# Yonkers City Council Unanimously Reappoints Vincent Spano Yonkers City Clerk

On Nov. 14, the Yonkers City Council voted unanimously to reappoint Vincent Spano as City Clerk for a five-year term. Every Councilmember took the opportunity to reflect on Mr. Spano's term in office and speak to the services that his office provides. Citing modernizations as well as expressing gratitude for his support to the Council, every member lauded City Clerk Spano on a multitude of improvements made since becoming City Clerk.

"I am humbled by the confidence that the Council has expressed by giving me the opportunity to serve the public for another five years," Mr. Spano said, "Mostly, I am proud of the bipartisan recognition for all of the hard work and improvements our team has achieved."

Our team forwarded this information to DOCCS and, to Mr. Rodriguez's surprise, DOCCS swooped in the next day and safely apprehended Mr. Rodriguez to bring him to his new home- Jail.

Our TipSubmit platform is operated by Motorola Solutions and is truly 100% anonymous. We can text you back to get more information, but there is no way for us to know the identity of the tipster unless they tell us.

Anonymous tips can be texted to "YPD" + Your Tip to 274637, or by scanning the QR code shown above. Keep in mind that these anonymous tips are intended to share information about criminal incidents or ongoing investigations where the tipster would like to remain anonymous; it is not a substitute for our Police/Fire call center. Please do not submit tips for in-progress events- the fastest way for you to get help during EMERGENCIES or ACTIVE CRIMES is to CALL 9-1-1.

been incredibly supportive and welcoming as they share in our vision for regional economic growth." said Halmi. Great Point Studios opened its \$500 million Lionsgate Studios in downtown Yonkers in 2022. And iPark recently purchased a 28-acre campus at 463 Hawthorne Avenue from nonprofit Rising Ground for \$52.6 million, with plans to build more fim studio space in the Ludlow section of SW Yonkers.

"There is a shortage of big, purpose-built stages, particularly in the Northeast," Halmi said. Lionsgate became the anchor tenant in first location downtown, occupying seven of its 11 soundstages. That location will feature eight, 20,000 square foot stages, one 30,000 square foot stage and two, 10,000 foot stages. Indeed, Yonkers has become Hollywood on the Hudson.


- -Helado, directed by Melissa Rodriguez, is about a young woman who reaches her breaking point after she's sent to fetch ice cream for the family late at night.

# Citizens Union Analysis of Nov. 2023 Elections Finds Significant Drop Off in Voter Turnout

Across New York State, voter turnout was significantly lower than last year's election, including in jurisdictions with important local races

In last week's elections, voter turnout decreased significantly across New York State, including in areas with important local races, according to an analysis from Citizens Union. The analysis compared voter turnout in key races for county and city offices in 2023 with voter turnout in overlapping areas in November 2022, finding that turnout in last year's elections was higher by 42 percent to 169 percent.

According to unofficial election night results, only 18 percent of eligible New York voters cast their ballots in the November 2023 general election. This highlights the need to shift local elections to even-numbered years and consolidate them with federal or statewide races, which see higher voter turnout.

This year, the legislature passed S3505B/A4282, legislation that would move certain New York county and town elections to even-numbered years. The bill is awaiting Governor Hochul's signature. A recent Siena College poll found that moving local elections to even-numbered years has support across the political spectrum, with a majority of Democrats and a plurality of Independents and Republicans favoring the policy. In January, Citizens Union released a report outlining the benefits of consolidating local races with elections for statewide or federal offices.

"Low voter turnout in last week's off-year election demonstrates the need to consolidate local elections with higher-profile races that see higher turnout," said Betsy Gotbaum, Executive Director of Citizens Union. "Moving local elections to even-numbered years will engage more voters and make the electorate more representative of the population. We urge Governor Hochul to sign legislation to move county and town elections to even-numbered years, a move that will strengthen local democracy across the state."

In Yonkers, only 24 percent of voters turned out to vote for Mayor this year compared to 43 percent for the race for Governor in 2022.

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano announced today the City of Yonkers' recognition on the Municipal Equality Index (MEI) report. The MEI examines how inclusive municipal laws, policies and services are for LGBTQ+ people.

The City of Yonkers received a perfect score of 100 joining 129 cities across the nation out of the 506 cities surveyed.

"The City of Yonkers has a longtime commitment to promoting equality and inclusion, regardless of who you love, "said Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano. "We are a City that celebrates and values all of us, and that continues to be our greatest strength. Our employees, residents and families deserve a safe space that provides opportunities to work, play and live their truth. Our score shows that progress is possible, it's valued and important to building our community."

# On This Day in Yonkers History...



Actor, author, editor, humorist and Yonkers resident Robert Benchley

Monday, November 20th:

1934: Careful investigation by Assistant Corporation Counsel J. Raymond Hannon unearthed a forgotten decision by the Court of Appeals, invalidating the bill introduced by New York City to annex Yonkers. Law Department research started after Bryn Mawr Park resident Clem Roeder criticized City Clerk William McCabe for "jumping the gun." After the Common Council voted against annexation, McCabe notified State Assembly leadership the City of Yonkers was against the plan. After Roeder claimed many Yonkers residents favored annexation, the City Clerk asked our Legal Department for a legal opinion.

As a result of the department's work, McCabe was able to remind Roeder New York voters approved a constitutional amendment in 1927 specifically prohibiting annexation without a referendum in the affected municipality. More important, the Court of Appeals ruled in NYC vs the Village of Lawrence, "no home rule bill of political subdivision in the state is effective," meaning the state legislature could not override wishes of the locality potentially being taken over by another municipality. The NYC attempt to grab Yonkers could not be authorized by the state!

Tuesday, November 21st:

1944: Yonkers school children mounted a "Schools at War" campaign to put schools in the thick of the war; they wanted to purchase war vehicles by selling War Bonds! Prices ranged from \$1,950 for ambulances to \$8,275 for amphibian "ducks" to \$15,000 for primary training planes. Any school selling enough bonds to cover the price of a vehicle had its name inscribed on it! Yonkers children worked to "finish the job," and bring home their beloved fathers, brothers, uncles or friends.

1945: Actor, author, editor and humorist Robert Benchley passed away. Benchley, who lived on Pennsylvania Avenue in the Crestwood section of Yonkers, authored more than 600 essays and screenplays. With Dorothy Parker and Alexander Woollcott, he was an original member of the famed Algonquin Round Table, actors and writers whose sharply honed wit and professional accomplishments gained national media attention.

Wednesday, November 22nd:

1943: Six merchants leaving lights on after closing and the Blair Shipyard, not completely dark during Yonkers' test blackout, had to appear before the Yonkers Civilian Protection authorities to explain why their lights were on.

1946: The Family Service Society of Yonkers announced they purchased Bank President Charles Ketcham's home on Palisade Avenue for its headquarters. The purchase was made after office rent at 45 South Broadway was increased by almost 700%! While the building was owned by the Westchester Lighting Company, the organization paid \$1000 annually. The company sold the building, and the new owners sharply increased their rent.

Thursday, November 23rd:

1915: Yonkers police launched a drive to keep New York City residents from coming to Yonkers to hunt; Judge Beall gave the first fine, \$260, to a Bronx man for shooting a chipmunk. The man claimed he thought it was a squirrel; State Conservation Laws prohibited shooting chipmunks.

1922: In his response to an appeal for funds, Yonkers elevator executive Alonzo See wrote that he would like to see all women's colleges burned to the ground and thought college women should be forced to perform manual labor for a year.

Friday, November 24th:

1925: Gene's Restaurant, 33 South Broadway, was the scene of a testimonial dinner Yonkers Socialists gave for Eugene Debs, the national leader of their party. Dr. Paul Bauerberg and Dr. John Morgan were the keynote speakers.

1950: The largest single group of women to be accepted in the Women Marines in the New York area enlisted for three years at the Marine Corps Recruiting Station in the Post Office Building at the foot of Main Street. After getting last minute instructions from St. Sgt. James Harrington USMC, our Women Marines left for Parris Island for six weeks' boot training.

Saturday, November 25th:

1942: Harry Sampson, appointed to manage the Yonkers office of the United States Employment Service (USES), called for 400 women to work in Westchester war industries. He found far too few people registered to fill open slots in our wire, food and clothing factories to fill war contracts.

# Former Westchester Deputy County Exec & Yonkers City Manager Arrested for Hit & Run

The news that former Westchester County Deputy County Executive Neil DeLuca was arrested and charged with leaving the scene of an accident after striking a 66-year old woman was disturbing.

The incident happened in the Town of Mount Pleasant on October 21. DeLuca is accused of hiting the woman at 7:45 pm on Bradhurst Avenue. Another motorist witnessed the accident and called the police.

An investigation by Mount Pleasant police found a piece of the car that struck the woman. Further investigation identified the vehicle involved and DeLuca was found to be an owner of the vehicle. Police interviewed DeLuca and he was placed under arrest.

DeLuca was arraigned in Mount Pleasant Town Court on October 22 and charged with a felony charge of leaving the scene of a serious injury motor vehicle accident and with unlicensed operation.

The woman was taken to Westchester Medical Center with serious injuries.

"As chief of the department, I could not be more proud of all involved personnel to bring this investigation to a successful conclusion culminating in the arrest of this offender," said Mount Pleasant Police Chief Paul Oliva. "Our thoughts and prayers are with the victim."

Prior to serving as Deputy County Executive under County Executive Andrew O'Rourke from 1991-1996, DeLuca, 74, served as Yonkers City Manager from 1988 to 199. He is President of the DeLuca Group, a real estate development consulting firm.

Mt. Pleasant Judge Mark Rubeo also issued an order of protection preventing DeLuca with having any contact with the victim or witness.

This incident is disturbing because DeLuca is a retired public servant with a generous pension. Due to the injuries sustained by the victim, it is clear that DeLuca knew that an accident had happened but decided to flee.

Police didn't get to interview DeLuca for 24 hours, preventing DeLuca from being examined for intoxication. He was also charged with driving without a license.

Most retired election officials obey the laws of their community. DeLuca had no regard for the woman he seriously injured. Shame on you-Neil DeLuca.

# Clay Tiffany - Gadfly, Truthteller, Pest, Movie Star

# Dirty Cop Nick Tartagione & Jeffrey Esptein Part of Story

Many of our readers may not know or remember the name Clay Tiffany, the bombastic host of a cable TV access show, Dirge for the Charlatans, which aired out of an Ossining cable access studio in the late 1990's. Tiffany, a Briarcliff resident, would rant about corruption and scandal, and would target whoever he believed was on the wrong side of good government.

Tiffany's accusations of corruption and wrongdoing in local government and the Briarcliff school district resulted in some notoriety. The show was entertaining and informative but was not always correct in its accusations. Tiffany named the people in local government who he accused of wrongdoing, and one was Briarcliff Manor police officer Nick Tartaglione. Tartaglione was a young, hulking presence who Tiffany was accusing of being a "rogue cop."

Tiffany continued the weekly accusations against Tartaglione, until Tartaglione flew into a steroid like rage, assaulting Tiffany while he was swimming alone on the Hudson River in 1999. Tiffany sued Tartaglione and the Briarcliff Police Department and kept talking about it on his show.

This resulted in a second, more ruthless beating, that left Tiffany in the hospital and scarred him for the rest of his life. The FBI began investigating and Tiffany won a lawsuit against the Village and Tartaglione for \$200,000, but his life was never the same. He died in 2015 a broken man but did have a moment of notoriety in Westchester because of his public access shows, lawsuits and confrontations with Tartaglione.

Tartaglione was fired, and then rehired by the Briarcliff Police Department.

He later "retired" and moved upstate where he became a drug dealer, eventually killing four of his drug partners. He was convicted of murder and is now serving a life sentence.

While in prison awaiting trial in the Manhattan Correctional Center, Tartaglione was a prison mate of Jeffrey Epstein. In fact, Tartaglione was cell mates with Epstein in the days and weeks before Epstein "hung himself" in his prison cell.

The story of Tiffany, Tartaglione and Epstein has drawn the interest of Emmy award-winning producer Gary Cohen, who has created nine documentary films for ESPN's "This is about free speech and how free speech isn't always pretty. But it's

effective in keeping the public informed and the public servants accountable. Clay Tiffany was an ugly, necessary part of the system," said Cohen. "Clay did something that made the system work better, and there is a concern that we are losing that ability by the local press to hold people accountable for bad behavior. Tiffany was a voice, a true citizen journalist. While he wasn't right all of the time, once in

a while he hit a nerve that needs to be hit. More of these voices are disappearing. "Its this erosion that creates the need for Clay Tiffany, and the object lesson is Tartaglione. Clay was screaming that Tartaglione was a rogue cop before he was a drug

dealer. He was an inconvenient truth to the system," said Cohen. Phil Reisman, the Dean of Westchester journalists at the turn of the millennium, wrote that Tiffany "ultimately aspired to nobility, even when he crossed the line of

civility," and called him "a controversial, iconoclastic gadfly in a quest for truth." Tiffany also heckled DA Jeanine Pirro on several occasions, blurting out "how's your husband," referring to Al Pirro and his tax troubles. And then again at her book signing, "what's the matter, Jeanine, did you have a bad face lift?"

Actor John C. Reilly created a character for an American comedy TV series called Check It Out with Dr. Steve Brule, who has an uncanny similarity to Tiffany and his public access show. (Link- https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=z5bMr\_0Zoc0&list=RDQ Mpy76GcrwR-g&start radio=1)

944: Yonkers was notified 36-year-old Captain Gustave Laffel was killed, the first and only Yonkers teacher to die in World War II. Laffel, a Saunders Physical Education teacher, was with the Corps of Engineers when killed in the Metz-Saarburg region. Just a few days earlier two friends received war souvenirs from him. Merchant David Knepfer received a Nazi battle flag; fellow Saunders teacher Harry DeVoe received a watch, wrapped in paper printed with the name Saarburg Port, Salut-Kase.

Sunday, November 26th:

1911: Alexander Smith Cochran offered to purchase a complete set of colonial furniture for Philipse Manor Hall.

1932: According to Margaret George, PR director for the War Industries Training Program, executives at Eastern Aircraft in Tarrytown called the Yonkers School of Aeronautical Manufacturing the "West Point of the air." Hundreds of the school's certified students, from all strata of society and a variety of ethnic and religious backgrounds, worked together at Eastern with one goal in mind, to end the war.

1943: Although Yonkers Mayor William Wallin was Counsel both to Habirshaw Cable and Wire and its parent firm Phelps Dodge, the company "abandoned its parking lot project." Running the plant round the clock caused serious parking issues in the neighborhood's narrow streets; the planned parking lot was to ease the situation. Although the Common Council unanimously supported the parking lot project, it voted to reconsider authorization of the needed zoning changes the night before, triggering the company's decision not to buy land to build a parking lot.

# Did You Know that Frosty the Snowman's is From Westchester? Armonk Parade Set for Nov. 26

Every year in the Westchester Town of North Castle, a holiday tradition is held celebrating the birthplace of Frosty the Snowman. In the Westchester village of Armonk, a parade is held to commemorate the fact that the famous story, and movie that most of us have watched again and again on television, hails from Westchester.

The lyricist of the winter holiday classic, Steve Nelson, was a frequent visitor to Armonk after World War II from his home in nearby White Plains. In 1950, he wrote the song's lyrics, which he put to Jack Rollins' music; it was the same year that he was looking for land in Armonk on which to build his new home. Gene Autry recorded the song that year, making it an instant classic, following his earlier hit of "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer."

Two years later, Nelson moved his young family to Armonk, where he lived until his death in 1981. In 1957, "Frosty the Snowman" was recorded again by Perry Como, solidifying it as a perennial song of the season. This success was followed by an animated version in 1969, now seen annually on TV. Located in the Town of North Castle, Armonk's historic district is the "Village Square" mentioned in the song's lyrics where Frosty dared the children to "catch me if you can."

Lifelong Armonk resident and town Councilwoman Barbara DiGiacinto said: "It was pretty much common knowledge that Mr. Nelson had Armonk in mind when he wrote the song. The traffic cop in the song who hollered 'Stop!' to Frosty was said to be based on the town's former Chief of Police John Hergenhan, who just happened to be my uncle."

Ed Woodyard, a longtime organizer of the townwide holiday event commemorating Frosty noted, "Frosty reminds people of the magic to be found during this time of year, for young and old alike. The only thing the Frosty believes in is kids." Events and activities will be held for three hours around town before the parade, which will travel north on Main Street to Maple Avenue, and then to Wampus Brook Park. Everyone is part of the parade, joining at the end to help welcome Frosty home for the holidays For information visit www. ArmonkFrosty.com.




