

Former Yonkers Teacher Gets 25 Years for Sexploitation of 16-Year Old Student

United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, Jay Clayton, announce that SANDY CARAZAS-PINEZ was sentenced to 25 years in prison for enticing a minor to engage in illegal sexual activity. CARAZAS-PINEZ's sentence was imposed by U.S. District Judge John P. Cronan, who also presided over her guilty plea. "Sexual exploitation by teachers offends every New Yorker," said U.S. Attorney Jay Clayton. "Sandy Carazas-Pinez betrayed her role and, through explicit texts and other means, coerced a 16-year-old into a sexual relationship. Actions of this type by anyone, particularly a teacher or other person of trust, will not be tolerated."

According to the court documents and statement made during court proceedings: CARAZAS-PINEZ was a high school teacher at a school for kindergarten through 12th grade students located in Yonkers, New York ("School-1"). From in or around November 2022 through February 2023, CARAZAS-PINEZ abused her position as a teacher at School-1 by inducing and attempting to induce a student ("Minor Victim-1") at School-1 into a sexual relationship with CARAZAS-PINEZ. Minor Victim-1 was 16 years old at the time of the abuse.

CARAZAS-PINEZ singled out Minor Victim-1 for personal attention at School-1. In addition, CARAZAS-PINEZ induced Minor Victim-1 to engage in sexual activity with her by leading Minor Victim-1 to believe that they were in a romantic relationship.

CARAZAS-PINEZ used her personal cellphone to call, text, and video call Minor Victim-1 to arrange sexual encounters and to repeatedly induce Minor Victim-1 to engage in live-streamed sexually explicit conduct while on video calls with CARAZAS-PINEZ. In text messages with Minor Victim-1, CARAZAS-PINEZ referred to her sexual encounters with Minor Victim-1 and the live

SafetySticks Installed at Yonkers Bus Stops



From the Yonkers Police Department: You may have seen these around...

They are called "SafetySticks" and this is the first full week of a no-cost pilot program that Yonkers PD has embarked on in partnership with the City of Yonkers, Parking Violations Bureau, and Municipal Parking Services (MPS). It's the latest initiative to combat congestion on our roadways by ensuring that bus stops are clear so that buses can pull completely out of the lane of traffic and don't block the roadway, allowing other traffic to move freely.

The MPS SafetyStick is a smart, solar-powered device designed to keep our streets safer and more accessible. They can be installed near fire hydrants, bus stops, and other restricted areas to automatically detect when a vehicle is parked illegally and record the violation. This technology helps ensure that critical spaces remain clear for emergency services, public transit, and pedestrians—improving safety, accessibility, and fairness for everyone in the community.

There are currently 7 devices deployed:

- (3) Central Park Avenue bus stop (by the entrance to MGM Empire City)
- (2) 15 Palisade Avenue bus stop

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Recognizes Yonkers as Bronze Certified for its Climate Leadership Graphical user interface, text, application

Yonkers Mayor Mike Spano today announced the City of Yonkers is designated Bronze Certified by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) as a Climate Smart Community. Yonkers is one of 26 communities statewide to be recognized for helping save energy, reduce flood risk, address extreme heat and develop other plans that demonstrate climate leadership.

“Achieving bronze certification as a Climate Smart Community is a significant milestone for the City of Yonkers,” said Mayor Mike Spano. “This recognition from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation underscores our commitment to sustainability and environmental leadership. Remembing Bob Stauf, Former City Councilman and Forever a Public Servant of Yonkers



Robert George Stauf of Yonkers passed away peacefully on September 16, 2025 after a lengthy final illness. He died at St. John's Riverside Hospital in Yonkers at the age of 83 years old.

A native of New York City, Bob was born there on September 10, 1942 to the late George Stauf and Anne Horton. Raised on Manhattan's Upper West Side and later in the Kingsbridge section of The Bronx, he attended Holy Trinity Grammar School, Fordham Preparatory School, and Fordham University where he earned his Bachelor's degree.

After graduating from Fordham, Bob began a decades-long career as a teacher first at St. Philip Neri Grammar School in The Bronx before moving to Yonkers where he taught in the City's public schools at Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Academy, P.S. 13, P.S. 21, and the PEARLS Hawthorne School. Innately curious, well read, and world-travelled, Bob was a lifelong learner, educator, and mentor dedicated to fostering understanding through meaningful exchanges across cultural, generational, economic, and racial lines.

To call Bob a pillar of his parish and community is a tremendous understatement. For his entire adult life, both in professional and personal circumstances, he tirelessly championed the cause of the underdog, the downtrodden, and the disenfranchised.

First and foremost in all things came Bob's Roman Catholic faith. Nurtured at home by his loving parents and further developed at Fordham by the Jesuits, with whom he maintained close ties for the entirety of his life, it was the bedrock upon which the rest of his life was built. Bob's faith shaped his relationships and guided his decisions. It was the lens through which he viewed this world and the life to come.

Devoted to his parish at St. Margaret of Cortona Church in Riverdale, Bob served as a Eucharistic Minister, Lector, and Cantor. For years, Bob was the Chairman of the parish's Adult Education Committee. He regularly brought enlightening and engaging speakers to the parish for stimulating discussions. Bob was an active member of the parish's Knights of Columbus Council – Pro Patria No. 751 – where he served as the Chancellor and Deputy Grand Knight. It was his ministry as a Cantor which will be remembered for many years to come. Last Autumn, he was honored by the parish at a Mass of Thanksgiving and reception for his years of generously and thoughtfully sharing his musical talents with all of us. Truly, a golden voice has been silenced!

In civic life, Bob played an integral role in the life of the Democratic Party in Yonkers for more than half a century. Rising from District Leader to Ward Leader, Bob ultimately served a short term as a Yonkers City Councilmember. He fondly remembered his years of service to the people of Yonkers. Bob was also the Chairman of several Mayoral Committees, including the Yonkers Human Rights Commission, the Mayor's Community Relations Committee, and the Mayor's Committee on Irish Affairs. In his neighborhood, he was President of the Yonkers Third Precinct Police Community Council. Bob's presence at

Fugitive Pleads Guilty to 2008 Rape of 13 Year Old in Westchester

Justice has no expiration date. The defendant's horrendous conduct, as alleged in the indictment, is no less shocking nearly two decades later. I am grateful to our law enforcement partners in Mexico and the U.S. who brought Mr. Herrera to answer for these charges. This multi-jurisdictional effort exemplifies my commitment to working with any and all agency partners in furtherance of community safety.

Westchester County District Attorney Susan Cacace announced that a fugitive from justice who absconded to Mexico after raping a young child over a decade ago has admitted to his criminal conduct.

Galo Herrera, 53, pleaded guilty yesterday to one count of Rape in the First Degree, a class B felony, before Judge Maurice Dean Williams.

DA Cacace said: "The defendant's cowardly scheme to evade accountability, nearly 20 years in the making, could not outrun the long arm of the justice system. In the intervening years, this office never ceased working to secure his return to the United States. I am hopeful this guilty plea will provide the victim with the closure she has long deserved."

Between December 2006 and January 2007, the defendant forcibly raped a young child who was under the age of 13 years old at the time. Herrera fled the jurisdiction before he could be apprehended on these charges.

In 2008, Herrera was indicted on one count of Predatory Sexual Assault Against a Child, a class A-II felony, two counts of Rape in the First Degree, a class B felony, and three counts of Endangering the Welfare of a Child, a class A misdemeanor.

He was extradited to Westchester earlier this year.

The case was investigated by the Mount Vernon Police Department, the Westchester DA's Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The Westchester County Department of Labs and Research and the New York State Police Crime Lab were utilized in the course of the investigation.

The case was prosecuted by Senior Assistant District Attorney Charlotte Gudis.

Assemblywoman Paulin Introduces Bill to Protect New Yorkers Access to Vaccines

Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, Chair of the Assembly Health Committee, has introduced the Vaccine Integrity Act (A.9060/S.8496), legislation that would allow continued access to vaccines and ensure insurance coverage for vaccinations. Her bill, which authorizes various healthcare practitioners to administer immunizations recommended by existing New York State immunization advisory bodies, is in response to recent federal actions which have disrupted New York's longstanding, reliable vaccine distribution system. "New Yorkers should be able to get vaccines easily and safely at their local pharmacies," said Assemblywoman Amy Paulin. "The newly imposed federal barriers and the spread of vaccine skepticism put New Yorkers' health at risk. My bill would ensure that New York State can continue to allow vaccines to be readily accessible to all New Yorkers at pharmacies without unnecessary obstacles."

Most New Yorkers over the age of eighteen get their vaccines at local pharmacies, where they can simply walk in and receive an immunization. This approach has made vaccination convenient and accessible. Recent federal actions however have made it harder for people to get vaccinated in New York State. Under current NYS law, pharmacies can only provide vaccinations without an individual prescription if those vaccines have been recommended by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC's) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). ACIP has historically provided guidance that New York and other states rely on to shape public health policy, vaccine schedules and insurance coverage.

The September 19th recommendation by ACIP that individuals should receive the COVID vaccine only after consulting a healthcare provider means barriers will exist.

Governor Hochul's September 5 Executive Order expands COVID vaccine access in the short term, allowing pharmacists to administer vaccines to children as young as three. However, the Executive Order is valid for only 30 days, would need to be continually renewed monthly to maintain access, and only applies to the COVID vaccine.

The Vaccine Integrity Act creates a permanent legal framework which would allow New York State to rely on guidance from the New York State Immunization Advisory Council (IAC), the 21st Century Workgroup for Disease Elimination and Reduction (WDER), and any regional advisory body that New York joins, such as the Northeast Public Health Collaborative that New York State jointly established along with eight states in the region (Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maine, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware) on September 15, in addition to ACIP. This would provide New Yorkers with reliable access to vaccines, even if federal guidance is disruptive or delayed.

Importantly, Paulin's bill would require health insurance providers to cover any vaccines recommended by these state or regional committees, just as they currently cover ACIP-approved vaccines. This guarantees that residents can get the vaccines they need without facing financial barriers.

"My legislation provides a permanent solution that protects vaccine access, ensures insurance coverage, and maintains the convenience that pharmacies have provided for decades," said Assemblywoman Amy Paulin. "Vaccine policies must be based on science, not misinformation, and they must expand access, not create barriers, in order to safeguard the health of New Yorkers."

The legislation is sponsored in the State Senate by State Senator Michelle Hinchey.

Real Estate Agent Pleads Guilty to Deed Theft

NYAG James Secures First Criminal Conviction Under Home Equity Theft Protection Act

New York Attorney General Letitia James today secured the guilty plea of former Rockland County real estate agent Oscar Dais for forging the signature of a homeowner to steal her property without her knowledge. In August 2021, Dais forged the signature of Monique Hill on a deed to take ownership of a Rockland County home while the home was in foreclosure. Dais pleaded guilty today in Rockland County Court to forgery and violation of the Home Equity Theft Protection Act (HETPA). This is the first conviction of a crime under HETPA, which helps protect New Yorkers from being taken advantage of when selling their home in foreclosure. Attorney General James worked to expand HETPA in 2023 as part of her ongoing efforts to prevent deed theft and protect New York homeowners.

"Oscar Dais took advantage of a homeowner who was dealing with a foreclosure and stole her property without her knowledge," said Attorney General James. "No New Yorker should have to fear that the home they own will be stolen from them. I will continue to use every tool at my disposal to fight deed theft throughout our state and bring scammers like Oscar Dais to justice."

In 2016, Hill's mortgage lender began foreclosure proceedings after she and her husband defaulted on their mortgage. In August 2021, Dais created a copy of Hill's deed with a signature line for "Monique Clark" – Hill's former married name which she did not use. Dais then forged Hill's signature on the deed and had it falsely notarized. Dais filed the forged deed with the Rockland County Clerk's Office, transferring ownership of the property to a company he controlled. At the time that this deed was forged, notarized, and filed, Hill was in the Dominican Republic and had no knowledge of the forged deed.

In October 2021, Hill reported the fraudulent deed to the Office of the Attorney General (OAG). She then filed a civil suit against Dais, which is still pending. As a result of his conviction, Dais will pay restitution to Hill and the fraudulent deed will be voided, restoring Hill's ownership of her share of the property.

The HETPA is a New York state law that protects homeowners selling a home in foreclosure or default to a buyer who wants to purchase the home as an investment. The HETPA requires complete contracts that sellers have a right to cancel, and the law prevents buyers from deceiving or misleading sellers. In 2023, Attorney General James advanced legislation to expand HETPA to also protect homeowners with active utility liens on their homes.

This is the latest example of Attorney General James taking action to protect New Yorkers from deed theft. In August, Attorney General James charged two people for stealing the home of an elderly woman in Queens. In February, Attorney General James announced charges against a woman in Queens for stealing the home and funds of her elderly neighbor. In October 2024, Attorney General James and Bronx District Attorney Darcel Clark announced the arrests of three real estate scammers for stealing over \$250,000 from New Yorkers and for their roles in a deed theft scheme to steal the childhood home of a Bronx resident. In April 2023, Attorney General James announced two pieces of legislation to strengthen protections and remedies for victims of deed theft, both of which have been signed into law.

New Yorkers who believe they are a victim of deed theft are encouraged to contact OAG by calling 1(800) 771-7755, emailing deedtheft@ag.ny.gov, or filing a confidential complaint.

On This Day in Yonkers History...

Monday, September 29th

September 29, 1938: Uncomfortable horse-hair stuffed jury chairs were repaired to make them more comfortable! Previous jurors got the "fidgets" sitting in the seats, a situation City Judge Charles Boote brought to Mayor Loehr's attention. He told the mayor how difficult it was to sit in the chairs. Yonkers made several improvements for the comfort of women jurors, who had the recent option of jury service after the state jury law was amended.

September 29, 1942: Constance Bennett, Hollywood screen star and former Park Hill resident, returned to Yonkers in the "Stars Over America" musical show presented in Larkin Plaza. Billed as a "Homecoming Day" for Miss Bennett, the program brought several well-known entertainers to Yonkers as part of a major bond rally. Every person buying a \$100 bond received an autographed photo of Bennett; admission to the show was the purchase of a War Saving Stamp.

Unfortunately, she couldn't visit her former home at 179 Park Hill Avenue. Owner MGM executive William Orr was out of town; he purchased the home four years earlier after viewing it once. Orr appreciated the "high stage and screen traditions" of the house, once home not only to Constance, but also her sisters Joan and Barbara and actor father Richard Bennett.

Tuesday, September 30th

September 30, 1942: Linden Street's Carlo Manzo, former member of the Singer Midgets Troupe, was one of the dozens of men who went to New York City to see ship builder Henry Kaiser. Kaiser had a contract to build cargo planes and ships, was offering jobs in Portland, Oregon. Manzo quite definitely stated "I don't want to build ships, I want to build planes!"

September 30, 1944: The Alexander Smith and Sons Carpet Company announced the mill's newspaper "The News" would premiere the following week! The monthly eight-page tabloid would have no commercial advertising, editorials or "preaching from the management." It would carry news about plant operations, employees, sports, and a "trading post;" employees could advertise a possession to

New York State has access to low-cost, environmentally conscious energy alternatives including solar, wind, geothermal and hydropower – we don't need or want Indian Point Back. The health and safety of millions of residents in the Hudson Valley is worth more than any power plant. That is why I support Governor Kathy Hochul's initiative that supports nuclear power plants in New York, but excludes New York City, Long Island and the Hudson Valley in that plan."

Indian Point, which operated since 1962, closed on April 30, 2021, following decades of public concern about the environmental and public safety risks posed by the plant. Under the terms of the 2021 Joint Proposal on Indian Point's decommissioning, Holtec International, the company responsible for decommissioning, agreed not to propose the siting of new nuclear reactors at the site without the explicit support of local government entities, including Westchester County, and the State.

Jenkins said: "Even years after its closure, inspections have identified radiological substances in the Hudson River and cesium isotopes in surface soil, highlighting the ongoing environmental hazards of this site. We have been through this once and we still are feeling the impacts, and we are not doing it again. We absolutely do not support reactivating a facility that continues to pose a threat to our community and our environment."

Jenkins made his comments after some media outlets tossed out the idea of a reopened Indian Point. And Holtec, the owner of Indian Point, has stated, through its spokesman Pat O'Brien, "The question we have been asked the most, since we began the historical restart of Palisades, is 'can IPEC (Indian Point Energy Center) return to service? We wanted to answer that question once and for all that right now it can be, should there be political will, and that it would take four years and \$8-\$10 billion."

"We are not actively looking to restart, just letting people know if the energy need, and political will exist, we would work with the stakeholders," said O'Brien to LoHud.com.

Anyone who wants to have a discussion about reopening Indian Point must first acknowledge that almost every county and state legislator opposes the idea, and worked hard for years to get it closed.

And while Governor Hochul is moving forward with plans for more nuclear plants in New York, they are all planned for upstate. If Hochul were ever to come forward with her support for a reopened Indian Point, she would be met with a room full of Westchester democrats telling her no.

Jenkins said, "New York State has access to low-cost, environmentally conscious energy alternatives including solar, wind, geothermal and hydropower." While this may be true, the cost of those energy sources, and the overall cost of energy for those of us in Westchester and Putnam counties, has gone through the roof, with a proposed 12% increase from Con Edison, and NYSEG proposing a rate increases of 23% for electricity and 33% for gas.

And while I understand that all of our elected officials in Westchester are opposed to the proposed energy bill increases, we are now in a situation where, for the foreseeable future we will see continued increases in our energy bills.

My question is why is that happening? Is it because Indian Point closed, and all of the energy they were supplying, mostly to NYC, is now gone, and as a result of supply and demand, the cost of the remaining available energy has risen significantly?

We asked a group called NYenergyalliance.org for some answers. We received the following response from Alex Panagiotopoulos, co-founder of New York Energy Alliance.

The Walls Are Closing In: Westchester's Energy Reality After Indian Point

When Westchester County Executive Ken Jenkins complains about Con Ed rate hikes, he's not wrong that families are squeezed. But he is catastrophically wrong about the source of the problem, and his reflexive opposition to nuclear power shows why the walls are closing in on New York's energy planners.

Jenkins vs. Jenkins

On the one hand, Jenkins rails against Con Edison's requests for higher rates, blaming the utility for pushing residents "to the breaking point." On the other, he proudly proclaims his opposition to reopening Indian Point, the single largest source of reliable, carbon-free electricity in the region until 2021. In other words, he blames the doctor while demanding the patient be deprived of medicine.

The CLCPA's Impossible Math

The Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA) mandates 70% renewables by 2030 and 100% "carbon free" by 2040. Sounds nice. But the numbers simply don't work:

- 1) Indian Point's output was roughly 2,000 megawatts, running nearly 24/7.
- 2) To match that with solar, you'd need tens of square miles of panels in perpetually scarce downstate land.
- 3) To actually firm that power into 24/7 electricity, you'd need dozens of grid-scale battery farms the size of the blocked 95-acre, 116 MW Somers/Mahopac project.

Westchester residents just rose up to kill one such battery plant, citing fire risk, lack of transparency, and zero community benefit. Imagine telling those same residents that to replace Indian Point you'd need the equivalent of fifty to a hundred Mahopac-sized battery facilities scattered across the Hudson Valley.

Solar Panels on Land They Don't Control

Indian Point-killing Democrats like State Senator Pete Harckham love to wave their hands about the "massive renewable buildout." But where, exactly? Westchester is not Nevada. Every acre of flat land here is contested: homes, schools, woods, reservoirs, wetlands. Residents who won't accept a single BESS battery site are hardly going to accept thousands of acres of solar fields and new high-voltage lines slicing through their neighborhoods. Even the emissionless Champlain Hudson Power Express (CHPE) line, buried under the Hudson River, has met fierce resistance.

Scapegoating the Utilities

Utilities like Con Ed and Central Hudson are caught in the middle. They don't write the CLCPA mandates; they're forced to comply with them. Then, when bills spike to pay for this impossible "transition," politicians like Jenkins turn around and point the finger at the very utilities saddled with carrying Albany's dead weight. It's political scapegoating at its most cynical.

The Reckoning

Here's the hard truth Westchester residents need to hear:

You cannot power a modern county with intermittent solar panels on borrowed land.

You cannot ask families to accept dozens of dangerous battery installations in their backyards.

You cannot demonize nuclear energy as "unsafe" while claiming climate change is an existential threat.

Jenkins wants to have it both ways: cheap, abundant energy with no rate hikes, while taking the largest source of safe, affordable baseload power off the table. Sustainable Westchester, which boasts County Executive Jenkins as a board member, infamously has rates for 100% renewable energy that are higher than the regular rates.

The Way Forward

The only realistic path for Westchester is the same one New York is slowly waking up to statewide: return to the vision of firm, carbon-free nuclear power. Governor Hochul's tentative embrace, in the tradition of President John F. Kennedy and former New York State Senator Robert Kennedy Sr., of new NYPA-backed reactors is a start. But it's time for Westchester leaders to stop pretending we can survive on weather-dependent power patched together with unpopular batteries.

Shutting down Indian Point was a generational mistake. There was never a justification for imposing the CLCPA's trillion-dollar burden on working families. The walls are closing in on the political class that sold Westchester a fantasy," writes Panagiotopoulos.

And who was our Governor when The Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA) became law? Andrew Cuomo, who is now running for Mayor of New York City.

I look forward to writing more about this topic, in the hopes of finding a solution. And if we can't lower our energy bills, can we at least get our annual increases pegged to the rate of inflation?

exchange for something else. Copies of "The News" would be mailed to all 5000 employees at home.

Its masthead was a sketch of the Smith Carpet Mills buildings.

Wednesday, October 1st

October 1, 1966: Former Leake and Watts resident George Barr, who moved there after his parents died, was featured in the new book, *Four Came Home*. Written by Colonel Carroll Glines, it revealed the story of the four survivors of the 1942 Doolittle raid on Tokyo. Lieutenant Barr spent three years in a Japanese prison camp, tortured, kicked, beaten, kept in a straitjacket and "treated" to the "water cure." Barr attended Hawthorne and Yonkers High, where he starred on the basketball team.

When the book was released, Barr headed the Program Management Division of Vulcan Air Defense Office, US Army Weapons Command at Rock Island, Illinois. He passed away less than a year after the book was released.

Thursday, October 2nd

October 2, 1927: The historic Nepperhan Creek began flowing down the new Plaza flume as workers blasted away the 30-year-old retaining wall at Warburton Avenue, diverting the stream underground, changing the course it held for 50 years.

October 2, 1941: City Hall employees were overjoyed by the news... the City Hall elevator was running again! Building Superintendent John Brady had closed it down because he felt it was "unsafe." The elevator cage door was replaced, but defense priorities delayed replacement of the steel doors on each floor. Since it would take an estimated two months to get new ones, City Manager Whitney told DPW Commissioner Chris Sheridan operating the elevator would be fine.

Friday, October 3rd

October 3, 2008: The New York Civil Liberties Union filed a lawsuit challenging Yonkers' refusal to disclose public records of the John Acropolis murder investigation. John Bly initiated the suit; his sister Caralee Bly was Acropolis' fiancée. Bly, writing a book about Acropolis, had asked to access the records five months earlier. Acropolis, a star athlete at Yonkers High and Colgate, was a union reformer who took on the local trash collection industry. During a 1949 garbage strike, Acropolis worked with the Yonkers Chamber of Commerce to start its own private company.

Five months later, Acting Judge James Hubert ruled Yonkers didn't provide sufficient reason to deny Bly's request. Yonkers claimed they considered the case still open.

Saturday, October 4th

October 4, 1924: Three hundred workers lost their jobs when Waring Hat Factory closed their "making" department, leaving only 200 employees, office staff and finishing department workers. Once one of the largest manufacturing companies in the Eastern US,

This was the first shutdown since the panic of 1893 forced the plant to close. The "Making Department" was the largest and most important in hat production; it handled blocking, stretching, stiffening and sizing of the hats.

Sunday, October 5th

October 5, 1943: Henry Samson, Director of the White Plains US Employment Service office, announced he wanted a list of 1,000 women to fill positions at the Eastern Aircraft Division of General Motors in Tarrytown. While speaking about the "manpower crisis," Samson noted women taking Yonkers School of Aeronautical Manufacturing training courses would fill vacancies through December, but more people were needed in January.

October 5, 1954: An unsuccessful thief escaped the scene of the crime in a hail of bullets! After attempting to disable Frey Cleaners burglar alarm, the robber waited. A passerby notified YPD Officers Francis Duff and Anthony Barton its alarm was ringing; they rushed over to see someone disappearing in the brush behind the building. The patrolmen let off a hail of bullets, but the thief disappeared into the dead end of Summit Street.

DiNapoli Audit: State Thruway Authority Has Improved the Accuracy of Toll Collections

The state's Thruway Authority (Thruway) generally bills drivers accurately for tolls, according to an audit by New York State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli. The audit identified some exceptions and recommended better monitoring and corrective actions.

"The Thruway Authority has come a long way since it first introduced cashless tolls, but some problems remain," DiNapoli said. "Even a smaller percentage of unreadable or inaccurate tolls can mean loss of revenue to the state or aggravation for New Yorkers facing incorrect bills. I appreciate the efforts the Authority has undertaken to fix the issues we identified."

In 2024, Thruway reported \$1 billion in toll and related revenues, up from \$804 million in 2021. E-Z Pass accounts for 95% of all tolls collected in 2024. Comptroller DiNapoli's previous audit from May 2023 found the TA needed to improve its collections process.

The latest audit found improvements but work that still needs to be done. For example, auditors looked at collections over a three week period and found 92,000 tolls couldn't be charged because vehicles' license plates were unreadable. At one exit, interchange 25A near Schenectady, some 36,000 tolls were incorrectly charged and another 8,000 that should have been charged but were not, for an error rate of about 5%.

The audit also found Thruway needed to provide stronger oversight of the more than 12,000 non-revenue E-Z Pass tags that do not get charged, as well as the toll discounts it gives to certain drivers. In looking at a random sample of 75 non-revenue tags, Thruway was unable to provide supporting documentation for the eligibility of 46 (61%) tags, making it unclear whether they were being used by eligible individuals

Thruway created the Office of the Toll Payer Advocate (TPA) in December 2019 to help customers resolve toll-related issues, using guidelines with a set of criteria to address the most common issue, reducing violation fees. Auditors found that Thruway did not always follow its own guidelines. In an examination of 50 cases, 20 were for toll-related issues on the Thruway. Of those, 12 received fee reductions that exceeded the amounts allowed by the criteria. While Thruway has the authority to give reductions over its own guidelines, the audit determined that it should document and explain why it's doing so to ensure a fair and responsive process for everyone.

The Thruway does not have a workable method for dealing with undeliverable mail. Auditors looked at 48 toll bills or past due notices mailed out by the Authority's vendor and found 25 were undeliverable. Of those, 21 were for New York and Massachusetts plates and instead of resolving the problem, the vendor continued to send mail to the undeliverable addresses. For toll payers to be treated fairly, they must be notified of the amount of payment due to enable them to avoid accruing penalties. The audit made nine recommendations for improving toll collections and customer service including a review of collections at Exit 25A to ensure charges are accurate, a periodic review of transactions to identify inaccuracies and their cause to prevent them from recurring, a review of non-revenue and discount tags to ensure eligibility, and documentation of toll settlements that are outside of guidelines. The Thruway generally agreed with the audit findings and said it has already taken steps to implement some of the recommendations.

, an employee was suspended for their comments on social media about the killing of Charlie Kirk. However, in that case, we do not know who the person is or what their comment was, as the Chappaqua School District kept it a confidential personnel matter.

Christine Sculti, the Republican candidate for Westchester County Executive, highlighted one of the county employees we wrote about at a press conference outside the county building in White Plains last week. Sculti, who was joined by Assemblyman Matt Slater and Somers Supervisor Robert Scorrano, called for an investigation into the training practices of school resource officers in Westchester.

Somers School Resource Officer Tanisha Blanche posted on Facebook after the death of Charlie Kirk, "Why y'all don't have that same energy for the school shooting that took place yesterday, but y'all crying over the man that was OK with gun violence" and "well that white sniper was over qualified when he put that hole in your neck hunni bunnii."

Sculti said, "Ken Jenkins Ignored Warnings — and Put Children in Harm's Way. The safety of our students is not optional — it's the primary responsibility of the government. Ken Jenkins failed.

"Despite direct warnings from the Somers School District about poor training, broken communication, and safety gaps, Jenkins' Department of Public Safety assigned an officer who later glorified violence after Charlie Kirk's murder.

"This isn't just bad judgment — it's a betrayal of trust and a risk to the lives of children and school staff. I've seen the August 22nd letter from the district. Their worst fears came true — and Jenkins ignored them. This is malfeasance, not mismanagement. And it cannot stand. Our kids deserve qualified, trusted School Resource Officers — not political appointments."

Assemblyman Slater said, "I was the Supervisor in Yorktown and oversaw the expansion of our SRO Program, and I know the important roles these officers play in our community.

"It's not just about protecting our kids, it's also about fostering relationships with the kids so they know they can go and actually have conversations with law enforcement officers, and about being able to harvest information from kids in our schools, that's really important for community safety."

"We had a district that raised concerns citing transparency and preparedness. As a parent and elected official, that is alarming, and people deserve answers."

The letter that Sculti referenced has not been made public, but according to other media reports, it was sent by the Somers School District's emergency office to the county.

Sculti said that the letter is evidence of poor training, broken communication, and safety gaps in the SRO program.

The letter said how the Somers School District had "deep disappointment with the current process surrounding the assignment of School Resource Officers (SROs) to our schools."

The complaint from Somers was that two prior SROs who worked at Somers HS did their jobs, but the retirement of one SRO and the reassignment of another SRO "left a gap in the process of selecting and preparing their replacements."

Media reports added that Westchester Public Safety Commissioner Raynor wrote back that all of its officers are well-trained. SRO Blanche and SRO Andrew Urizzo were the replacements for Somers

After Blanche's post became public, she was permanently reassigned and no longer works in the Somers schools. Blanche was reassigned within the Westchester County Department of Public Safety.

Superintendent Bronstein added, "We appreciate the swift action of the police department to protect our schools."

The problem with Sculti's request that SRO Blanche be fired is that public employees are protected by the same First Amendment rights that all of us have.

And despite the fact that we were offended by her comments about Charlie Kirk, in her role outside of her job as an SRO, she is entitled to the same right to free speech that all of us enjoy.

At the press conference, Sculti and Scorrano intimated that there was already hesitation about Blanche in Somers before her posts became public, despite her having served in the position for only a few weeks.

Perhaps there is more in the letter that the Superintendent shared with the county, but one prominent Westchester attorney we spoke to with experience in law enforcement cases, said, "her comments were outside the role of her job and she is entitled to make them, especially in a case as public as Charlie Kirk. Plus, the county reassigned her from Somers. If she is fired for her comments, she certainly can take legal action."

No comment from the County Executive, who referred the matter back to the County Police Department, who has no additional comment.

We believe that appropriate action was taken against SRO Blanche and that any calls for her termination are not legally sound, and would incur the taxpayers of Westchester with millions of dollars in legal fees and compensation to her, for enjoying her constitutionally protected rights.

(1) 10 N Broadway bus stop- (1) Doyle Park bus stop (274 Ashburton Avenue)

In other areas of the country, these devices can send automated tickets to car owners. Currently, these are just being used in a data-gathering pilot program to help address illegal parking, and there is NO ENFORCEMENT action being taken by these sticks.

We repeat- you will NOT receive an automated ticket if you trigger one of these devices. You may, however, receive a ticket from a Police Officer or Parking Enforcement Officer who is in the area.

We're still testing how these devices look and operate, so for now, we're just using these devices to help allocate enforcement resources to certain problem areas. If we ever move to an enforcement period with these devices, we'll be sure to update our whole community and have conspicuous signage in the areas where they are being used.

We know traffic congestion is annoying- illegal parking is a big contributor to it. We appreciate our community understanding that we're always exploring new ways to keep our streets safe!

The walk began at Messiah Baptist Church on Warburton Avenue and unfolded as both a spiritual journey and a communal act of solidarity. Some participants joined the church in Yonkers, while others walked wherever they were, each step honoring loved ones lost too soon.

The theme was rooted in Scripture: “And walk in love, as Christ also has loved us” (Ephesians 5:2). For many, the verse reflected both the pain of loss and the sustaining power of faith.

“The mothers who lost their children to violence should know to hold on,” Mrs. Whitehead reminded. “Not to change. The love is going to always be there.”

The day stood as an expression of faith, service, and outreach. Rev. Frank E. Coleman Jr., pastor of Messiah Baptist Church, led his congregation in ensuring that the walk remained a space for healing and unity.

For Mrs. Whitehead, the event was about more than memory. It was about presence — ensuring that Kenny’s name, and the names of others taken too soon, remain part of Yonkers’ collective conscience.

“This is why I’m bringing people together,” she said. “So we can remember all the young people that we lost in the city of Yonkers.”

The message, like the walk itself, was simple yet powerful: to rise, to remember, and to keep moving forward, step by step, in faith and in love.

City functions was a foregone conclusion for many years. It was through his activities with the Party that Bob became involved with a plethora of organizations in and around Yonkers, including, The Salvation Army, The Kiwanis Club of Yonkers, and Brahma Kumaris of New York.

However, causes dedicated to Bob's cherished Irish heritage held a special place of affection in his heart. At the height of The Troubles in the 1980s and 1990s, Bob travelled to the North of Ireland on several occasions as part of a U. S. Congressional delegation with the late Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan and Representative Eliot Engel to assess the situation. As an educator, community activist, and human rights advocate, he was uniquely positioned to meaningfully contribute to the delegation's activities. He participated in numerous and productive meetings with both factions. Many years later, the fruits of these labors are still evident.

Bob was a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in the Myles Scully Division of Yonkers and the American Irish Association of Westchester County. Of the former, he was Hibernian Man of the Year and Past Chairman of the Division's Brendan Murphy Memorial Communion Breakfast. Of the latter, he was President and Chairman of the Board of Directors on several occasions and Irish-American Man of the Year. Bob also served as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of The Tara Circle organization. He was a member of the County Leitrim Society of New York, as well. In 2019, the Yonkers Saint Patrick's Day Parade honored him as an Aide to the Grand Marshal, the festivities of which he joyfully recalled. His memorable presence as the long-standing co-host of Emerald Focus, an Irish-American community cablevision television show, will be sorely missed. As many can attest, Bob was a top-notch raconteur blessed with a wry wit.

Left to mourn his death are a few cousins, innumerable scores of friends, and his treasured companion and devoted friend of more than forty years, Catherine T. Marshall of Yonkers.

A wake for Bob will be held at Riverdale-on-Hudson Funeral Home on Sunday, September 21st from 3:00pm to 7:00pm. A Mass of Christian of Burial will be offered at St. Margaret of Cortona Church on Monday, September 22nd at 10:00am. Burial will follow at St. Mary's Cemetery in Yonkers.

depictions of sexually explicit conduct she induced Minor Victim-1 to create as "gifts."

CARAZAS-PINEZ also used her personal cellphone to send Minor Victim-1 sexually suggestive photographs of herself along with sexually explicit text messages. After sending the photographs and messages, CARAZAS-PINEZ instructed Minor Victim-1 to delete them and inquired repeatedly as to whether Minor Victim-1 had done so.

To facilitate their sexual encounters outside the premises of School-1, CARAZAS-PINEZ directed Minor Victim-1 in text messages to obtain day passes from School-1 to be permitted to leave campus. CARAZAS-PINEZ then met Minor Victim-1 at a location near School-1's campus and drove Minor Victim-1 to another location. On multiple occasions, while parked in CARAZAS-PINEZ's car at various locations, including in or around the Bronx, Yonkers, and Staten Island, New York, CARAZAS-PINEZ engaged in sexual intercourse and other sexual acts, and attempted to do so, with Minor Victim-1.

In addition to the prison term, CARAZAS-PINEZ, 36, of Bethel, Connecticut, was sentenced to five years of supervised release.

Mr. Clayton praised the efforts of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the New York City Police Department for their outstanding work in this matter.

The prosecution of this case is being handled by the Office's Civil Rights and Human Trafficking Unit in the Criminal Division. Assistant U.S. Attorney Mitzi S. Steiner is in charge of the prosecution.

Lenny Amicola is a long-time resident of Croton. For some time, he has hung a flag on his property that reads, "TRUMP IS MY PRESIDENT."

The Village of Croton recently issued an appearance ticket to Amicola for violating the Zoning Code.

Amicola hired an attorney and planned on fighting the ticket in court. The Village government then caved and withdrew the violation.

However, the Village Government, led by Mayor Brian Hugh, may be in more trouble due to claims by Amicola's attorney that Lenny's First Amendment rights were violated by a democratic-led government that sought to remove a Trump sign.

Another layer to this self-induced soap opera came when the Village Code Enforcement Officer, Thor Snilsberg, wrote a "Whistleblower" letter to the Village, which claimed that he "was asked to enforce the code unjustly" by the Village Manager.

That letter was obtained by the website thecrotonchronicle.com, which has provided excellent coverage on this topic and is worth subscribing to.

After Snilsberg's letter became public, Roseann Schuyler, Amicola's attorney, issued the following statement. "Today's release of a whistleblower complaint proves that the leadership of the Village of Croton on Hudson conspired to force a resident to remove a Trump flag from his property under threat of legal action against him. President Trump is personally involved in the matter; earlier this month, he congratulated resident Leonard Amicola after the Village announced that it was withdrawing its code enforcement case against Mr. Amicola in the village court.

"The whistleblower was Village Code Enforcement Officer Thor Snilsberg, who stated that he "was asked to enforce the code unjustly" by the Village Manager. At risk of his own job, Mr. Snilsberg stood up for free speech, and we admire and thank him for his principled stance against the village's violation of the U.S. Constitution.

"The village's attempt to violate Mr. Amicola's free speech rights also infringed on the rights of seventeen other residents who were subject to code enforcement action as a pretext for the village's targeting of Mr. Amicola's flag. All people's rights are threatened when one person's rights are taken away.

Roseann Schuyler, attorney for Mr. Amicola, stated, "We are reviewing today's disclosure and will be following up with the Department of Justice, which has been monitoring this case."

The only comment from the Village government or any of the officials involved was the following statement. "The Village of Croton-on-Hudson has withdrawn the violation and appearance ticket issued for the display of a banner, in violation of the Village's Zoning Code.

"This violation was part of routine, Village-wide code enforcement that identified 17 non-compliant locations. Our code enforcement team worked with each property owner to seek voluntary compliance, successfully resolving most violations without further action.

"Village staff have been falsely accused of engaging in a politically motivated enforcement action. The facts above make it clear that this is categorically false.

"What began as routine code enforcement was transformed into a national spectacle through social media and traditional media coverage before any hearing could take place. This has resulted in abusive messages and threats of violence directed at Village personnel who were simply performing their professional duties. These threats are under law enforcement investigation.

"Further, the US Department of Justice (DOJ) has sent correspondence to the Village regarding this matter. While the DOJ letter drew no conclusions about the claims being made about the Village, the letter stated that the Department has the authority to initiate civil action against local governments. The DOJ encouraged "the Village to review its ordinance and enforcement practices promptly to ensure compliance with constitutional requirements."

"Our village government is not in a position to contend with continuous anonymous abuse of staff, threats to personnel, and a federal intervention regarding a minor civil citation for a non-safety-related provision of the Village Code.

"Given these circumstances, the Village must prioritize the safety of its personnel and the conservation of taxpayer resources. After speaking with the Village Prosecutor, the current case has been withdrawn, and no further enforcement actions will be taken."

Congressman Mike Lawler said, "Selective enforcement erodes trust in government. The Village of Croton can't pick winners and losers when it comes to enforcing the law and protecting free speech. Why are some folks held to the letter of the law while others get a pass? The Village owes residents real answers and a proper investigation.@thejusticedept."

One long time Croton resident commented, "I lived in Croton for years. My husband's family for most of their life their whole life actually. I worked in Croton for 40 years and I graduated from Croton Harmon High School. Over the last couple of weeks I made this Village a better place I helped with other people with a group of us to protect Lenny's First Amendment right. By doing so it protects all of your first amendment rights in this Village of Croton. There's people in this group that don't even want to hear from us they don't like anything we have to say because they don't agree with our politics and our religion. This is not North Korea I can say what I want. The Croton Gestapo can't stop me. That's what I'm going to call you guys now the Croton Gestapo. Have a good day."

Amicola and Schuyler appeared on Newsmax to discuss their case.

Now comes word that the Croton Police Department is investigating a death threat sent to village personnel. The email read, "Mangione targeted the wrong individual. Hopefully, others will get it right. F*\$@ You, Leftists Pieces of Dog S*&%. President Trump 2016-2028!!!"

The threatening email is where we get off the bus. While we agree that Mr. Amicola, a Vietnam Veteran, has every right to fly a Trump Flag, or any flag on his property, we do not condone any threats of violence.

"Were it left to me to decide if we should have a government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter.
