


Governor Kathy Hochul helped reopen Philipse Manor Hall after a \$20 M renovation below: one of the new exhibits at the oldest building in Yonkers

These new exhibits advance the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation's Our Whole History initiative, which is an effort to ensure that the state's historic sites embrace stories that

It's that time of year when all of us should try to make an effort to help others for the holidays. One easy way to do that is to help Jordan Mendez, a freshman at Yonkers-Middle High School, who has started a food and clothing drive to help families having a tough time with inflation and the rising costs of everything.

Jordan is a graduate of the Charter School for Educational Excellence, CSEE, and a Boy Scout from Troop 4. Recently his troop volunteered at the Tour de Yonkers bike event. "At the Tour de Yonkers we had a lot of excess food, and I didn't want it to go to waste, so we came to St. John's Church, Getty Square, and offered it to people who were just walking by. One person said she knew people who were having troubles affording food and that made me think about a way to help."

"I know most people want to help but don't know how. So I came up with the idea of doing something and giving everyone the chance to help."

The name of Jordan's endeavor is Yonkers Moxie Project. "Moxie is a word that stood out to me. It's about determination, and we need that to help lift up our community."

Together with his mother, Khaleelah Bond, the two have "put our brains together and find out how we can serve our community. It has been a rough three years for a lot of people, and many are food insecure."

Jordan says that students and staff at Yonkers Middle-High School have joined in the effort. "I put out donation boxes at my school and got a great response."

In addition to food, Jordan wanted to collect clothing because "I found a lot of students at my school who felt insecure about their clothes. I was able to collect more than 200 pounds of clothes."

And Khaleelah, who works at a dental office, was able to get a large donation of dental supplies that will also be handed out.

A few supermarkets in Yonkers have also agreed to help-Whole Foods, and Shoprite, with the hope that others will come aboard. Turkeys are the best donation, but all food items will be accepted.

The plan is to have a giveaway on Wed. Nov. 23, the day before Thanksgiving, at The Yonkers Salvation Army, 110 New Main Street, between 1pm-6pm. Meals may also be served, depending on the response and the number of donations.

Yonkers Bond Rating Boosted by S&P to A+

Agency Reassigns Yonkers with Bond Rating of Stable Outlook Reflecting City's Improved Financial Management

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano today announced that leading financial bond agency S&P Global Ratings upgraded the City of Yonkers to an 'A+', stable outlook, revised from an 'A', stable outlook in 2021. S&P Global Ratings reassigned an 'A+' rating to City of Yonkers' general obligation bonds and the City's school debt.

"Given the fiscal challenges that Yonkers has faced, I am pleased with the latest bond ratings as they continue to be the highest Yonkers has received in forty years," said Mayor Spano. "These ratings reflect my administration's hard work and commitment over the last decade to strengthen the city's finances. Working together with our Governor, state delegation and City Council, we continue to illustrate a financial plan that S&P has deemed secure and responsible."

According to S&P, the leading factor for the city's rating is its improved management conditions, as evidenced by several years of balanced-to-positive budgetary performance that bolstered reserves to the highest nominal amount in recent history, positioning the city to absorb the phase-out of federal stimulus funds, as well as slower economic growth in the first half of calendar 2023.

Yonkers Finance Commissioner John Liszewski said, "The 'A+' rating with a stable outlook from S&P once again illustrates that under Mayor Spano's leadership, we are not only moving Yonkers in the right direction and implementing sound financial policies, but creating conditions that will grow our economy and school district."

"The City has made a lot of progress and our financial outlook continues to improve every day," said Mayor Spano. "The financial burdens that threaten New York's Big Five Cities are real, especially those placed by our dependent school districts and increasingly dependent populations. I look forward to continually working with our city and state representatives to achieve a stronger and more financially secure Yonkers."

Ridge Hill on Ice, Skating Rink Opens Nov. 19



Walk into a winter wonderland at Ridge Hill, where holiday preparation is in full swing as the Yonkers mixed-use destination readies to celebrate a magical season of family-friendly events, including the debut of a festive new experience: Ridge Hill on Ice.

Construction of the 2,000 square-foot ice rink is well underway as the Town Square Lawn (central green space located next to The Cheesecake Factory) transforms into an outdoor skate zone, with a grand launch set for the same day as The Lighting of Ridge Hill on Sunday, November 20. After a dazzling professional ice-skating performance at 4 p.m., the rink officially opens to the public. DEA Drug Bust in Yonkers: 19 Kilos of Fentanyl Seized- 20 Million Doses



Damian Williams, the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, and Frank A. Tarentino III, the Special Agent-in-Charge of the New York Field Office of the Drug Enforcement Administration (“DEA”), announced that JUSTO VARGAS was charged for possessing nearly 20 kilograms of fentanyl with the intent to distribute it, in concert with others. VARGAS was arrested on Sunday and presented yesterday before Magistrate Judge Paul E. Davison.

U.S. Attorney Damian Williams said: “As alleged, the defendant conspired to distribute fentanyl, one of the deadliest drugs on Earth. Thanks to our law enforcement partners, nearly 20 kilograms of this poison have been taken off the street.”

As alleged in the Complaint: On or about November 13, 2022, VARGAS met with a confidential source to sell that confidential source approximately 19 kilograms of fentanyl. VARGAS arrived at the Cross County Center parking lot in Yonkers, New York, and parked adjacent to the confidential source’s vehicle. The parties exited their respective vehicles and stood next to the open trunk of VARGAS’s vehicle, which contained what appeared to the confidential source to be 19 kilograms of fentanyl. Agents and officers then intervened and arrested VARGAS and seized the fentanyl.

VARGAS, 31, of New York, New York, is charged with one count of possession with intent to distribute 400 grams and more of fentanyl and one count of conspiring to do the same. Those offenses carry mandatory minimum sentences of 10 years in prison and maximum potential sentences of life in prison.

The mandatory minimum and maximum potential sentences in this case are prescribed by Congress and are provided here for informational purposes only, as any sentencing of the defendant will be determined by the judge.

Mr. Williams praised the outstanding work of the DEA’s New York Drug Enforcement Task Force comprising agents and officers of the DEA, New York City Police Department, and New York State Police. Mr. Williams also thanked the Office of the Special Narcotics Prosecutor at the Manhattan District Attorney’s Office and the Yonkers Police Department for their assistance in this case.

The case is being prosecuted by the Office’s White Plains Division. Assistant U.S. Attorney Ben Arad is in charge of the prosecution. According to Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) estimates, one kilogram of fentanyl can produce 1 million to 1.5 million pill dosage units, so Vargas was estimated to be selling at least 19 million doses of this deadly drug.

Happy 60th Birthday Will Library

This is a special week in Yonkers. The Grinton I. Will library, the beautiful building off Central Park Avenue which everyone from out of town can never find celebrates 60 years of service to the Yonkers community. I am proud to say that for 56 years I have been a patron at the Will library only to be beat by my older sister who has been a patron since it’s opening.

Originally called the Sprain Brook Library, it’s name was changed to the Grinton I. Will Library in honor of Library Director Grinton Will , a well respected individual. In Yonkers. I don’t know what the I stands for. Maybe a reader of this column can clue me in. For the work that she did for so many years to get a new library built I figured by now the Riverfront Library would be named after Jacqueline Miller, Library Director for so many years after Mr. Will.

When the library was built the roadway became 2 levels between Arlington street and Sadore lane. This brought a lot of traffic to an already busy road for people like my mother always trying to get some place fast!

Oh, how I remember the third floor with record players you could put your headphones on and sit and listen to the latest recordings without bothering anyone. The Fine Arts Department went from reel to reel to record to VCR recordings to cassette tapes to our latest the Compact Disc. The cassette tapes were locked in cabinets so you had to get a librarian to open it.

Sheet music was available for loan. A book of reel to reel movies that you could take out which was great if you had a reel to reel projector. There was always one in the auditorium you could use and the projector room which today is used for a meeting room more than a projector room.

When some trustees and Friends went to the library to request VCR tapes be added to the collection, the response was if we add VCR Tapes today, lawn mowers were next. Mind you at one time the library loaned out works of art to adults and children. Look around the building today and as they say the rest is history.

Before reconstruction began probably 20 years ago the second floor consisted of staff offices and the Children’s room. Always on the left wall as you entered was the scoreboard for the various reading programs listing how many books the children in the program had read. My sister always topped the list reading many more than she had to. Me, well let’s just say I read the required number.

On the first floor we have the auditorium. Our 325 seat auditorium is one of the biggest in WESTCHESTER County Library System. The only bigger auditorium is the Riverfront with over 400 seats. Once a month children’s programs including

Paper bag players, a famous children’s theater troupe would perform to 325 eager children. Mrs Schoenfeld, head of children’s programming always greeted participants coming into the auditorium which most of the times had its 325 seats filled with happy kids. Mom piled everyone who could fit in the car in little blue rambler for the shows. After the show, mom, the teacher that she was was brought her careful of kids to the Children’s Room to pick out to a minimum of 3 books- hopefully more... thus my sisters love for reading.

Many people don’t know about the Patio at the end of the Reading Room. A delightful place for a reception or simply to relax with a book. I always thought how perfect the library and all its spaces would be for a New Years Night Out so many communities have. Imagine disco dancing under the stars on the patio!

The author Philip Roth died this past spring. My sister tried to read as many books of his as possible that she has not read. Let’s face it, a copy of Portnoy’s Complaint should be in our Yonkers libraries. You would think they would have a classic like that. No, the library had to get it from Mt. Vernon.

To honor the 60th Birthday of the library, We would like to get 60 books, classics and important books donated by those here today and the general public. The library will select the books missing from the collection and you simply donate the cost of the book which will have a sticker on it with your name

The Will Library should have all the classic and well known books. You can do your part by giving staff time to prepare a list of classics and important books. And then paying for 1, 2, however many you can afford.

A shout out to the librarians, leadership and behind the scenes including bookmobile drivers and out in public staff for 60 years of serving the general public with a smile! And to Friends of the Library of which I am President and the Yonkers Public Library Foundation for being an important part of what makes Yonkers Libraries the great institutions serving the public that they are.

Grinton Will Library. For 60 years this, too has been an important part of Yonkers!

If You Have A Loaded Gun in Your Car, Don't Do 100 MPH on the Parkway



On October 30, 2022, the New York State Police from the Hawthorne barracks arrested four individuals for illegal possession of two handguns on Tuckahoe Road in the city of Yonkers.

At approximately 6:25 p.m., Troopers observed a BMW 440 traveling in excess of 100 miles per hour on the Sprain Brook Parkway. The suspect vehicle was followed to Tuckahoe Road where a traffic stop was initiated. Investigation found two loaded handguns in the vehicle, a .380 Ruger LCP, and a 9MM Smith & Wesson SD9 VE.

Jalen S. Irwin, age 19, of Valley Stream, NY, was arrested for Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the 2nd degree, a class C felony, and Criminal Possession of a Weapon (large capacity ammunition feeding device) in the 3rd degree, a class D felony. Deandre A. Bowen, age 21, Kevin E. Hill, age 21, and Daijaun I. Jarvis, age 20, all of Queens, NY, were arrested for Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the 2nd degree, a class C felony.

All four subjects were arraigned before the Honorable Judge Best of the city of Yonkers Court and remanded to the Westchester County Jail in lieu of \$15,000 cash bail, \$30,000 bond, or \$45,000 partially secure bond. They are scheduled to reappear before the court on November 7, 2022, at 9:30 a.m.

reflect the diversity of our state and nation's history.

"Philipse Manor Hall provides a unique window into early Colonial-era life in New York and lends itself to telling the first chapters of the nation's path to independence," Governor Hochul said. "The people who lived, worked and traded at the Philipse family home in the 18th century had a tremendous impact on shaping the lower-Hudson Valley. This renovation of Philipse Manor Hall reflects New York State's strong commitment to preserving our shared heritage - illuminating the full spectrum of our state's diverse culture and history."

Philipse Manor Hall is a National Historic Landmark and a Yonkers City Landmark; a status that fully informed State Parks' approach to the rehabilitation of the site. In addition to the architectural restoration of the Hall, the grounds and building have been updated to improve accessibility, which includes a newly constructed, discreet rear addition that houses new bathrooms and an elevator. The new exhibits have been designed to meet the needs of multilingual speakers, the hearing and visually impaired, visitors with wheelchairs and walkers, and is sensitive to visitors of all ages, abilities, and cultural experiences. Prior to its reopening, Philipse Manor Hall received approximately 15,000 visitors a year, and renovations are expected to double the amount of visitors to approximately 30,000 a year.

The exhibits are additionally offered virtually for those who are not able to visit the site in person, which expands the reach of the site's dynamic history to an international audience. A website devoted to additional historic and interpretative content called the "Virtual Wing" will include a 360° virtual tour.

The new exhibits incorporate the journeys of the Philipse family, the indigenous people from whom the Philipse lands derive, and enslaved Africans, whose work and trade allowed the Philipse family to prosper during the pre-Revolutionary era. While past exhibits and lectures have documented the role that Africans and indigenous people contributed to New York State history, these expanded permanent exhibits more fully depict and share this complex history with visitors.

Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins said, "Today is an exciting moment for Philipse Manor Hall as it reopens with a new focus. The newly permanent and accessible exhibits will help visitors more fully understand all that Africans and Indigenous people contributed to the history of New York State and the City of Yonkers. I encourage everyone to visit, and congratulate Philipse Manor Hall and the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation on the reopening."

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano said, "We do not show history through subtraction, we show history through telling the whole story. With the addition of key Yonkers figures and milestones, Philipse Manor Hall will now be a place that takes our residents and visitors on a bona fide journey. I want to thank our partners at the state level for this investment which will document and preserve our city's growth and development for generations to come."

Latimer Cuts County Property Taxes Four Budgets in a Row No One-Shots, \$65 M Surplus

Westchester County Executive George Latimer has proposed a \$6 million dollar cut to the County property tax levy in a preview of his 2023 proposed Operating Budget. This is the fourth County property tax cut in a row presented by Latimer as County Executive.

Latimer said: "I have been all around this County; I have heard the stories from families who are feeling the strain of inflation- this budget is for them. We have once again cut taxes, and expanded the programs that the people of this County need. I am proud of this Budget, this is what honest and fair governing is, that is who we are as an administration."

- Closing 2022 with projected \$65.9 million operating surplus
- No borrowing for tax certs
- No borrowing for pension
- No use of fund balance
- 2023 Budget contains no borrowing or one-shots
- No use of fund balance
- No borrowing for cash flow

Latimer said: "The 2023 Budget reflects a continued commitment to programs that meet the needs of Westchester County residents. We have cut taxes but we have also added \$1 million to food security programs that serve 100 pantries, we have increased funding for homeless shelter contracts, and we have put in \$500k for New Rochelle Family Court support services."

Budget Director Larry Soule said: "This budget reflects the steadfast commitment of the County Executive to serve the needs of all residents of Westchester County, while at the same time remaining accountable to the needs of the taxpayers."

RATING AGENCIES

The 2023 Budget increases the "rainy day fund" to about 19% of County operating expenditures- a bold way to stabilize the bond ratings for the County.

Latimer said: "For the past four consecutive fiscal years, our administration has been able to propose an Operating Budget that included a cut to the County property tax levy. Westchester County also boasts a AA+, AA+ and Aa1 rating by Standard and Poor's, Fitch and Moody's, respectively - among the highest ratings awarded by these three major agencies. These accomplishments are due in no small part to the professional work of the Westchester County Department of Finance."

Finance Commissioner Karin Hablow said: "I applaud the County Executive for submitting a balanced budget that also includes another consecutive year of a decrease to the tax levy. The County has steadily improved its financial position while continuing to offer the services needed and sought out by its residents. The fiscally responsible budgets that the County Executive has proposed year after year will position Westchester County as a financially stable entity for years to come."

PUBLIC SAFETY / CORRECTIONS / PROBATION

In a record setting year, the Department of Public Safety, Department of Corrections and Department of Probation are funded at the highest level they have ever been funded in Westchester County history - a total of \$260.9 million.

- Correction \$156.6 million
- Public Safety \$59.1 million
- Probation \$45.2 million

This allocation in the Budget includes:

- IT Coordinator and Crime Data Analyst for Public Safety

Health Commissioner Dr. Sherlita Amler said: "The Health Department has devoted a considerable amount of its resources over the past two years to its COVID response. This budget will allow the Department to refocus its attention on core public health priorities and inequities."

talkbacks and Q&A's that accompany each screening.

"Over the past two years that we've offered online viewing, we've developed a following of fans who enjoy the films online," said Dave Steck, YoFi's Executive Director and co-founder, "By making the decision to present this year's festival as a fully hybrid experience, every film will get a theatrical screening and simultaneously be available online for remote viewing, so everyone can choose whichever way works best for them."

This year, the festival kicks off on the evening of Friday, December 2nd, with its traditional "Taste of Yonkers" Red Carpet Reception that features offerings from local restaurants, including Dolphin Restaurant, La Bella Havana, Yonkers Brewing Company and Nahmias Et Fils Distillery. It's followed by a specially curated opening night short film program and finishes with an after-party at Zuppa Restaurant and Lounge.

The film festival really kicks off Saturday and Sunday, December 3rd and 4th, with all-day programming, including screenings, workshops and networking events. On This Day in Yonkers History...



Otis Elevator Company's First Yonkers factory, 1868

Monday, November 21st:
November 21, 1946: Otis Elevator announced a quarterly dividend of fifty cents a share, an increase of 15 cents from the previous quarter. The dividend paid on December 27; Preferred stock holders got a dividend of \$1.50.

November 21, 1949: Supreme Court Justice Frank Coyne awarded custody of little Joseph LoCascio to his mother, Mrs. Annette LoCascio. Coyne stated the father had made no allegations the mother was unfit, and he believed a child this young needed his mother. The father received reasonable visitation rights.

Tuesday November 22nd:
November 22, 1919: YPD Sergeant Jerome Linehan, with the help of Woodworth Avenue's Isaiah Cunningham, subdued a man suspected of robbing a local hotel proprietor of \$300; the hard-fought battle happened at South Broadway and Prospect Street.

November 22, 1924: According to the plans filed with the Building Department, the estimate to build Benjamin Franklin Junior High School was \$620,000. The school was built at Poplar, Linden and Maple Streets.

November 22, 1929: The Yonkers Art Commission approved sculptor Isidore Konti's design for the Spanish-American War Veterans Memorial; it would be erected in City Plaza, later known as Larkin Plaza.

Wednesday November 23rd:
November 23, 1923: The funeral for the late Mayor Walter Taussig was held at his home at 191 Park Avenue. Reverend J. I Blair Larned, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, officiated in a room filled with an overwhelming number of flowers sent by fraternal and civic organizations.

November 23, 1931: Because wailing of the Yonkers Ferry fog siren, Alderman Walter Jones received dozens of complaints from his constituents. Being proactive, Jones met with Leo Schwarzstein, Manager of the Westchester Ferry Corporation, and got a cool reception to his complaint. Schwartzstein explained sirens were necessary to guide ferries into the pier at the foot of Alexander Street during heavy fog. The noise was heard starting at 6 am two days in a row. Yonkers Police received more than 200 complaints about the sirens from Western Yonkers residents, from Ludlow to northwestern Yonkers. Getting no satisfaction from Schwartzstein, he went to Health Commissioner Clarence Buckmaster, who immediately sent an inspector to investigate.

Thursday, November 24th:
November 24, 1942: The Herald Statesman reviewed the "V for Victory" warning for speeders! Because speeding wasted gas needed for the war effort, Yonkers drivers' began tapping out the signal, "beep—beep—beep—beeeep" (three short, one long beeps, Morse Code for V) whenever they saw another driver exceeding the limit. In most cases, the driver immediately slowed down, not only because speeding is "dangerous, it is TREASON," in the words of the paper.

November 24, 1956: Fourteen American Legion Posts held a testimonial dinner honoring the Yonkers Keys baseball team, Junior American Legion Baseball Westchester, State, and Eastern Division champions at the Bajart Post on McLean Avenue. Keynote speaker was NY Giants pitcher and Yonkers native Steve Ridzik; he presented the New York Giants trophy to the team. State Commander Lester Rosenbaum presented the NYS Legion trophy. John Armand, President of team sponsor Key Liquors, presented gifts to all team members.

Friday, November 25th:
November 25, 1905: The Board of Commissioners dismissed charges of neglect of duty against a Yonkers patrolman who fell asleep on duty after hearing his explanation. He said he opened a call box, put his head on his palm and elbow and the ledge... and promptly fell asleep. Apparently, he had been taking care of a sick friend for several days and had not slept in 48 hours.

November 25, 1913: In a daring battle of the sexes, eleven women, captained by Mrs. Owen Oliver, competed against eleven men lead by William J. Blackburn. The contest? Spelling! Held in the parish house of St. Andrew's Memorial Church, the spelling match lasted for more than an hour, with the women emerging victorious.

Winning team members were Oliver, Mrs. George Lowerre, Emily Lithgow, Lillian Stevens., Marian Boughton, Mrs. Isaac McGay, Mrs. Arthur J. B. Tait, Mrs. William Marter, Mrs. Wegman, Mrs. Arnett Lawrence and. Sarah Harrison. Men's team members were Blackburn, Charles Apgar, William Marsden, Victor Cromwell, James McIntyre, Percy Simpson, William Witte, Benjamin Cromwell, Wilson Burrows, W. B. Bottone and A. R. Lawrence. William Kellogg, C. Arthur Dunlavy and Arthur Land served as the judges.

Saturday, November 26th:
November 26, 1911: Alexander Smith Cochran offered to purchase a complete set of colonial furniture for the Manor Hall. **-continued on pg 6-**

November 26, 1935: Less than a week after a Chamber of Commerce committee demanded better and stricter enforcement of parking regulations in Yonkers, three of the five committee members asked City Judge Boote for leniency for their friends.

Sunday November 27th:

November 27, 1945: Proving that the US Army values friendship, or at least that was what the Yonkers recruiters in the Yonkers Recruiting Station reported. Long time friends and schoolmates Frank Fornabaio and Nicholas Costello of Oak Street went to the office in the Post Office together to sign up and then reported to Army headquarters in New York to take their physicals together. Both men wanted to learn to drive large Army trucks and vehicles.

November 27, 1946: Former Mayor John Fogarty blasted the closing of the Yonkers Health Center Laboratory. Pointing out for many years, during the tenure of the late Health Commissioner Dr. Buckmaster, Yonkers had "an enviable health record under his long and intelligent administration, it being usually among the first ten healthiest cities in the country." The Health Center and its "splendid equipment" were created to care for underprivileged children, using the guidance from local Academy of Medicine members. The lab had been taken over by Westchester County; local physicians were unhappy with the County's services.

PARKS & RECREATION

Total amount in the Budget for Parks and Recreation is \$60.3 million. A combined \$28 million has been slotted for structural improvements at the Ice Casino and Playland Amusement Park. Additionally, \$7 million has been allocated for Hilltop Hanover Farm and Environmental Center, and \$3.3 million for Cranberry Lake Preserve improvements.

Latimer said: "As the construction of the County's historic investment in Playland continues, we look toward other park facilities that have suffered from underinvestment in the past."

HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

The total amount allotted for the Human Rights Commission in the Budget is \$1.3 million. This includes an additional investigator.

YOUTH BUREAU

Total Youth Bureau funding is \$4.7 million dollars. Among the new initiatives is an expansion of the Invest-In-Kids program to \$250K.


