Let the People Decide: Should Mayor Spano Run for a 4th Term? Charter Revision Commission Would Place Term Limits Change on Referendum

Mayor Mike Spano recently appeared on Yonkers Voice for an interview with Ru Ros. During that interview, Ros asked the Mayor if there was support for him to run for a fourth term, would he do it? "You have moved Yonkers forward, but there's always room for more improvement. We want you to finish the job-what if there was popular demand for you to continue"

Mayor Spano asked, "how would we know if they want that?" adding "four years ago, I had no intentions of running for a third term, but I bought into it and it turned out to be the right thing for me personally and the city." There are two ways that Mayor Spano would be permitted to run for a fourth

term next year (2023). The City Council would have to vote to overturn term-limits, as they did four years ago, or a change- repeal to the term limits law would have to be approved by the voters in the form of a referendum.

And with the Mayor asking for the people to decide on whether he should run for a fourth term, a referendum would give the people a voice, in saying yes Mayor Spano, run for a fourth term, or no, 12 years are enough.

Six months ago, we spoke with a prominent democrat in Yonkers, who was not necessarily a Spano supporter, but admitted that the City has made great strides under Mike Spano's leadership. And she wanted to know how it would continue, and didn't see any viable alternatives to keep the progress going.

That same sentiment remains among many people in Yonkers, who like Spano, are searching for someone to replace him. Two members of the Yonkers City Council, Corazon Pineda-Isaac, and John Rubbo, have been testing the waters about a run for Mayor. And Yonkers Democratic Party Chair Tom Meier and Assemblyman Nader Sayegh are the other two names that are in the mix.

But the usual assumption has been that one, or all four, would run for Mayor if Spano doesn't run. While that decision may change, all four have not thrilled the stakeholders, unions, and party leaders to the point where Mayor Spano feels comfortable handing the keys over and departing.



On This Day in Yonkers History...



General Joseph W. Stilwell, "Vinegar Joe" from Yonkers

Monday, September 5th

September 5, 1945: Attendance of more than 17,000 students in Yonkers Public Schools was the largest in years; it was so large, Schools Superintendent William Williams appointed 15 emergency teachers, with the possibility of appointing more as our population increased. While other schools were bursting, School 26's attendance dropped; with an enrollment of 40, only three teachers were assigned there. The school had been open for ten years, but the attendance never built up. The Board announced it decide whether to close the school at the next School Trustees meeting.

September 5, 1945: Yonkers own General Joseph W. Stilwell, aka "Vinegar Joe," represented the Allies in Okinawa when nine Japanese officers, representing 105,000 Japanese Army and Navy forces who had served in the Ryukyu Islands, signed unconditional surrender papers. After the signing, the general told the officers, "I hold each one of you personally responsible for carrying out my instructions. That is all. You may now go back to your quarters."

Tuesday, September 6th

September 6, 1947: Mrs. Alexander Rosenberg, wife of the Rabbi of Congregation Ohab Zedek, and daughter Naomi returned to Yonkers from Germany. The family lived in Germany for two years while Rabbi Rosenberg served with the Joint Distribution Committee, and as the liaison officer between the American Military Government headquarters and Jewish religious authorities. The Rabbi had expected to return with his family, but was detained in Germany a few more days, finishing up his work there.

September 6, 1956: The Yonkers Keys, our NY State and Eastern Junior American Legion championship team, was met at South Broadway and Valentine Lane with a welcome home parade! Although raining, the parade drove through Getty Square, Palisade to Yonkers Avenue, then headed east to the Pasqua Post for ceremonies. All speakers from Mayor Kristensen on voiced their pride in our boys; the evening ended with the Keys team cheer.

Wednesday, September 7th:

September 7, 1911: Speaking from Paris, Samuel Untermyer gave a whole hearted endorsement of Governor Woodrow Wilson's views on "big money trusts." Untermyer said the two most difficult problems the country faced were "curbing the concentration of the money power," and "regulating and controlling the industrial competition engaged in inter-state commerce." He added, Wilson "did not mistake or overstate the facts or the immediate overshadowing peril from the growing concentration of the money power in America."

September 7, 1945: Although their son Staff Sergeant David Eckes of Alder Street was reported missing in action March 18, 1944, Florence and Fred Eckes finally received official word David was presumed dead. He was lost while on a bombing mission to Landsberg, Germany. While heading back from the target, his Flying Fortress was attacked by enemy fighters, destroying the plane. Eckes, a former employee of Rex Roofing Company in Yonkers, had received the Air Medal and an Oakleaf Cluster February 1944.

Thursday, September 8th

September 8, 1919: After an examination of ballots in the Republican primary, Supreme Court Justice Tompkins announced Mayor Wallin had won renomination over Ulrich Wiesendanger by 13 votes.

September 8, 1934: Reginald Roberts of Edgewood Avenue, an oiler aboard the Morro Castle, saved from the ship after it burst into flames off the New Jersey coast. Officially, the cause of the fire never was determined, but more than 130 people died in the conflagration.

Latimer, County Government Announces Inflation Busting Measure to Help Residents

Bee Line Bus Ridership Up 30% Due to Free Summer Fares

Whether you were traveling for work, play or a summer beach day — Westchester County residents enjoyed free rides on the Bee-Line Bus this summer from June 1 through Labor Day. The free fares program was valid on all buses in the fixed route bus system including the express route into Manhattan, and the Bee-Line ParaTransit System. Bee-Line bus ridership soared this summer, up approximately 20% on weekdays and 45% on weekends compared to levels in May 2022. Residents who normally purchase a 30-day unlimited MetroCard, saved nearly \$400 this summer. Thousands of residents participated in the free rides program, which will conclude on September 6.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said: "Every dollar counts. In Westchester County, we are working hard to combat rising costs by finding new and innovative ways to provide relief. This summer, we wanted to give people a reason to ride the Bee-Line bus, but more importantly, we want to provide an opportunity for our residents to save some money. While our free fare program may be coming to an end, we have a robust number of cost-saving programs we are rolling out now for residents to take advantage of this fall and winter."

Free fares on the Bee-Line Bus are part of a larger program Latimer created to address inflation, including free admittance to Westchester County's pools and beaches on certain days, and free commuter parking at the North White Plains Commuter lot, and the County Center parking lot from July 1 through August 31.

The fall and winter additional cost-saving programs Westchester County residents can participate in are as follows:

Lowering the Sales Tax on Residential Energy

Latimer has proposed lowering or eliminating the sales tax on residential energy on a quarterly basis, from December 1, 2022 – February 28, 2023. The sales tax elimination covers home heating oil, propane, natural gas, electric, coal and wood for residential heating purposes. It covers homeowners as well as rental units, and landlords/renters will be eligible depending on the structure of the unit's heat and electric use.

Civil Service Exams: Westchester County is waiving the fees for Civil Service Exams through December 31.

Zero Tuition Increase at SUNY Westchester Community College
Together with SUNY Westchester Community College Trustees and the Westchester County Board of Legislators earlier this summer Latimer announced WCC will be holding the line on tuition for the 2022-2023 school year. The flat tuition reflects ongoing challenges faced by students and families who are struggling with rising costs due to inflation, and uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. Annual full-time credit-student tuition is \$4,730 – the lowest tuition among colleges in the region.

Feeding Westchester and Food Pantry Funding

Latimer has increased funding to Feeding Westchester by \$700,000. This doubles what was included in the 2022 budget, and covers the increased cost of food and fuel. Feeding Westchester has experienced an increase this year of \$0.71 per pound across the foods they provide, compared to \$0.60 per pound last year. Feeding Westchester is also seeing an 18% year over year increase in food costs.

The article, "America in a New Light" by Emma Marris, highlights conservation approaches outside of protected areas and introduces the idea that species can be conserved on working lands and in cities. This recognition serves as a proof point that environmental conservation and stewardship is possible in even the most unlikely of places.

As stated in the article, "This project, initiated by community leaders more than 20 years ago, is a hard-won and expensive reality, involving the state, the City of Yonkers, Groundwork, Scenic Hudson, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service." Yonkers mayor Mike Spano says the project has been "a major catalyst for the renaissance of downtown Yonkers and the city as a whole." Other key partners include US Army Corps of Engineers, PS&S, Friends of Philipse Manor Hall, Westchester County, Scenic Hudson, the Yonkers Downtown BID, Beczak, and many other local residents and community leaders. We are so grateful to our friends at the Van Cortlandt Park Alliance who encouraged Ms. Marris to visit us, and are planning to daylight their urban creek, Tibbetts Brook, in the near future.

More from the National Geographic story, "Nothing illustrates the promise of urban con-servation more poetically than "daylighting" a creek. It's easy to forget that all cities were built on ecosystems, and many had rivers and creeks running through them. As cities grew, these waterways were typically confined to pipes or

"In Yonkers, an unofficial "sixth borough" just north of New York City, Saw Mill River, which once powered mills to cut timber and grain grain into flour, gradually turned into a polluted mess. In the 1920s the last 2,000 feet was covered with a parking lot. But since 2012, 800 feet of that section has run through a landscaped channel, sparkling in the sun in a new 2.2-acre park. More recently, other sections, deeper downtown, have been uncovered.

"I take a train from Manhattan to Yonkers to see it. The creek turns out to be visible from the platform. Just outside the station, I am met by Brigitte Griswold and Candida Rodriguez of Groundwork Hudson Valley, one of the many organizations that helped unbury the creek. We cross the street and take in the satisfying sight—and sound—of a burbling river in the center of downtown. We see a fish ladder, installed for the sea-born eel babies—called "glass eels" because they are completely transparent—to climb upstream to grow big.

This project, initiated by community lead- ers more than 20 years ago, is a hard-won and expensive reality, involving the state, the city of Yonkers, Groundwork, Scenic Hudson, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. That first 800 feet cost \$24 million. But Yonkers mayor Mike Spano says the project has been "a major catalyst for the renaissance of downtown Yonkers and the city as a whole," adding that it inspired more than four billion dollars in redevelopment, including 3,000 apartments.

"Green gentrification" can be an ironic consequence of urban conservation, but Yonkers has required some units to be low-income housing. After native plants were installed along the new channel, wildlife appeared as if by magic. Muskrat, herons, turtles, and ducks are spotted here regularly. Another section hosts a hydro-electric wheel that powers nearby streetlights.

In a streamside park, two men are whiling away the afternoon. "I like the water. I like the ducks,"-one tells us, appreciatively. Griswold once worked on more traditional conservation projects, but she wanted to do something that connected people to the non- human world—in part so they would come to care for it enough to fight for it. That meant doing it in the city. Not everyone can afford to visit flagship national parks, she says.

Rodriguez shows me areas on a Yonkers map that were redlined—set aside for nonwhite residents, spurned by lenders. They have fewer trees and more concrete. Access to nature is not evenly distributed. Fixing that injustice may be the best way to create a generation that cares enough about other species to save them.

Rodriguez says the daylighted creek offers a place for people to unwind, creates a buzzy location for businesses, and protects threatened species like eels. "A triple win," she calls it. Griswold sums it up: "There's a beautiful thing in downtown Yonkers, and it belongs to all of us."

SPCA Westchester assists in the Humane Society's Work to Find Placement for 4,000 Abused Beagles



SPCA Westchester welcomed nearly a dozen beagles to its Animal Rescue Center in Briarcliff Manor, NY as part of the group of beagles to be removed from a mass-breeding facility riddled with animal welfare concerns. The Humane Society of the United States is coordinating the removal of approximately 4,000 beagles housed at an Envigo RMS LLC facility in Cumberland, VA which bred dogs to be sold to laboratories for animal experimentation.

The transfer plan was submitted by the Department of Justice and Envigo RMS LLC, with the agreement of the Humane Society of the United States to assume the responsibility of coordinating placement. The transfer will take place in stages over the next 60 days, and the dogs will be up for adoption via SPCA Westchester and other shelters and rescues.

"It's unimaginable what these poor dogs have gone through, says Shannon Laukhuf, Executive Director of SPCA Westchester, and we're honored the SPCA was asked to assist in giving these deserving, brave beagles a second chance. We'll be placing them into foster and forever homes shortly and encourage anyone interested to email Eileen@spcawestchester.org."

The transfer plan comes as a result of a lawsuit filed against Envigo by the Department of Justice in May, alleging Animal Welfare Act violations at the facility. Repeated federal inspections have resulted in dozens of violations, including findings that some dogs had been "euthanized" without first receiving anesthesia, that dogs had received inadequate veterinary care and insufficient food, and that they

were living in unsanitary conditions.

"It takes a massive network of compassionate, expert shelters and rescues to make an operation of this scale possible," said Lindsay Hamrick, shelter outreach and engagement director for the Humane Society of the United States. "We are deeply grateful to each organization that is stepping up to find these dogs the loving homes they so deserve." SPCA Westchester is located at 590 North State Road, Briarcliff Manor, NY 10510. "The one thing I hear again and again about Mayor Spano is stability. A lot of people in Yonkers want the stability that Mayor Spano has brought the city for the past 11 years. They also see what's happening in other communities and they don't want that to happen in Yonkers," said one Yonkers democratic leader.

"If there was someone out there to take over and continue the progress and move the city forward that the party leaders and others were comfortable with, then we wouldn't be having this discussion. But there isn't and the Mayor doesn't want to see the work in Yonkers, on test scores, safety, jobs and development go in the other direction. There's more to do, and for some, the work of Mayor Spano isn't over. It's like having a coach leave before the game is over."

"Usually after 12 years, there's voter fatigue, to the point where the Mayor, or Governor, knows its time to go and the people want you to go. But that's not the case here in Yonkers. There remains a large segment of the population happy and ready to vote for a fourth term."

One question remains in all of this: Mayor Mike Spano has yet to officially agree to move forward with a referendum on a fourth term. He said as much to Ru Ros, saying the job of Yonkers Mayor "is all consuming, and a completely unnatural lifestyle. There are a lot of needs that the city has and a lot that needs to be accomplished."

If the Mayor agrees to play the scenario out, The Yonkers Charter Revision Commission would meet and go over any proposed amendments to the City Charter. The next step would be to hold public hearings and create the ballot question, on term limits and any other charter changes, and to set a data for the referendum.

Another Yonkers democrat said, "If I want to vote for Mayor Spano again, why can't I. Someone else can also run and try to beat him. Who is going to step up? I think his popularity, even after 12 years, is the answer to that question. Let the people

September 8, 1941: Dr. Ward Cook, Director of the Yonkers Bureau of Laboratories, asked Charles Cox, Chief of the New York State Bureau of Water Supply, to resurvey the Saw Mill River watershed. Cook wanted to increase the daily amount of water in the Yonkers water system.

Friday September 9th

September 9, 1926: Van Cortlandt Park Avenue's Catherine Kennedy, "Miss Yonkers of 1926," became the first Yonkers gal chosen to be a Miss America finalist! Kennedy competed against 72 other contestants for Miss America 1926; after more than three hours of questioning, finalists were chosen by secret ballot.

September 9, 1945: Point Street's William Beckmann, Jr., a former Otis Elevator tester, notified the company their badly damaged plant in Manilla, was still standing! He sent a photo of himself standing outside the building to the "Digest," the Otis employees' magazine. In the Navy, Beckmann served as an Electrician's Mate Second Class.

Saturday, September 10th

September 10, 1945: General Brehon Somerveil, Commander of the Army Service Forces, sent a letter to Alexander Smith and Sons Carpet Company President Frederick Klein stating, "Your company has played a very important part in producing the equipment and supplies which have been such a decisive factor in winning the war. You and your associates... must have a deep sense of satisfaction as you look back on your accomplishments on the war production front. Now that the war is won, I want to express to you the gratitude and appreciation of the Army Forces for the magnificent achievement of your organization."

September 10, 1955: Administrator Max Manus announced the newly opened Cross County Hospital and Medical Center had admitted its 1,000th patient.

Sunday, September 11th

September 11, 1926: The new Benjamin Franklin Junior High School opened with 1,200 students. Unfortunately, construction had not finished so students walked on hall floors covered with planks and tarpaper to the tune of pounding hammers. The work was finished a few days later.

September 11, 1927: Elizabeth Tomashevsky, was appointed as the YWCA International Institute Worker; Mrs. Tomashevsky was forced to flee her home in Petrograd, Russia, to escape oppressive Bolshevism. While living in Russia, she chaired a large charity.

September 11, 1936: When Republican Congressional Candidate Oliver Carpenter addressed the Sixth Ward Republican Organization, he warned Democrats to "stop Roosevelt or let the party become the Roosevelt Party."




