The New Face of Poverty: Families and Children Left Hungry After SNAP Benefit Cuts

This month, thousands of families across the country faced an unexpected and devastating challenge — the halt of SNAP benefits. With food prices soaring, the cost of basic groceries like milk, cereal, and bread has climbed to over \$25, leaving many households struggling to put food on the table.

But the crisis didn't start with the benefit cuts. Even before this, rising inflation, job losses, and stagnant wages had pushed families to the brink. Nationally, 13.5% of U.S. households—about 18 million families—reported being food insecure in 2023, with nearly 18% of households with children struggling to afford enough food.

In Westchester County, food insecurity already affected about 7% of households, and in Yonkers, the situation is even more alarming. Some neighborhoods report that two in five households face food insecurity, and over one in ten children live below the poverty line.

Feeding Westchester reports that food banks now serve twice as many residents as they did before the pandemic.

With basic needs already under strain, the halt in SNAP benefits lands at a time

Westchester Power Pulls the Plug on County's Green Energy Program: What Happened?

A popular green energy delivery program for more than 150,000 Westchester homeowners and businesses has been abruptly halted without explanation.

The Westchester Power program, a nonprofit-led initiative by Sustainable Westchester to provide residents and businesses in Westchester County with 100% renewable energy through a Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) model, is shutting down at the end of November 2025.

Reason for Shutdown: Sustainable Westchester cited burdensome state regulations and the New York Public Service Commission's (PSC) rejection of up-

Yonkers Ranked 5th Safest City in the USA



With the U.S. experiencing over 340 mass shootings and over 26,000 motor vehicle deaths so far this year, the personal-finance company WalletHub released its report on 2025's Safest Cities in America, and Yonkers ranked as the 5th Safest city in the USA. To determine where Americans can feel most protected against life's hazards, including nonphysical forms of danger, WalletHub compared more than 180 U.S. cities across 41 key metrics. The data set ranges from traffic fatalities per capita and assaults per capita to the unemployment rate and the percentage of the population that is uninsured.

Westchester residents, attorneys, and those in the judicial system are wondering about the case of Chantel Chenault, a caseworker with Westchester County Adult Protective Services (APS), who pleaded guilty to stealing more than \$700,000 from a 95-year-old elderly dementia client under her care.

The details of the case are embarrassing for Chenault, who first withdrew \$200,000 from the woman’s bank account and then went a step further, transferring \$500,000 from the woman’s retirement accounts into her bank account, where Chenault withdrew the rest.

New York Attorney General Letitia James’ office prosecuted the case and, through a forensic audit, found that Chenault used the victim’s ATM card at the MGM-Empire Casino to withdraw funds.

In July, the AG’s office issued a press release, which we reported on, that included the fact that “As a result of OAG’s investigation, a guardian was appointed for the victim in April 2023. The guardian was then able to successfully

The Illicit Cannabis Market is Hurting New Rochelle & Our Community Deserves Better

A year ago, Highlife Health opened its doors as New Rochelle's first licensed, women-owned cannabis dispensary. It was a proud moment, not just for me, but for the community that supported us. Since then, we've grown our space, created jobs, and contributed more than \$400,000 in tax revenue to the State of New York and the City of New Rochelle. That money is going directly back into our community to support roads, schools, and other needed infrastructure that makes New Rochelle New Rochelle. I'm honored to do this.

But with that growth has come challenges I never could have imagined.

Just yesterday, I walked into a corner store in my own neighborhood and was casually offered four different strains of cannabis. The store is unlicensed, unregulated, and selling to minors. And it's not the only one. Within walking distance of my business, multiple unlicensed shops are openly operating, with no testing, no oversight, and no concern for safety.

Meanwhile, my dispensary follows every regulation, invests heavily in compliance, and pays taxes that directly support our city. Yet when I ask for enforcement, I'm told the city doesn't have the authority, and the county doesn't have the resources. I'm expected to sit idly as illegal businesses not only put kids at risk, but also threaten the survival of compliant small businesses like mine.

What troubles me most isn't just the unfair competition; it's the danger to our community. These illegal operators sell untested products that could contain harmful substances. They market directly to young people. And they fuel the stigma around cannabis that I and many others in the legal industry have worked tirelessly to break by showing what a safe, legal, and responsible dispensary can look like.

I'll admit, there are days when I sit at my desk in tears, wondering if fighting this uphill battle is worth it. But I know it is. Because this fight is bigger than me. It's about proving that compliance matters, that safety matters, and that small businesses who play by the rules deserve a fair chance to succeed.

It's time for real enforcement. Our community can't afford to wait any longer.

Mamdani Is The New Candy Man, But He's Really Handing Out Poison

Zohran Mamdani and Donald Trump have more in common than we think. Both made extremely ambitious promises when they were running for office. Both said they would make life more affordable for desperate families. Both have targeted minorities.

Trump claimed, with no evidence of course, that Mexicans were bringing crime and drugs to America, when he announced his candidacy for the Presidency in 2015. His administration's ICE goons are arresting Latinos across the country, regardless of whether they have citizenship papers or a green card.

Mamdani has been going after Israel and the Jewish people since he was a college student.

Trump said he would bring manufacturing jobs back to America. This isn't happening. We lost approximately 33,000 factory jobs in 2025, according to the U.S. Labor Department.

Trump claimed he would lower inflation. Inflation is running at about three percent. Prices for beef, chicken, coffee, cereal, yogurt and other foods have risen.

Mamdani said he would make city buses free and fast. If you have any kind of economic sense at all, you will ask, "Who is going to pay for the bus drivers, the engineers, the maintenance workers who work for the MTA Bus Company? Where is the money going to come from to pay for their salaries, health care and pensions?"

About 4,000 people work for the MTA bus lines, running 1,300 buses. It costs about \$800 million a year to operate the buses.

And how's he going to make the buses go faster? Blow up all the other vehicles fighting for a lane on the city's over-crowded streets?

Mamdani said he would make high quality child care free. Our family paid thousands of dollars a year for day care for our child when we lived in the outer boroughs, from the time the kid was six months old until kindergarten. Would we have wanted to purchase less expensive care for our child? Of course, but who is going to pay the bill for city-dictated high-quality day care that's somehow affordable? The mayor-elect's free child care plan could cost about six billion a year.

The mayor-elect also wants to open city-run grocery stores, one for each of the five boroughs, selling food pegged to wholesale prices. In a city that lacks virtually any open space, where could the land and the building be located for such enterprises? Unsurprisingly, the owners of private supermarkets, delis and bodegas are not happy about this proposal. How will they be able to compete and survive against a city-run grocery that's selling food at much lower costs?

Mamdani also said he wants a rent freeze. People may justifiably complain that the rent is too high, but freezing rents is going to almost certainly warp the rental market. Maintaining and repairing tenants' apartments costs money. Building material prices have gone up this year, due to tariffs, energy cost increases and more demand, according to the National Association of Home Builders.

Insurance fees have increased by more than 18 percent, the New York City Rent Guidelines Board states. Utility, maintenance, energy and administrative costs are up too, the rent control board says.

Mamdani says he'll raise taxes on the wealthy and corporations to write the checks for free buses and child care.

Governor Hochul has already told Mamdani the city buses are not going to be free, so that's one big promise that he can't make good on already. The state has to approve the tax increases Mamdani wants. Let's see what happens when the Governor and the over-burdened and notoriously contentious New York State Legislature work through Mamdani's proposals and put it through their sausage machine. Even if they approve some kind of tax increase, it would be extremely unlikely Mamdani is going to get what he says he needs to pay for all the candy he wants to hand out.

The other very disturbing aspect of Mamdani's public statements are his overtly anti-Israel positions. Mamdani belongs to the Democratic Socialists of America (DSA), which is openly hostile to Israel. Mamdani doesn't believe Israel has the right to exist. He's said he doesn't support any country that has a "hierarchy of citizenship on the basis of religion or anything else."



On This Day in Yonkers History...



Yonkers native and Yonkers High School graduate Dr. John Winthrop, winner of the 1946 Nobel Prize in Chemistry

Monday, November 17th

November 17, 1944: "Salute the Navy" and a Navy Band stopped in Yonkers, to promote our Sixth Bond Drive. Accompanied by WAVES, Coast Guardsmen, and Army equipment, they marched from Larkin Plaza to the World War Memorial on South Broadway where they held a program to inspire Yonkers to buy bonds; our Yonkers' subscription quota was \$12,600,000.

Sergeant Robert Friedman, Buena Vista Avenue, was the featured speaker; he held three Presidential Citations, a Purple Heart, a Silver Star and the Infantryman's Combat Badge with laurels, received because of his heroic actions in three invasions.

The first buyer was Travers Avenue's discharged veteran David Rifkin who had served in North Africa.

Tuesday, November 18th:

November 18, 1777: British General Tryon sent Hessian troops to pillage and burn homes in Philipse Manor. The Hessians allegedly stripped women and children of clothing, then turned them out into the cold. Old men and boys were led to enemy lines wearing little but a halter the Hessians put around their necks to lead them.

Patriot newspapers severely condemned Tryon for making war on women, children and the elderly.

November 18, 1926: Michael Landy, Superintendent of Yonkers' Department of Combustibles, ordered contractors building a theater at South Broadway and Herriot Street to stop blasting with so much force and noise. Officials at St. Joseph's Hospital reported doctors could not perform surgery because the explosions were so intense, its building shook with each blast.

November 18, 1932: Yonkers joined the Keskeskick Chapter, DAR, to observe the reopening of Philipse Manor Hall, Manor House Square's renovated historic landmark, and celebrate Yonkers Days!

A torchlight parade with music, banners and streamers kicked off the celebration; theater screens, milk bottles and laundry bundles advertised it. One hundred seventy-five merchants celebrated Yonkers Days, all selling quality merchandise at record low prices.

Trolley cars and buses not only announced the event with posters, they provided free transportation during Yonkers Days' morning shopping hours!

Wednesday, November 19th:

November 19, 1919: Jockey Club Chairman August Belmont sold Fair Play, considered by many the best horse he ever raced and the top stallion of his Nursery Stud, to Yonkers' Gifford Cochran for a record breaking \$100,000, topping William Whitney's purchase of Hamburg. Fair Play had sired Man o' War and Mad Hatter.

Yonkers believed Cochran wanted to breed his own winning racing stable.

November 19, 1946: Nobel prizes were awarded to two former Yonkers residents! Dr. John Mott, internationally known religious leader and long-term head of the YMCA, received the Nobel Peace Prize; Dr. John Northrop received the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for his work preparing enzymes and virus proteins in a pure form. Northrop graduated from Yonkers High School. Dr. Mott lived in Yonkers for many years; he received his award for creating a peace-promoting brotherhood across national boundaries.

As Food Banks see Increase in Usage, Purchase NYPIRG Food Drive Collects Donations



For the past month, students across New York have organized Trick-or-Eat food drives to help stock local food pantry shelves to fight back against increasing food insecurity in our local communities. Trick or Eat is a long-standing Halloween food drive where volunteers collect non-perishable items door-to-door instead of candy. The drives, organized by the statewide student-directed nonprofit NYPIRG, collected thousands of non-perishable food items across the state. The Purchase NYPIRG chapter gathered over 700 items, which were donated to the Purchase College Food Pantry.

"Trick or Eat is a really special event because it takes the generosity of our neighbors to make it successful" said Matthew Paolucci, NYPIRG Project Coordinator at SUNY Purchase. "This year, we expanded our food collection efforts by dropping off more than 300 brown paper bags to our neighbors in Rye Brook, and the generosity of their response was incredible."

Food insecurity, where a person experiences inconsistent access to adequate food due to a lack of money and other resources, is a major problem, with one in four adults in the State experiencing food insecurity. Food insecurity is also a problem that reaches our college campuses. The proportion of college students experiencing financial stress and unmet essential needs is growing.

"Trick or Eat is really important to me because I get to see the impact that it has on my local community when I walk past the food pantry everyday" said NYPIRG volunteer and Purchase student Francisca Schmalz. "seeing people in need benefit from the work that students put in to support one another is really inspiring."

Shelters, food pantries, and programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) can assist those who suffer from food insecurity; however, these resources are often underfunded and can be underutilized. These concerns have been compounded by the government shutdown, waning federal funds for food banks, and looming work requirements for SNAP; many students will suddenly find themselves unable to qualify.

NYPIRG's Hunger and Homelessness project aims to meet the needs of hungry neighbors through events like the annual Trick-or-Eat drive. The project sheds light on the realities of hunger in the on- and off-campus communities. According to NYPIRG's 2016 Hunger on Campus report, nearly half of the surveyed students were considered food insecure and 22% considered themselves hungry, which means that they were very food insecure. Now, with food pantries at all State University of New York (SUNY) and City University of New York (CUNY) campuses, NYPIRG's food drives help ensure that students are able to take advantage of a fully-stocked campus food pantry when they need it most.

"With federal funding cuts looming to our local food banks and members of our community left in limbo as the government shutdown affects SNAP, it's as important as ever that we keep the shelves in these food pantries stocked so that students can benefit from this service," said Matthew Paolucci, NYPIRG Project Coordinator at SUNY Purchase. "Even if our drive alone collected just 700 food items for one pantry, the hope is that this kind of work inspires more people to get involved in their local communities during these times of great need."

Transgender Day of Remembrance: A Conversation with Anastasia Kinard

Every year on November 20th, we observe Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDoR)—a time dedicated to honoring trans folks whose lives were lost to anti-trans violence. This day concludes Transgender Awareness Week and was founded over 25 years ago by Gwendolyn Ann Smith in memory of Rita Hester, a Black trans woman murdered in 1998.

The purpose of TDoR is twofold: first, to remember the lives we've lost, and second, to raise public awareness of the ongoing crisis of violence facing trans folk. According to the Human Rights Campaign (HRC), at least 36 trans and GNC folk were violently killed in the United States in the twelve months following the last TDoR. Of that number, roughly half were Black trans women—a stark indicator of the intersectional disparities that shape this violence.

I spoke with 26-year-old Queens resident Anastasia Kinard about what TDoR means to her. She said:

"Transgender Day of Remembrance reminds us of the lives we've lost — lives that were full of beauty, talent, and promise. I feel like being a transgender in 2025 we should appreciate the people that pass and that paved way for us because we the next generation and my name will be noticed."

Those words reflect the heart of TDoR: it is not simply a list of names read aloud, but a call to reflect on lives interrupted and to recognize that the legacies of those gone live on through the work and presence of trans folks now and in the future.

Black trans women are often targeted. HRC's report highlights that Black trans women comprised 50% of the documented fatal victims in that 12-month span. The report also notes that the true number is almost certainly higher, given underreporting, misgendering of victims, and gaps in data.

In addition to violence, structural factors—such as poverty, housing instability, and discrimination in employment and healthcare—amplify risk and vulnerability for trans and GNC folk. As the HRC notes, the overlap of racism, misogyny, transphobia, and economic exclusion creates a "culture of violence" in which trans folk of color are disproportionately at risk.

For Kinard and for many other younger trans folk, TDoR is simultaneously a moment of grief and a moment of empowerment. The memory of those lost becomes a charge: to live, to thrive, to carry the torch onward. As Kinard put it, the people who "paved the way" did not simply die in vain—they left behind the space, the platform, and the promise for the next generation.

This year, as we gather in vigils, in classrooms, in community centers, in parks, or even quietly at home, we honor the names and lives of those lost. We lost powerful trans folk in Ballroom, and we will never forget them. With that, we also recommit to the work: raising awareness, building safer spaces, advocating for health, economic, and social justice, and ensuring that in the future, no names will need to be spoken on TDoR.





in the First Degree (class B felony)Robbery in the First Degree (class B felony)Burglary in the First Degree (class B felony)Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Third Degree (class D felony)

Jenkins, 32, will be sentenced by Judge George Fufidio at a hearing on Dec. 11. DA Cacace said: "First and foremost, I want to thank the jurors for exercising their civic duty with such care and consideration.

"Maria Coto's life was cut short on May 14, 2024. As proved during a multi-week trial, Hasseem Jenkins beat her until the nerves in her brain stem were severed beyond repair, hurling repeated epithets as she lay dying on the floor.

"Maria devoted her brief time on Earth to helping others. She was a petite woman with an uncommonly generous spirit. She will live on in all the lives she touched along the way.

"I am grateful to the jury for holding the defendant responsible for killing Maria. My office will continue to support Maria's family and all crime victims in Westchester County."

The case was prosecuted by Trial Division Chief Nadine Nagler and Assistant District Attorney Kevin Jones.

In a more recent incident, a mother was beaten to death by her ex-boyfriend in an Elmsford Hotel in front of their baby boy.

Roseberline Philippe, a 32-year-old office assistant at White Plains Hospital in New York, was tragically beaten to death by her ex-boyfriend, Justin Bartley, on Sunday, November 2, 2025, in Room 230 of the Days Inn motel in Elmsford, Westchester County. The couple, who had met years earlier at Port Chester High School, shared a 2-year-old son; Philippe had reportedly grown fearful of Bartley following their child's birth and was attempting to end the relationship.

According to police reports, the pair arrived at the motel around 8:30 a.m. Bartley, 32, allegedly subjected Philippe to a prolonged assault lasting several hours before fleeing the scene around 4:30 p.m. with their toddler son, heading to his family in the Bronx. Motel cleaning staff discovered Philippe's battered body later that afternoon, prompting an immediate investigation. Surveillance footage captured Bartley leaving with the child, leading to his swift arrest later that day by a joint task force involving local police, county authorities, and the FBI. The boy was safely recovered and placed with family.

Bartley, who was on probation for a prior gun charge, faces second-degree murder charges and is being held without bail at Westchester County Jail. Philippe's sister, Yvena Philippe, described a heated family confrontation with Bartley the previous day (November 1) at their White Plains home, where he was told to leave. The family expressed devastation, with Yvena noting, "We thought she was coming home." A GoFundMe campaign has been launched to cover funeral costs and support the child's future, highlighting Philippe's role as a devoted mother, loving daughter, and kind friend.

Rose leaves behind her precious 2 year old child, who must now grow up without their mother's love and guidance. As we grieve this unimaginable loss, we are coming together to support her family and honor Rose's memory.

Yonkers Man Charged with Murder & Weapons Charges in Relation to Yonkers Shooting

Westchester County District Attorney Susan Cacace announced that a Yonkers man was arraigned for Murder and weapons charges. These charges followed an indictment in relation to a shooting death which occurred in Yonkers in August.

Xavier Palmer, 29 years old, was arraigned today on charges of Murder in the Second Degree, a class A felony, and Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree, a class C felony. Palmer pleaded not guilty on all charges and was remanded to the Westchester County Jail by Judge George Fufidio.

On August 11, 2025, Mount Vernon resident James Hardy, 41 years old, was shot and killed on Cliff Street in Yonkers. An investigation led police to Palmer who was arrested by the Yonkers Police Department shortly after the shooting. A loaded Glock .9mm handgun was recovered by the YPD at the scene of the shooting.

DA Cacace said: "Despite law enforcement efforts to keep violent crime at all-time lows in Yonkers and throughout Westchester, this case is a reminder that our community is still vulnerable to tragic and senseless crimes like this. I am grateful for the swift arrest made in this case and my hopes are that the prosecution of Xavier Palmer will bring some sense of closure to the victim's friends and family."

The investigation was conducted by the Yonkers Police Department.

The case is being prosecuted by Assistant District Attorneys Marissa Wynn and Kevin Jones.

Also, Mamdani is mistaken if he thinks Israel was founded on the Jewish religion. Israel was created by the United Nations after World War II for a very particular reason. The Jewish people needed a safe place to live after Nazi Germany killed six million Jews. There was no future for the Jewish people in Europe. America wasn't going to take the rest who survived the war. They really had nowhere else to go.

The overwhelming majority of the survivors wanted to live in their ancestral homeland. The United Nations partition plan in 1948 offered the Arab population that lived in Palestine their own state along with the Jewish state. The Palestinians and neighboring Arab countries rejected the plan and declared war on the new state of Israel. The Palestinians were offered their own state in negotiations with Israel in the year 2000. The Palestinian leader turned it down.

To imagine, as Mamdani does, that the Israelis could somehow peacefully co-exist within the same borders as the multitude of followers of Hamas, Islamic Jihad and other Palestinian terrorist factions is a dangerous fantasy. Hamas' charter calls for the destruction of Israel. The Israelis have had their backs against the wall for decades. They're not going to ever give up the only available vessel ensuring their physical safety.

When Mamdani says it's possible to be anti-Zionist, but not anti-Semitic, he's playing word games that are ultimately meaningless.

In 2023, he said, "We have to make clear that when the boot of the NYPD is on your neck, it's been laced by the IDF," meaning the Israel Defense Forces. This claim manages to slur both the New York City police and Israel at the same time. It implies that Israel is somehow pulling the strings on an American police force, which is a classic anti-Semitic trope. He's also posted on social media saying the police are racist, wicked and corrupt.

The vast majority of police officers are sincere in their desire to protect the public. I imagine some are racist or corrupt. Nobody can defend police officers who brutalize young men of color. What happened to George Floyd and many others is unconscionable. But to characterize the entire New York City police department as evil or corrupt is to engage in the very stereotyping that Mamdani as a progressive is supposed to decry.

I've interviewed a few police officers in Westchester for stories. They often have to make split second decisions that could mean they lose their life while trying to do their job. One former officer I interviewed got bitten on the wrist during a home invasion by a burglar who was high on PCP. The burglar hit an elderly man in the head with his own oxygen tank, ultimately causing the man's death, and sexually assaulted the man's home health care aide.

Another year, on the Fourth of July, a kid threw some kind of incendiary device at the same officer's head. The officer sustained severe skeletal, neurological and sensory injuries. He had to retire from the force.

The thing about social media and the Internet is that you can't ever erase your words. Mamdani may have won the mayoral election, but he's already stained relationships with the police department, the real estate industry, the financial industry and the beleaguered Jewish community, in a city that is famously difficult to govern.

My prediction is that Mamdani will find it extremely hard to make any meaningful headway with his goals to make the city more affordable. But his policies could actually make it harder than ever for everyday New Yorkers to survive.

dated municipal filings as the primary causes. The group announced the termination on November 6, 2025, affecting 26 participating municipalities.

After the announcement of closing the program, NYS PSC spokesman James Denn said, "Sustainable Westchester failed to meet basic outreach and education standards that are in place to protect ratepayers, including providing program participants with the correct price comparison information for how their bills would be increasing compared to the default utility. Sustainable Westchester decided to terminate its CCA program on its own following the rejection of its deficient municipal filings."

Impact on Customers: Over 100,000 participants will automatically revert to Con Edison as their default supplier starting December 1, 2025. No action is required from customers, and rates will align with Con Ed's standard offerings. The program has delivered lower electricity rates (averaging 10-15% savings) and promoted clean energy since 2018.

Launched in 2016 to meet local climate goals, the program pooled buying power for greener electricity but faced ongoing disputes with state regulators over compliance and transparency.

Many of our readers were skeptical of the program because, in the 26 Westchester communities where the Sustainable Westchester-Westchester Power program was welcomed, they were required to opt out. If they did not opt out, they would automatically be enrolled in Westchester Power.

While some months' utility bills for Westchester residents in the program were lower than Con Edison's, in most months their bills were higher.

But not significantly higher, which brings us to the conclusion we've always had about the program: that with Westchester Power, there were thousands, if not tens of thousands, of Westchester homeowners willing to pay a little bit more for green energy.

That was the backbone of Sustainable Westchester's argument.

But for many Westchester residents who were struggling to make ends meet, they wanted the cheapest plan. And it was difficult for residents to make an accurate comparison of the rates between Con Ed and Westchester Power.

The only comment from Sustainable Westchester came in the form of a November 6 letter to the 26 municipalities in Westchester that use Westchester Power, advising them that they will have to use Con Edison or NYSEG for northern Westchester customers in December, giving them just 24 days' notice.

The cities of New Rochelle, Yonkers, and White Plains, the towns of Greenburgh, Bedford, North Salem, and Pound Ridge, and the villages of Tarrytown and Sleepy Hollow were enrolled in the program.

The letter from Sustainable Westchester's Executive Director, Noam Bramson, reads in part,

"Following extensive discussion with New York State officials, consultation with energy suppliers, and analysis of trends affecting community energy programs statewide, Sustainable Westchester has made the difficult but necessary decision to discontinue the Westchester Power program.

"Recent outreach and education requirements mandated by the State Public Service Commission – while grounded in important goals of transparency, consumer protection, and affordability that we fully share – have, in practice, presented significant implementation challenges for community energy programs like ours. Although our outreach and education activities in recent months have been, by far, the most extensive and robust in the program's history, we are unable to obtain State authorization to launch the new contract on schedule.

"Before closing and in this spirit, I want to emphasize that Westchester Power is just one of many services that Sustainable Westchester is proud to offer our municipal members. From GridRewards to Solarize, from EnergySmart Homes to the Clean Energy Accelerator, from MOVE to Municipal Thermal Energy Networks and more, our programming is robust, wide-ranging, and user-friendly. We touch thousands of lives every day and offer a proven model for regional collaboration. If you have not already partnered with us to take full advantage of our expertise and programming, then please consider this a renewed invitation to join us," writes Bramson, the former Mayor of New Rochelle.

The changes made by the NYS PSC, a State Agency, in 2024 required energy providers, including Westchester Power, to provide more information about their energy bills. "At a time when New York consumers are facing increasing prices for the majority of commodities, it is more important than ever that CCA administrators are completing the minimum outreach and education requirements before being allowed to opt out and enroll eligible customers in a program that will increase their energy utility bills," Denn said.

Denn's blunt criticism of Westchester Power should not be overlooked, nor should the requirements, which seemed simple, to lengthen the outreach and community education period before a contract was approved.

It estimates that the Westchester Power program reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 1.5 million metric tons, equivalent to taking 35,000 gas-powered cars off the road.

Supporters like Greenburgh Supervisor Paul Feiner were disappointed in the decision.

Editor's Note:

If 150,000 customers were using Westchester Power, wouldn't it make sense to comply with the PSC and reopen the program? Even with a delay of several months?

And even if half of the customers never wanted to be in the program and opted out, is there a benefit—or a business model—for the 75,000 remaining customers?

What the PSC is asking for is something many of our readers wanted: more information about opting out and a price comparison. That is not a difficult hurdle to overcome.

Governor Hochul Announces Two Accelerated Pavement Projects to Begin in Westchester Next Year Along Routes 133 and 100B

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced that the New York State Department of Transportation will be adding two important paving projects to its Hudson Valley paving program next year along two vital roadways in Westchester County, accelerating an investment to restore pavement and improve travel along key stretches of State Routes 133 and 100B. Westchester residents, attorneys, and those in the judicial system are wondering about the case of Chantel Chenault, a caseworker with Westchester County Adult Protective Services (APS), who pleaded guilty to stealing more than \$700,000 from a 95-year-old elderly dementia client under her care.

The details of the case are embarrassing for Chenault, who first withdrew \$200,000 from the woman's bank account and then went a step further, transferring \$500,000 from the woman's retirement accounts into her bank account, where Chenault withdrew the rest.

New York Attorney General Letitia James' office prosecuted the case and, through a forensic audit, found that Chenault used the victim's ATM card at the MGM-Empire Casino to withdraw funds.

In July, the AG's office issued a press release, which we reported on, that included the fact that "As a result of OAG's investigation, a guardian was appointed for the victim in April 2023. The guardian was then able to successfully secure \$881,062 in restitution to the victim from Westchester County, which was used for her housing and medical needs."

So the taxpayers of Westchester County are on the hook for the \$881k that was returned to the victim. Will Chenault be able to pay the county back?

And here is the buried lead. Chenault, who pleaded guilty on June 26 to Grand Larceny in the Second Degree in Westchester County, was sentenced on Oct. 31 to Five Years' Probation.

One attorney we spoke to was baffled that Chenault got only probation. "What is strange is that the county paid the old woman back, and the defendant got probation. The July 2 press release is not on the AG's website, and there was no press release when she was sentenced, which is also highly unusual.

That sentence seems extremely lenient to me. Particularly because the defendant was in a fiduciary position, meaning issues and was entrusted with caring for the woman, and instead took advantage of her. And it seems like she just squandered the money away on gambling. That sounds just greedy to me. Unless she has an illness that is a death sentence, I don't understand the sentence at all."

According to the AG's July release, "Chenault faces a sentence of up to six months in jail."

We have heard that Chenault is ill, and the LoHud.com story notes that she took a medical leave of absence from her job in 2022.

The AG's office provided no additional comments, and a check of the legal documents in the County Clerk's database shows no new entries for Chenault's case since 2023. We also don't know who the judge was who oversaw the case and agreed to the probation.

And because the NYSAG's office handled the case, there was no involvement from the Westchester DA.

Our friends at mtvnewcenter.com have been following the case, and the comments on their Facebook post included more than 100 stunned readers, with

Thursday, November 20th:

November 20, 1934: Investigation by Assistant Corporation Counsel Hannon unearthed a forgotten Court of Appeals' decision invalidating the New York City bill to annex Yonkers. His research started after Bryn Mawr Park resident Clem Roeder criticized City Clerk William McCabe for "jumping the gun." After the Common Council voted against annexation, McCabe notified the State Assembly leadership Yonkers was against the plan. Roeder claimed Yonkers residents favored annexation, so the City Clerk asked our Legal Department for an opinion.

MCCabe was able to remind Roeder New York voters approved a 1927 constitutional amendment prohibiting annexation without a referendum in the affected municipality. More important, the Court of Appeals ruled "no home rule bill of political subdivision in the state is effective," meaning the state legislature could not override wishes of the locality, canceling NYC's attempt to grab Yonkers!

Friday, November 21st:

November 21, 1926: Public Works Commissioner William Goldsmith rejected the proposed city dump on Saw Mill River Road by Sprain Ridge Hospital. He believed drainage from the site into the Nepperhan River would contaminate our water supply.

November 21, 1944: Fire broke out on the Swedish liner Gripsholm, anchored off Yonkers. By the time our firefighters reached the ship, its crew had extinguished the blaze.

Between 1942 and 1946, the US chartered Gripsholm transported exchanges of POWs and US citizens caught behind enemy lines a dozen times.

Saturday, November 22nd:

November 22, 1919: The Prince of Wales, later King Edward VIII and the Duke of Windsor, decorated three Yonkers men with British Military Medals; the ceremony took place on the HMS Renown, lying in the Hudson River off Manhattan.

Angus Robertson of Van Cortlandt Park Avenue was a former Sergeant and recipient of the Distinguished Service Cross awarded for heroism in action before the Hindenburg Line.

Besides receiving the Distinguished Service Medal from General Pershing and the Croix de Guerre from France, Thomas Dean of Elinor Place received the British Military Medal from the Prince.

The third, Sergeant William Spencer of Cliff Street was awarded a decoration from the Prince of Wales for his "conspicuous services" during the war, showing extraordinary bravery under fire by silencing a machine gun nest and killing four Germans. He also was honored with the US Distinguished Service Medal and the French Croix de Guerre.

Sunday, November 23rd:

November 23, 1943: Otis Elevator was notified its Yonkers plant won the Army-Navy production award for "high achievement in the production of war material," for the third time; included was a tribute from Under Secretary of War Robert Patterson. He commended the Yonkers men and women employees for setting "an inspiring example for your fellow Americans on the production front." The Yonkers Otis plant was entitled to fly an "Army-Navy E flag" with two white stars.

A few takeaways from Election 2025 in Westchester.

I-Democrats won the day, not only in Westchester but in New Jersey and Virginia. The victories by Congresswoman Spanberger and Congresswoman Sherrill point to a shift in the electorate, away from President Trump and MAGA and back toward the Democratic Party, especially in America's suburbs.

81% of young women voted for Mamdani in NYC, 80% for Sherrill in NJ, and 78% for Spanberger in Virginia. Both Spanberger and Sherrill were Congresswomen. Sherrill served in the Navy and as a federal prosecutor, while Spanberger served our country in intelligence.

All of this means that here in Westchester, if democrats pick a female candidate like Sherrill and Spanberger to run for Congress in NY-17, then Mike Lawler can be defeated. And if Lawler goes, so goes the House of Representatives to democrats next year.

Currently, seven democrats have announced their run for Congress in NY-17, after Jessica Reinmann ended her campaign and endorsed Cait Conley. Conley, an Army Veteran *with three Bronze Stars*, is one of the leading candidates, along with Rockland County legislator Beth Davidson.

II- In Yorktown, former Yorktown Supervisor and Town Justice, Democrat Lanny Gilbert was elected to the Yorktown Town Board after all early votes and paper ballots were tallied.

Gilbert will join Democrat Susan Siegel on the Town Board, which will still have a 3-2 Republican majority. Gilbert, 5559 votes, narrowly defeated republican councilwoman Luciana Haughwourt, 5442 votes.

Days before the election, Gilbert reminded voters that I lost my 2015 election by just eight votes, and Susan Siegel won her election last year by just 107 votes.

III-The Town of Eastchester is the only remaining town board in Westchester with all Republicans, 5-0, after Supervisor Tony Colavita and council members Luigi Marcoccia and Theresa Nicholson were all reelected unopposed.

Other Republican-majority town boards in Westchester now have Democratic members, including in Mt. Pleasant, Yorktown, Harrison, and Somers.

IV-Conservative Party Alliance with Democrats in Westchester continues. Westchester Conservative Party Chair Hugh Fox continued his party's recent alliance with democratic candidates by endorsing democrats in several 2025 elections.

In the Town of North Castle, Democrat Sonny Vataj ran on the conservative line, while Republican Barbara DiGiacinto also ran on the C line. Both won election to the Town Board.

In the Town of Harrison, the election of Town Clerk was decided by the C line, with democrat Angela Sposato narrowly defeating republican Dottie Klein. Sposato had the C line and received 209 votes. Klein lost by less than 100 votes, and if you give her the C line, she would have won.

And in the election for State Supreme Court Judge in the 9th Judicial District, which includes Westchester County, three Democratic candidates had the C line and won. All four Democratic judicial candidates for the State Supreme Court were from Westchester, and all won decisively by 90,000 votes. Congratulations to Judge Verris Shako, Judge-elect Diane Clerkin, Judge John Collins, and Judge Desmond Lyons.

In Eastchester, Colavita, Marcoccia, and Nicholson ran on the republican and the Common Sense Party line.

The action by Chairman Fox and the Westchester Conservative Party is the only instance of a Conservative Party in New York State endorsing Democrats.

V-Republicans split on Sculti and Colety: Republican leaders and candidates we spoke to were divided in their views of County Executive candidate Christine Sculti and Westchester GOP Chair Doug Colety.

Sculti lost her bid for County Executive for the third time on Nov. 4, losing to Ken Jenkins by a record 68%-32%. One Somers republican wrote, "It was only 8 years ago that republican Rob Astorino was County Executive. Since then, Republican candidates have kept losing. I would argue, as you have, Mr. Murphy, that republicans cannot win with their top candidate losing by 35 points, year after year.

"I would also blame Westchester Chairman Doug Colety for running candidates who keep losing by 35 points for County Executive. Make a change, Doug, or we will make a change with you. If not, then I say the fix is in."

Other local republican leaders tell a different story. "We knew Sculti was going to run again and lose. I told her not to run, but I give her credit for doing it again with no money and little support. I also don't blame Colety because he asked many Republicans to step forward and run, and all of them refused. So it was Sculti or nobody. If you ask Joe Citizen to run against Ken Jenkins —or any popular Democrat —nobody wants to do it anymore. Maybe it's the Trump factor. Who is going to run for County Executive, and who will serve as republican Chair in Westchester? Both are thankless jobs."

Some compared the race for Westchester County Executive to the race for NYC Mayor. "Republicans in NYC reran Curtis Sliwa, after he lost by 30 to Eric Adams four years ago. There was no prominent republican to run for NYC Mayor. Same candidate, same result."

VI-Searching for a republican that did better than expected. We find the one republican that cracked 40% in the county wide races. Kevin O'Keefe, republican candidate for county legislator in the 4th district, ran against BOL Chair Vedat Gashi. Republican strategist TJ McCormack who is now the overnight host on WABC Radio -AM 770, said, "A few months ago a big, charismatic Marine veteran of the War on Terror, full of energy and positivity burst into a GOP office and announced he was running for Westchester County Legislator. When we started to explain the petition process he told us he already had about 50 signatures. Kevin O'Keefe Westchester came up short, but he was as spirited and earnest as any candidate I have ever encountered. Kevin literally never stopped. This campaign was a great warm up for something else down the road. At least I

Budget Update Paints Less Alarming Picture of Federal Health Cuts

A new fiscal report from the state Budget Division suggests federal funding cuts will hit New York's health-care budget less severely than officials have previously warned.

A financial plan update released last week estimates that Washington's tax and spending package, signed by President Trump this summer, will add \$2.6 billion to the state's health costs in fiscal 2027, rising to \$3.6 billion in 2028 and 2029.

However, most of those costs could be avoided if the state wins approval to reconfigure its Essential Plan, as proposed to federal regulators in September.

Meanwhile, the Budget Division has increased – not decreased – its projections of how federal Medicaid funding the state will receive in years ahead. Compared to figures it published in May, the division anticipates an additional \$444 million in federal Medicaid support in fiscal 2027, \$2.8 billion in 2028 and \$2.6 billion in 2029.

The division also estimates that enrollment in the three state-run health plans – Medicaid, the Essential Plan and Child Health Plus – will rise rather than fall over the next three years.

The report warns that a newly imposed tax on managed care organizations, designed to draw an extra \$4 billion in Medicaid funding over three years, is at risk due to policy changes in Washington. Yet the state's projected revenue from the levy is unchanged as officials wait for clarity on when those federal policies will take effect.

These forecasts are surprisingly stable given that the federal legislation cut almost \$1 trillion from Medicaid over the next 10 years, and New York's version of the safety-net health plan has the highest per capita spending in the U.S.

The outlook stands in contrast with comments from other state officials and industry representatives, who have said the impact of health cutbacks in Washington would be "devastating" and "catastrophic."

Governor Hochul has said "draconian" cuts in the federal legislation – known as the One Big Beautiful Bill Act or H.R. 1 – would cost the state's health care system \$13 billion annually and cause 1.5 million New Yorkers to lose insurance coverage.

"I've been very clear: no state can fully undo the damage in this bill or backfill cuts of this scale," Hochul said in a July press release.

The \$13 billion figure was based in part on double-counting: It was the sum of \$10 billion in lost federal aid and \$3 billion in increased costs to the state. That equates to a net reduction in health funding of \$7 billion, which – if cut immediately – would still have left hospitals and other providers with more money than they had in 2025.

Hochul's estimate of coverage losses was based on two provisions of the federal legislation: a "community engagement" rule requiring that non-disabled adults demonstrate 80 hours per month of work, education or volunteering to stay on Medicaid, and a ban on using most federal health funds for legally present immigrants.

The latter requirement was especially disruptive for the state's Essential Plan – and accounts for the bulk of the fiscal impact on New York.

Created under a little-used clause of the Affordable Care Act, the Essential Plan covers residents just above the income eligibility threshold for Medicaid, from 138 percent to 250 percent of the federal poverty level. Its \$14 billion in federal funding is based on the tax credits that its 1.7 million enrollees would have received if they had purchased commercial coverage through an insurance exchange – an amount that has been more than enough to cover the program's entire budget.

Until now, legally present immigrants have been a revenue generator for the program, accounting for 55 percent of its funding or about \$7.6 billion per year. With immigrants losing eligibility, the state faced the loss of that revenue and – under a 2001 court ruling known as *Aliessa v. Novello* – an obligation to provide Medicaid coverage for 500,000 of the immigrants at state expense. That tab of about \$3 billion per year represented the bulk of the federal legislation's projected impact for fiscal 2027.

In September, however, officials announced a plan to keep the *Aliessa* population in the Essential Plan and finance their coverage with surplus money that had accumulated in a trust fund. This maneuver involved rolling back a 2024 expansion, which would bump out some 460,000 enrollees above 200 percent of the poverty level. The state's application to the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) was submitted in October.

The Budget Division's fiscal update alludes to this plan, which is due to take effect in July 2026, but does not provide the financial details. Nor does it explain the financial implications of continuing the program under its current structure for citizens only.

Instead, it shows the Essential Plan's budget declining to one-quarter of its current level in fiscal 2027 and dropping to zero in 2028 and 2029. Those figures seem to imply that the plan will cease operations in July 2026, which is a possibility state officials have not previously raised.

This scenario seems unlikely. If the state's restructuring plan is rejected, in fact, the state is arguably obliged to continue operating under the federal waiver it received in 2024.

In a recent notice, the Health Department said that only enrollees with incomes above 200 percent poverty stood to lose coverage in July.

"Nothing will change for ... enrollees with income up to 200% FPL," the notice said. "New York is committed to preserving coverage for as many New Yorkers as possible and ... minimizing the financial losses to the health care delivery system by retaining most Essential Plan coverage."

Asked to clarify why its report showed the plan's funding ending next year, a Budget Division spokesman said: "The Financial Plan reflects H.R. 1 as currently executed and will be updated as we receive CMS's decision."

The state's overall fiscal outlook has improved somewhat since its first-quarter report in August, but spending is still expected to outstrip revenues over the next three years, the report says. It shows the state facing a \$4.2 billion gap in 2027, down from \$7.5 billion after the first quarter. The combined gaps over the next three years total \$26.8 billion, down from \$34.3 billion in August.
