SPCA Westchester and Yonkers Police Shut Down Pet World for Animal Abuse

Thanks to a joint investigation by SPCA Westchester Humane Law Enforcement Unit officers, Yonkers Police, Yonkers Building Dept. and the Westchester Health Dept., Pet World, located at 433 South Broadway in Yonkers has been shut down and their license revoked. As you can see from these photos, the conditions these poor animals were living in is heartbreaking. It was a team effort and we are very relieved to know that no more animals will needlessly suffer here.

A police officer was making a call Friday checking a security alarm in a building next door when he walked into the basement and saw the hundreds of birds, ducks, chickens, roosters, and pigeons along with rabbits all con-

tained in the basement.

"It was cramped, it was filthy — keeping birds in a basement, now how they were supposed to be kept," said SPCA Director Ernest Ungaro. Photos released by the SPCA showed "heartbreaking" living conditions for the animals, the organization said.

The birds and rabbits rescued were taken to a local farm. The owner was issued a court summons and they will no longer be allowed to operate in Westchester County. Two years ago, the same store lost its license to sell

Don't Worry, Sprain Lake Will Refill Once Again

Over the summer, we received the following letter from Nicholas. "I was just fishing in the Sprain Reservoir and the water level was significantly lower then it was the last time I fished there which was about 8 weeks ago. The water level is getting lower and Elm Trees are over six feet tall. I'd like to point out that these trees are where 8 to 12 feet of water should be $\overline{20}$ to 25 yards from where the old shore line used to be. The obvious question is if the gates have been repaired and closed why

isnt the lake filling up again?

City Councilman Anthony Merante, who represents the area around Sprain Lake, has been checking the progress with City of Yonkers Engineer Paul Summerfield, who wrote, "I am pleased to inform you that after significant preparation of the Gate House lower shaft walls, the 5th and final sluice gate was installed on Thursday, August 19. The gate's control spindle still needs to be installed, however, the sluice gate opening and all other gates remain closed and the reservoir will begin to finally start filling up. The new roof on

the Gate House will be installed in the next few weeks.

Summerfield explained the work earlier this year. :Repairs to the dam controls were started 18 months ago to make the dam system functional again, in order to meet NYS DEC safety requirements to be able to drain the dam within 14-days. This renovation project would restore the banks of the reservoir, the spillway and spillway channel that feeds into Grassy Sprain Brook; remove the existing non-functioning 48" diameter drain valve below the dam embankment and install a new valve; replace 5 cast iron gates housed in the stone gatehouse in the reservoir; and restore the valve house and gatehouse. The dam and associated structures were built in stages between the late 1800s and early 1900s and so the aged gates and the valve needed to be custom fabricated - a lengthy process. The valve itself was lowered 30 feet down into the valve chamber and assembled in place. The dam system also prevents excess water from spilling on to Tuckahoe Rd. The \$1.6m project was funded largely by a grant from NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. The reservoir supplied drinking water to much of Yonkers before it was decommissioned in the 1970s. Yonkers now obtains its water from the NYC reservoir

system in the Catskills." Councilman Merante said, "Its welcomed news that Sprain Lake is filling up. Its natural beauty will be ready to be enjoyed by everyone from golfers at Sprain Lake Golf course, to fishermen or just travelers on the adjacent park-

way enjoying a water view.'

Yonkers Teachers: We Want Our Students Back in School; Student Athletes Must be Vaccinated

As students across Westchester school districts prepare to go back to school after Labor Day, teachers unions, administrators and most parents are supporting plans to return to a normal school year with studnets in class with there teachers. And as the 2021-22 school year begins, there will be no remote option for the small number of parents who don't want to send their children into class.

Samantha Rosado-Ciriello, President of the Yonkers Federation of Teachers, said "Teachers are ready. We want our students in school. After one year of remote learning, the best place for students to learn is in the classroom with their teachers. We can read the body language of our students, which is important to learning. Some students are reluctant to say I need help, but a teacher can tell when a student needs help by their demeanor or body language. This prompts us to go to the student in a non public way to offer help.'

'All of the social and emotional support programs are in our schools, when they are at home that is not necessarily the case. We did the best we could with remote learning during the pandemic, but both students and teachers need to go back to a classroom. Many parents also realize the

value of having their children in school.

Mayor Mike Spano and the Yonkers Board of Education have mandated that all staff be vaccinated before the first day of school or undergo

Ciriello said that the YFT is currently negotiating all parts of vaccination, ventilation and all back to school issues with the district, adding that while the vast majority of teachers in Yonkers have been vaccinated, there are some who have not been vaccinated for medical or religious reasons.

"We want to make sure that vaccines are available to those who want it, but we do have teachers with medical conditions and religious beliefs, and others who are still uncertain. We support vaccinations and encourage people to get vaccinated but we also believe that this is a choice and that they should not be mandated to do something that they are unable to do. And these decisions should not be made without negotiating with the unions'

In other YPS news, the district announced that all students participating in fall sports and coached must be vaccinated. "This fall, student athletes have the opportunity to participate in Varsity and Junior Varsity Football, Soccer, Volleyball and Swimming. The district is requiring two

Mount Sinai Health System Offers Comprehensive BRCA Program

Last month, Mount Sinai Health System launched a comprehensive BRCA Program for Men and Women. Ashley Tsang, MD, Breast Surgeon, Mount Sinai Doctors-Westchester, and an Assistant Professor of Surgery at the Icahn School of Medicine, explained the program and how genetics

plays a role in the likelihood, detection, and prevention of breast cancer. According to the American Cancer Society, the average risk of a woman in the United States developing breast cancer sometime in her life is about 12.5%. This percentage has stayed the same over the decades, but with screenings and early detections, the medical community has been able to

catch it earlier and save lives and avoid advanced stages. A smaller percentage of women who have breast cancer also have a genetic or hereditary predisposition for cancer, through the BRCA genes, 1 and 2. BRCA1 and BRCA2 are two genes that are important to fighting cancer. They are tumor suppressor genes. When they work normally, these genes help keep breast, ovarian, and other types of cells from growing and dividing too rapidly or in an uncontrolled way.

Cuomo Pardon of David Gilbert Draws Outrage From Law Enforcement Community

During his final day in office on Monday, Gov. Andrew Cuomo commuted the sentences of four individuals, referred one case to the parole board, and fully pardoned one individual. "The march towards a more fair, more just, more equitable, and more empathetic New York State is a long one, but every step forward we can take it worthwhile and important," Gov. Cuomo said. "These elemencies make clear the power of redemption, encourage those who have made mistakes to engage in meaningful rehabilitation, and show New Yorkers that we can work toward a better future. I thank all the volunteer attorneys representing elemency applicants for their dedication and service to justice."

The most controversial commutation was for David Gilbert, who has served 40 years for the Brinks Robbery in Rockland County in 1981. Gilbert was the getaway driver and did not shoot any of those killed in the robbery gone wrong on Oct. 20, 1981 at the Nanuet Mall. One security guard, Peter Paige was killed and another Joseph Trombino was seriously wounded.

Nyack Police chased the car driven by Gilbert before they could escape. When they pulled over the U-Haul Truck, two robbers jumped out and shot and killed Nyack Police Sgt. Edward O'Grady, and Officer Waverly Brown were killed, and two other offiers injured at a roadblock near the NYS Thruway.

David Gilbert, 76, was convicted of three counts of second-degree Murder and four counts of first-degree Robbery in 1983. He's served 40 years of a 75-years-to-life sentence, related to an incident in which he was the driver, not the murderer. While incarcerated, Gilbert has made significant contributions to AIDS education and prevention programs. He has also worked as a student tutor, law library clerk, paralegal assistant, teacher's aide, and an aide for various additional facility programs. At this time, Gilbert is the only individual still incarcerated with no possibility of parole in his lifetime. He will be referred to the Parole Board for potential release.

A few of the individuals who were granted clemency by Gov. Cuomo were incarcerated members of the Release Aging People in Prison Campaign (RAPP).

"We are overwhelmed with happiness for the five incarcerated people granted clemency by Governor Cuomo, some of whom are beloved members of the RAPP family. While our heart breaks for those who did not receive good news today, we double down on our commitment to keep fighting for their freedom. Despite what happened tonight, the fact remains that incoming Governor Kathy Hochul will inherit an indefensibly racist and brutal prison system and we are hopeful that she will lead our state toward a more humane system of justice for marginalized New Yorkers by using her clemency powers and championing parole reform," RAPP Director Jose Saldana said in a statement. "Power to the families of incarcerated people, who shoulder so much of the burden and whose love and labor keep our collective fight alive, as well as the many grassroots activists, attorneys, and the students at the CUNY Defender Clinic, whose unyielding advocacy and commitment to the ideals of redemption and compassion help all of us to build a better world."

Law Enforcement officials were angered by the commutations. "A Disgraceful move by a disgraced man, and silence from Albany," wrote the-Affiliated Police Associations of Westchester.

Gilbert was a member of the 1960s revolutionary group the Weather Underground. Two other members of the robbery team have been paroled over the years. Kathy Boudin was paroled in 2003, after spending 23 years in prison after she pleaded guilty to murder and robbery. Judith Clark was released on parole in 2019 after Cuomo commuted her 75-years-to-life sentence to 36 years.


Other Commutations made by Gov. Cuomo were:

Greg Mingo, 68, was convicted of four counts of second-degree Murder, first-degree Robbery, first-degree Burglary, and second-degree Criminal Possession of a Weapon. He's served 39-and-a-half years of a 50 years-to-life sentence.

Robert Ehrenberg, 62, was convicted of two counts of second-degree Murder, and one count of first-degree Robbery and first-degree Burglary. He's served 28-and-a-half years of a 50 year-to-life sentence.

Ulysses Boyd, 66, was convicted of one count of second-degree Murder and two counts of second-degree Criminal Possession of a Weapon for an incident in which he was not the gunman. He's served 35 years of a 50 years-to-life sentence.

Paul Clark, 59, was convicted of three counts of second-degree Murder, one count of second-degree Attempted Murder, and one count of second-degree Criminal Possession of a Weapon. He's served 40 years of an aggregate 58 years and 4 months-to-life sentence.





On This Day in Yonkers History...



The Glenwood Lodge

Monday, September 6th

September 6, 1934: Former Fordham Tennis Team Captain, South Yonkers Tennis Club star Eugene McCauliff of Fairfield Place lost to William Allison while competing for the National Singles Championship at Forest Hills. Although Allison was ranked second in the country, the tall Yonkers man, a protégé of tennis phenom Vincent Richards, battled through many sets of fast volleying, forcing the game to 5 sets before he lost.

September 6, 1975: Tawny Elaine Godin, an 18-year-old pianist from Yonkers, was crowned Miss America 1976.

Tuesday, September 7th:

September 7, 1904: Hundreds of Yonkers people gathered daily to watch the progress of the construction of the Philipsburgh Building on Hudson Street. It was being built largely from ferroconcrete, with the floors and column made of that material. Early twentieth century ferro-concrete was a relatively new system, applying reinforced concrete, mortar or plaster over layers of metal mesh and closely spaced thin steel bars.

September 7, 1924: The B. F. Keith Vaudeville Exchange, drawn by her beauty and spirit, off Florence Kreisler, Miss Yonkers of 1924, a contract to appear in a vaudeville show with Miss America of 1924, Ruth Malcomson.

Wednesday, September 8th

September 8, 1943: Patrol service of the US Coast Guard Reserve Auxiliary, which had been working out of Ludlow for two years, was suspended by the Coast Guard district office. They had obtained enough boats for regular patrol, and did not need the hundreds of private yachts and boats, painted battleship gray and wearing Coast Guard numbers. These privately owned boats had seen active duty, with owners and crew serving as uniformed Coast Guardsmen. Many of these men were taken into the Coast Guard Reserve to serve on the regular Coast Guard patrols.

September 8, 1951: Joe Golding, backfield star for the New York Football Yankees, was a guest at the Rockledge Manor Hotel (35 Wellesley Avenue). Owner Gordon French hosted many celebrities in the early 1950s, espe-

Yonkers Man Arrested in Connecticut with 4 Pounds of Fentanyl

Norwalk officers arrested a Yonkers, New York man for being involved in large fentanyl trafficking in the greater Norwalk area at 2:30 pm on Thursday, August 26.

After a long investigation, police found the suspect, Orlando Jimenez, with 4.4 pounds of pure fentanyl and large sums of money. The total street value in Jimenez's possession was approximately \$80,000. Norwalk Police Department Special Services Division had help from the New York and Connecticut Field Divisions of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and the Danbury Police Department Narcotics Unit.

Police say that fentanyl is a dangerous drug in all communities. Even if a small amount were to be inhaled or touched can be deadly. Anyone who comes in contact with this drug, including the first responders, can be at risk.

Jimenez is being charged with possession with intent to distribute controlled substances. He is being held on bond.





Yonkers Resident, Veteran, Charged with Attempted Murder in NYC Hachet Attack

Aaron Garcia, 37, a Veteran of the US war in Iraq and a resident of Yonkers, has been charged for attempted murder for a hachet attack on an innocent man in a Manhattan bank-ATM. The incident occured on August 15.

A detailed story from the Daily Mail details how Garcia lived in a Northwest Yonkers multi-family home and "terrrorized neighbors, sneaking into the apartments of females, and chasing the landlord when he asked for the rent. Garcia could not be evicted because of the recent mortatorium.

Yonkers cops had also been seeking to arrest the suspect Garcia, for an unspecified Feb. 15 incident and on four bench warrants for failing to appear in court. Garcia had prior arrests from 2020 incidents of harassment, aggravated harassment, stalking and criminal contempt

aggravated harassment, stalking and criminal contempt.

Garcia is being held at Bellevue Hospital for pychiatric observation.

The bloody victim of the attack, Miguel Solorzano, was not seriously injured, and did not know Garcia, adding that "He didn't even rob me. He took nothing. Nothing. He was crazy."

Relatives of Garcia told the Daily News that after his service in Iraq, he was never the same. "He was a little off-center. He was in combat. All he would say is 'I saw dead bodies," the relative said. Garcia lived with his mother for a period of time bu moved into the multi-family home last year. Family members said that he began to get more rude and disrespectful, but they were shocked at what video footage shows him doing to someone he did not know.

We reached out to the Yonkers Police Department, who responded by stating that "At the time, he (Garcia) had four (4) active bench warrants and (1) active arrest warrant. Charges include Criminal Contempt 2, Harassment 2, Aggravated Harassment 2, and Stalking 4.

"It appears all these charges are domestic in nature and stem from prior arrests and an incident on 02/15/21. He was previously arrested on 07/21/20, 06/04/20, and 03/15/20."

YONKERS MAN FOUND GUILTY IN BRIBERY AND KICKBACK SCHEME WITH CHAPPAQUA SCHOOL DISTRICT EMPLOYEE

A Yonkers man who paid a Chappaqua Central School District employee over \$5,000 in bribes and kickbacks has been found guilty following a two-week jury trial, Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah appounced

Ricardo Jimenez, 57, was found guilty on August 26 of Bribery in the Second Degree and Rewarding Official Misconduct in the Second Degree, both felonies. Jimenez faces a sentence range from a conditional discharge to a maximum of 5 to 15 years in state prison.

Between November 2014 and August 2017, Jimenez paid a Chappaqua Central School District maintenance employee over \$5,000 to ensure district-related maintenance projects were awarded to a company Jimenez owned, RJ Summit Services, Inc., and approve each invoice Jimenez sent to the school district. When the District paid RJ Summit Services, Inc., Jimenez kicked back portions of the payment to the district employee in cash and checks made out from another company.

The Westchester County District Attorney's Office's Investigations Division launched its investigation in 2017 after being contacted by both the Chappaqua Central School District and Johnson Controls, Inc. Jimenez was also an employee of Johnson Controls, Inc., a vendor to the school district.

"Bribery and kickback schemes like this one take money out of the hands of hardworking public employees and everyday workers and this kind of corruption won't be tolerated here in Westchester," DA Rocah said. "I thank the Chappaqua Central School District and Johnson Controls, Inc. for alerting the District Attorney's Office of this fraudulent activity so justice can be served."

The case is before Judge David Zuckerman in Westchester County Court and is being prosecuted by Deputy Bureau Chief Brian Fitzgerald. Jimenez is scheduled to be sentenced on November 29.

10 Westchester Communities Opt Out of Marijuana Dispensiaries, Cafes

We continue to update our Westchester readers on the decision by a number of local, Westchester County towns and villages that have decided to Opt-Out of permitting marijuana dispensiaries and cafes to open in their

We have previously reported that The Town of Eastchester was first, then came the Town of Yorktown. With the help of some of our interested friends in local media, we have uncovered 8 more

They are: Eastchester, Yorktown, Larchmont, Ardsley, Somers, North Castle, Mt. Kisco, North Salem, Lewisboro, and Bronxville.

Three other communities have meetings next month to hear debate and vote on opting out. Dobbs Ferry Oct. 6th. at 7pm, the Village of Mamaroneck will likely place its Opt-out measure agenda in the Fall, and the Town of Mamaroneck is having a public meeting to express your option Sept. 1 and Sept 22.

That would make 13 communities in Westchester who have decided to

opt out. Some of the reasons given for opting out include:

The Town of Lewisboro –split their vote–unanimous to opt out of consumption lounges-cafes, but 3-2 to also opt out of dispensiaries. Lewisboro Supervisor Peter Parsons made an interesting point during the debate on the Town Board on July 12. Lewisboro residents will be able, at some point to order marijuana for home delivery, so why not allow at least the dispensiaries to operate, which will give the Town a share of the tax revenues.

"At the end of the day," he said of marijuana, "I think it will be so available in town that it's a joke to stop it being sold in town. All you're going to do is force business out of the town," by opting out said Parsons, who is one of the few Town Supervisors to vote in favor of dispensiaries.

This from the Village of Mt. Kisco, which explains the process. "On July 12, 2021, the Board of Trustees of the Village/Town of Mount Kisco adopted Local Law 4 -2021, entitled "Opting Out of Retail Sales of Cannabis". The local law adopted pursuant to Cannabis Law § 131, is intended to opt out of the licensing and establishing of retail cannabis dispensaries and/ or on-site cannabis consumption establishments within the Village/Town of Mount Kisco. The effect shall be that retail sales and on-site consumption establishment for cannabis shall not be permitted within the municipal limits of the Village/Town. This local law is subject to permissive referendum. This process would require a community vote on the subject if twenty percent of registered Mount Kisco voters sign a petition, which must be submitted to the Village Clerk, Ed Brancati, by the end of business on August 11, 2021. The Village would then hold a special election to vote on whether to permit cannabis sales."

No word on Rye yet about opting out. The Village of Scarsdale has drafted Opt Out legislation but has yet to vote or approve it. And residents in the Town-Village of Harrison are waiting for a decision or comment from Mayor Ron Belmont, or members of the Town Board on what they plan to

Before the Dec 31 deadline to Opt-Out, there could be 20 Westchester Communities that want nothing to do with legal pot in their communities. 25% of each community will have to sign a petition granting the referendum vote and then a simple majority would have to approve.

If your local Town, Village or City government does not Opt-Out, then they are considered to be opting in. Reports are that the Town of Ossining

will not be voting on opting out.

"We don't necessarily want to be a guinea pig, but there may be benefits to being first," Ossining Town Supervisor Dana Levenberg said. More on Ossining and other communities in the weeks to come.

Report Finds 14.2% of Yonkers Residents Live in Poverty

A new report from Self.Inc, based on the most recent poverty data from the U.S. Census Bureau shows that 19.1% of Yonkers children—and 17.7% of Yonkers minorities—live in poverty. Overall, 14.2% of the Yonkers population lives in poverty, compared to 12.3% for the U.S. as a whole.

To find the cities with the highest poverty rates, researchers at Self analyzed data from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey. Researchers examined poverty rates for all cities with at least 100,000 residents and collected data on both the percentage and number of people living in poverty overall and for children and racial or ethnic minorities.

The analysis found that 19.1% of Yonkers children—and 17.7% of Yonkers minorities—live in poverty. Overall, 14.2% of the Yonkers population lives in poverty, compared to 12.3% for the U.S. as a whole. A summary of the data for Yonkers finds:

Overall poverty rate: 14.2% Child poverty rate: 19.1% Minority poverty rate: 17.7%

Total residents below the poverty level: 27,999 Total children below the poverty level: 8,895

Total minority residents below the poverty level: 24,156

Overall poverty rate: 12.3% Child poverty rate: 16.8%

Minority poverty rate: 17.3% Total residents below the poverty level: 39,490,096 Total children below the poverty level: 12,000,470

Total minority residents below the poverty level: 22,138,000

Dr. Tsang explained that in more than 90% of breast cancer patients, there is no genetic or hereditary cause. But for the 5 to 10% of cases that are due to a genetic mutation, genetic panel testing, which includes the BRCA gene as early as possible is a new recommendation, especially for patients that have a family history of can-

"BRCA genes are associated with a 60%-70% likelihood of breast cancer over a patient's lifetime. That's compared with only 12.5% of all women having a likelihood of breast cancer. That's why it's important for our patients to get tested for the BRCA gene, to see if they are high risk for breast cancer, or if their cancer is associated with the gene since a mutation in this gene is also associated with an increased risk of cancer in the ovaries, prostate, pancreas, and skin.

"The key is to find out early through testing, and then we can offer risk reducing treatments. We can reduce the risk of developing breast cancer by up to 90% with risk reducing surgery, so the earlier women with a strong family history get tested, the better the chances are to prevent developing cancer," said Dr. Tsang.

When a patient presents with a strong family history of breast or ovarian cancer, especially in first degree relatives, genetic panel testing is recommended. "Before 2013, we only tested for BRCA 1 and 2 because those were the most well know breast cancer associated genes. After 2013, more companies were able to offer genetic testing, and we now test for 8 breast cancer associated genes," said Dr. Tsang.

Dr. Tsang explained that the primary reason for genetic testing is "if there is a strong family history for breast or ovarian cancer. If that is the case, we recommend that you see your primary care doctor or gynecologist and ask about testing. These genes are passed down from your family."

How will Mount Sinai's Comprehensive BRCA Program save lives? risk reducing strategies can reduce cancer by 90%. That alone saves lives."

Dr. Tsang said that she refers patients to other physicians when they are found to carry a mutation in the BRCA 1 or 2 genes. "The BRCA gene is also associated with ovarian cancer, prostate cancer, pancreatic cancer and melanoma, as well as breast cancer in men. I refer female patients to a gynecologist so that they can discuss ovarian cancer screening, and potentially risk reducing removal of the ovaries. I may also refer patients to see a gastroenterologist for an endoscopic ultrasound to screen for pancreatic cancer if there is a strong family history. And for melanoma prevention, we refer to a dermatologist for an annual skin exam."

Dr. Tsang added that more and more patients are interested in "wanting to know their genetic history and that's a good thing. The most important part of this program is that it empowers patients with the knowledge about their cancer risk and be able to do something about it. If one of my patients tests positive, I do encourage all their family members to get tested, both men and women.

"I encourage men with a history of cancer in their families to get tested as some genes are associated with prostate cancer, pancreatic cancer, colon cancer and melanoma. Men can get breast cancer, too," said Dr. Tsang.

especially star football players.

Thursday, September 9th

September 9, 1933: Ben Dwight, former Yonkers Recreation Commissioner and Chairman of the National Lawn Tennis Umpire's Association, officiated at the US Open at Forest Hills. Englishman Fred Perry beat Australian Jack Crawford to win the international competition supervised by our Yonkers man!

September 9, 1950: Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell Amazon, the latest owners of Glenwood Lodge at 390 North Broadway, completed a \$35,000 project to renovate and modernize the fifty-room hotel. The Amazons had purchased the lodge from Annie Booth, sister-in-law of General William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army.

Friday, September 10th

September 10, 1935: David Hutchison, the Yonkers artist who painted the Ivanhoe mural in the Children's Room at the Yonkers Public Library, revealed the subject of his second mural, Native Americans on top of the Palisades watching the Half Moon as it sailed up the Hudson past Yonkers. Although there was no funding for the second one, Hutchinson volunteered to continue working if the library gave him a model and the cost of his materials.

September 10, 1964: Yonkers director, writer and filmmaker Michael Roemer won the City of Venice Prize and the San Giorgio Statuette in the Venice Film Festival for Nothing But a Man; the San Giorgio was awarded to films considered especially important for the progress of civilization. The independent drama starred Ivan Dixon and Abbey Lincoln; it focused on the story of African-American railroad worker Duff Anderson's efforts to maintain his dignity in a a small town near Birmingham, Alabama. The US National Film Registry selected it for preservation in the Library of Congress in 1993 because it was "culturally, historically or aesthetically significant."

Saturday, September 11th

September 11, 1941: Six Yonkers companies received government contracts. Cameo Curtain was to manufacture Mosquito Bars and Campbell Hat Company's contract was for Army hats. Otis Elevator Company's contracts were for gun recoil mechanisms, elevators, steel castings and plane engine parts. US Industrial Chemicals contract was for ethyl alcohol and the NY Guild for Jewish Blind received a contract to make more than \$53,000 worth of pillowcases!

September 11, 1944: Colonel John Stilwell stepped down from the presidency of the National Safety Council to serve as chair of the organization's new policy making organization. To celebrate his new office... and to show his gratitude to his former staff, he threw a luncheon in their honor at the Sherman Hotel, one of the best hotels in Chicago. Two hundred fifty people arrived to find had only bowls of fruit and paper cups set on the tables; this later was augmented by some cheese sandwiches. Apparently the dishwashers had gone on strike, so there were no dishes for the luncheon! Stilwell's comment on the snafu? "At least when I was president, there was better food!"

Sunday, September 12th

September 12, 1945: Because the official surrender of Japan lifted naval censorship, the vital part Yonkers played in the war effort was revealed, including the US Coast Guard citation awarded to the Yonkers unit! The Temporary Reserve Unit, Flotilla 203, Lower Hudson Division, US Coast Guard at Yonkers NY, headed by Chief Boatswain Mate H. George Pierpoint, was awarded the honor for using their own boats to patrol the lower Hudson, checking all boats on the river, including the freighters anchored at various moorings in our area. Men over draft age and youths under the draft age manned the unit. At the formal review attended by all the units from New York City north to Poughkeepsie, the unit received both a citation and the Security Shield of Honor "For important contributions to the Port Security program of the United States Coast Guard, thus making possible the safe and uninterrupted flow of our country's manpower and war materials to the battlefronts of the world and hastening the Day of Victory for the United Nations." Admiral R. R. Waesche, Commandant of the US Coast Guard, signed both presentations.
