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Plan for Migrant Teens to Use St. Ann's School Rejected



St. Ann's School, on Brewster Ave., will remain vacant for the time being

A plan to use the vacant St. Ann's School on 40 Brewster Avenue for migrant teens during weekday hours has been rejected, by St. Ann's Pastor Stephen Norton, and the Archdiocese of New York. The school, which has been closed since 2019, due to budget cuts in the Archdiocese, was said to preparing for a staff of 100 and for 200 mostly male migrant children to attend the school during the week arriving by bus in the morning and leaving at the end of the day.

"For many reasons, and after speaking with the Archdioceses, we have decided not to go in that direction," said Father Norton, who had the primary authority to make the decision. "We are looking for a buyer or another renter for the school, but at this point, Rising Ground is not an option."

Rising Ground would have been the operator of the program for the Federal Government. Migrant teens would have been at the school for 90 days and then

reunited with their families in the US. Several meetings were held at St. Ann's with the community to discuss the proposal. Most of the parishioners attending the meetings opposed the plan, despite the

\$500,000 in rent that the parish was to receive and is in need of. "There were so many factors in addition to the opposition from the community."

It just wasn't viable at this juncture, and for so many reasons we just had to step away," said Father Norton. The school is located several blocks away from St. Ann's Parish on Midland Avenue.

City Council Minority Leader Mike Breen, who is also running for Assembly in the 90th District, said, "I think this was the right decision for the community. I understand that this was a difficult decision for Father Norton to make, but after sitting through one of the discussions with the community, it was clear that they did not want the school to be used for this purpose. We will find another use for the school."

Father Norton made a compelling case for using the school for this purpose in a letter to Councilman Anthony Merante, who had asked questions and had also opposed the proposed use. "A parish must do more than simply meet the religious worship needs of parishioners; it has an obligation to utilize its resources to meet the charitable, educational needs of its people whenever possible, and the surrounding

The Yonkers City Council held a special meeting on May 25 to vote on a \$1.3 Billion spending plan for City operations and the Yonkers Public Schools. The Council made several changes to Mayor Mike Spano's budget proposal before adopting it by a vote of 6-1, with Councilmember Corazon Pineda-Isaac voting no.

The Council reduced the proposed tax increase from just under 3% to 1.25%, and also increased funding to the Yonkers Public Schools by an additional \$3 Million. Mayor Spano had already proposed record funding of \$680 Million for the YPS, including an additional \$20 Million coming from NY State.

City Council President Lakisha Collins-Bellamy, after completing her first City budget as Council President and as Budget Chair, said the spending plan strikes a balance between increased education funding and helping out taxpayers struggling to pay for higher gas and food prices due to inflation. "This was an arduous task but this is what we were all elected to do."

"We all have our priorities and education is paramount and one of the most important tasks. However it in unconscionable to put an additional burden on the taxpayers. We gave them (YPS) everything they wanted and more."

'This budget meets our commitment that our children have the best and that families move to Yonkers for our great schools. I'm also glad that we were able to lower the tax increase, for taxpayer facing inflation and gas prices. To add another burden to them did not sit well with me. In the end, we got all that we needed for the residents."

Councilmember Corazon Pineda-Isaac voted no on the budget and on several other spending items related to the City's fiscal 2022-23 spending plan that starts July 1. "There are items that I wanted to see in the budget. This budget doesn't do enough for my first priority, which is the Yonkers Public Schools. We know the struggles that public schools have had and the YPS suffers from years of mismanagement and underfunding. "I wanted the 32 additional positions that are included in this budget, but I

wanted more because the need is so large. The Superintendent doesn't have the ideal amount of surplus in case of an emergency. The Mayor's budget would have provided additional revenue that could have gone to the schools. It would have cost the taxpayers an additional \$19 per month."

Council Majority Leader Tasha Diaz criticized Pineda-Issac for her no vote. "I'm a product of the YPS and a lifelong resident of Yonkers. And now I'm the Educaton Chair. This is a budget that is sustainable and works for the city. We

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Westchester Formula Finders Seek to Collect, Trade, Sell and Donate to Moms in Need

When Westchester mom Ali Curran saw a major shortage of baby formula across the county, she took action. The result is a Facebook page Westchester Formula Finders, that helps moms find baby formula and has 1,300 members in less than 10 days of activity.

Curran from Valhalla, and the mother of an 8 month old said that the feeling for most moms not knowing if they can find formula for their newborn, "feels extremely scary. For me I feel OK, because I have friends and family who can help. I feel badly for people who don't have that social network. It's scary and it makes you nervous as a mom to feel like you won't be able to have what your kid needs.'

So far, the response has been positive, and helpful, to mothers in need. "We have had a number of exchanges and good information from our members, with many donating or offering what they paid for formula," said Curran.

The Facebook group is moderated by Curran and Jennifer Lynch, a neonatal nurse practitioner at New York-Presbyterian Morgan Stanley Children's Hospital. Lynch, who brings a wealth of healthcare experience, and knowledge of the current shortage, reminded members to check and make sure that products are samples are not outdated or part of a recall.

"The challenge has been getting the actual product in the hands of people that need it, especially the people who don't have the resources to be driving around all day looking at different stores for what they need," Curran said. "It's been heartwarming, really lovely to see how people have stepped up for each other and gone out of their way and taken their time to say they have it or people are dropping formula at each others' houses. It's lovely, but it's really sad that there's a need. We're just trying to help fill that gap."

NY State Attorney General Letitia James has issued a warning to stores overcharging for formula, and Curran said the members of Westchester Formula Finders are also on the lookout for price gouging. "Our group is very active, and will be reporting any violations." She added that the price of formula depends on the size of the powder or liquid, so even a powder can with a \$64 may be in the

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Mayor Spano Launches Electric Powered Leaf Blower Incentive Program Rebate Applications Available at YonkersNY.gov



Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano today announced the launch of the city's new electric leaf blower rebate program for Yonkers residents and landscapers. To assist residents and lawn care professionals with converting their equipment to a quieter, healthier, and lower maintenance electric alternative, Yonkers residents now can receive a \$50 rebate from the City for purchasing an electric leaf blower. Yonkers-based landscaping companies can apply for up to five rebates of \$75 each per electric leaf blower purchased.

"We are doubling down on our efforts to reduce air and noise pollution in our City by encouraging residents and landscapers to use electric powered leaf blowers," said Mayor Spano. "With this incentive plan, switching to cleaner, quieter lawn care equipment not only protects us from the health hazards of gas-powered blowers, but also can provide us a little extra savings. I encourage all to make the switch and help us in creating a greener, cleaner Yonkers."

Yonkers city code bans the use of gas-powered leaf blowers, June 1- September 30. Gas-powered leaf blowers, along with other types of gas-powered maintenance equipment, pose significant environmental and health hazards to our communities and those who use them regularly. Operating a gas-powered leaf blower for one hour has been reported to create as much smog-forming pollution as driving a car 1,100 miles, or from New York City to Tampa, FL. Gas-powered leaf blowers also present quality of life impacts resulting from the high-intensity sound levels they produce, which may also pose an increased risk of hearing loss to regular users. Sound levels at distances of 100 to 400 feet have been found to be 22 decibels louder for gas-powered leaf blowers than their battery-electric equivalents.

Jason Baker, Chair of the Yonkers Green City Advisory Committee/Director of Sustainability, commented, "While leaves that fall on our lawns do not pose an environmental or public health risk to our communities, the use of gas-powered leaf blowers contributes to air pollution and excessive levels of noise. This program takes a consumer-friendly approach toward reducing these hazards by making environmentally preferable electric alternatives more accessible for outdoor maintenance."

Funded through the Yonkers Industrial Development Agency (YIDA), rebate applications are available at www.yonkersny.gov/leafblowerrebate. Rebates are limited and available until funds are exhausted. Residents or landscapers can recycle gas-powered leaf blowers by dropping them off (empty of gas) at the Yonkers Recycling Center located at 735 Saw Mill Road, Yonkers, NY. Lohrfink Park Improvements Completed in Time for Summer





normal price range.

Some of the photos on the Facebook page, which can be found at, https://www.facebook.com/groups/406479904681788, include cases of formula at the Costco in Yonkers, and at other pharmacies. If you keep a watchful eye on the page, you can find available formula.

Lynch, a lifelong Yonkers resident, told us that "some people are trying to take advantage of this crisis. That's why we started this group, to try and mitigate the problem of price gouging and people buying up all the supply."

"I have two older children, but I can't imagine the stress that parents with young children are going through. When you have a baby its hard to get out of the house and add to that having to search for formula."

Lynch said that her experience as a nurse in Manhattan has shown her, "we have enough formula in the hospital, but its when they leave that the problems exist. For some babies who need a specialized formula, its even harder to find the right kind, and if they can't find any, they have to come back to the hospital for IV treatment. They need fortified breast milk. Those are the babies that need the most support. If your baby is on regular formula, there are options and you can switch between brands. "

Lynch said that it may take a while to get enough formula back on the shelves to alleviate the problem. "That's why we started the group, and it has renewed my faith in humanity, and people who just want to help each other. This is all about helping babies."

Pools to Open June 24

Put on your bathing suits and grab your SPF as beach season arrives in Westchester County Memorial Day Weekend! Croton Point Beach in Croton-on-Hudson and Glen Island Beach in New Rochelle are scheduled to open on a preseason basis beginning Memorial Day Weekend, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, May 28, 29 and 30.

After Memorial Day, the two beaches will remain open weekends only, through Sunday, June 26, when the full summer schedule begins as the four County-owned pools open Friday, June 24. County pools are located at Saxon Woods Park in White Plains, Sprain Ridge Park and Tibbetts Brook Park in Yonkers and Willson's Woods Park in Mount Vernon.

Glen Island and all four pools will be open daily through Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 5. Due to ongoing capital projects, Croton Point Beach will be open weekends only for the season, with the exception of Mondays July 4 and Sept. 5. Hours for all facilities during the season are 11 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.; last entry at 6 p.m.

Commissioner of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation Kathy O'Connor said, "Our pools and beaches are the perfect destination to spend summer days. I'm excited for the season to kick-off and welcome residents back!"

Westchester County residency is required at Glen Island Park and all pools. Proof of residency must be shown with either a Westchester County Park Pass or a New York State driver's license showing a valid Westchester County address. Admission fees apply at all of the beach and pool facilities and parking fees apply at Tibbetts Brook Park, Croton Point and Glen Island. 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On This Day in Yonkers History...



An early 20th Century postcard of the Yonkers Pier

Monday, May 30th

May 30, 1872: Thomas Ludlow led opposition to incorporating Yonkers as a city, presenting a strong protest signed by Yonkers residents to NYS Governor John Hoffman. According to Ludlow, the majority of the people who lived outside the Village of Yonkers were opposed to incorporation. Outside the village, Yonkers was mostly farmland with very few buildings.

They resented the lack of consultation, believing this was "against the spirit of our institutions that any portion of the people of this State shall be subjected to an entire change in the form of their municipal government without some authorized expression of the will of the people to be affected thereby on that subject."

Others signing the petition were Richard Lawrence, H. M. Schefflen, John Taylor, Thomas Radford, Thomas Knowlton, B. T. Weeks, G. A. Rollins and Henry Williams. Also expressing displeasure were the well-known names of Shonnard and Saunders, who claimed incorporation was a scheme of just 3 men and did not reflect the opinion of the majority of Yonkers people.

Tuesday, May 31st

May 31, 1949: Ninety-one year old Christina Rein, widow of Civil War veteran John Rein, was honored at a dinner party held at Fanshaw Restaurant on South Broadway.

May 31, 1995: After Beczak Environmental Center, Ferry Sloops, Friends of the Old Croton Aqueduct, Hudson Communities Coalition, Ludlow Park Homeowners Association, Tuc-Loc Civic Association, Untermyer Performing Arts Council, Yonkers Audubon Society, Yonkers Cub Scout Pack 32, Yonkers Boy Scout Troop 42 and the Yonkers Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation joined together to "spruce up" Untermyer Park, the group was treated to a lecture by Landscape Architect Ralph Crosby, a tour of the Untermyer Park, light music and refreshments!

Wednesday, June 1st

June 1, 1946: After carefully reviewing his exam, the Yonkers Civil Service Commission determined Fire Lieutenant Thomas Barden, instead of failing the exam for Captain, actually scored third in the exam. Barden, failed by an unidentified examiner, someone who had prepared, conducted and marked "previous official examinations." The Commission had to answer City Manager Montgomery's request for clarification. Member Bernard Silverman, Commissioner Horace Gray and Director Joseph Crowley explained to Montgomery the Examiner, after marking the tests, gave an answer key to the examination. After Barden appeared before the Commission to appeal, the group carefully reviewed his test answers and came to the conclusion Barden had been incorrectly rated; he actually placed third. The examiner's poor rating cost Barden the captaincy as the position was given to someone else. Instead, two men who scored lower were promoted. Barden refused to comment, but his friends said the Lieutenant got a "raw deal."

Once a nationally ranked track star, Barden qualified for the 1916 US Olympic Team but couldn't attend; the games were canceled because of the war in Europe.

Thursday, June 2nd

June 2, 1943: "The Wind That Swept Mexico," by Caryl Avenue author Anita Brenner, was published. An interpretation of the Mexican revolution from 1910 to 1942, it was the first English language book to present an overview of the phases of the revolution, and was called "one of the most powerful and discerning pictorial histories every published." Written in collaboration with photographer George Leighton, the book brought a whirlwind of interviews for Brenner, including by Mary Margaret McBride and news commentator Johannes Steel. A paperback version was published in 1971, and a second edition in 1984. It remains in print today, thanks to the University of Texas Press.

Born on a ranch in Mexico, Brenner and her family were forced to flee to Texas because of the revolution as a child. After she completed her PhD at Columbia in Anthropology, she became a foreign correspondent for the NY Times and covered the Spanish Civil War and later returned to Mexico. During the 1920s and 1930s, she was part of a group of intellectuals and artists such as Diego Rivera, Jose Clemente Orozco and Frida Kahlo; as an anthropologist, reporter and cultural promoter, she become an important bridge to both worlds.

Brenner was the wife of Major David Glusker, MD, serving overseas with the Army at the time of publication, and the mother of two young children.

Friday, June 3rd

June 3, 1912: A couple of Common Council members discussed purchasing the Pocantico watershed at North Tarrytown to supplement the Yonkers Waterworks.

June 3, 1935: Several hundred dignitaries and Polish-American residents dedicated a pin-oak tree and bronze tablet in Washington Park in memory of Madame Marie Sklodowska-Curie, the Polish scientist who conducted pioneering research

on radioactivity Mme. Curie was born in Warsaw. She shared the 1903 Nobel Prize in Physics with her husband Pierre, and received a second Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1911.

Saturday, June 4th

June 4, 1931: John Van Deventer of Philipse Place was granted a patent for his invention of a walking toy. The wooden toy consisted of a pair of swinging legs attached to a body and propelled by a stick.

June 4, 1945: Councilman Thomas Sheridan introduced an ordinance to the Yonkers Common Council to create a wide riverfront highway, beginning south of Trevor Park and ending at the Yonkers northern border.

Sunday, June 5th

June 5, 1907: Elevation of the tracks of the New York Central Railroad from Ludlow Station to Glenwood Station was stopped because of property owners refused to sell the land at the railroad's offered price. The company wanted to eliminate all potentially dangerous grade crossings that impeded street traffic by raising the tracks 15 feet at its highest level between Main Street and Ashburton Avenue.

June 5, 1943: City Manager William Walsh banned fishing from the front of the Yonkers Recreation Pier... but fishing was permitted from the sides of the dock.

gave the YPS everything they wanted and more. How can you say you want more? I have spoken to Superintendent Quezada and he is ok with the budget. This is a budget that my colleagues have come together to support. I find it to be selfish and unjust to say that what we gave them was not enough. Also \$19 a month more in taxes means a lot to some people when milk is \$6 per gallon. We did provide for the children and I support this budget."

Council Minority Leader Mike Breen said, The schools got their money and we decided not to raise taxes more than 1.25% because when they money is coming in that's not the time to do it. We raised taxes by 6% a while ago because there was no money and the union contracts were due. It had to be done, but we don't have to raise taxes now for union contracts that will be due in 3 years. Hopefully, we will have more revenues then from the casino and Lionsgate. I wasn't going to go above 1.25% and I'm proud of what we did.

Councilmember Shanae Williams voted yes on the budget but no on the capital spending plan, explaining that the process left out items she wanted to see and that it was incomplete.

Councilman John Rubbo said, "While not perfect, this is a good budget. It adds positions and the tax increase is lower. Both will benefit our residents. This budget adds 10 new police officers, invests in infrastrucute, and invests in our schools. We added another \$3.1 Million to this budget and as a parent with two kids in the YPS, we voted for the critical staff requests that Dr. Quezada asked for.

Councilman Anthony Merante said, "The city is doing well. This is my 5th budget and we never kicked the can down the road. This is a budget that I can sell to my constituents. We didn't neglect the schools or the taxpayers, and did it without any drama."

Additional positions funded in the budget for YPS include 9 Full time counselors, 4 social workers, 9 Teaching Assistants, and 10 additional public safety offi-

The budget now goes to Mayor Spano for his signature"Yonkers, now the third largest city in New York State, weathered the effects of a global pandemic better than expected largely due to the city's uniquely diverse workforce; its growing population because of its booming economic development; increased e-commerce sales; and direct federal stimulus aid to residents," said Spano.

"Thanks to the cooperative work with our City Council, we are improving quality services for our residents, relieving our taxpayers as best as we can and making the vital investments in education so we can keep moving Yonkers forward."

I exclude the members of the private Federal Reserve board because that problem was created by the Congress in 1913. Congress delegated its Constitutional duty to provide a sound currency to a federally chartered, but private central bank.

I exclude the IRS as it is not a Constitutional organization within the United States department of the Treasury. After much research, the IRS appears to be a collection agency working for foreign banks and operating out of Puerto Rico under the color of the federal alcohol administration ("FAA") but the FAA was promptly declared unconstitutional inside the 50 states by the US Supreme Court in the case of U.S. v. Constantine, 287 (1935). At foot note 23 in the case of Chrysler Corp. v. Brown 441 U.S. 281 (1979), The US Supreme Court admitted that no organic act creating the IRS could be found after they searched for such an act all the way back to the Civil War, which ended in the year 1865.

I exclude all the special interests and lobbyists for a sound reason, they have no legal authority. They have no ability to coerce a senator, a congressman, or a president to do one cotton-picking thing. I don't care if they offer a politician a million in cash. The politician has the power to accept or reject it. No matter what the lobbyist promises, it is the legislator's responsibility to determine how he votes.

Those 536 elected officials spend much of their energy convincing you that what they did is not their fault. They cooperate in this common con

What separates a politician from a normal human being is an excessive amount of gall. No normal human being would have the gall of a speaker who stood up and criticized the President for creating deficits (The President can only propose a budget. He cannot force the Co

The Constitution, which is the supreme law of the land, gives soul responsibility to the House of Representatives for originating and approving appropriations and taxes. Who is the current speaker of the house? Nancy Pelosi. She is the leader of the majority party. She and fellow house members, not the president, can approve any budget they want. If the president vetoes it, they can pass it over his veto if they agree to.

I can't think of a single domestic problem that is not traceable directly to those 536 people. When you fully grasp the plain truth that 536 people exercise the power of the federal government then it must follow that what exist is what they want to exist.

If the tax code is unfair, unconstitutional and corrupt it's because they want it unfair, unconstitutional and corrupt

If the budget is in the red, it's because they want it in the red

If they do not receive Social Security but are on an elite privileged retirement plan not available to We The People, it is because they want it that

There are no unsolvable Government problems

Do not let these 536 people shift the blame to bureaucrats, whom they hire and whose jobs they can abolish; to lobbyists, who's gifts and advice they can reject; to regulators to whom they give the power to regulate and from whom they can take back this power.

Above all do not let them con you into the belief of the existence of disembodied mystical forces like the "economy", "inflation", or "politics" that

These 536 elected officials and they alone, are responsible. They and they alone have the power and should be held accountable by "We The People" who are their bosses. Provided the voters have the gumption to manage their own employees... we should vote them out of office and clean up their

An oath of office is required by the peoples state and federal constitutions upon being elected to public office. The oath of office is a contract between the person elected and "We The People" in exchange for \$ consideration. Violate your oath of office and you no longer represent or work for "We The People".


