience watched a pageant presented by a consortium of Suffrage societies, followed with an address by former President Theodore Roosevelt. The topic of his speech was the importance of granting women the right to vote, a change from his stance a few years earlier.

Labor union members, horsemen and horsewomen, women driving cars, Boy Scouts, teachers and students, doctors, lawyers, architects, and many other professionals, joined members of suffrage organizations from all over the country. Thousands marched to the sounds of 35 bands, all to show support for women's suffrage. The parade grandstand was filled with husbands of the prominent society women in the parade. New York State Governor Charles Whitman sat next to Samuel Untermeyer; both men proudly watching their wives march.

Samuel passionately testified in Albany for women's rights. In February 1910, he pleaded the cause of woman suffragists before the New York State Judiciary Committee. Three months later, he again was in Albany, making a moving testimony during Woman's Suffrage Week hearings. Immediately following the presentations of the anti-suffrage speakers, Mr. Untermeyer was the first to speak on behalf of women's right to vote. Mr. Untermeyer reviewed the history of the movement in this country and continued:

"In every great controversy for freedom the law has always been in the wrong... This is particularly true of the present movement that strikes at the root of the social fabrics and seeks to give representation to that half of our citizens who bear their share of the duties and responsibilities of civilized life and of government.

"Women are eligible with men for the electric chair, the prison, and the tax roll. It seems intolerable that they should be ineligible for the ballot, the jury box, and to have their part in framing the laws under which they are required to live.

"But we are told that whatever may have been the injustice of the past, the law now deals justly with women, and that they have no grievance which requires so radical an innovation as the experiment of the ballot to correct. Such an argument takes no account of the unanswerable justice of their demand.

"Do women receive fair or decent consideration from the courts in the way of support where they are deserted by their husbands or are compelled for other reasons to seek divorce?

"The result is that she and her children are invariably punished for the man's offense. The law seems to proceed on the utterly intolerable and indefensible theory that the wife has no interest in the property accumulated during marriage...

The law does not give to the wife as a right any part of the husband's estate in case of his death unless he happens to own land. He can leave her penniless if he sees fit."

Samuel began actively working on Men's League for Woman Suffrage events and was a frequent speaker at fundraisers and meetings. Untermeyer volunteered to represent British militant suffragist Emmeline Pankhurst when the US government tried to deport her. Although he did not officially present her cause to President Wilson, Minnie and Samuel sat at the head table for her first speech in the U.S. after the President reversed the decision of the Immigration Board of Special Inquiry.

The Untermeyers actively began their own round of education, entertaining and fundraising. Making good on Minnie's 1909 promise of letting the factory workers tell the story of their lives, the Untermeyers gathered a group of 60 society and community leaders at Greystone to hear addresses by striking shirtwaist makers. Samuel told the crowd he hoped the "... girls would win and assured them of his sympathy."

Minnie was patroness of two theatrical benefits in March 1910 to raise money to benefit suffrage. Shortly afterwards she banded together with Mrs. Vanderbilt, Mrs. Whitney, Mrs. Russell Sage and other women to publish their names as members of the Woman Suffrage Party. These ladies all lived in the same Assembly District and publicly contradicted Assemblyman Dana who claimed no one in his district supported suffrage, and that only one of his female constituents wanted to vote.

That June, Greystone was opened to reformers with the first of a series of Hudson River Equal Franchise Society's drawing room lectures. Attendees included both husbands and wives of society's elite, and, it was noted, Mrs. Louis Myers, Samuel and Minnie's daughter Irene.

A "Votes for Women" evening benefiting the Empire State Campaign Committee was held at the Untermeyer's New York Fifth Avenue home. Chaired by Carrie Chapman Catt, one of the featured speakers that night was Samuel Untermeyer.

As both a Patron and Life Member of the New York State Woman Suffrage Association, Minnie continued her activism, as did Irene. In 1915, the Untermeyers hosted an extremely successful suffrage party at Greystone; the guest of honor was Mrs. Charles Whitman, wife of the 41st Governor of New York. Money raised that afternoon was divided between the German-American Committee and its parent organization, the Woman Suffrage Party.

The Untermeyers continued their support of the German-American Committee, hosting two more events for them October 1915. The first was a fundraiser featuring Katherine Dreier, Chairman of the German-American Committee, and Miss Mary Garrett Hay, Chairman of the Woman Suffrage Party. Pianist Carl Friedberg and Leipzig Opera House soloist Carolyn Ortman opened the program, and, after Carrie Chapman Catt addressed the group, a piano and violin duet performed ended the evening.

The Untermeyers arranged for their friend and fellow suffrage supporter Williams Jennings Bryan to speak. After hosting him at their Yonkers home, the Untermeyers drove Bryan to a meeting of more than 3,500 people. Jennings, well known as a brilliant orator, electrified and energized the crowd, telling them "women suffrage was sure to be universal." Another Women's Rights event hosted at Greystone featured Labor leader Margaret Dreier Robbins, President of the Women's Trade Union League, and raised funds for her organization's fight for working class women.

Samuel began actively working on the events organized by Men's League for Woman Suffrage. He spoke frequently at fundraisers and meetings, and volunteered to represent British militant suffragist Emmeline Pankhurst when the US government tried to deport her. Although he was not the one who officially presented her cause to President Wilson, both Minnie and he sat at the head table at her first speech after the President reversed the decision of the Immigration Board of Special Inquiry.

Samuel became active in the Men's Equal Suffrage Campaign, serving on its Constitutional Committee, and joined the group of New York men who signed a Declaration of Suffrage Faith. All long-time suffragists, their statement of support ended, "We, the signers of this statement, declaring our intention to vote for the amendment, belong to various parties, but we are united in our desire to have our State true to the fundamental principles of democracy."

Daughter Irene Untermeyer Putnam Richter escalated her involvement in Women Democrats of America and the family remained active until the very end of the battle.

Through their efforts, and the efforts of thousands of men and women throughout America, the Nineteenth Amendment finally was ratified on August 26, 1920. Minnie and Irene, the joys of Samuel's life, now had the right to vote.
